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STORM IN GENERAL STATES SETS NEW SNOWFALL RECORD

Chicago Weather Bureau Reports 18.5 Inches During 50 Hours, Eclipse March of Winter 12 Years Ago

(By The Associated Press) CHICAGO, March 26.—Approaching the fifth 12-hour tonight, a post-winter storm which already has snuffed out all reports of snowfall, continued unabated.

Snow fell through the day to defeat all attempts to clear highways or maintain transportation schedules. At Chicago, reports to the Chicago office registered a fall of 18.5 inches, eclipsing a record set January 6 and 7, 1918, by 24 inches.

Indications of the extent of traffic paralysis came in telegraphic reports to the Chicago office. In the late afternoon, reports from late today showing roads generally impassable in the territory bounded by Milwaukee, Wis., to the north; Evansville, Indiana, Cincinnati, Columbus, Toledo and Detroit.

The city's most serious problem was the milk supply. The milk supply was carried into the metropolitan center today and officials of the Pure Milk association said continuation of the storm would spell milk famine tomorrow.

Chicago schools were closed at 10 o'clock because of the storm, no more than 16 per cent attendance could be maintained.

The day in Chicago at least, was free of known fatalities, but there were several minor traffic accidents.

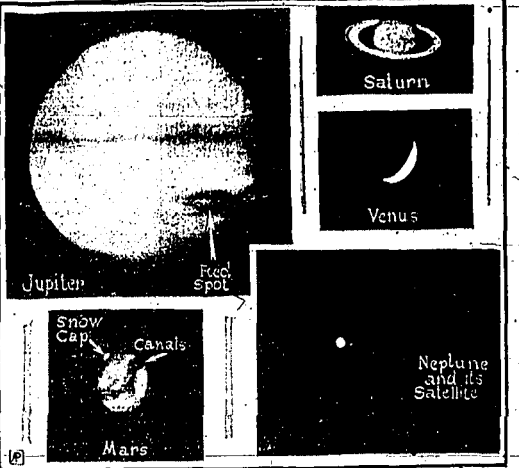
Discovery Of Ninth Planet Unlocks Opportunity For Science

ASTRONOMERS HOPE NEWEST BODY WILL UNVEIL MYSTERIES

Diversity in Known Group Indicates Latest Star Will Hold Wealth Of Marvels

PROBABILITIES POINT TO COLD TEMPERATURE

Investigators Plan to Apply Laws of Universe to Unravel Secrets of Solar System



Which of these will the new planet look like? It is likely to be different from any. The photographs above show how no two known planets are alike.

NEW YORK, March 26— A planet is being discovered that is not merely another cold, distant bit of matter presumably like those already known.

Instead, it is another laboratory of the biggest and most fascinating kind, a new opportunity for astronomers to study the nature of creation from a different angle.

What the differences between the new planet and its eight known brothers will be has not been ascertained, except that the vast diversity in known planets is sufficient guarantee that the discovery of planet "X" means the opening of a new house of marvels.

Probabilities

Even now there are few facts pointing to certain probabilities. It is cold of a kind unknown thus far on planets. Neptune, the planet nearest to the newcomer, is about 40 degrees below zero. "Pluto," the new planet, twice as far from the sun, perhaps four billion miles, may be assumed as colder. If not much colder, then it must have a surprising method of heat, something improbable by astronomical discovery.

Would a human being on the new planet think "it is interesting that consistency is its' soul or substance?"

Density of Planets

Astronomers have found some reason to believe that as planets get further from the sun they are less dense, and Saturn is considered about as solid as water.

Again, there is no certainty, but it is the uncertainty that goes to make the new planet interesting.

No family on earth was ever so disgraced as the sun's children—known as the eight planets—now introduced to him.

Mars, most like earth, has the mysterious canal, which are not made in the human sense, but something gurgantuan.

Saturn doesn't even look like a planet; it photographs like a child's toy top because of its rings.

Jupiter's Red Spot

Vast Jupiter, 10 times the diameter of the earth, has the famous "Red Spot," and scientists are now trying to know for certain what it is. It is something in the ocean of seeming clouds that swirls around Jupiter's face infernally, and hides the surface.

The "Red Spot" is a mysterious disturbance of some sort. Astronomers are studying it all over the world.

Venus, cloud screened ladylike, has concealed even to this day the exact time she takes to rotate. Late estimates make this turn take a few Venus years, which would mean she always turns her face to the sun, so that one side may be roasting hot, and the other always night.

Laws of Planets

Despite all the conflicts, astronomers are convinced that one set of laws govern all the planets, and that they will be simple laws when everything is understood.

So they are not surprised to find a little moon revolving around Neptune, two million miles from earth, 36, also, to expect to apply some of the known laws to unravel some of the secrets of the new planet, and perhaps advance one more step toward mastering the riddle of whence creation came.

Secret work will take up the afternoon. Several hundred persons from other lodges are expected to attend.

Dedication of the \$20,000 hall of the Odd Fellows lodge here today will mark the successful culmination of a quarter of a century of hope and effort. Immediately after the organization of the lodge here a movement was started to construct a home. It was first planned to build at 127 Second avenue south. Later a site was obtained on Main avenue east, which at present is occupied by the Tourist hotel. This site was traded for property at the corner of Second avenue and Second street west, now occupied by the Tivy laundry.

The cornerstone of the present home was laid November 24, 1929, in the presence of 300 persons, assisted by H. Fuller, then grand master for Idaho, assisted by officers of the Twin Falls Odd Fellows lodge and of affiliated organizations.

The hall was opened on the evening of February 21, with a banquet, which was attended by more than 800 persons, followed by a ball in the hall from which an account of its popularity. It was necessary to turn away guests.

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CANADIAN BRANDS GOVERNMENT RUM CONTROL FAILURE

Former Premier E. C. Drury Predict Dominion's Eventual Return to Complete Prohibition of Alcohol

(By The Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, March 26.—Government control of liquor sales in Canada was described as an "absolute failure" by E. C. Drury, a former premier of Ontario province, who predicted at prohibition hearings before the house judiciary committee today that the Dominion eventually would return to complete prohibition.

"Whatever the solution of the drink problem may be," the Canadian asserted, "it is not government control."

Drury and John J. Lentz, Columbus, president of the American Insurance union and a former member of the house judiciary committee, were the only witnesses who testified for the "dry" forces today.

Scott Stride, general superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League, was scheduled to climax the day with an attack upon the proponents of the house repeal of the Eighteenth amendment. He had distributed copies of his remarks earlier in the day but when Mrs. Lena Lons (Kost) general of the "dry" forces, presented him, Chairman Graham adjourned the committee meeting. He said the "dry" would be given next Wednesday in which to complete presentation of their views.

Mr. Graham also made known that a recess of about two weeks might be taken before the debate is permitted to offer rebuttal testimony.

Cites Figures

Drawing his conclusions from insurance statistics, Lentz said mortality and decrease under prohibition and that the "dry" laws had proved of widespread benefit to the American people. Insurance companies, he found, he said, that total abstainers live an average of about four years longer than liquor drinkers.

Explaining that he had been requested by prohibitionists in the United States to give an account of the Canadian liquor situation, Former Premier Drury related the various changes in liquor administration that have occurred in his country.

He pointed out that as long as there had been complete prohibition in the Dominion, the manufacture of spirits was not prohibited at the time when the laws were most strictly enforced.

It was important to an understanding of the situation, he said, to realize that each province of Canada had different laws for the regulation of retail sale and that the Dominion government limited its legislation to control of manufacturing and inter-province and foreign shipment.

Popular Disaffection

Drury said he did not think the liquor question would continue as at present because of what he termed popular disaffection.

PORTO RICAN TELLS OF "HANGING" JURY

Jury in Utah Lead Mail Fraud Trial Admits Yielding to Bribery Temptation

NEW YORK, March 26 (AP)—A poverty stricken Porto Rican from whom the temptation of \$10,000 and the witness stand in federal court today and told in detail how he had "hung" the jury which listened for seven weeks to the huge mass of evidence in the Utah lead mail fraud trial.

Testifying for the government in the bribery trial of Arthur N. Sager, Edward H. Reynolds and Joseph Shallock, who were defense attorneys in the Utah lead case, the witness, John Cruz, juror number 10, said the first overtures were made to him by Murray Wechsler, a federal court bailiff. Wechsler took the stand yesterday and described his operations as intermediary between the defense attorneys and Cruz.

Cruz said that Wechsler accompanied him home after he (Cruz) must have taken it in the courtroom. Wechsler, he asserted, asked him about his finances and then urged him to vote for acquittal because the defendants were "nice people" and "would take care of him."

Thereafter, he continued, he received sums of money at intervals, \$100, \$50, and then, on February 15, \$200.—The larger sums were delivered by a stranger who he said did not represent Sager and urged him on the last visit to vote for acquittal, even if he had to hold out for 24 hours.

ASTRONOMERS HOPE NEWEST BODY WILL UNVEIL MYSTERIES

Diversity in Known Group Indicates Latest Star Will Hold Wealth Of Marvels

PROBABILITIES POINT TO COLD TEMPERATURE

Investigators Plan to Apply Laws of Universe to Unravel Secrets of Solar System

By HOWARD V. BLAKESLEE (Associated Press Science Editor)

NEW YORK, March 26—The newly discovered planet is not merely an other cold, distant object, but presumably like those already known.

Instead, it is another laboratory of the biggest and most fascinating kind, a new opportunity for astronomers to study the wonders of creation from a different angle.

What the differences between the new planet and its eight known brothers will be can not now be guessed, except that the vast diversity in known planets is sufficient guarantee that the discovery of planet "X" means the opening of a new house of marvels.

Probabilities

Even now there are few facts pointing to certain probabilities. One is cold of a kind unknown thus far on planets. Neptune, the planet nearest to the newcomer, is about 40 degrees below zero, Fahrenheit.

The new planet, twice as far from the sun, perhaps four billion miles, may be assumed a colder, if not a much colder, than it has. The surprising method of heat, something improbable but not yet ruled out as impossible by astronomical discovery.

Would a human being on the new planet sink "The weight of his body is his soil or substance?"

Density of Planets

Astronomers have found some reason to believe that as planets are farther from the sun they are less dense, and that this has been considered as so solid as water.

Again, there is no certainty, but it is the uncertainty that goes to make the new planet interesting.

Not family on earth was ever so diversified as the sun's children—now increased to nine.

Mars, most like earth, has the most serious cases of canals in the human scene, but something gargantuan.

Saturn doesn't even look like a planet. It photographs like a child's toy top because of its rings.

Jupiter's Red Spot

Vast Jupiter, 10 times the diameter of the earth, has the famous "Red Spot," and even yet no astronomer knows for certain what it is.

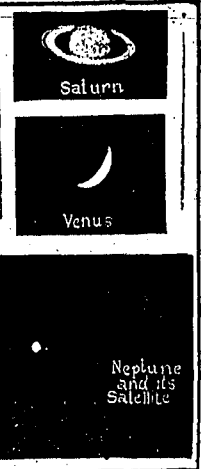
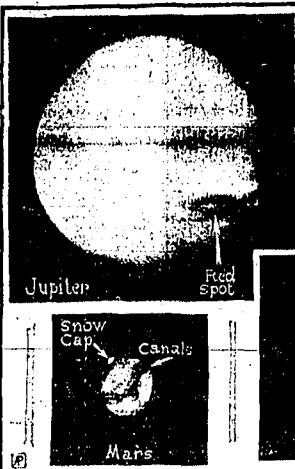
It is something in the ocean of swirling clouds that sweep across Jupiter's face interminably, and hide the surface.

The "Red Spot" is a mysterious disturbance of some sort. Astronomers are studying it all over the world.

Venus, cloud screened, laydike, has concealed even to this day the time she takes to rotate. Later estimates make this turn take a full Venus year, which would mean she always turns her face to the sun, so that one side may be scorching hot, and the other always cold.

Laws of Planets

Despite all the known facts, astronomers are convinced that one set of laws govern all the planets, and that they will be simple laws when everything is understood.

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, March 26—Government control of liquor sale in Canada was described as an "absolute failure," by E. C. Drury, a former premier of Ontario province, who predicted at prohibition hearings before the house judiciary committee today that the Canadian prohibition would return to complete prohibition.

NEW YORK, March 26.—Boys, who always have the time and inclination but frequently lack the price of admission, will see major league baseball games in increasing numbers this season.

For years half a dozen clubs have admitted small boys without tickets to the ball parks, but as a result of an effort initiated by the two Chicago clubs the practice may be made universal.

When Jimmy Walker cheered Babe Ruth last year, he was admitted home runs and a dozen big league trail seemed nearer his end five years ago, and New York made an appeal to the "city-faces" to let the street to whom Ruth was a hero.

Ruth has simply justified the faith of the "kids." It was a small boy who appealed to Joe Jackson with the "say it ain't so, Joe," which went round the world when the White Sox star admitted that everything was not all that it should have been in 1919.

Thomas H. Bowler, Chicago alderman, is leading the drive for free admission of boys to major league games. Mr. Bowler, who is commissioner of the city's parks and recreation department, attended the last joint meeting of the major leagues to present the case of the boys, and the two Chicago clubs have announced four "boys' days" each week, with a possibility that the number may be increased.

"Kids haven't any money and can't peep through knot holes any more because of the concrete walls," said Bowler, who is the supply of major league talent and because they don't see so many names they are losing interest in the game, and it is almost impossible to see them.

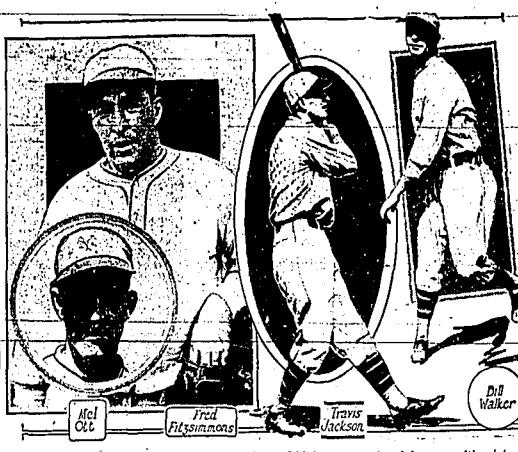

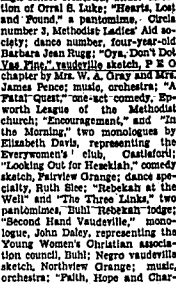

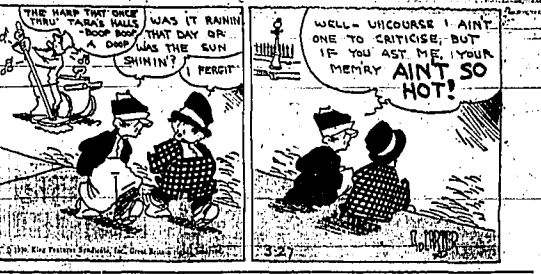

VETERANS' TIME FOR FILING CLAIMS FLYS

BOISE, March 26—Every ex-service man who has not previously filed a claim on account of disability should file immediately action to get his claim before the United States veterans' bureau, according to statement made by G. H. Hudson, manager of the veterans' bureau at Boise, Idaho. Under a provision contained in the World War Veterans act all applications for disability compensation should be filed prior to April 6, 1930. Hudson urges every ex-service man who is suffering from a disability which either originated in the service or could be traced to service, to file application. This should be done even though doubt as to the origin of the disability exists. The application can be secured from any service officer of the American Legion, executive secretary of the American Red Cross, or upon ap-

plication at the local office of the bureau. All veterans who have filed claims with the bureau which have been disallowed within the 48-hour period after this date will know that their claim is the result of their service during the war.

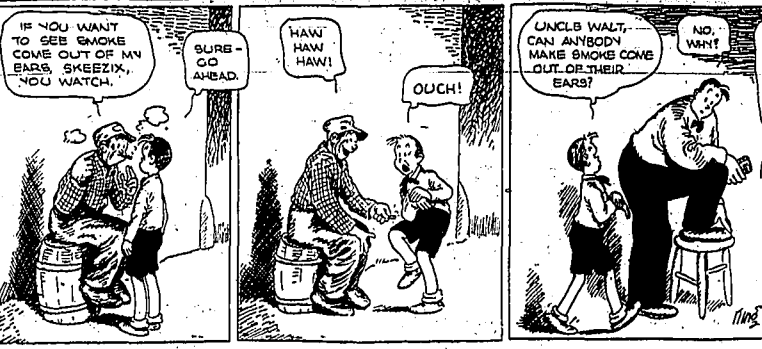

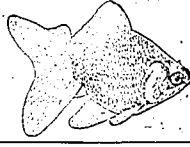

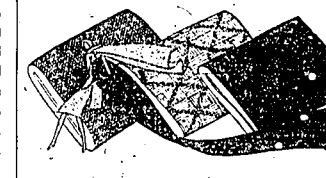
