LEADERS DECIDE TO REQUEST PARKER TO ANSWER COMPLAINT

Friends of Hoover's Nominee For Supreme Court Bring Word of President's Endorsement of Senate Move

Washington, April 18 (AP)—Judge John J. Parker, North Carolina, will be invited before the senate judiciary committee to answer the protests made against his nomination as an associate justice of the supreme court.

Senator Vander, Indiana, Republican leader, asked that the nominee be given a hearing on the extent of the restlessness in the party ranks.

Therapeutic the Republican leader asked Senator Overman, Democrat, North Carolina, one of the sponsors of the nomination.

Denies Statements Friends of Judge Parker deny that he made some of the statements attributed to him.

Senators Overman and Vandenberg, Ohio, in their statements declared that they are in favor of the nomination.

Laidlaw park and Big Hole, old time tradition has it that a popular Indian stopping place called Big Stoop spring was located. Here it was said that some of the old-time Indians came from a crevice leading from an ice cave. It is ice cold, and is supposed to have had an enervating effect on the worn and tired aborigines who journeyed thither to regain their health.

**FRONTIER GRANGERS OF GREENWOOD ASSEMBLE**

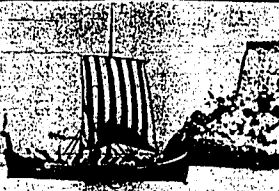

Collins left the scene to summon assistance, after learning that McMurray was not seriously hurt. He had not returned when a deputy sheriff and police officers arrived a little later, and his whereabouts was unknown to the officers late last night.

McMurray was brought to the police station by C. W. Lane, traveling salesman, who reported that he had found McMurray near the wreck and turned about to bring him here for medical attention. Several stitches were required to close the wounds in McMurray's head and face. He said he and Collins were returning from a trip to Hogerson on a sheep deal.

**A Washington Bystander**

WASHINGTON, April 15 (AP)—From dusty files in Washington, the staff of a new book of heroes is being drawn. It is the story of the bravest of the brave of those who were the gray in the war between the stars. So lately has that rift of the God been swept into the past by time or washed out by the blood of man from both sides of the Mason-Dixon line until under the Stars and Stripes on foreign soil in later wars, that honor of the "lost cause."

The war was over, the archives of the confederacy never became the distinction that comes to American military heroes in the awarding of star crosses or medals of honor. 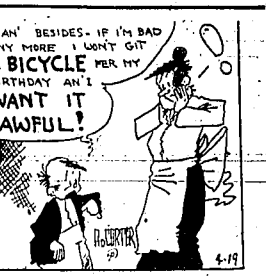
CONTEST TO SAVE OLD BRIDGE FAILS District Court—Dismisses Appeal From Order for Abandoning Milner Span
