MAHATMA GANDHI COMPLETES PLAN IN EARLY HOURS

Solemnity Marks Campaign of Disobedience at Little Group Gathers in Gulf of Cambay Waters

(By The Associated Press)
JALAPUR, India, Sunday (Morning)—April 5.—Mahatma Gandhi manufactured salt from sea water here this morning, thereby breaking the British law establishing a monopoly on salt manufacture.

CLIMAXES EFFORTS

Tomorrow is the long awaited day for the leaders of the civil disobedience campaign in India.

At 6 A. M. Mahatma Gandhi and his followers then arrived at Gandhinagar, where they had the manufacture of salt in opposition to the government monopoly.

Nearly a month has passed since the Mahatma and a little party of followers left Ahmedabad for the 35-mile march to the sea. The party stopped in villages at night and at each one the venerable national leader, whose title means "the holy one," raised supporters and obtained resignations by village headmen. The Mahatma ate little but his of dried fruit on the march, as it is his custom while some of his followers were stricken with smallpox and other diseases, but the little band of survivors kept on.

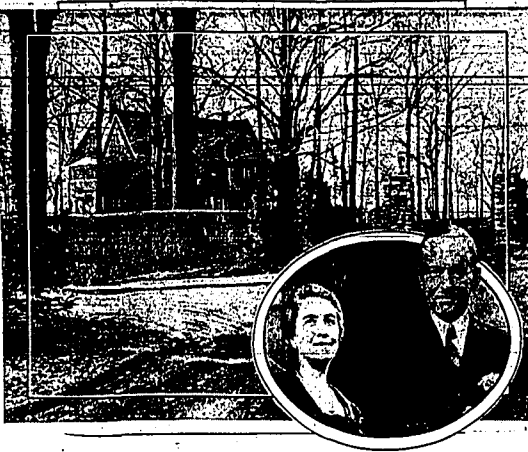

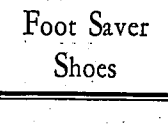

AERIAL CAMERA TAKES SOLOMON PALACE VIEW

CHICAGO, April 5 (AP)—The geologic expedition of the University of Chicago Oriental institute has succeeded in sending a peeping camera into the sky to look upon the ruins of King Solomon's palace and stables at Armageddon.

The pictures obtained, the scientists say, are much better for aerial cartography or for archaeological visualization than are pictures which might be taken from an airplane.

COUNTY SENDS FOR WOMAN FOR TRIAL

Sheriff Goes to Spokane for Mrs. Daisy Hopkins Wanted on Charge of Fraud

Daisy Hopkins, alias Gertrude Hopkins, will be brought back to Twin Falls to answer to a charge of conspiracy with her husband, John H. Hopkins, to obtain a \$1850 automobile license last month under false pretenses, according to a decision reached by Twin Falls county authorities yesterday.

The woman was arrested, and the case was removed at Spokane last Saturday, but nothing was found there to indicate the whereabouts of the man.

Advisability of turning the case over to federal authorities to prosecute under the Dyer act was considered, but it was finally decided that the woman should be brought to trial here, and effort continued to locate her husband.

Extradition papers were drafted in the present attorney's office yesterday and delivered to Sheriff E. V. Prater who left for Spokane last evening.

The Hopkins are alleged to have given a bogus draft on an Iowa bank in payment for the car, which they obtained from a dealer and left here shortly thereafter. They were traced to Astoria, Oregon, where, it was reported they saw a check dated March 12 on a Twin Falls bank in which they had no funds, in payment for gas and oil.

American Institute of Cooperation Approaches Problem From Newest Angle

COLUMBUS, Ohio, April 5 (AP)—In the light of a full year's test by the federal farm board, cooperative marketing will be approached from its newest angle in five and a half weeks of school to be held at Ohio state university in conjunction with the annual meeting of the American institute of cooperation June 18.

The institute will open one year to the day after President Hoover signed the act which created the farm board and authorized a fund of \$50,000,000 to be used for the rehabilitation of American agriculture.

Resolutions plans look toward the presence of at least a quorum of the board, which would conduct its regular work from temporary headquarters in Columbus. That would give each member an opportunity to address the conference each day the commodity he represents is discussed.

Expect Many Farmers Farmers are expected to participate in the educational school attendance of 2000. Ohio state university estimates place farmer attendance at more than 1000.

The faculty will include Dr. C. R. Felt, professor of economic history at the University of Toronto; W. T. Spanton, agent of the federal board for vocational education; J. F. Palmer, head of the department of agricultural economics, Ohio state university; L. C. Foster, assistant professor of agricultural education; and B. B. Spohn, district supervisor of the Ohio extension service.

Controlled by 34 farm organizations, the institute of cooperation will devote its interests to discussions of agricultural cooperation. Organizations interested in farm marketing will hold meetings of their boards of directors at the same time.

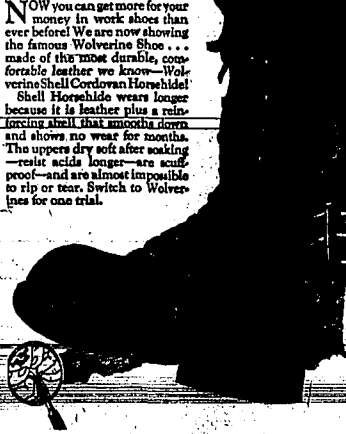

Bob Shawkey, manager of the Yankees and a great pitcher in his own right shortly after "Big Ed" Walsh passed out of the baseball picture, convinced the youngster that his future would be hurt by inactivity on the bench. Shawkey pointed out to the former Notre Dame pitcher that he needs work which he can not get on a major league club. The way to learn to pitch, said Bob to Bob, is to pitch.

So Young Walsh waited the contract bar to immediate participation in minor league ball and he will be given a chance to pitch often. Observers of the big boy in the Yankee's training camp at St. Petersburg suggest that a year or two, possibly one, in the minors will make him a certain choice to go long way in the American league, where his father made records.

BOR-WALSH is bigger than his father and has more of the pitching motions of "Big Ed." The senior Walsh is one inch over six feet and weighs slightly under 200 pounds when he was the ace of the great Sox staff. The junior Walsh is two inches taller than his father and weighs several pounds more.

The other Walsh boy, Ed, Jr., will remain with the White Sox, although well posted baseball men have said that he would be a much better pitcher today if he had spent some time in the minors, instead of making the big jump from college to the majors—Notre Dame to the White Sox.

ED WALSH, Jr., is his father's height but of lighter build and is fully 20 pounds lighter than his big, although younger, brother.

Glen Liehardt, Jr., whose father Glen Liehardt pitched for Cleveland five years, although he is only 19 years of age, has had a year in Class A baseball with Des Moines of the Western League. The boy has much to learn but is credited with ability and after more experience he will be well rounded.

SULPHUR VALUABLE FOR SOIL ASSETS EXPERT IN REPORT

Mark Bennett, Journalist, Farmer and Orchardist, Discusses Fertilizers in Dry Climate Areas

The value of sulphur as a means of increasing production is strongly emphasized in a report by Mark Bennett, Oakland, California, recently completed after an exhaustive study of the subject in which he fortifies his conclusions with quotations from reports and with tables of figures compiled by experiment stations in different states where tests of the value have been made.

He was one of the first settlers on the Twin Falls project on which he filed on land in 1904 which he still owns near Twin Falls. Mr. Bennett has a large ranch at Willist, California, on which he has part of the year, residing the rest of the time in Oakland.

He has a world-wide reputation for his work in publicity due to the fact that he had charge of publicity for the world exposition in St. Louis, Buffalo, Portland and San Francisco.

The report declares "Sulphur is one of the most active chemicals and under the influence of warmth and moisture in the soil unites with other minerals to form sulphates which are soluble and usable by plants in their growth and development.

Sulphur may be used in its pure state or in the form of gypsum. It is stated. Regarding quantity to be applied the summary of the report states "Moderate applications of sulphur, 100 to 150 pounds, per acre, once in three years are considered sufficient to maintain adequate supply for alfalfa and other leguminous crops. * * * About 600 pounds of gypsum are necessary to equal 100 pounds of sulphur, gypsum being 16 per cent sulphur chemically combined with lime a calcium sulphate, less impurities.

GENERAL WARRANTS OF DEBT DECREASE IN CASSIA COUNTY

B. F. Wilson, Auditor, Reports District Better Off by \$24,188.66 Than at Close of Year 1928

(Special to The News) BULLEY, April 5 (AP) At the close of the fiscal year 1928 Cassia county had \$22,216.60 cash on hand with which to apply toward the payment of \$103,658.48 worth of outstanding general fund warrants as compared with \$22,872.42 on hand the year previous to apply toward \$101,720.27 of such warrants.

(Special to The News) BULLEY, April 5 (AP) At the close of the fiscal year 1928 Cassia county had \$22,216.60 cash on hand with which to apply toward the payment of \$103,658.48 worth of outstanding general fund warrants as compared with \$22,872.42 on hand the year previous to apply toward \$101,720.27 of such warrants.

What the final dividend from the defunct Commercial State Bank, Murley, will be, he continues, as an effect against the amount of \$223,435 which the report shows is still due the county therefrom, is not yet known, although the remaining assets of that institution have recently sold at public auction in Murley. It is not expected, however, that the county will be disappointed in anything from this source, and the county eventually will be obliged to charge about \$200,000 to profits and loss, says Mr. Wilson.

Total additions to surplus and reserve for all funds and accounts during the year are shown at \$170,463.78—additional evidence of a marked improvement in county finances. The bill for the year shows an increase in the total assessed valuation of the county of \$372,012 over that of 1928, but a total of taxable property to \$2,823,235.

Bonded Debt Decreases A decrease of \$48,294 in the total bonded debt of all funds will be combined in another gratifying item shown in the report, having a balance of \$1,732,322 at the beginning of the year, and ending at \$1,684,028 at the close of the year. This is a decrease of \$48,294, or 2.8 per cent.

Small Road Fund — Post office labor and miscellaneous supplies, except the cost of the road and bridge fund during the year. The smallest of the sum is due to the fact that only the balance of the county remains outside of organized highway districts, to-wit, Elizabeth, Millie, Heppner and Caldwell communities.

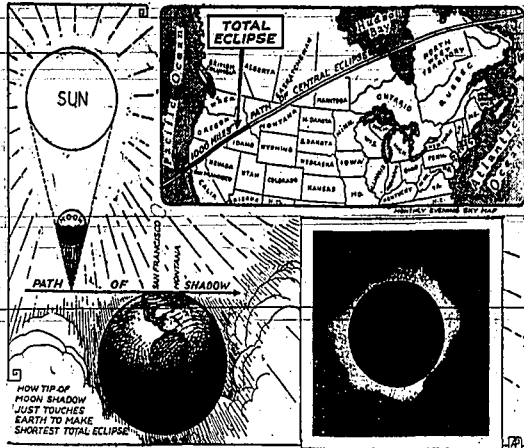
Astronomers Prepare to Photograph Total Eclipse of Sun

WESTERNERS AWAIT SPEEDING SWEEP OF BIG BLACK SHADOW

Scientists Set Camera Shutters by Formula Computed in Advance of Spectacle

All of Nation In Line For Partial Obscurity

Path of Complete Darkness Bisepts Idaho and Enters Boundaries of Four States

By HOWARD W. BLAKELEE (Associated Press Science Editor) NEW YORK, April 5—A round black shadow half a mile across will sweep at 1600 miles an hour over the far west on April 28. And astronomers will be out in airplanes and aloft with cameras, trying to "shoot" it and wondering whether they will succeed. For this shadow is the path of a total eclipse of the sun, the smallest and shortest on record. It will last at the most a second and a half at any one point.

ington is computing the path of totality. The hours when the eclipse is at its middle are given by Popular Astronomy as follows, in standard time: Berkeley, California, 10:38 A. 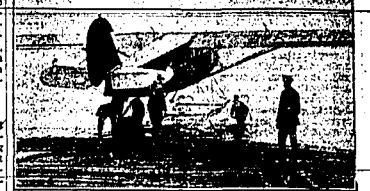

IDAHO MOUNTAIN CLUB MAKES BID TO NATURE LOVER

Sawtooth District Offers Delights of Visit to Wild Region Without Sacrifice of Civilization's Comforts

An opportunity to the residents of the mountain fastnesses of the West to enjoy the delights of these delightful "wilderness" without sacrificing comfort in a reasonable degree will be afforded by the Idaho Rocky Mountain club.

A native of Alabama where he was graduated from University of Alabama, Mr. Snedecor has also had a business career in New York and Los Angeles.

All thoughts of the city mode of life and making money faded from his mind several years ago when he penetrated into the Sawtooth mountain district from Bentley. He promptly made up his mind to forget business and indulge his love for the outdoors by a career in bringing these wonders to the attention of strangers, Mr. Snedecor admitted.

The Idaho Rocky Mountain club is the result of that resolve.

The board of directors includes the following: Winston Paul, president, Domestic Electric company, incorporated, New York; Dallas S. Townsend, Barry, Wainwright, Thacher and Symmer, New York; W. V. McRoberson, president, Alabama Home companies, Birmingham, Alabama; Peter O. Snedecor, and G. W. Gillespie, Bentley, Idaho.

Mr. Gillespie is assistant manager and has charge of the horses used by the club in all other livestock. He is a native Idahoan.

Specialties in the way of entertainment will include summer pack string trips and fall hunting trips.







SENIOR ROCKEFELLER'S DAYS CONTINUE CROWDED WITH DUTIES DESPITE HEAVY HAND OF TIME ON SHOULDERS OF WORLD'S RICHEST NON AGENARIAN

GOLFING BUSINESS AND CHARITY WORK RECEIVE ATTENTION

Wealthy Oil Magnate Spends Parts of Each Year in Four Great Homes

Famous Figure Still Rises at Early Hour

Patriarch of 91 Summers in Best of Health Looks Three Score and Decade

(By The Associated Press)

NEW YORK, April 5.—John D. Rockefeller divides his time each year between four residences.

He spends a few weeks in the spring and fall at his brownstone home in New York's Fifties.

He winters at his place at Ormond Beach, Florida.

He summers at his Pocantico Hills estate north of New York, with its Georgian granite mansion and grounds which range from formal gardens to rugged woodlands.

His fourth home is near Lakewood, New Jersey, in the middle of a sandy area of several hundred acres. It is the halfway house where the estate lives before and after his Florida visits.

It used to be a golf club house, and he calls it Golf House, for it is given by his favorite links.

Each Gets Bright Dime

Mr. Rockefeller rises at about 7 A. M.

He makes the rounds of his house from attic to cellar and gives each servant a freshly minted dime or nickel. Then he goes for a walk about the grounds.

Looks Belle Years

He eats slowly and moderately for the sake of his health, but with restraint. He had no indigestion 20 years ago or since. Some of that time he weighed 200 pounds, because he was drinking milk with cream. Now he

weighs 160 pounds—a good weight, considering his small build.

Always he has been able to endure great labors. He comes from a family of strong men.

"In his home he looks a jolly 70 or so, rather than a patriarch of 91. His step is slow, but it has always been so. Vitality glows in his eyes, in the grasp of his small but muscular hands, in his strong voice and in the pink of his deep-lined cheeks, bronzed by the out-of-doors.

After breakfast, and after every other meal, he joins his family in a game played with 52-numbered tickets. It is a sort of competitive solitaire. He plays it so that he will not hasten from the table too soon to work or play.

He goes upstairs to his study at 9:15 to buy himself for an hour with problems of investment and benevolence.

An Outdoor Man

At 10:15 he respouses except when he is at his town house—for his morning game of golf—the hole. He has played golf for 25 years, for he exercises it affords him has been no new experience to him. He has worked and played out of doors as long as he can remember. Even when he was busiest building up his business in Cleveland he spent two or five afternoons a week outdoors, surveying, laying out roads, transplanting and cutting away trees about his estate on Euclid avenue.

Long before he heard of golf he was fond of riding and driving good horses. Often when he had grown tired from studying too long and too hard on a problem, he lets his horse and the vent for a dash behind the wheel for of trotters he had. He would give them the reins and

let them gallop, break or trot if they wished.

After an hour or so of that active exercise he would go home, refresh, take a nap and dine lightly. Then he would take up work on the business problem again and find it easy.

Likes Daily Nap

He has taken a daily nap, and sometimes two, ever since he was a young man. He believes in plenty of sleep as a restorative of energy, just as he believes in the tonic of sunshine and fresh air. He takes a nap after his morning round of golf and another brief rest between his lunch and his daily automobile ride.

Mr. Rockefeller likes anecdotes. He tells them at the table, on the golf links and during the games after meals. Here are two of his favorites:

1. Two seals were drowned in Loch Lomond. Each bet the other sixpence he could stay under water longer than the other.

2. A tramp called at the home of a circusman and got a good meal by telling what a devoted Christian he was. He made his story stronger by pointing to patches on his nose worn through by much prayer. As he was walking off the minister called: "Why is it that you have such a big patch on the after-deck of your trousers?" "Oh, sir," said the tramp, "Alas! Sir, I have been at times a sad backslider!"

Clothes Are Tasteful

Coming downstairs for his daily drive as soon as his after-lunch

rest is over, Mr. Rockefeller wears such clothes as might be worn by any tasteful, middle-aged professional man.

A cutaway suit of steel gray, freshly washed, a percale shirt with fine blue stripes, a white turned-down collar and a rich but plain four-in-hand silk cravat of dark blue with a faint figure in it. A small pearl tie pin. Thick brown leather gloves. Square-toed, tan shoes with double-sole.

An attendant helps him into a long, double-breasted brown ulster, and swigs a knitted scarf about his neck.

Mr. Rockefeller dons amber-lined goggles and a cap with flaps which come down around his neck and throat.

Farm Life Formed Habits

He rides often in a car his son gave him a dozen years or more ago, and the route of the ride takes him into the country. He never has been much out of touch with country life. He was born in a newly settled region of upper New York and spent his earliest years in the country. Work he had to do in the household and on the farm helped him form habits of industry, steady habits which he does not lose when city boys can do to gain, although city boys have greater advantages in the school.

—He had not planned as a boy what his career was to be. At school he worked hard to learn all he could. He was not an easy student, and had to apply himself diligently. He hoped to go to college, but

learned at 16 that he could not, so he went to business college to fit himself for office work. He did not yet know that it would be, but he was after something big. When he spent six weeks looking for work he never went into a retail place, but always tried railroads, banks or wholesale places.

Believes In College

Mr. Rockefeller believes boys and girls too, ought to go to college if they get there to work as well as to play.

He regards youth's chances for success today as much better than 70 years ago, when he began. Then young men had everything to do and little or nothing to do it with. The nation was in transition from agriculture to wholesale manufacture and commerce, and methods and machinery had to be invented as they were needed.

Mr. Rockefeller has pointed out that during the years people have learned the value of cooperation; that a body of men well organized and working together can accomplish far more and do it cheaper than double the number of men working in scattered groups and in cut throat competition.

savings make the foundation of greater fortune.

Often he gives a nickel besides, and says, "This is to spend—if you wish!"—But his tone and manner suggest that spending money is not a thing to be done rashly or lightly.

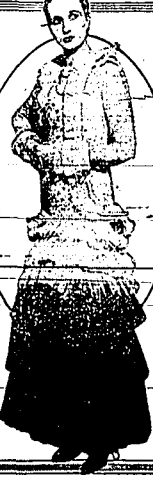

ST. LOUIS, April 6.—The Oregon Trail is to be blazed anew—but this time by airplane instead of covered wagons.

One hundred years ago on April 10 a band of pioneers driving covered wagons set out from St. Louis for the unmapped West. Their trip is little mentioned in history books, but the route they took is famous today as the Old Oregon Trail.

On April 10 of this year, according to tentative plans, another band will set out for the West from St. Louis, but the trip will be a short one. For a few miles out an airplane will take up the trail and speed through the air over the route those American frontiersmen so laboriously traveled.

Will Carry Message

The plane probably will carry a message from the governor of Missouri to the governor of Oregon.

The covered-wagon plane trip will signify a national-wide celebration of the covered wagon centennial supported by the Old Oregon Trail Memorial association. Observance will extend from April 10 to December 29 the centennial of the birth of Ezra Meeker, a Northwest pioneer who founded the memorial association.

The party that starts from St. Louis over the old route this April will drive reconstructed wagons similar to those used by the pioneers.
