HOOPER REQUESTS FACTS ON PARTY'S STATUS IN SOUTH

President Asks Department of Justice to Consider Findings of Senate Committee Report on Dixieland

WASHINGTON, March 18.—The president today asked the department of justice to consider the findings of the senate committee condemning conditions in the South.

Almost coincident with the chief executive's comment upon the report of the Brookhart committee on federal patronage, Senator Hooper, Republican, Ohio, today requested that the president not condemn any sale of patronage.

The president said all federal officials known to have engaged in reprehensible behavior should be removed. He added that the senate report referred to Dixieland, race, and conditions which have already been dealt with by the action I took on the twentieth of March last.

Mr. Hoover said recently charges have been brought by the generalization which has been displaced in South Carolina against a member of the new advisory committee there. They have been purposely denied by the new committee; he added, and have been under investigation for some weeks by the department of justice.

Senator Hooper declared in the senate that the Republican party in South Carolina is guilty of corruption and dishonest government and dishonest disposition of patronage.

Calling attention to testimony before investigating District Attorney Hartman and Judge Campbell, collector of internal revenue, both of which testified to Mr. Hooper, a committee member, said both should be dismissed and that he would oppose their confirmation if they were re-nominated.

Senator Brookhart, in presenting the committee's report, said he would ask the department of justice to investigate the Southern situation. Presenting evidence from four states—Georgia, Mississippi, South Carolina and Texas, the report condemned the present practice of dispensing patronage through the referee system as abolished and condemned it as "most reprehensible."

Arrangements are going ahead at the justice department for a thorough scrutiny of the situation in all states where conditions are reported as unfavorable.

WIFE OF MAGICIAN HOUDINI FAILS TO HEAR FROM SPIRIT

MIAMI, Fla., March 18.—The widow of Harry Houdini, the world-famous magician, today said she had abandoned hope of communicating with her husband in the spirit world.

"She said that for three years she had sought to penetrate the veil of the grave and communicate with her husband, but now has renounced faith in such a possibility."

"I hoped and prayed and worked to get a message from Houdini," she said, "but several of the great spiritualists I consulted declare I have succeeded. But it is not true. The silence is void."

"I had succeeded in communicating with Houdini I would carry a message of hope to all burdened souls, but I have none. There is nothing to be said."

BONEH TESTIFIES IN BRIBERY TRIAL

Oil Man Maintains \$100,000 Advanced to Fall Loaned and Not Offered as Bribe

WASHINGTON, March 18.—The testimony of a sharp cross-examination, Edward L. Doherty maintained today that the \$100,000 advanced to the oil man in 1921 was a loan and not a bribe.

Doherty went when he testified concerning his son who was killed by his secretary a year ago. He said that the government had not proved its case against him in the cross-examination.

He evaded the question of his refusal to testify in the trial which resulted in the \$100,000 loan being returned to the government until the trial was over.

Finally Owen J. Roberts, special government prosecutor, read to the jury a statement that Doherty had read to the court in the civil trial, which wound up with the assertion that he had testified in the grounds that anything he might say might tend to incriminate him in the subsequent criminal trial.

Roberts endeavored to show that Doherty and Fall had conspired prior to November 30, 1921, to get possession of the oil man's property.

FRANCE AND ITALY CONTINUE AT ODDS AT LONDON PARLEY

Failure to Overcome Obstacle Likely to Result in Limited Five-Power Pact Including Building Holiday

LONDON, March 18.—An endurance deadlock between France and Italy over naval parity wore on today, the opinion grew in naval conference circles that neither side was prepared to yield.

If the present situation lasts through Sunday, when Premier Tardieu of France, will return for another conference with Prime Minister MacDonald of Great Britain, authoritative quarters see the end of negotiations within two weeks.

300 MEN LOSE JOBS IN MINES IN NORTH IDAHO

Dog Doomed To Die For Killing Sheep Escapes From Death Cell

SANTA ROSA, Calif., March 18.—A dog sentenced to die for killing sheep, escaped from his cell in the city pound a short time before he was to have been executed.

When the poundmaster came to get the dog, he found him gone. Investigation disclosed two boards had been torn away from the cell.

The dog's owner, George Weber, claimed the escape was circumstantial and sought to attack the state law requiring that sheep-killing dogs be executed.

The legal phase of Weber's fight was unsuccessful but dog lovers the country over rallied to Tim's defense. From all parts of the United States telegrams and letters poured into the office of Governor C. C. Young at Sacramento urging him to reprieve the dog and permit it to be sent some place where there are no sheep.

BRITON'S RACE CAR DEVELOPS TROUBLE

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla., March 18.—A broken gasoline line today delayed tests of a British-made race car for the world's fastest speed record.

WASHINGTON, March 18.—Provision for censorship of imports of foreign literature were restored to the tariff bill tonight by the senate.

In action, on which no record was taken, ended two days of debate fraught with vigorous and picturesque attacks upon the principle and application of censorship.

CHASE NATIONAL BANK OF CITY OF NEW YORK BECOMES GREAT-EST FINANCIAL INSTITUTION

NEW YORK, March 18.—Creation of the world's largest bank with resources approximating \$2,800,000,000 to be known as the Chase National Bank of the City of New York, was announced today.

The institution is to be formed, subject to the routine approval of stockholders, through the merger of the Chase National bank, now the largest bank in the country, with the Equitable Trust company, which in turn is absorbing the Trust Company of New York.

OFFICERS FAIL TO FIND CAPONE IN WINDY CITY

CHICAGO, March 18.—Both Chicago morning newspapers, The Tribune and The Herald and Examiner, today said they had no word of Al Capone's whereabouts.

The officers returned to Chicago this morning, and that Deputy Police Commissioner John Egan sent several squads out to look for him. The most widely circulated report was that Capone arrived by plane from Cleveland, where he is thought to have spent last night.

In any event, he headed the many police who were supposed to arrest him upon sight as an undesirable citizen. Tonight, it was rumored, a welcome celebration was being held for him at a South Side hotel, with friends and business associates greeting him.

INCH OF RAIN FALLS DURING 10 MINUTES IN SOUTH CALIFORNIA

SANTA ANA, Cal., March 18.—An inch of rain was reported to have fallen in 10 minutes today as a miniature tornado and water-spout swept across ranches here.

The storm apparently touched the earth for the first time at the Santa Ana airport. An inch and a quarter of rainfall flooded the field within 10 minutes.

WORD OF CONFLAGRATION FAILS TO REACH OUTSIDE-WORLD UNTIL EARLY MORNING BECAUSE OF BROKEN WIRES

ELK CITY, Idaho, March 18.—This little mining town was almost wiped out by a fire last night. Telegraph and telephone wires were burned, cutting communications until this morning.

Flames started at 4:40 P. M. and spread through the whole business district unchecked, householders racing to save their personal belongings before the strong wind could drive the fire into their homes.

S. Morgan, hotel owner, was the organ reported seriously hurt. He was struck by falling timbers as he carried furnishings from his hotel. Mrs. Morgan sustained damage to the town at \$200,000.

Buildings burned down included a business-house, one residence, two hotels, a pool hall, a bowling alley and a drug store. The nearly 200 inhabitants were helpless for there was no fire department.

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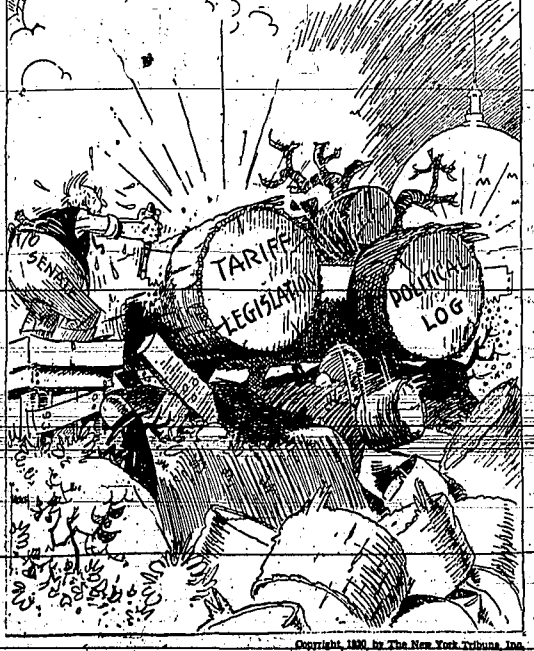

# Turning the light of Truth on false and misleading statements in recent cigarette advertising

**W**HAT ANOTHER MANUFACTURER of cigarettes chooses to say about his product is not our affair. Even when he sees fit to misrepresent his product and leave false impressions concerning it, that still is his business—not ours.

But—when, in his advertising, he goes beyond his own product and makes false statements or leaves misleading impressions about other cigarettes—then it is time that the truth be told.

Some time ago a manufacturer of cigarettes used the following statements in his advertising:

"The extra secret heating process removed from ( ) harmful irritants, corrosive acids, which are present in cigarettes manufactured in the old-fashioned way, and which cause throat irritation and coughing."

"No matter how much or how little you pay for cigarettes you have a choice of only two general classes, and not more than two. In one class you have the billions of cigarettes manufactured in the old-fashioned way and in the other class you have ( ), the toasted cigarette, a product of modern science, a cigarette from which harmful irritants have been removed by that extra secret process described by the phrase 'It's Toasted!'"

**W**HEN THESE STATEMENTS were first made, we assumed that they were a casual phase of that manufacturer's advertising and did not represent a deliberate and calculated policy. After making a few such statements, he abandoned this particular form of advertising. However, other statements used in his advertising came to the attention of the Federal Trade Commission as a question of their truthfulness.

As a result of the action of the Federal Trade Commission he was ordered to stop his admitted practice of using in his advertising false testimonials of non-smokers to the effect that they kept slender by smoking his brand of cigarettes, and was further ordered to stop using other fake testimonials and the specious argument that all can keep slender by smoking that brand of cigarettes. He then began to use again the form of statement quoted above or variations of it.

**I**F ANY MANUFACTURER chooses to say that the tobacco he uses contain "harmful irritants, corrosive acids, that are injurious to the throat," and then to claim that these things are removed by the heat-treating process, that is his own affair. But when he tries to create the impression that it is general practice to use in cigarettes such rank tobacco as he describes, we object to the attempted reflection on the industry.

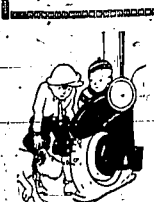

VERDICT AT TRIAL FAVORS STEINBERG

Federal Court Jury Finds Kimberly Produce Man Not Guilty of False Billing

Otto Steinberg, Kimberly produce dealer, accused of billing potatoes in carloads at less than actual weight in violation of the interstate commerce act, was found not guilty by a jury in federal district court at Pocatello. The verdict was returned within 30 minutes after the jury received the case shortly before noon.

The alleged misrepresentation in regard to weight of the potato shipments was asserted to have been made in order to obtain advance in freight rates, but evidence indicated that the full amount of freight charges on the actual weights had in reality been paid.

There were 10 counts in the information accusing Steinberg of the crime, each referring to a different shipment, four of which were made from Hansen and the others from Kimberly. Alleged violation between actual weights and billings ranged from a few hundred pounds on one car to 10,000 pounds in another.

The case for Steinberg was presented by S. L. Hodgins and J. L. Hodgins, Twin Falls, while the government was prosecuted through District Attorney H. E. Day, assisted by C. W. Scott, attorney and investigator for the interstate commerce commission.

Witnesses summoned to testify at the trial Monday and Tuesday included William Savage, John Savage, Albert Brown, James Kimball, L. E. Ward, I. E. Finney, Kimberly, J. L. Shepherd and George Trout, respectively Oregon-Short-Line agents at Kimberly and Hansen.
