Summer Program Calls For
Lightweight Clash After
Jack Sharkey and Fulton
Via For Heavyweight Title

NEW YORK, March 31—Prospects for a bull market among the cauliflower growers sharply today with every indication that business at the same old turnstiles will be brisker than ever this summer.

As a follow-up to the program including the heavyweight title fight June 12 at the Yankee stadium between Jack Sharkey and Max Schmeling, Madison Square Garden paired Sammy Mandell, lightweight champion from Rockford, Illinois, for a 4-round title test against Al Singer, sensational Bronx youngster, in the same hall yard July 17.

Singer agreed the papers today and agreed to take 12 1/2 per cent of the receipts as his wages. Mandell, who turned Jimmy McLarnin in his last championship battle here, accepted the match some time ago and will receive the champion's 5 1/2 per cent.

In signing today Singer registered his confidence in his ability to best Ignacio Fernandez, Filipino winger, in the garden Friday night. The last time Singer, gaudied with the brown-skinned veteran, Fernandez shocked the cauliflowerers by knocking out Young Al in three rounds. Since then Singer has come back in sparkling fashion with a steady string of knockouts.

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THREE BANKS DEMUR TO DISTRICT SUITS

Attorneys Open Attack on Complaints in Actions to Recover Schools' Losses

Three Twin Falls banks, through attorneys in district court here yesterday, interposed demurrers to suit filed by three of the county's rural school districts to recover from the banks monies alleged to have been paid on forged school district orders for warrants.

Demurrers attack the school district complaints from several angles, asserting that the district trustees should be brought in as necessary and proper parties to the action; that the complaints do not show how the banks caused the county audit to deliver warrants on the county treasurer to them and do not show why or how monies were unlawfully obtained and received.

On the basis of auditors' reports, 22 out of the county's 37 rural school districts lost some \$19,000 account of apparent forgeries of school district orders for warrants, the auditors asserting that all of the apparent forgeries examined appeared to have been written by the same person, while Miss Virginia Lower, former clerk in the office of the county superintendent of public instruction, was found guilty at trial last December on a charge of forgery of one of the questioned instruments.

The three districts which are seeking to recover their losses from the banks are: Alton Valley District 16, suing the Twin Falls Bank and Trust company for \$250 paid on an order dated October 4, 1928; Shamrock District 22, suing the First National bank for \$250 on an order dated March 20, 1929; and Deep Creek District 27, suing the Twin Falls National bank for \$203 on an order dated March 25, 1929.

All districts in these actions are represented by Sweeley and Sweeley, legal advisors for the banks being Frank L. Behan for the Twin Falls Bank and Trust company, Walters, Perry and Thomas for the First National bank, and J. B. Brown and W. Orr Chapman for the Twin Falls National bank.

QUEST FOR MARTEN ENDANGERS IDAHOAN

Trapper Nearly Loses Life In Blizzard While Bringing Fur Animals to Camp

LEWISTON, March 31 (AP)—The story of an Idaho trapper who almost lost his life in a vain attempt to start a martens farm has been reported here from Lowell, little trading outpost at the junction of the Selway and Lochsa rivers.

Fred HOWARD, who lives on a homestead two miles below Lowell, captured two live martens in February near Glover's Saddle, far back in the Clearwater forests. He put the martens in a box on his back, intending to pack them out as the nucleus of a farm at his homestead.

Traveling from Glover's Saddle to the Cogswater lookout station, he ran into one of the worst blizzards of the year. It is high country, there are no cabins and following the trail was difficult as the wind swept great billows of snow over the path.

Snow Blocks Door

It was dark when he reached the lookout building and the storm was at its height. The cabin was drifted over with snow, with only the peak visible. With his snow shoes as his only equipment, Howard tried to dig down to the door but the wind was blowing a hurricane and the snow

drifted in as fast as he could shored it out.

Realizing he was growing weak and would never be able to dig into the shelter, Howard plunged on toward the next shelter at Andy's Horn camp, four miles away. He stumbled out into the darkness, down the long ridge, with the snow swirling in great blasts at 30 miles an hour. Fighting each foot of the way it took him hours before he reached the last mile which was through timber, and which afforded some protection. Another hour and he reached camp, exhausted, numb with cold.

Howard was safe, but the objective of his blizzard trip was lost. The two martens had frozen to death in their box on Howard's back.

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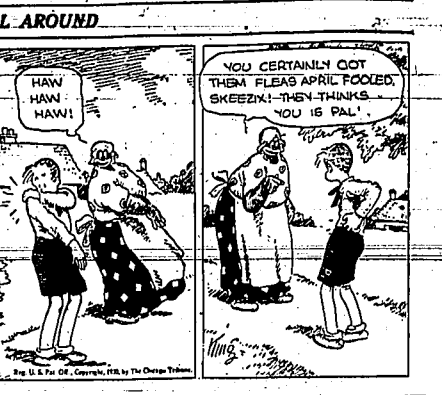
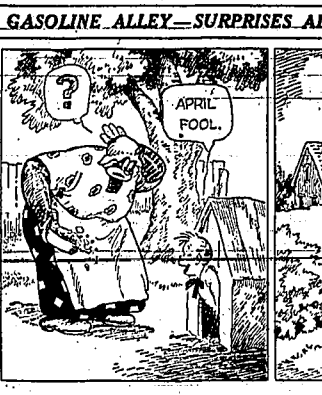
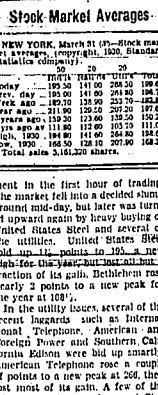
