Question of Permanent Business National Group at Gathering in Washington

By CLYTON COFFIN (Associated Press Staff Writer) WASHINGTON, April 15.—The question of whether a permanent business stabilization council will be set up may be decided at the twentieth annual meeting of the chamber of commerce of the United States in Washington April 16 to 18.

The program puts emphasis on study of the efforts undertaken last year under President Hoover's leadership to prevent the onset of industrial depression in 1930.

Plans for Discussion Discussions are expected to decide whether a permanent business council will be established to coordinate the activities of the industrial cycle savings from prosperity to depression.

Farm Board Work In addition to the report on stabilization, another item of particular interest will be a description of the federal farm board work.

# OVERSEAS BUSINESS OF AMERICAN TRADE SHOWS BIG GROWTH

### Development of Merchant Marine and Foreign Commerce Since War Proves Veracity of Old Saying

By The Associated Press  
NEW YORK, April 17.—America is proving the truth of the old saying that foreign trade follows the flag.  
So say Americans who have watched the development of the United States merchant marine and foreign commerce since the world war.  
As proof of this contention, the growth of trade with South America, Africa, and Asia is cited by H. G. Smith, president of the national council of American shippers.  
Before the war few vessels flying the American flag were engaged in carrying trade between the United States and these parts, and in some cases there were none, Mr. Smith points out.

### Trade Development

Comparing the number of American ships operating in 1924 and now with the development in that period of foreign trade, Mr. Smith says it is obvious that the services established by American vessels have made an important contribution to the expansion.  
At the outbreak of the world war only five American vessels were carrying trade between South America and the United States when the total trade amounted to \$350,000,000.  
In 1928 the number of vessels had grown to 88 and the trade had increased nearly 300 per cent to pass the billion mark.

### Pacific Lines

Similarly only one line of American ships operated between Pacific ports and Asia when the business was started. Today there are 140 ships and the cargo is valued at \$2,000,000.  
Before the war not one American ship was operating between this country and Africa. Foreign ships carried the \$17,000,000 worth of commerce. Now 20 ships are in service carrying a good share of the \$200,000,000 worth of trade between the two countries.

## BRITISH FOREIGN LOANS NEAR AMERICAN FIGURE

NEW YORK, April 17 (AP)—Great Britain came closer to equaling the record of the United States as a foreign money lender in 1929 than any year since the war, due partly to the operations of American investors who transferred their interest from bonds to the stock market.

The foreign capital issues floated in the United States in 1929 dropped approximately 50 per cent, according to the department of commerce. They totaled \$706,807,000 while British total was \$541,470,000.

### County Commissioners Move To Improve Timmerman Hill Road Into Shoshone

HAILEY, April 17 (Special to The News)—At the regular meeting of the county commissioners at Blaine county Tuesday, the proposal for improving the Timmerman Hill road to Shoshone was approved. There was some opposition in Carey and Commissioner E. Kelley from that place did not vote. By the action of the commissioners a \$75,000 fund will be available for work on the road for the year. 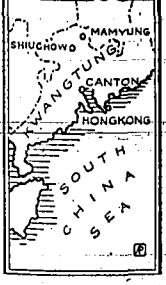

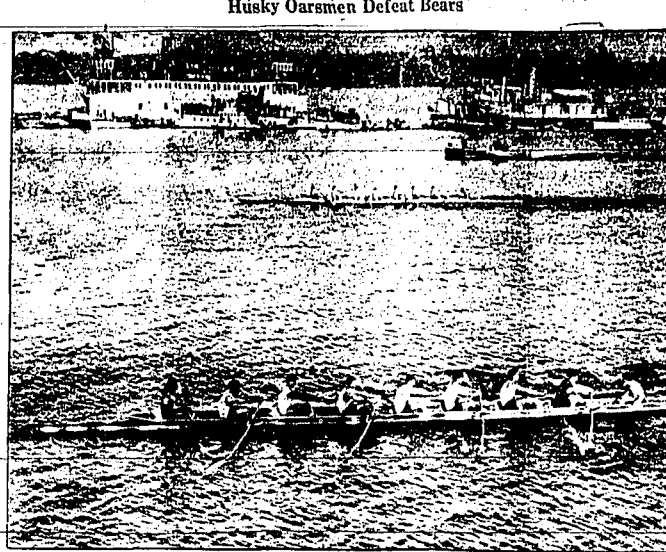

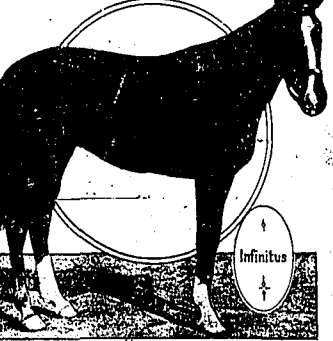

## Official Sponsors Plan to Relegate Coaches to Bench

Dr. Charles Kennedy Looks For Success of Sports in University Under Condition Outlined to Organization

By BRIAN DELL (Associated Press Sports Writer) PRINCETON, N. J., April 17.—College baseball, suffering for years from a decline brought about by lack of interest, is now convalescent and soon may be restored to its former health and vigor, thinks Charles W. Kennedy, president of the National Collegiate Athletic association.

Dr. Kennedy is sponsor of a plan to have "contact" all in the stands during college baseball games while their teams carry on without benefit of their counsel on the bench.

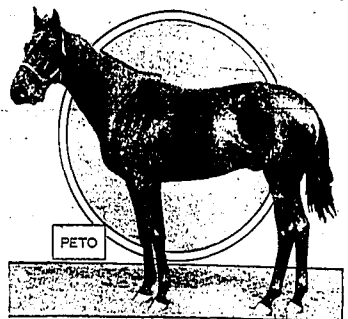
Much of the renewed interest in the college sport was created by this innovation in the opinion of Princeton's board chairman. "I am sure it will work out satisfactorily," said Dr. Kennedy. "I have not yet seen a name player under the new conditions, for Princeton does not open its league schedule until May, but the scheme has worked well in the few games in which it has had a trial."

Coach to Be Abent The plan of having the coach absent himself from the bench is a good thing for both undergraduates and coaches. It makes self-directed play by the students imperative, will teach them initiative and add to their ability to make decisions promptly. "Any one can decide a course if he can think it over, but action in baseball games must follow instantly on the heels of the decision. The coaches, too, are benefitted, for they have long had to take too much blame for the performances of the players."

Byrd Douglas, head baseball coach at Princeton, cooperating heartily with the Princeton authorities in working out the plan, is waiting for the result of the experiment with interest.
