

16 AMERICANS HOLD KIANGSI PROVINCE

Foreign Minister in Message Declares Nationalist Government Taking Measures to Suppress Red Forces

(By The Associated Press) SHANGHAI, March 25.—Sixteen American missionaries and their families, 10 of whom are men and six women, are bottled up in Kiangsi province, by bandit and communist armies, and their condition is reported as serious.

MILAN, Italy, March 25 (AP)—"Pluto" is the provisional name that Italian astronomers have given to the new trans-Neptune planet discovered March 13 at Lowell observatory, in Flagstaff, Arizona.

Professor Emilio Bianchi, and his assistants at Breara observatory, have photographed the new planet, despite the fact that the weather has been bad, and they hope with one more night to confirm some of the American researchers.

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GALE AND SNOW IN WINDY CITY CAUSE FREQUENT MISHAPS

Storm Delays Automobile Traffic and Interrupts Communication With Resultant Lists of Injuries

(By The Associated Press) CHICAGO, March 25.—High winds and drifting snow today held transportation almost at a standstill, hampered communication, caused numerous accidents and were held directly responsible for at least three deaths.

The storm swept out of the northeast, raced over the lower Great Lakes states, and extended south into the Missouri Ozarks.

Speed Mistress Of Seas Steams Into Fog-Bound Gotham Harbor After Shattering Ocean Record

NEW YORK, March 25 (AP)—The new speed mistress of the seas—the North German Lloyd liner Europa—aid in to a fog-bound New York harbor today with a new trans-Atlantic record for her maiden voyage from Cherbourg breakerwater to Ambrose lightship, just off the entrance of the lower bay.

Cutting through a light mist and drizzle, the Europa passed the lightship at 5:24 A. M., to establish a record of 17 hours 58 minutes for the run across the Atlantic's speed lane.

The Europa averaged a speed of 27.2 knots in the 3157 miles she traveled from Cherbourg breakerwater to Ambrose light—a course that was never shorter than the route taken by the Bremen in her record-breaking October run.

SENATE RECESSES AFTER APPROVING BUILDING MEASURE

The chief delegates of the five powers decided upon this course today. The exact date of the plenary session will be announced after Paris Minister Briand returns from Rome to head the French delegation.

Work for constructing a forest products laboratory at Madison, Wisconsin, and \$60,241 for repairing roads in South Carolina which were damaged by the floods.

The bill of Senator LaFollette, Republican, Wisconsin, authorizing the Forest products laboratory for the University of Wisconsin was passed earlier in the day.

All amendments proposed by the senate appropriations committee to the agriculture measure were approved. The bill carried a total of \$10,253,768 as finally passed.

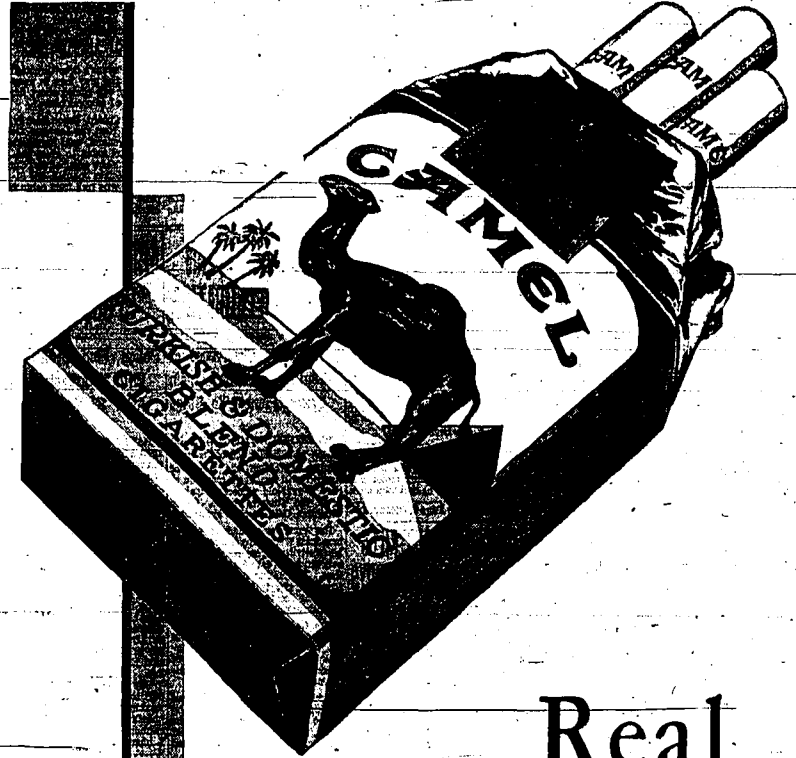

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# Grid Rule Board Acts To Enforce Stop Period On Shift Play

## Committee Bans Apparel Colored Same As Pigskin

Four Pairs of Eyes Instead of One or Two Keep Constant Lookout for Violations During Next Year

BY TED VOSBURGH (Associated Press Sports Writer) NEW YORK, March 25—Finding that some teams last fall were beating the stop rule on shift plays and others were wearing and the same color as the ball to trick opponents, the national football rules committee today announced definite action to curb these practices. These were the most important results of the annual session of rule-makers for 1930.

Instead of "approximately one second," the stop period on shift plays was changed to "a period of at least one second." The count roughly measured the amount of pause was increased from four to six and the referee was empowered to carry over and watch to assure himself that the rule is being obeyed.

Four pairs of eyes instead of one or two will be on constant lookout for any and all violations of the rules next year, under a provision giving the referee, umpire, field judge and line judge "jurisdiction over all fouls."

Under the old code there were certain fouls which the referee was to look out for and others for which one of his fellow officials was solely responsible.

Referee Final Judge The referee will act as the final judge upon any conflict of testimony or opinion arise.

Repealing "unfortunate tendencies" as represented by the use of camouflage in designing uniforms, the committee adopted a resolution which prohibited the use of jerseys, protectors, jerseys or attachments which are so similar in color to the ball that they give an unfair and unsportsmanlike advantage over their opponents.

### FILER FARMER PLANTS SMALL FOREST ON FARM

With a view to giving first hand information to Idaho farmers on the planting and care of forest and shade trees in the way of farm-forest plantings of woodlots, shelter-belts and windbreaks, a tree-planting demonstration program has been arranged on the farm of G. C. Nio, Rout 1, one and one-half miles north and two miles west of Filer, on Monday, March 31, at 1:30 P. M., according to an announcement by County Forester Harvey S. Hale, Extension Agent A. M. Bowder of the Idaho college of agriculture, Moscow, will be present to supervise the planting and explain the procedure.

The county agent stated that it is the aim of the extension division to have farm forest plantings on every Idaho farm which will not only make the farms more attractive but also supply a source of forest products in the way of fence posts, props, poles, wagon tongues, double trees and so forth. Also, he said, tree offer protection to the farm buildings and livestock and are often the best means of utilizing odd pieces of farm land, or soil that is not fit for crop cultivation. The cost of establishing such plantings, he added, is almost negligible when compared with the final returns.

### PASSENGER LOSES SUIT FOR DAMAGES

#### Jury Awards Judgment to H. J. Rouch, Sued by Former Neighbor in Oregon

Robert Ludwig, 69, one time La Grande, Oregon, butcher, gained nothing when he went to court to collect his claim for \$3225 damages from Henry J. Rouch, Twin Falls, former neighbor in Oregon, for injuries he said he had received while riding with Rouch in an automobile here last September 15.

A jury in district court here yesterday at the conclusion of trial in Ludwig's suit gave him nothing but returned a verdict in favor of the defendant Rouch. The jury received the case at 11 A. M. after hearing testimony by attorneys and receiving the court's instructions, and returned the verdict at 1:30 P. M., taking time out for lunch.

Ludwig claimed to have been hurt when Rouch's car collided with another machine at an intersection in South Park addition, Twin Falls. Witnesses, including Martin Meier, driver of the other car, testified that both cars were moving slowly, none of the passengers was thrown from his seat, and a crumpled fender on Rouch's machine was the only damage.

Other testimony was offered to show Ludwig had been a guest at Rouch's home several days before the accident, and that Ludwig had broken his leg in Oregon several years ago and that the injury had not healed perfectly. Through his attorney, O. C. Hall, Rouch moved for a nonsuit when court sessions resumed yesterday morning after all of the evidence in the case had been submitted.
