LONDON CONFEREES DRAFT TRI-PARTITE TREATY AGREEMENT

American Delegates Hope To Conclude Labors in Time to Sail on Levathan for New York City

(By The Associated Press) LONDON, April 11.—The London conference of the three great powers, with its treaty within a treaty built as a new beacon on the road to disarmament, is rapidly nearing its close and may end at the plenary session next Thursday with the signing of the London treaty.

This will follow a similar plenary meeting of brief duration Monday, which will be a preliminary treaty which embodies the three-power agreement reached by the United States, Great Britain and France.

Secretary Simson and his American colleagues confidently expect to sail home on the Levathan, the ship normally would sail April 22, unless the conference is able to hold her 24 hours if necessary, and the Americans are negotiating to see if sailing could be delayed to the 28th or 29th.

Celebrate Success Today the delegations celebrated the success with which the London conference had been achieved with dramatic efforts yesterday after almost the last vestige of the conference had been agreed to.

## Meeting of 50 Persons Who Receive Irrigation Supply From Pipe Line Organizes to Test Rights

George Herriott, Twin Falls attorney, was elected chairman and J. C. Bradley, vice president of the Twin Falls Bank and Trust company, was elected secretary and treasurer at an organization meeting of owners of land irrigated by water from the lowline canal through Blue Lake.

The meeting was held at the Twin Falls city hall, which was recently partially closed for a time and for which the city has so far refused to assume responsibility for maintaining and keeping open. The meeting, attended by 50 persons, representing 200 acres of the 400 acres irrigated from the pipe line, voted to request the board of directors of the Twin Falls Canal company at their meeting today, and John W. Iron, manager of the company, to appoint Asher B. Wilson watermaster for the purpose of fixing charge of the canal line and fixing responsibility.

About \$500 was pledged by those present at the meeting to carry out the plans deemed necessary and, it was stated, several land owners who were unable to attend had declared themselves willing to cooperate.

The consensus of the meeting was that the city was responsible. It was stated that unless the city could be reached on that basis an appeal to the court for determination of the matter would be made.

The pipe line lies within the city limits and the land to which it carries water is located outside the city. The landowners claim that the city about 10 years ago took steps which render it liable for maintenance of the pipe line to the headgates within municipal limits.

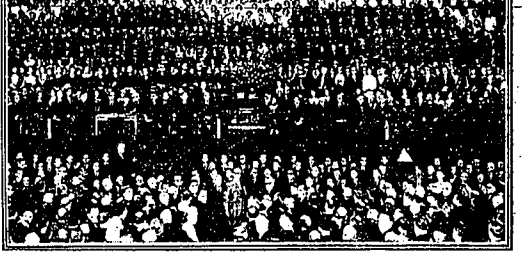
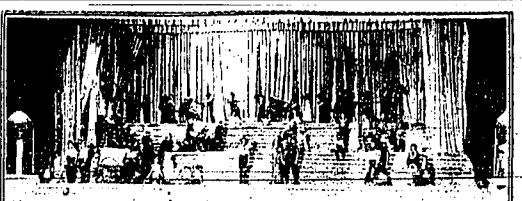
