PIONEER STOCKMAN OF WYOMING DIES

Feudist Gun Battle Far Out in Prairie Results Fatal for Resident Rancher

NEW CASTLE, Wyo., April 7.—John E. Mead, 10, one of Wyoming's most prominent stockmen, was fatally killed today in a feudist gun battle on the prairie 40 miles west of here today.

The fight was the result of an incident in which Mead's horse was killed by a stray bullet fired by a man on the Old West ranch and sheep war days, friends of the slain man.

Keth Mead, son of the slain man, said he and his father were driving along on leased property south of Newcastle yesterday when Wolf appeared in an automobile.

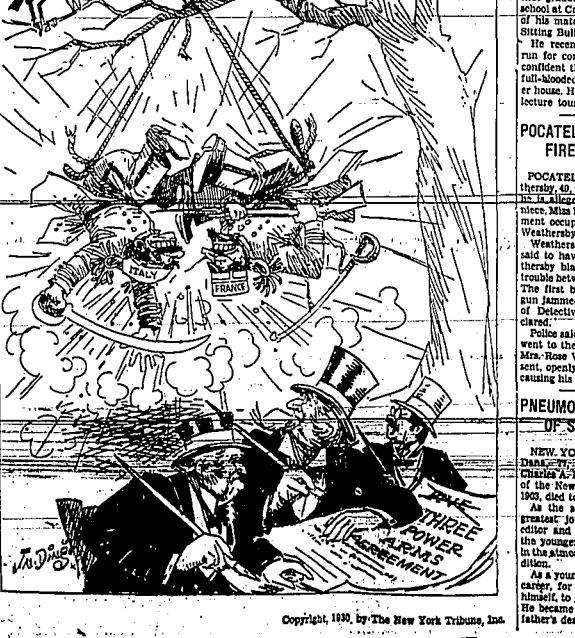

# FEDERAL BUREAU PROMISES LABOR AGENT ALL-YEAR

## Telegram Gives Assurance of Granting of Request From Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce Board

Twin Falls will have an all-year federal labor service beginning June 1; that the Boise firing service will inaugurate about April 15 a passenger service will stop here a week on its aerial service between Pocatello and Boise; that reduction of 15 cents per 100 pounds in the rate on potato shipments to Los Angeles via Sacramento has been granted, and that Twin Falls will join in the all Idaho excursion trip, starting from here May 18, were high light in the activities of the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce board of directors at its meeting last night.

A telegram from the federal employment bureau at Washington to Nevell S. Wright, secretary, assured the establishment of the federal labor service for which the club has labored for several years, with the purpose in mind of stabilizing the labor situation, with a view of securing ample supply of workers when needed by farmers and orchardists, and, at the same time, avoiding filling the city with men for whom there is no employment, to the injury of local laborers.

# Rate Not Set

Exact date for the beginning of regular weekly passenger service by the Boise Firing Service has not been set, it was stated, but it will be either on April 15 or within a few days thereafter. Rates have not been announced, but it was stated that they would compare favorably with the rates on the railroad, and that it will require an hour and a quarter to fly from here to Boise. The fact that Magic Hot Springs and Buhl are both preparing land-planes for use on the route, adds data relative to aviation prospects in the report made by Secretary Wright.

The reduction of potato rates shipped to Stockton and Fresno, and transferred to Los Angeles, will, it was stated, make a material saving to those who find such transferring economy advisable. This matter has been urged by the Chamber for some time, and the present announcement followed the meeting here last week of Mr. E. Crodin, Salt Lake City, general freight agent of the Oregon Short Line, with representatives of the chamber.

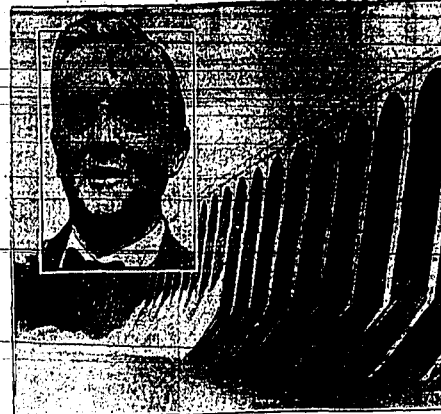

# ALASKA OFFERS LARGE REINDEER MEAT SUPPLY

JUNEAU, Alaska, April 7 (AP)—The reindeer industry in Alaska can stand immediate export of 350,000 carcasses annually. That is the report of the Biological Survey.

Average weight of a carcass is 140 pounds, which gives a possible export of 50,000,000 pounds of deer meat at an estimated value of \$2,000,000.

In addition to the value of the meat there would be approximately 2,000,000 pounds of by-products, including 350,000 hides worth from \$1.50 to \$4 each.

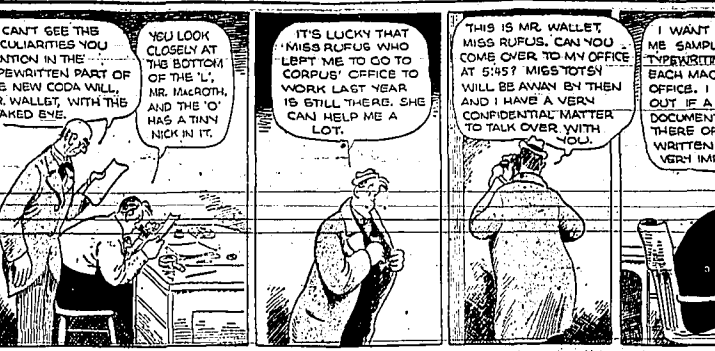

# OBSTRUCTION IN PIPE LINE BRINGS DISPUTE TO FOCUS

Twin Falls City Council and Landholders Outside Municipal Boundaries Agree on Appeal to Court

An obstruction that developed recently at the south end of an underground pipe through which water flows a quarter-mile across Blue Lake, adding for irrigation of approximately 500 acres of land outside Twin Falls city limits on the north, brought to focus last week a long-disputed question whether the conduit should be maintained by the city or by approximately 50 affected landholders.

In discussion of the question at last evening's meeting of the city council, council members stood pat on advice given by E. M. Sweeney, city attorney, a week before that there is no justification in law for any expenditure of municipal funds to maintain a water course serving lands outside the city limits.

Spokesmen for the interested landholders were equally obtuse in this respect, and it seems to be clearly understood at the close of the informal discussion that the dispute would be carried into the courts for immediate action.

Committees seemed to devote such action in order to obtain a definite understanding of the city's responsibility and liabilities in this regard, and the landholders, after arguing for a time that the city at least should own the pipe this time, indicated purpose to make an immediate appeal to the courts.

The case for the landholders was presented before the council last evening by David Court, R. C. Letsch and Asher B. Wilson.

The city attorney was not present on account of illness.

Inquiry prosecuted by city officials and interested landholders since the question was presented at last week's council meeting, seems to indicate that the pipe line was laid some time prior to 10 years ago, to replace an open ditch.

It has not been established definite by the city or the Pocatello Security company, which plotted and laid the Blue Lake addition.
