

OFFICERS IDENTIFY EIGHT OF DEAD IN NEW MEXICO CRASH

Information Regarding 11 Mangled Bodies Remains In Doubt Following Re-check by County Officials

(By The Associated Press) ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., April 12.—Retracing their work after some of the earlier identifications had proved to be erroneous, county authorities tonight had positively identified eight of the 19 persons killed by a fire in a wreck of an airplane in a brush near Santa Fe, N. M., today.

Because many of the bodies were so mangled that there were little or no signs upon them, the first identifications were made by baggage, bus tickets and letters. The re-check revealed that two persons listed as dead were not passengers on the ill-fated plane.

James W. Lacey, Compton, California, tonight was in the most serious condition among the 19 men who were rescued. He was given a 24-hour trial and is expected to live to be on the case of a secretary having complications.

The bodies of two babies were still among the unrecog bodies. Authorities believed the infants are related and thought their mother probably was among the dead.

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Mrs. William Turner, Peocs, one of the victims, is in a dangerous condition. The plane had gained about 100 feet altitude on the takeoff when the motor stalled and the ship slipped to the ground.

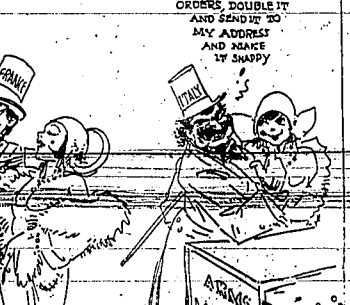

Terrific Gas Explosion in Washington Mine Instantly Snuffs Out 21 Men's Lives

(By The Associated Press) TACOMA, Wash., April 12.—A terrific gas explosion on the second level, about 600 feet under ground, in the Carbonado coal mine of the Pacific Coal company at Carbonado snuffed out the lives of 21 miners at 6 o'clock.

So strong was the blast that the men, a complete shift unit, were instantly killed. Timbers were torn out of place and parts of the mine walls caved in, but mine authorities stated it was believed that few of the bodies were buried very deep.

Jury In Emmett Oxidicide Trial, Convicts Accused Man and Fixes Penalty

EMMETT, Idaho, April 12.—A verdict of murder in the first degree, fixing the penalty at death, was returned shortly after 11 o'clock tonight by the jury which tried John C. McClurg for the slaying of his wife, Mary, December 8 last.

The trial ended with defense taking less than a day to present evidence aimed at reducing more than three days of testimony from state witness picked up to prove that the witness had not seen her body.

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### LONDON NAVAL PACT BEGINS TO ASSUME DEFINITE OUTLINES

#### Drafting And Expert Committees Rush Work on Details Of Tri-Partite Treaty to Halt Competitive Building

LONDON, April 12.—The London naval treaty, which in large measure will eliminate world competition in naval building for the next 20 years, today began to take shape in definite outlines.

A draft was rushed into shape by the drafting and expert committees throughout the day, in the hope of submitting it to the delegates by midnight to be studied over Sunday.

So far, the jurists responsible for writing the treaty are holding their own in their race against time to make a possible formal signature on Thursday and the departure of the American delegation homeward on the liner *Lexington* on April 23.

The committee assigned to the work of drafting labored at their task all through the day and into the night. They were aided by special treaty experts under Sir Maurice Hankey, secretary-general of the conference.

The experts waited outside the committee's room in St. James' palace ready at a moment's notice to furnish advice on the precise wording of any doubtful clause.

All outstanding points in the various technical reports were approved this afternoon by the first committee of the conference and will be presented at the formal plenary session on Monday.

France and Italy formally reserved the right to pull the capitulations they are entitled to construct under the Washington treaty prior to the present year. This tonnage agreement was signed in London December 1922.

According to the definite conference scrapping program, the United States will scrap the battleships Florida and Utah, one ship to be rendered unfit for warlike service within 12 months of ratification of the London treaty and finally scrapped within two years.

The British empire will scrap four ships, the *Marborough*, the *Emperor of India*, the *Bombay* and the *Tiger* at various intervals up to 20 months from the date of ratification of the treaty.

Prime Minister Ramsey MacDonald, Secretary of State Simon and Ex-Premier Baldwin, respectively, are bent on finishing the major part of the conference work by next Thursday.

McClurg did not take the stand and his only words in connection with the case were presented to the jury through the mouths of other witnesses. Mr. McClurg, who is the brother-in-law of the late pilot, was called to the stand to testify briefly of the death of his wife, about an hour after it happened, when he came to Tex's home here.

The jury took the case shortly after a visit to the scene where officers pointed out to them the place where the car left the road and where it finally stopped, straddling a gully, 100 feet down the steep hillside.

As motivation for the crime, the state contended that insurance policies, with double indemnity provision, had been applied for by himself and Mrs. McClurg—that they were worried about her prospective motherhood, and that they had been unhappy from the time they were married in Yakima, Washington, last fall.

In his short presentation, defense insisted that everything was readily explainable as an accident. McClurg testified at preliminary hearing that smoke had come from the floor board as they drove up the hill and the machine got away from him as he attempted to investigate it. To support this testimony was brought out at the trial that the gas feed line was broken, that tracks of the car indicated it might have leaped nearly two score feet after leaving the highway, and that the body of the girl was hanging barely in the edge of the car when officers came upon it on the cold December night of the tragedy.

### 19 PURSUIT PLANES SET ALTITUDE MARK

#### United States Army Squadron Flies in Combat Formation 30,000 Feet High

SACRAMENTO, Cal., April 12.—A new world's altitude record of 30,000 feet for combat formation flying was set here today by 19 airplanes of the Ninety-third Pursuit Squadron flying in connection with the United States Army's air maneuvers.

led by Captain H. M. Elmendorf, of the planes took off at 8 A. M. from the Maxfield and returned two hours later with the new record. The old record was 17,000 feet. The altitudes reached by the various ships ranged from 27,500 to 30,000 feet.

Captain Elmendorf reported an landing that when he reached 30,000 feet the tube leading from the oxygen tank supplying him with air slipped from his mouth and he was forced to dive downward four miles to keep from losing consciousness. Extremely low temperatures were encountered at the higher altitudes but fuel line clogging weighing 50 pounds kept the men from freezing.

Praising the work of pushing higher the limits of combat flying, Brigadier General William E. Colburn, commanding the maneuvers, said the job which was so effectively done by the pilots "could have been performed just as well by any other group of army pilots." He declared, "It is the training of the entire body of flying personnel and exceptional ability of many individuals which is of importance in modern military tactics."

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### NELLIE ROSS TAKES PRESIDENT TO TASK

#### Former Governor of Wyoming Declares President Wants to Enter League

NEW YORK, April 12.—Mrs. Nellie Taylor Ross, former governor of Wyoming, today told the Southern Women's national Democratic organization of New York that, though President Hoover has avoided open endorsement of the League of Nations, she believes he is secretly endeavoring to enter it by "side door—the family entrance."

On the other hand, Representative French said the results of the London treaty conference are so splendid that they should command the hearty support of the people of the United States and of the world.

Other nations could not see their way clear to go as far as the United States in making reductions, but the tonnage agreed upon is somewhat under the present tonnage of the available.

Mrs. Ross, who is vice chairman of the Democratic national committee, said: "First, he believed in the League of Nations. When he became president he could not very well continue to uphold the League, which at heart, he has always believed in. Since then he has had his Republican aides help him to do so."

Mrs. Ross asserted that evidence of an effort to enter the League via the "side door" is to be found in the world court and the recent conference on armaments in Europe. "It was a great calamity to the world and humanity when these ideas failed because we were 10 years too late," she said.

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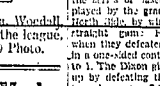
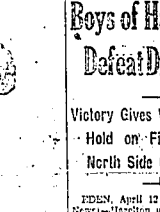
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## New York Giants Defeat Chicago White Sox by 4-1

## Losers Shatter World's Record For Mile Relay

For Second Time in 13 Years University of Southern California Defeats Cards in Annual Track Contest

Hector Dyer, in Century, Shows Heels to Wykoff, 1928 Olympic Sprinter, in Major Upset of Day

LOS ANGELES, April 12.—For the second time in 13 years the University of Southern California today defeated Stanford in a dual track meet marked by the recording of one new world's mark and tying another. The final count stood 84-1-12 to 46-11-12. It was fitting that the final event on the program, the mile relay, should go to Coach (Dino) Tompkins' athletes in record-breaking time as consolation for their decisive defeat. The Cardinal quartet covered the distance in 3 minutes 12 2/5 seconds, a second faster than the former mark set in 1921 by Newark Athletic club.

The much equaled time of 8:5 seconds in the century, also was credited to Stanford when Hector Dyer, showed his heels to Frank Wykoff, 1928 Olympic sprinter, in the major upset of the day.

Coach Dean Cromwell's Trojans chalked up their advantage by scoring seven firsts, and sharing three others with Stanford. Coach Tompkins' team accounted for four firsts, but it was the clean sweep by the men of Troy in the low hurdles, half mile and javelin which spelled defeat for the Cardinal team.

Besides the stakes for the hundred and the mile relay, exceptional performances were registered in the javelin throw, which went to Captain Jesse Mortensen, University of Southern California, with a toss of 201 8/10 feet; the high jump with Robert von Oedel, of the Proletas clearing the bar at 6 feet 5 3/8 inches and the furlong dash, which ended in a tie between Dyer and Wykoff in 21 2/5 seconds.

# Cambridge Crew Triumphs Over Oxford

## Two Lengths Win Hard Fought Race On Thames River

American Coxswain, R. E. Swartwout, New York, Steers Light Blue to Victory to Break Deadlock

Roar of 1,000,000 Excited Throats Including Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald's Follows Racers

By BATES HANEY (Associated Press Staff Writer). LONDON - ON THAMES, England, April 12.—Cambridge university, with an American coxswain, R. E. Swartwout, New York, at the tiller, won its Oxford boat race with its annual boat race with Oxford today by five lengths in a match so stubbornly contested that the result was in doubt right up to the last three quarters of a mile. Followed by the roar of a million excited throats which swept along both banks of the Thames from Putney to Mortlake in the wake of the rival boat, the Oxford crew spurted into a quarter-length lead from the crack of the starting pistol, maintained it at a grueling pace for nearly four miles to crash up to the home stretch and see Cambridge nose its way to victory. They made a magnificent effort to win, those boys in dark blue, setting the pace throughout a terrific race, but Cambridge's steady power beat them. At the finish the entire light blue crew remained sitting upright, looking fresh, while the Cambridge crew, very much distressed, lay over their oars gasping for breath.

Fast Time Cambridge rowed the course of four and a quarter miles in 19 minutes 45 seconds, fast time under the conditions. By winning the Cambles established superiority over Oxford in local triumphs for the first time since before the American civil war. It was the seventh consecutive victory for Cambridge which now has a total score of 41 victories as against Oxford's 40. Oxford's total, however, includes two trifles of nine consecutive victories. Honors were divided in one dead heat which occurred in 1877. The weather today, which was blustery and wet, favored Oxford which won the toss and chose the Surrey side. This is the inside route on the winding S-shaped course. Ex-Freighter Stanley Baker followed the race from a launch which trailed the race boats by a few feet.

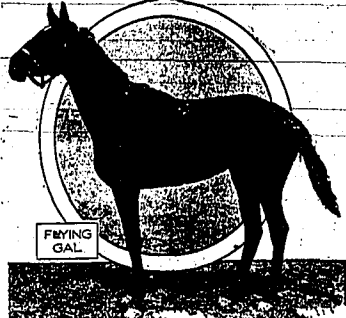
High Warnings

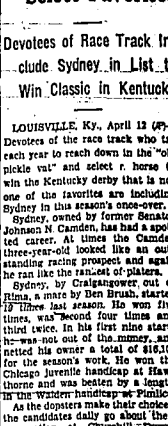

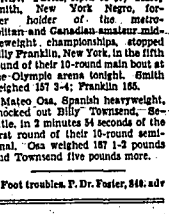

PROHIBITION CHIEF SETS FORTH ORDER

WASHINGTON, April 12 (AP)—Prohibition enforcement officials throughout the nation today were ordered by Prohibition Commissioner Doran to put forth greater efforts to prevent diversion of industrial alcohol to bootleg channels.

In instructions sent to officials of the prohibition service, the commissioner said nothing was more important from the standpoint of effective enforcement and protection of public health than to deal effectively with criminal operation based on manipulation of various alcohol products.

The commissioner said that in no field was there call for a display of greater intelligence and poise than in the permissive field where consumers and industry must receive consideration. Doran said that "only a certain amount of routine inspection with respect to dealers and druggists is necessary."

## BISHOP BOASTING 87 SUMMERS CONDUCT FIFTY-FIRST RITUAL

### Home Moravian Church at Winston-Salem Prepares To Observe One Hundred Fifty-Eighth Ceremony

(By The Associated Press) WINSTON-SALEM, N. C., April 12 — For the fifty-first time at Easter dawn, Bishop Edward R. Douthett will conduct the largest church ceremony in the Carolinas.

It will be the one hundred fifty-eighth Easter sunrise service at the Home Moravian church in old Salem, where a band of Protestants from Saxony settled in the eighteenth century.

Forty thousand persons are expected to worship with the bishop, who conducted his first Easter service in 1870. He was 36 then. Now he is 87. Since the Easter of 1773, the ritual has been held in old Salem regularly, having originated with the Moravians of John W. Klotz. The Easter service is the principal festival.

**Hands Herald Event**  
As early as 2 o'clock Easter morning bands herald the hour that Christ's resurrection will take place, led by D. J. Pfohl, director for 33 years.

At 5 o'clock Bishop Douthett appears in the hooded doorway of the weather-beaten brick church that dates back more than a century and says:

"The Lord is risen."  
"The Lord is risen indeed," responds the congregation.

Then follow the Easter liturgy and a solemn march to God's acre, as the Moravians call their graveyard, for completion of the service. Bands play antiphonally throughout the procession as 500 youths—led by W. J. Higg who has been chief leader for a score of years—direct the column.

**God's Acre**, on Easter Sunday usually contains cut flowers and evergreens worth \$10,000 piled around the simple gravestones, all small and similar, with no distinction of persons. Burials are made in air groups, all married women together, all unmarried women, married men, bachelors, boys, and girls.

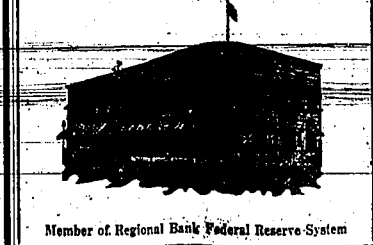

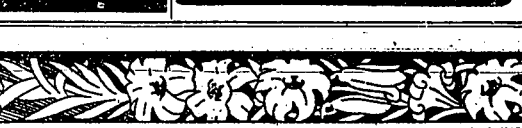

### DIRECTORS NAME ASHER B. WILSON AS WATERMASTER

Twin Falls Canal Board Approves, Petition of Land-Owners Under Pipeline in Twin Falls City Boundary

Asher B. Wilson, Twin Falls attorney and president of the Idaho state board of education, was yesterday appointed watermaster to distribute irrigation water delivered through an underground pipe in Twin Falls city limits for about 50 owners of approximately 450 acres north of the municipal boundary.

Appointment was made by Twin Falls Canal company directors in session, yesterday to which time they had adjourned Tuesday.

It is regarded as preliminary to legal action to determine whether Twin Falls city or the landowners served by the pipeline are responsible for maintenance of the conduit within the city limits.

Appointment of Mr. Wilson as watermaster was requested by interested landowners who last Friday evening effected a petition to Twin Falls city attorney, chairman, and J. G. Bradley, Twin Falls banker, secretary and treasurer for the year 1929, was adopted. It differed little from that of last year. There were some readjustments. The most important of these had to do with the salary of John W. Iron, secretary and manager, who has agreed to retain permanently the position of chief water master along with that of manager. Mr. Iron has been occupying both positions since his appointment as manager at a salary of \$75 a month. This was raised yesterday to \$200 a month. The lowest salary heretofore paid to any manager is said to have been \$350 a month.

T. Don Conner, Pler, appeared before the board regarding the proposed taking over of a ditch near Pler. A committee composed of W. O. Born, J. F. Corde and Peter Link was appointed to investigate the proposal. The board voted to take over lateral Number 46, near Knoll and lateral Number 26A, north of Buhl. Each is about a mile long.

The board authorized Manager Iron to purchase all the lumber needed for repairs at Milner dam; and also to sell well rig Number 8. The number of prisoners housed in the Missouri penitentiary has reached a record total of 400.

War department regulations governing the conduct of Citizens' Military Training camps prescribe that transportation to and from Fort Douglas, uniforms, equipment and messing and housing facilities be furnished free by the government. The 1930 camp will be housed in a tent encampment on the Fort Douglas military reservation.

The schedule prescribed by Colonel Price for the camp emphasizes recreational and athletic programs and instruction in the principles of American citizenship. Afternoon sessions will be devoted almost exclusively to athletics under supervision of expert instructors from the regular army. Evening ceremonies and parades will normally close the day.

### FORGERY CASE APPEAL IN LINE FOR HEARING

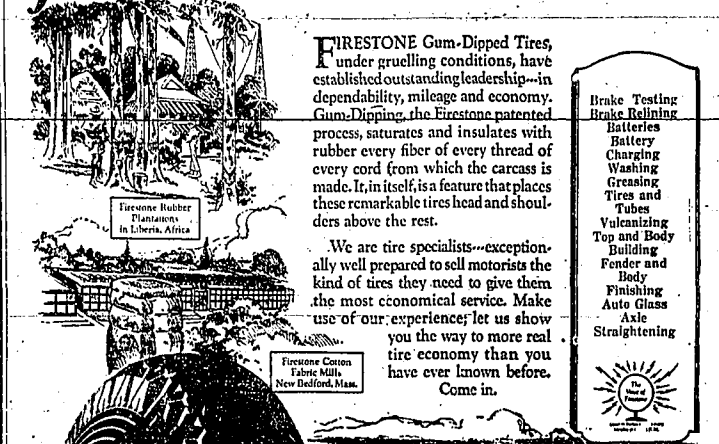

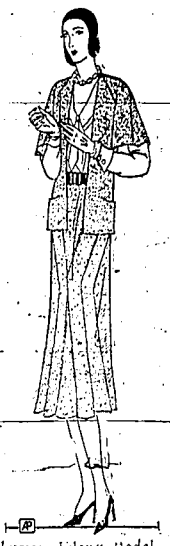

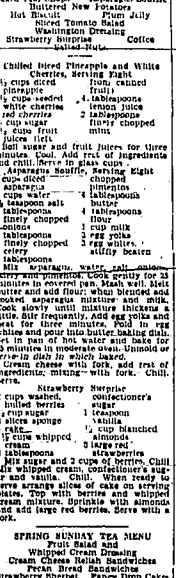

## Officers of Army Aid War Mothers On Trip to France

WASHINGTON, April 12.—A group of women ever went to Europe with the journey so carefully prepared for them as the 5400 gold star mothers and war widows who will make the government pilgrimage to the graves of their sons and husbands in France.

Fifty army officers, carefully chosen by the war department from posts all over the country, will take charge of the women both in New York and Europe.

They will have no regrets about baggage, sight-seeing trips or the impressive visits to war cemeteries. Each problem will be allotted to the army men.

Wide Selection  
These men will be in rank from lieutenant-colonel to lieutenant. They are selected from as widely varying posts as California, Texas and New York. They are chosen for their special qualifications for this most unusual journey.

Nearly every branch of the service from the tanks to the medical corps, will be represented in the six-week bodyguard.

Most of the officers already assigned war service in France. Many of their comrades lie in the European cemeteries.

Major Albert Kenner  
Major Albert Kenner of the medical corps, who will go with the first detail of 18 officers April 18, was attached to the British army in the early days of the war. He was awarded the distinction of sergeant-major. Lieutenant-Colonel George G. Bardet of the infantry served as liaison officer between the American and French armies of occupation.

Women from Nebraska will be the first to begin the pilgrimage. Their state was the one drawn by Mr. Herbert Hoover from a silver bowl containing envelopes with the names of all the states. The first group will call from New York May 7.

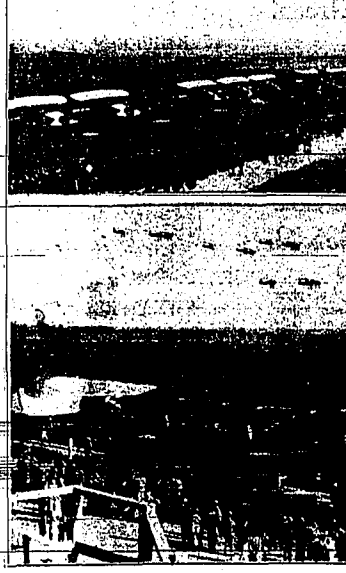

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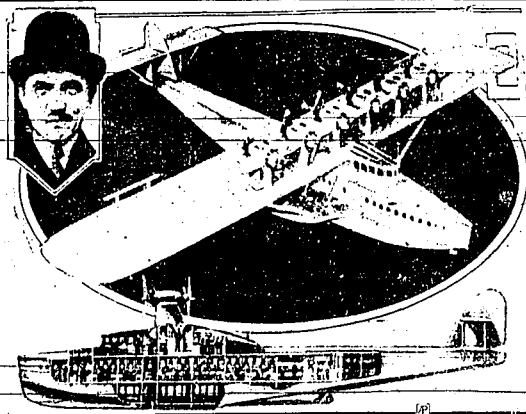

# 60 Passengers Plan For Voyage Over Atlantic In Huge Plane

### German Do-X Capacity-Test Comes When Aerial Leviathan Undertakes Perilous Oceanic Flight



Sixty persons are to span the Atlantic some time early this summer when the "DO-X" (top), world's largest airplane, flies from Germany to America. Diagram shows details of plane's construction. It was designed by Dr. Claude Dornier (top).

NEW YORK, April 12.—Some time during the early part of the summer a 60-ton, man-made and driven by 12 huge motors is to hurtle over the Atlantic to America.

The "Do-X," world's largest heavier-than-air craft with 200 horsepower, resembling a torpedo boat rather than a hydroplane, with wings "made in Germany," but engines "made in the United States of America," is preparing to span the ocean.

The seaplane has carried 100 people in flight and its normal capacity is 60 passengers and a crew of 11.

Starting in June or July from Friedrichshafen, home of Graf Zeppelin, Dr. Claude Dornier, designer of the flying monster, expects to come by way of Spain and the Azores.

The lead will be distributed in three decks into which the hull is divided. The upper, or "control," deck contains engine-control, radio, and auxiliary motor rooms. The middle deck is designed exclusively for passengers. The bottom deck, or "hold," will contain fuel, provisions, freight, and luggage.

Its wing section is so thick that it is possible for a person to walk almost the entire spread of 197.5 feet while the ship is in flight.

Above the central wing is an all-metal upper wing which supports the motor, mounted in tandem so that six pull and six push the craft in flight, without increasing the lift of the main wing.

Stub wings, which strengthen the structure, are divided into four water-tight compartments and the hull is divided by bulkheads into nine compartments.

Ten flight pilots will be relieved of the supervision of the power plants, which are tended in the engine-control room, but may be operated from the pilot's seat.

A separate gasoline engine supplies electricity to the boat, and the entire gasoline supply is carried on the floor of the hull with a capacity of 427 gallons.

Performance tests with the new engines will reveal the boat's speed, which now is rated at 133 miles an hour maximum and 100 miles an hour cruising.

## MODERNISTIC OPERA PERTURBS GERMAN

### Latest Drama Excites Audience of Teutons in Leipzig to Verge of Rioting

LEIPSIG, Germany, April 12 (AP)—An opera about the verge of rioting when the piece was performed here. Entitled "The Rise and Fall of the City of Mahagonny," this highly modern work by Kurt Weill and Bert Brecht describes what happens when a city is incubated from doing anything he wants to do.

The free city is founded by three fugitives from justice, so their attempt to regulate human conduct. How this reacts on the inhabitants is shown in assorted organs in the second act.

Even in this utterly free community, however, the central character ends in the electric chair. He unfortunately allows himself to commit the one crime which no community, however liberal, can overlook: he fails to pay his bills.
