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Idaho Mining Industry Enjoys Year Of Prosperity In 1929

VALUE OF STATE'S OUTPUT RISES TO OVER \$35,016,005

Stewart Campbell, State Inspector, Reports Increased Production Totaling \$5,414,979 in Period

(By The Associated Press) Boise, March 19.—The last year was one of the most prosperous for the mining industry in the history of the state, with the value of the output being \$35,016,005, an increase over the preceding year of \$6,414,979, report of Stewart Campbell, state mine inspector, said today.

During the year there was a substantial increase in production of silver and lead; the production of zinc and copper was practically doubled and the value of the output was the largest in any year since 1918 and has exceeded that four times in Idaho. The value of gold produced remained about the same.

The number of producers was the same, totaling 194, with Shoshone county continuing unapproachably in the lead with 50 producers and a total value of output fixed at \$22,330,870 or more than 90 per cent of the state's production. The next came Custer county with metal valued at \$1,129,541, a figure which was increased more than three times over the preceding year.

Of Shoshone county Inspector Campbell reported that it "made a record increase in the production of the five chief metals, particularly zinc and copper, which was almost double that of the previous year. The rank in percentage as compared with the rest of the state was a little less, being 62.81 per cent in 1928 and 61.48 per cent in 1929.

Production Increases
"The total production in 1929 was \$32,030,870 as against \$27,474,740 in 1928, thus accounting for a large part of the total state increase between the two years. This county was first in the production of lead, silver and zinc; Boise county was first in the production of gold and copper, while Shoshone county stood second in all its copper being derived as a by-product from lead-silver ore."

"The respective rank of the principal mining counties in point of total production was: Shoshone, Custer, Blaine, Butte, Boise, Lemhi, Bonner, Idaho, Owyhee and Valley."

"The year witnessed the further receding out of a number of 6231 placer mines of the type that once brought such wealth to their operators in the early gold rush days in the state."

"The number of big producers increased, however, a factor which the mine inspector said was indicative of the expansion that the mining industry is witnessing, the property inflored during the year, and the pos-

abilities that Idaho offers for the developing of new mines."

"Total production and value of the various metals as compared with 1928 follows:

Gold output was 20,742.52 ounces valued at \$428,729.20, a decrease of 4.87 ounces in production and \$222.32 in value. The value remained standard at \$20.21 per ounce.

Silver output increased from 8,267,484 ounces in 1928 to 9,446,684 ounces in 1929 but value dropped from \$5,228,558.70 in 1928 to \$5,006,059.50 in 1929. The drop in value, which came in spite of the increased production, was due to the drop in average price from \$6.18 cents an ounce to \$5.81 cents.

Lead prices Good. Lead production increased from 302,509,871 pounds valued at \$19,078,354.41 in 1928 to 312,151,641 pounds valued at \$19,230,817.61 in 1929. An increase of 9,560,770 pounds and \$152,463.20 in value. The value per pound increased from 6.36 cents in 1928 to 6.16 cents in 1929.

Zinc production was 110,767,523 pounds valued at \$7,473,161.00 compared with 102,543,304 pounds valued at \$4,480,142.80 in 1928. The year's production was greater than that of any year since mining began in Idaho, exceeding the 1928 production by 56,423,980 pounds and \$2,723,028.20 in value.

Copper production more than doubled that of 1928, totaling 5,726,407 pounds valued at \$1,038,707.81. Production in 1928 was 2,643,200 pounds, valued at \$297,450.70. The value per pound increased from 14.57 cents in 1928 to 18.07 cents in 1929.

ber of the house from New York who now lives in Chicago, testified that he was one of the men who were in the credit for the growth of sentiment that resulted in the Eighteenth amendment, then was more critical of the temperance societies put together. He described conditions he attributed to liquor traffic, before enactment of the dry laws and said that modern industry demanded sobriety of its workers."

Resuming their testimony for their third day before the committee, the "dry" made a quiet attack today on the arguments presented by anti-prohibitionists.

At the conclusion, the "dry" announced only one witness for tomorrow, Daniel C. Rogers, a former commissioner of internal revenue, is scheduled to appear. Mrs. Lenna Lowe York, a former member of the legislative committee of the National Association of Organizations supporting the Eighteenth amendment, planned to read a statement from Professor Irving Fisher of Yale university, on the benefits of prohibition, probably will be offered for introduction by DeLoe Pickett, his secretary.

Commander Doeltz's remarks were presented by Colonel H. W. Jenkins of the Salvation Army.

In Salvation Army hotels in the pre-prohibition days, he said, between 25 and 33 per cent of the men in them were under the influence of intoxicating liquor. During a recent knighting scene in Chicago, it added, 500 men in a hotel were vaccinated and not one of them was found to be under the influence of drink. He stated said bowery workers in New York, "will dance without the slightest hesitation that conditions are fully 70 per cent better in every way than before the prohibition-law was enacted."

Another development in the prohibition controversy was the announcement by Representative Clay Republican, Missouri, that the law enforcement commission was continuing its study of his 2.75 per cent proposal. It said he had been advised that Chairman George W. Watersham of the commission, was not speaking for that group when he remarked after a Senate Judiciary committee meeting that he did not believe that 2.75 per cent bond would satisfy "robust appetites."

IRRIGATION WATER CONDITIONS VARY ON IDAHO PROJECTS

Plentiful Supply Appears for Snake River Farmers According to Forecast by Reclamation Department

(By The Associated Press) Boise, March 19.—A dry season for several Idaho projects yet plenty of water for Snake river irrigators and those on the principal tributaries is forecast by the department of reclamation in a report released today.

Taking each storage point in turn it said:

Jackson Lake Reservoir contains 691,550 acre feet compared with 610,000 acre feet a year ago while water conditions are 35 to 40 per cent below normal compared with 30 per cent below normal last year. The reservoir will fill with a favorable run-off.

American Falls reservoir contained 949,000 acre feet on March 1 compared with 1,400,000 last year but will fill to its capacity of 1,700,000 acre feet unless unusual conditions prevail.

Blackfoot reservoir contained 297,000 acre feet on March 1 compared with 240,000 a year ago although this was due to about 15,000 acre feet more carryover than in the previous year. Snow on the watershed is reported below normal

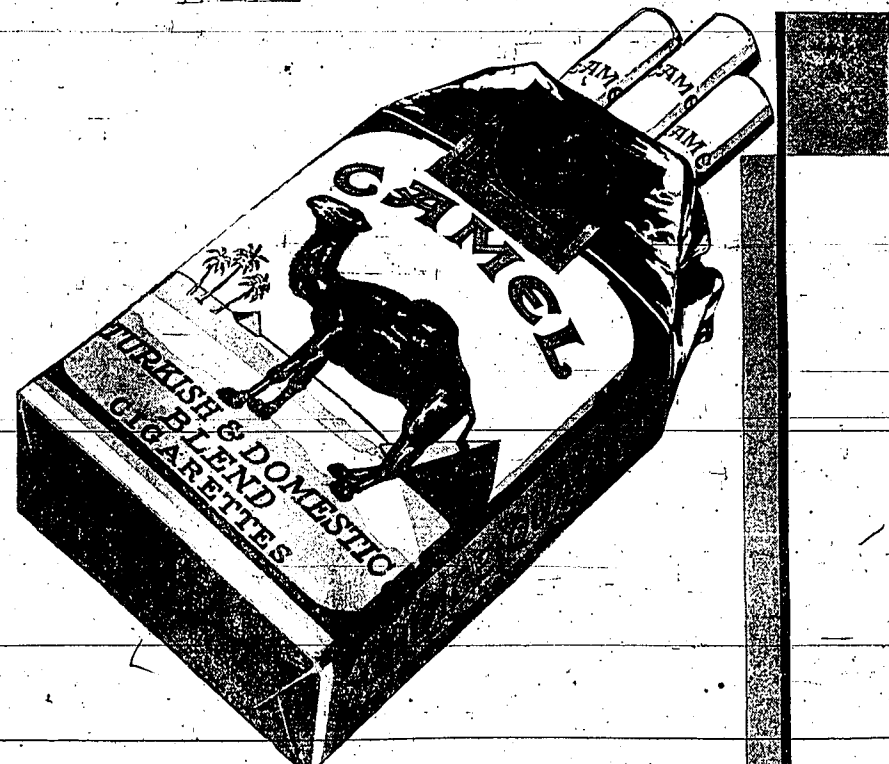

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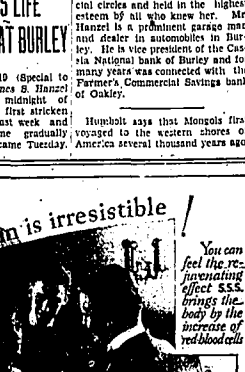
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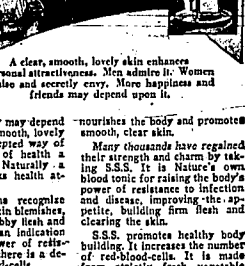

STOCKMEN OF IDAHO IMPORT PUREBREDS FOR DAIRY PURPOSE

Dr. A. J. Dickman, Director of Animal Industry, Says Trend Indicates Improvement in Gem State-Herds

(By The Associated Press)
BOISE, March 19.—Idaho is shipping fewer and importing more purebred dairy cows, and at the same time exporting more grade stock than she is importing. Dr. A. J. Dickman, director of animal industry, reported today.

Dr. Dickman took the trend as an indication that Idaho herds were steadily being built up with pure stock while the grade material was being moved out.

At the same time, this movement of good stock furnishes a steady income to the state and one in which the dairymen seem to be assured a "lasting market" because of the high quality of cattle.

Export Data
In 1927, Idaho exported 200 purebreds and 800 grades. In 1928 she exported 110 purebreds and 472 grades. In 1929 the exportation of purebreds and grades was 100 and 472. The importations for 1927 were 200 purebreds and 790 grades. In 1928 280 purebreds and 100 grades were brought in. In 1929 268 purebreds and 123 grades were imported.

The principal market for the exports is California, Los Angeles county in particular. In that county showed Idaho leading all states as a source of supply for the country's stock, having shipped 1000 head during the last year. Utah ranked second with 432 head. So placed are Idaho's dairy shipments to get the Idaho stock that Dr. L. M. Hurt, livestock inspector for Los Angeles county, has written Dr. Dickman commending the state for its high quality of stock, and particularly its attention to breeding and tuberculosis. This latter factor alone, Dr. Hurt said, assures Idaho of a "lasting market" in Los Angeles county.

BROTHERS DISPUTE CLAIM FOR WAGES

Thomas Logan, Kimberly, Demands John Logan's Demand for Pay for Farm Work

John Logan, California, and Thomas Logan, Kimberly, his brother, each over 70 years of age, were principals in the trial in district court here yesterday of a lawsuit growing out of John Logan's claim for \$2500 wages for work done for his brother on farms at Kimberly and Murtaugh during nearly five years from February, 1921, to December, 1923. Introduction of evidence occupied almost the entire day and the case will be given to the jury following attorneys' arguments and delivery of the court's instructions.

The suit, which was filed for John Logan by Harry Benoit, attorney, last November, is said to have been brought following long continued effort to arrive at a settlement out of court. John Logan claims wages at the rate of \$40 a month, and acknowledges payments received from his brother in the sum of \$700 cash and \$200 for work clothes, tobacco and other articles.

Thomas Logan, represented at trial by M. J. Beverly, attorney, asserted that the settlement was complicated by reason of certain agreements to discontinue the suit and maintenance payments that his brother obligated himself to pay. He denies such an agreement and says that Thomas Logan lives on a farm near Kimberly and is one of the original entrants on the Twin Falls project.

BEAN ASSOCIATION PAYS OUT \$125,000

Headquarters Issues Checks Making Total for Year to Members \$875,000
The Southern Idaho Bean Growers' association yesterday began mailing checks for about \$125,000 representing one half a cent a pound for beans insured by the association last year. This amount represents three and a half cents a pound or a total for the year so far of \$875,000. Approximately 700 persons receiving these checks, which have been issued periodically to members from time to time as sales have been completed.

The checks are issued from the headquarters of the office here by C. R. Detrick, manager of the association.

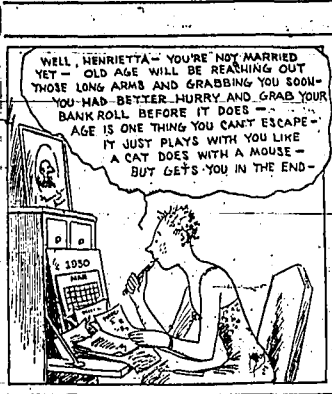

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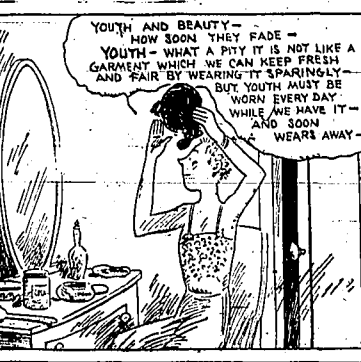
