



# London Naval Parley Nears Close With Three-Power Treaty

## PACT ALLOWS TWO DISSENTING LANDS TO ENTER AT WILL

United States, Britain and Japan Seal Naval Accord and Announce Decision to Admit France and Italy

LONDON, April 10.—The London naval conference will be wound up next week with a three-power agreement permitting the two dissenting lands to enter at will.

The treaty which provides for a skeleton five-power pact which France and Italy can join even before they settle their differences on parity.

The way was made clear today when the United States, Great Britain and Japan, after nearly three months of negotiating, signed their naval accord.

And a dramatic last-minute move by the American negotiators sealed the five-power treaty when the conference agreed today as far as general agreement on any points was concerned. Secretary Stimson, Ambassador Morrow, and Ambassador Cushman made proposals to the French and Italian delegations which will enable the delegation five-power pact to be drawn, and the five big nations, which will meet in St. James palace to approve the plan.

The whole London naval treaty will not be written and signed until next week, but the conference will be wound up and the delegates can have formalities to the ambassadors in London—the envoys of the United States, France, Italy and Japan, all being conference delegates.

A plenary session at St. James Tuesday is expected to be the last formal "full dress" conference gathering. On that occasion the three-power accord will be proclaimed, and the points upon which the five powers can agree.

By today's developments all consideration of the highly controversial consuetudinary pact, in which the Americans would have been expected to join, is dead. The United States will leave London without a semblance of an European political entanglement.

**Elusive Formula Out**

Likewise, the elusive security formula, which Great Britain and France hunted for weeks, is out.

In the line of common sense, the American representative, Ramsey MacDonal, who has stubbornly fought during the conference to keep the negotiations alive, announced tonight the conference would be adjourned next week.

In the opinion of conference circles tonight the London negotiation descriptive words of the delegates among the five delegations that more than once threatened completely to disrupt them—will end with tremendous achievements recorded for the cause of disarmament.

This was particularly emphasized when it became known that Foreign Minister Briand of France had given Mr. MacDonal assurances the French government does not intend to build up to the fleet program it has so vainly fought for.

as to tonnage equipment and size of aircraft carriers, a agreement reached on special and exempt classes of ships, and the compromise on the global and category method of measuring fleet tonnage.

## MERGER OF GIANT STEEL COMPANIES CONFRONTS DELAY

Financial Observers Look For Indefinite Postponement After Statement by Amalgamation Opponent

(By The Associated Press)

YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio, April 10.—Financial observers here tonight believed that indefinite postponement was in prospect for the merger of the Youngstown Sheet and Tube company with the Bethlehem Steel corporation.

They based their conclusions on a statement of Cyrus S. Eaton, Cleveland financier and chief merger opponent, and of Newton D. Baker, Cleveland associated counsel, for Sheet and Tube who has taken leadership in the proponents' legal battle.

Baker stated in open court this afternoon that even if the merger is confirmed by inspectors of election

and Bethlehem so notified, that company will tell Sheet and Tube to get out of the picture before the deal is got through.

"It is conceivable that a mad man might go through with a deal like this, as long as there are still living around," Baker asserted.

Will Fight

Eaton, in a statement yesterday, said he would "fight the merger to the last ditch."

Observers noted that the regular annual meeting of stockholders "must" convene under the company's by-laws, on April 22. In view of Eaton's determination to "fight to the last ditch" the merger would not be ended by that time.

After April 22, many of the controversial shares of stock may regain their right to be voted on the merger. This includes the 51,038 shares held by Oils and company, which they bought after the last date of record.

These shares include 40,000 bought by other individuals after the last date of record.

The 51,038 will be voted by Eaton forces. Eaton now controls 316,000 shares, and the voting of the 51,038 in his favor would give him a total of 401,038, more than enough to block the merger, according to the observers.

In an amendment to a temporary restraining order filed this afternoon, Judge C. S. Turnbaugh held that vote on the 51,038 shares of controversial stock should be annulled but it could not be recorded.

Judge Turnbaugh issued the temporary injunction last night and arguments were held this afternoon on motion of Sheet and Tube attorneys to dismiss. Arguments of the question of making the injunction permanent are scheduled to be held tomorrow.

The case was given to the jury at 8:30 and the verdict was read in court at 9:25 P. M. today.

None of the three defendants flinched as the verdict was read by W. H. Pebringer, foreman of the jury composed of 10 farmers, a shoemaker and a garage man.

A beading rain pelted the windows of the court room as the verdict was read. Thomas H. Hoffmire, counsel for the defense asked for a jury poll at 9:25 P. M. today.

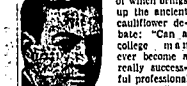


# Wolff Enters Ring To Upset Adage Of Ancient Cauliflower

## Graybeards Point To College Boys' Record and Smile

Gimme Dumb Guys; Tough, Ignorant; Dumber The Better; Maintain Smartest Fight Managers

NEW YORK, April 10.—Six years ago Allie Wolff, a huskily molded Jewish boy, was a Dick Merivale on the sidewalks of Brooklyn in intercollegiate football and basketball. Last June he was graduated from Penn State with a string of nine varsity letters and three intercollegiate boxing championships.



Today this came Allie Wolff is about to become a professional fighter, a middleweight with the juice of a college education upon him. All of which brings up the ancient cauliflower adage: "Can a college man ever become a really successful professional gladiator?"

The graybeards of the ring, pointing to the records of Sully Manganomy of Centre college; Big Ed Orvey, from Notre Dame; Dr. Ludwig Haydman, with a string of German degrees behind his name; Montie Mann of Nebraska; Less Mariner of Chicago, and a sprinkling of others, say it can't be done. Wolff is getting ready to show that it can.

"A college athlete," Wolff grunted between body bends in a stuffy little gym, "should have two strikes on the rest of the fighters starting in if he really likes the game. The college athlete has at least four years of body building training under the best possible instructors. He learns to obey orders. He develops speed, stamina, and instant coordination of mind and muscles.

"Fundamentally setting the right instant-to-make-a-punching-stance, an open fist is no different from grabbing a opening to shoot a right hand punch to the chin. Both take the same kind of thinking and coordination. Perhaps the reason more college athletes aren't successful fighters is because they start so late."

Wolff, 26 years old, is a success story, perfectly fit, and a successful boxer, perfectly fit. He won 23 successive matches in intercollegiate competition. He doubts as a physical instructor in a Brooklyn high school. Several of the smartest managers of cauliflowerers watched Wolff work today. They thought he was a nice boy, might make a fighter, but:

"No college guys for me," said one. "Gimme the dumb guys, the tough, tough ignorant guys, the dumber the better."

### Thoughtless Ones Face Trouble With Man at Courthouse

It is exasperating when one is doing his best to beautify the grounds about a public building to find that thinking persons have ripped up a flower bed or broken branches off shrubbery or committed any one of a number of other deprecations lately perpetrated on Twin Falls county court house grounds. A. I. Ross, court house custodian, declared last evening.

Work that Mr. Ross has done toward beautification of the courthouse grounds has attracted through the last few years that have not only been a matter of pride and gratification to himself and all the county officials, but that have been highly praised by many visitors.

Telling of some of the discouragements he has encountered through deprecations that, he says, are generally the result of thoughtlessness, Mr. Ross referred last evening to finding a deep hole dug in the middle of a flower bed by a stream of water running through a hole that he had adjusted painstakingly, but some other person later had picked up to get a drink, and it came down in such manner that the stream wreaked havoc on the newly-planted flower bed.

It is a matter of too common occurrence, and older persons as well as children are among the offenders.

# Idaho Fire Fighting and Prevention Costs \$513,506 in Year

## COMPANIES EXPEND HUGE AMOUNTS FOR TIMBER PROTECTION

Greater Portion of Money Spent to Save Forests Goes to Northern Part of State, Audit Reveals

(By The Associated Press) BOISE, April 10 — Fire suppression and prevention cost Idaho timber protective associations \$513,506 last season, by far the greater portion of which was spent in North Idaho, an audit of the associations by the bureau of public accounts revealed today.

Of the total, \$392,239, went directly into fire fighting in one of the costliest seasons on record. This amount is exclusive of the large amount spent by the forest service but includes money paid by the state into the associations for protection of state owned timber.

**Association Expenditures**  
The Bend Oreille association put on the costliest show with an expenditure of \$188,720 of which \$163,873 went into fire fighting. The Bend Oreille led off with the highest expenditure with \$47,000 per acre in the southern Idaho association came last with 2 cents an acre. This latter association, however, protects the greatest acreage of timber, 524,540 acres, as against 40,621 acres in the Potlatch association, the next highest.

All associations together spent \$107,773 for patrolling, charged \$12,962 to property depletion, spent \$11,240 for blister rust control and \$18,690 in incidental expense.

**Blister Rust Control**  
In addition to this the Potlatch association spent \$10,000 for blister rust control as well as \$875 contributed to the general blister rust fund. The Clearwater Timber association put \$10,000 in the blister rust fund while the Clear d'Alene put \$370.

Of the total spent, the state contributed \$63,227 or about one-fifth. Total expenditures of the various associations for its items were: Clear d'Alene \$128,440; Clearwater \$55,072; Potlatch \$82,119; Bend Oreille \$188,720; Priest Lake \$26,125; Taseemini \$5,522; Pine Creek \$360; southern Idaho \$10,747.

**Accesses included in each were:** Clearwater \$28,728; Clearwater \$46,816; Potlatch \$20,801; Pine Creek \$16,241; Priest Lake \$17,226; Taseemini \$3,670; Pine Creek \$10,484; southern Idaho \$10,747.

PHILADELPHIA, April 10 (AP)—The site where "Hail Columbia" was written in Philadelphia 132 years ago, is at last to be recognized as one of many historic landmarks of the old Quaker city.

On April 22, anniversary of the composition of the patriotic song, by Joseph Hopkinson, eminent American jurist, the Historical Society of Pennsylvania will unveil a bronze tablet on the house at 338 Spruce street, on obscure three story brick dwelling.

On the tablet will be inscribed the legend: "Hail Columbia" was composed here by Joseph Hopkinson on April 22, 1788. Erected by the Historical Society, Pennsylvania, April 22, 1920.

The anthem was written during a period of political excitement, when a conflict with France was a possibility and was arranged to be sung to the tune of "The President's March" composed in honor of President Washington while he was in Philadelphia.

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## OIL REFINERS SEEK IMPROVED PRODUCT

Research Engineers Try to Produce Lubricant With Minimum Viscosity Change

TULSA, Okla., April 10 (AP)—Progress in the automotive and aviation industries in the last few years has forced the petroleum refiner to quicken steps in order to provide motor oils and greases to meet the demands of modern engines.

Intensive research in recent months has brought advances in methods of refining, and as a result new lubricants and oils have appeared on the market.

One problem created by modern motoring is that of excessive oil consumption. Road tests have shown that at speeds above 50 miles an hour the quantity of oil used increases rapidly.

**Vacuum Pipe Still**  
To produce a lubricant adapted to high speed driving, refiners are using vacuum pipe stills equipped with fractionating towers which reduce the volatility of an oil to a minimum by separating the more volatile parts.

The American Society of Testing Materials has determined that viscosity is the most important single property of a lubricant. Since viscosity changes with temperature and the rate of change varies with different types of oil, and because the automotive and airplane motors are operated over a wide temperature range, the goal of refiners is an oil showing a minimum change of viscosity with temperature.

## TOURISTS TREK THROUGH REGION OF BLACK HILLS

RAPID CITY, S. D., April 10 (AP)—Tourists have replaced prospectors and traders in the trek to the Black Hills.

This summer playground hopes to entertain 750,000 visitors during the coming season.

## PILOTS AT KELLY FIELD FLY FOR 48,448 HOURS

SAN ANTONIO, Texas, April 10 (AP)—A record-breaking total of 48,448 hours of flying time was recorded in 1929 at Kelly field, the air corps advanced flying school.

Permanent and student pilots combined to register the largest aggregate of flying time made by any army field since the close of the World war.

A single ship, capable of continuing flight, would need to be in the air almost six years to equal the record.

Figured in mileage, the airplane fleet in 1929, 4,844,700 miles, equivalent of nearly 200 trips around the world.

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## ATLANTIC OCEAN FLIER RETURNS TO OLD POST

LE BOURGET, April 10 (AP)—Jean Assolant, after a few months of glory for crossing the Atlantic last June, has come back to his old job as a pilot on the Paris-Biarritz air line.

Assolant still is popular but he also is poor and he has to make a living. He met kings and presidents when he and his companions, Lotli and Lefevre, made a tour of European capitals after their trans-Atlantic flight but there was no salary attached to the job of exploring the fame of France.

Flying is Assolant's trade, his every-day work that puts butter on his bread. His pastime is football.

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## COURT TESTS PLAN FOR ALIENISTS' TESTIMONIES

ST. LOUIS, April 10 (AP)—The practice of "act an alienist to catch an alienist" in court cases has had its run in St. Louis courts.

Backed by the judges of the circuit court here, Circuit Attorney Franklin Miller recently took a first step toward eliminating the practice of having one alienist's testimony neutralize that of another.

Miller introduced his alternative system in the recent trial of Alan R. Schumann, who shot his father last January.

Instead of having an alienist for the prosecution and one for the defense to argue Schumann's sanity, Miller asked the circuit judge to appoint three alienists to consult together. Their expense was to be paid half by the state and half by the defense.

This step was taken, Miller said, to avoid unnecessary expense concerning the sanity of the subject between alienists for the defense and prosecution.

## AMERICANS MAKE NEW SWISS CHEESE FLAVOR

WASHINGTON, April 10 (AP)—Esters a new found flavor-maker for Swiss cheese.

The name is streptococcus thermophilus vis-à-vis, a family of bacteria, and for short scientists have named the three flavor-making members of the family O-1, O-2 and O-3.

How these bacteria are used as starters for making better Swiss cheese, and making it in America, too, is told by four members of the United States bureau of dairy industry in a report to the Society of American Bacteriologists. These experimenters are W. C. Frazer, L. A. Burkoy, K. J. Mattoon and P. D. Wampler.

O-2, they say, "has been beneficial to cheese by improving texture, flavor and consequently score, grade and selling price. It has also been possible to prevent deflata."

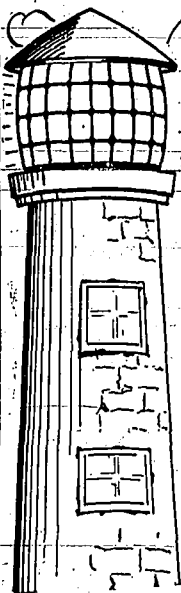

REVISIONS

Singing of the "Star Spangled Banner" calls for a degree of vocal talent that is not usually met by many Americans recognize the air which they hear it, but not many are familiar with more than the first, three or four lines of its words.

Among those of those who are acquainted with the words, though, there has arisen a fact that the sentiment expressed is too blood-thirsty, that it is in fact an incentive for armed conflict.

With view to correcting such a state of affairs there has been devised a revision of the original verse. It is now being circulated for approval in Idaho's public schools. It runs like this:

"Oh say will you hope for the dawn of the day When the war-lark has fled from the hearts of a Nation? And no more will men rush to the perfidious fray.

But will peace all unite in a world-federation. There is plainly here a radical revision of the original. It reminds one of an interesting revision of certain verses that the amiable Autocrat of the Breakfast Table once said he had composed for a convivial occasion. As written by the Autocrat, the verses would read:

"Then a smile, and a glass, and a toast, and a cheer, For all the good wine, and we've enough of the best."

In cellar, in pantry, in attic, in hall. Long live the gay servant that laughs for us all!"

The Autocrat was mistaken about the nature of the celebration for which he wrote the verses, and the chairman of the party, a man well known as "revelator," made some alterations with this result:

"Then a scowl, and a howl, and a scuff, and a sneer For strychnine and whiskey, rabians and beer."

In cellar, in pantry, in attic, in hall. Down down with the tyrant that masters us all!"

There is no disposition to quarrel with the sentiment expressed in the revisions, either of the National air, or in the Autocrat's verse. Perhaps the revision in both instances is to be preferred to the original.

DIVIDENDS AS USUAL

The dividend checks sent to a couple of million owners of corporation stock on April 1 are reassuring.

"There is no such thing as a free lunch" in the vast majority of cases, as they expected. The dividends are as high as usual, in some cases higher.

"Even a casual examination of the list," says K. TURNER, "shows that whatever effect the stock market break had on business, and whatever the effect it may have eventually on a corporation profit, it has had little or no effect on dividends for the first three months of the year."

This doesn't mean that stocks have earned as much money the first quarter of 1930 as they were earning a year ago. The present dividends are paid, in part, from the accumulated surplus of last year and other years.

The hopeful thing about the situation, however, is the widespread feeling that the caution will suffice for the present emergency and that the available surplus has been exhausted to a degree that is not likely to be reached again.

THE ILLIAD OF THE NORTHWEST

The Wilson Price Hunt expedition occupies a less prominent place than it deserves in the memories of our people. In successful achievement, it was inferior to the earlier journey of Lewis and Clark. But in dramatic terms, it is the most significant of our history.

John Jacob Astor, promoter of the expedition, founder of the fur and fur trade which still survives under his name, was a native of Germany. Coming to New York, he entered the business, operating around the Great Lakes, and accumulated what was then considered great wealth.

According to Senator Goldborough and the tariff commission, the product of the industry is "fish liver" of the genus *Coraxus*. That means goldfish. Not the kind so termed in the army when put in cans for rations, but the decorative kind that frisk about in ponds and bowls for the edification of all beholders.

And Frederick county, Maryland, it is said, has the largest "goldfish farm" in the world. It is a 1500-acre plant containing all manner of ponds including one 11 acres in area. And its only business is raising and marketing goldfish.

What a contrast to the ritual method of goldfish production and transportation followed in Japan, the only competitor of the goldfish.

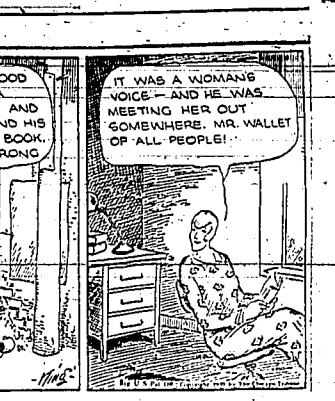
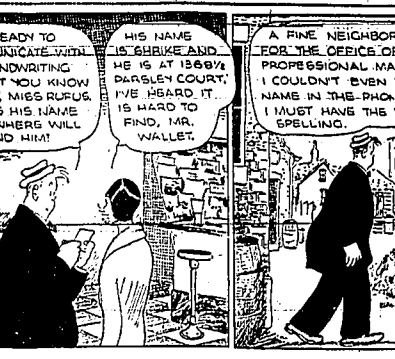

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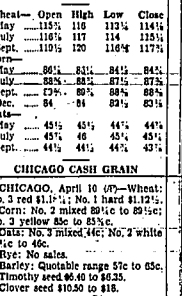
