AUTHORS OF LONDON NAVAL PACT FINISH 7000-WORD TREATY

Colonel Stimson Heads List To Sign Agreement During Plenary Session To Close 14 Weeks' Work for Peace

London, April 21 (The Associated Press)—The London naval treaty is expected to be signed and sent to the ratifying governments today.

Three months ago today the five-power disarmament negotiations were inaugurated by King George and tonight the treaty is being signed.

Colonel Stimson stepped disarmament of technical terms on tons and guns to probe into the underlying problems of disarmament and the progress of civilization in relation to national defense.

The last 14 weeks have given me more confidence in my belief that the peaceful methods of disarmament are essentially the place of war.

As he saw it, the result of the treaty was to be to clarify the issues and make their solution in the future more possible.

Heurich gave no intimation as to the identity of the other occupant of the car, but said the discovery was not entirely conclusive.

RUPERT CHURCHES PRESENT SPECIAL EASTER PROGRAMS
