



# Tariff Measure Enters Last Lap Of Congressional Journey

## CONFEREES AWAIT TASK OF PASSING ON-TARIFF ISSUES

Six Major Disputes Appear Inevitable During Closed Session of Group From Two Legislative Branches

HAROLD OLIVER (Associated Press Staff Writer) WASHINGTON, April 3.—The Hawley-Smoot tariff bill which has required nearly 15 months for framing and passage through the house and senate is submitted to a conference between the two congressional branches today for adjustment of the hundreds of differences over rates and other features.

The conferees will start tomorrow behind closed doors, with five conferees from each house endeavoring to map out a program of procedure. Six major disputes face the conferees, all of which are expected to be brought back to the respective chambers for review before a final agreement in conference. House Republicans have pledged informally that the conferees will not attempt to reach a final settlement of the sugar, cement, lumber and shoe rates, without permanent authority to express itself on these items.

The senate Republican conferees have made a similar pledge to recede on the export duties and presidential flexible tariff proposal until the senate has had another opportunity to express itself on these important provisions. Acting first, the house adopted, April 1st, a bill sending the tariff measure direct to conference without previous action on any of the 1200-odd amendments.

Nineteen Republicans bolted their party by voting against the rule. They were joined by the Farmer-Labor member, Kvale, Minnesota, and 133 Democrats. Fourteen Democrats went over with 27 Republicans for the rule. Speaker Longworth appointed the following five leading members as conferees: Representatives Hawley, Oregon, chairman; Dredway, Massachusetts, and Bachrach, New Jersey, chairmen; Garner, Texas, and Collier, Mississippi, Democrats. On the senate side, the house requested for a conference, the senate, after brief discussion, appointed the following members of the finance committee as its conferees. They are senators Smoot, Utah, chairman; Watson, Indiana, and Shortridge, California, Republicans; Blinn, North Carolina, and Harrison, Mississippi, Democrats.

No attempt was made in the senate to place a Republican independent on the conferees committee. Members of the conferees of Democrats and Western Republicans, in control of the measure for almost six months, had indicated they might seek to have their group thus represented.

Senator Jones, Republican, Washington, sponsor of the tariff on soft wood lumber, now on the free list, inquired "if" the senate conferees were going into a "null and free" conference.

When informed by Vice President Childs, who appointed the conferees, that they were compelled to enter such a conference, the Washington senator said he realized that but he also knew "this is not going to be a full and free conference."

Indications have pointed to a re-opening of the lumber rate if put to a vote in the house.

Senator Smoot predicted the conference would require at least three

## PROHIBITIONISTS OF NATION REST CASE

Committee Permits Reading Of Statement by Leaders Friendly to Volstead Act

WASHINGTON, April 3.—"Dry" forces ended their case in the prohibition hearings before the house judiciary committee today with statements by six leaders describing a decade under the Eighteenth amendment as having improved economic and social conditions throughout the country.

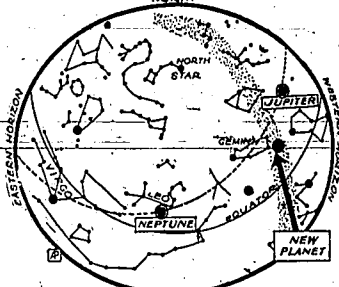
After presenting but one witness, the "drys" obtained permission of the committee to offer written statements from their leaders without subjecting them to cross-examination abruptly ending the scene and the hearings. The "wets," however, are to be given opportunity for limited rebuttal two weeks from today. Since February 12, the committee has heard first from the "wets" and then from the "drys," opposing opinions on the measure to repeal the Eighteenth amendment, which have been before that group for years. Both sides presented witnesses from many walks of life, ranging from farmers on the Western plains to smart society women in Eastern cities; from industrialists, financiers, social workers, educators, scientists, former government officials and members of congress.

Bowling Testifies At the outset today, J. Weston Allen, Boston, former attorney general of Massachusetts, the only witness to take the stand, contended that under the constitution there was no inherent individual right to drink of sell liquor.

He cited many constitutional interpretations by the supreme court and other judicial bodies supporting his position. Solution of the drink problem, he said, rested in strict enforcement by the several states.

The statements, which were introduced into the record unread, came from P. Scott McBride, general superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League; David Hackett, secretary of the Methodist board of temperance, prohibition and public morals; Ernest H. Chertington, general secretary of the World League Against Alcoholism; the Rev. Edwin C. Din-

# Babson Analyzes Conditions in Oil Industry of Nation and Looks for Continued Improvement in Future

## Bay State Statistician Holds Optimistic View in Regard to Long Pull Possibilities of Petroleum Securities and Outlines Prospects

BABSON PARK, Fla., March 3.—An analysis of the oil industry and its securities must consider both the long pull outlook and the immediate or near-term prospects. For some time I have felt that the long pull possibilities of the oil are thoroughly sound. In the first place, it is a "great" business with a steadily growing demand; second, over future years the supply will gradually diminish, thus making the remaining properties more valuable; and third, new uses are constantly being discovered for petroleum and its by-products which open up new markets.

In the last few years, however, the short-term outlook has been frequently clouded by intermittent periods of over-production, price cutting, and poor earnings. Practically no other industry can turn on more production as quickly as oil. This will not always be true, so, in the course of time, our resources become diminished. At the present time, however, the condition exists. The oil industry is like a huge cistern.

### Control of Production

"When the producers want more oil all they have to do is to turn the spigot. Unfortunately, in recent years they have been turning it on at the wrong times. Also, instead of agreeing when it should be turned on and off, too many producers, up to recently, have been taking a hand at the faucet individually—with disastrous results.

Several recent developments indicate a turn for the better in the oil business, and greatly improve the near-term outlook. Most important is the voluntary reduction of about 25,000 barrels per day in crude oil output during March compared with February. This was achieved by voluntary agreement among the producers, especially by the statewide curtailment plan put into effect in California. Compared with the peak rate of production last August, the March rate shows a decline of about 15 per cent. Every month from August to March has shown successive declines in production compared with the previous month. This clearly indicates the progress of cooperative curtailment and is a very healthy trend. Storage of oil admittedly is large, but with the declining production rate, it is not long to bring the supply in line with consumption.

### Law of Conservation

A second important factor is the upholding of the legality of the various gas laws in California. This law which calls for conservation of natural gas through restricted production, and which necessarily will bring restriction of crude oil production as well, has been contested in the courts for some months. The final decision upholding it reinforces by legal edict the efforts of California producers to curtail through voluntary agreement. Now that "restrictive" agreements "break down," the state government can take a hand to force restriction. Since California has been one of the worst offenders in the over-production problem, the prospect of definitely clearing up the situation in that area is distinctly helpful to the oil outlook as a whole.

A third development, coming on top of the other two, is the recommendation by the federal oil conservation board that gasoline refiners cut down their operations about 15 per cent. Owing to hoarding up of huge gasoline supplies last summer, stocks on hand are at record high levels.

### Trend Downward

However, the trend of output of gasoline has been distinctly downward since last October. The daily production of gasoline in February was about 1,164,000 barrels compared with 1,280,000 barrels for the month last fall. The federal conservation board's recommendation for even further curtailment has been heartily accepted by the refiners, and should result in a very drastic cut. Later, gasoline prices are likely to reflect this trend by an advancing tendency.

A fourth important factor looking toward betterment, is the voluntary action of certain large companies to cut down their oil and gasoline inventories in about the same proportion

as refining operations in this country are cut down. If this policy is followed out it will remove the threat of a foreign flood of gasoline and oil which might otherwise endanger the success of curtailment efforts in this country. It shows that the spirit of cooperation has now taken a firmer hold on the industry than at any time in the past.

### Increase in Price

A fifth straw showing which way the wind blows is the recent increase of 25 cents a barrel in the crude oil prices in California. While this advance was probably designed to compensate producers for temporary loss of income in the curtailment program, it is, nevertheless, a distinctly optimistic development. With the heavy consuming season for both oil and gasoline now at hand, and with the trend of output continuing downward in each case, the price situation is more promising to the industry. As soon as we begin to draw on storage, prices again tend to advance.

Of course, there have been many false starts in the past toward oil curtailment, only to be followed by a breaking down of agreements and further discouragement. Hence, there is no certainty that all the elements in the industry have been brought into line and can be kept from breaking over the traces. There may be competing views of such production which may cause temporary discouragement and price reactions. However, because of the recent developments which I have outlined the prospects for the oil business are more encouraging than they have been for some time.

### Better Oil Stocks Sound

I believe the best oil stocks are fundamentally sound and have been boomed along with many other securities. The market is now very selective and one should purchase only thoroughly deflated securities with a good outlook of which the oil is a good example. "This is a good time to buy oils because they have been hanging behind the market and in general are selling on a deflated price basis. The ratio of price to earnings is also low. The oils have not enjoyed much popularity in recent months owing to the price cutting and other adverse conditions. Earnings have reflected this situation by some decline, which has added to the unpopularity of the oil group. However, fundamentally the oils are sound. Competition is decreasing due to consolidations, and more "economies" are being effected. Careful selection is, of course, necessary in the oil group as well as in other groups. Buy for investment only the stocks of the large, strong, entrenched, well rounded companies with a good record of earnings and dividends. Speculative purchases should be given more careful selection, and particular attention given to the character of the management. The growing spirit of cooperation is one of the most hopeful signs for the future of the industry and its securities. Leaders of the business should, and doubtless will, do all in their power to foster cooperation and betterment.

### NEGRO KILLS CHILD AND YOUNG MOTHER

#### Coroner's Jury Declares Act of Head of Family "Justifiable Homicide"

SEBRING, Fla., April 2 (AP)—A woman and her child were slain today in their home by a Negro intruder who was in turn shot to death by the woman's husband.

Mrs. William E. Carver and her two-year-old son were beaten to death with an axe when the woman swoes from a man and young Negro, identified as Ben Whitehead, smacking her room.

There was an outcry and Mrs. Carver, who was asleep in the next room, awoke. She looked into the wife's bedroom in time to see the Negro hit Mrs. Carver, picked up his revolver and fired three shots into the Negro's body, then reloading the gun and fired twice more, all six bullets taking effect.

The child was believed to have been killed almost simultaneously with his mother as they tried to get out of bed.

A coroner's jury returned a verdict shortly afterward in which it was found that Mrs. Carver and her son had been murdered by a Negro identified as Ben Whitehead, and that the Negro had come to his death at the hands of William Carver in a "justifiable homicide."

"That robbery was the motive for the murders was evidenced by the fact that some of Mrs. Carver's jewels were taken from the pockets of his clothes after he had been killed."

### CANADIANS OPPOSE RUM EXPORT BILL

#### Legislator Declares Nation On South Able to Stop Traffic if Determined

OTTAWA, April 2 (AP)—Further opposition to the government bill prohibiting the export of liquor into the United States was voiced in the senate today, accompanied by proposals that would delay its passage.

Senator Tanner joined Senator Witherby in moving that the bill be submitted for preliminary consideration to a special committee selected by the senate to obtain information as to the probable effect of the bill on Canada's national and economic life and on international relations.

In this motion they were supported by Senator Robinson, who caused adjournment of the debate until the next sitting of the body after saying that progress on the revision of the present amending treaty between the United States and Canada might be obtained more quickly if there were nothing "in the way of the government's negotiating a treaty beneficial to Canada."

Senator Tanner said the United States could stop the liquor traffic in the United States and Canada if they wanted to do so, adding that there is a growing sentiment against the violation of the United States' Passage of the bill by congress, he said, was a "political move."

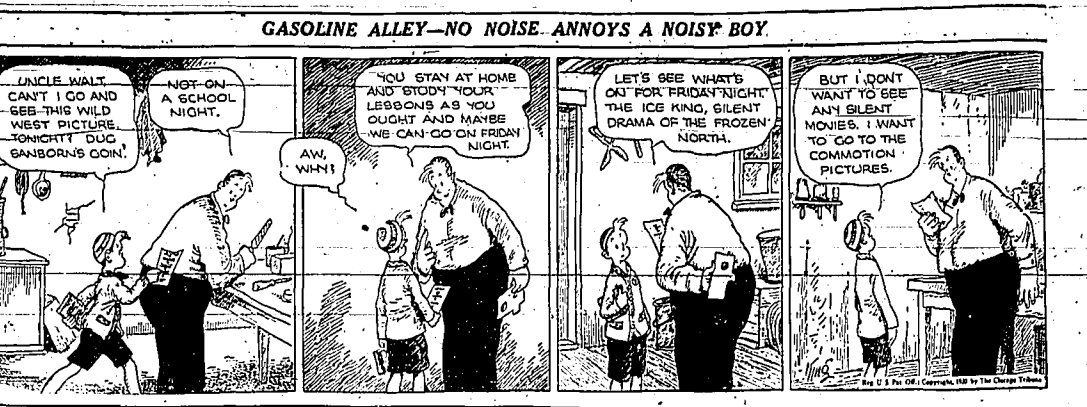

# ELECTORS BALLOT UPON AN ADDITIONAL LEVY FOR SCHOOLS

### District Board Submits Proposal To Authorize Increase up to 7 Mills To Voters of Locality

Election will be held in the Twin Falls independent school district, tomorrow from 1 P. M. until 6:30 P. M. on the question of permitting the school board to issue up to 7 mills tax in addition to the levy permitted without such referendum. Voting will be held in the block and Lincoln schools.

The places for holding this election for voters residing east of Blue Lake boulevard southeast of Shoshone street, and east of the highway southeast from the southwest end of Shoshone street will be at the Hickel school building. Qualified electors residing west of Blue Lake boulevard, northeast of Shoshone street and west of the highway running south from the southwest end of Shoshone street will be at the Lincoln school.

### Change in Law

Elections of this character have been necessary since 1923 owing to amendment of the Idaho law changing the steps to be taken to secure an increase in the levy above a stipulated number of mills for school purposes. Prior to that time, the ordinary limit was 10 mills but the school board, with permission of the state superintendent of schools, might increase this to any figure. The new law was changed so that the limit of levy was fixed at 8 mills, with permission to the local voters, only the qualified to increase this to 15 mills, leaving the net total the same as the net total previously.

### Issue Undecided

The voters of the Twin Falls district have always agreed with the school board that the levy raised was necessary in order to carry out the program mapped out for the ensuing year and the annually voted the levy requested by the board.

To be qualified to vote at this election persons must be legal voters of Idaho, and in addition:

"Residents of the district at the time of election."  
"Parents or guardians of a child or children when such child or children are under 21 years of age and when such child or children are the parents or guardians thereof are residents of the district at the time of election."  
"A woman who pays taxes within the district, and the husband or wife of such taxpayer in case such taxpayer is married."

The total amount of money estimated by the school board to be necessary for the operation of the district for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1930 is \$109,400. The board, without referendum is authorized to levy the sum of \$108,000, or 6 mills on the assessed valuation of \$8,314,247. The voting of permission to levy 7 mills does not necessarily mean that the board will levy the full amount, but should it do so the amount collected thereby would be \$32,500.

The balance of the amount required to conduct the schools of the district business during the year includes such appropriations, tuition fees and minor sources of income.
