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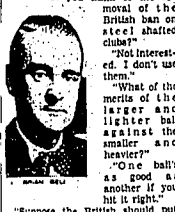

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SUBURBAN AREAS POPULATION GAINS

More Inhabitants of Twin Falls Precinct

Twin Falls suburb population has made substantial increase during the past decade, according to preliminary counts of census returns announced by Judge O. P. Davitt, district supervisor of the census, here last evening.

That part outside the city limits of Twin Falls precinct number 7, which includes the north and east of town, had 190 in 1920, showing an increase of 247 during the 10 years, it was announced. There were 123 in 1910.

Alleandale precinct, Twin Falls county, with 29 farms, had 101 population, the population of this area was not shown separately in 1920.

Deep Creek precinct, Twin Falls county, with 121 farms, had 638 population, as compared with 638 when the last census was taken 10 years ago.

Part of precinct number 8, North Jersey, with 148 farms, had 787 population. Comparative figures are not given for this area was not shown separately in 1920.

That part of Hagerman precinct, Crood county, outside Hagerman village boundaries, has 126 farms and 658 population, as compared with 603 population in 1920, according to the preliminary count.

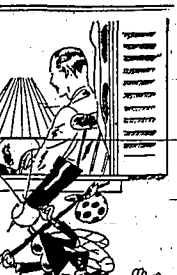

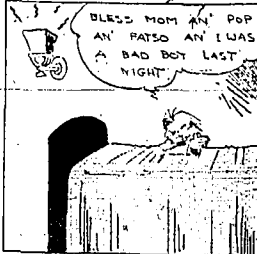

"I didn't harness him the next morning, but as I started down the trail he followed me a little way. Then he just disappeared. "One of the men said he saw him last, a long way off on the ice barrier, alone away. That's the way they do, you know. When they realize they're through, they just go off by themselves and die. Chitnook never came back. "Chitnook was the greatest lead dog I've ever seen, and he was more of a man than I'll ever be." With Walden on the C. A. Larsen were his two assistants, Norman D. Transportation facilities in Shanghai, LaGuardia intimated such a provision did not belong to the bill, that the rivers and harbors committee was exceeding its authority, and finally struck his fist toward Denney and shouted: "That's not legislation. That's bribery." Denney defended the provision, with an explanation that it was intended to reward faithful and efficient service, and the fact that Deakay did not have final jurisdiction over river and harbor recommendations was evidence of the committee's honest intentions. The provision was finally stricken out by a vote of 112 to 69.

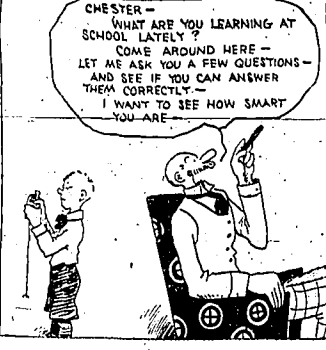

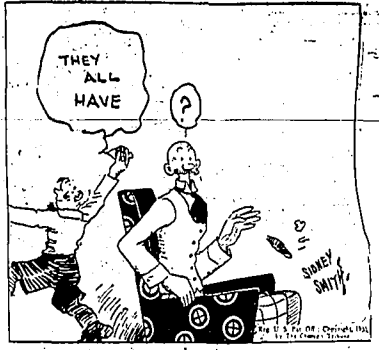

AGRICULTURAL UNIT NAMES OBJECTIVE Smith-Hughes Instructor in Twin Falls Tells of Boy Organization Work Here

Explanation of the objective of the Smith-Hughes agricultural class of the Twin Falls high school is contained in a circular issued by G. L. Mink, agricultural instructor of the school. On the subject of purposes of the work and conditions of admission, Mr. Mink says:

"Agriculture is a subject fitted primarily to farm boys, but town boys may register for this subject if they are interested and can meet all the requirements outlined under project work.

"Project work is work done by the boy on the farm and should be up with the class work. The project should be a source of income for the boy while attending school and should in most cases help the student get started in college after he graduates from high school.

"Examples of good project for the boy are: poultry, sheep, hogs, dairy cattle, beans, onions, sugar beets, and potatoes.

"The class work consists of lessons on better methods of farming. Many field trips are taken to the best farms and to help the student get the practical side of the work. Many judging trips will be held and part will be taken in the leading local and national livestock shows.

"The class work is accomplished almost entirely by the group study plan, which consists of students working out their own projects under supervision of the instructor. The agricultural classes are divided into groups according to individual interests, and individual instruction is given each student.

"Student self-checking is encouraged, and the boy rapidly becomes a factor of his own job. The Twin Falls Future Farmers of America organization is a local chapter of the national organization for farm school students of agriculture, of which Harry Wellbush, Twin Falls, is vice president, and is composed of all agricultural students who show exceptional interest and ability in agriculture.

From the objectives of the organization are mentioned to be obtained by inducing 100 per cent of boys to have a bank account and 25 per cent to have savings accounts.

"Promotion of vocational agriculture is urged through holding of an annual Future Farmer fair, such as that which will be held here May 3, with 100 per cent of membership making part, inducing 50 per cent of the boys to exhibit something at the fair; also, hold annual demonstrations, judging trips and parties, and sponsor evening classes, evening classes for farmers; part time courses for older boys.

"Development of rural leadership is suggested through class participation in Future Farmer projects, holding of "Kaukapoo" courts and meetings to study parliamentary procedure. The members are urged to make boys more attractive, to make chapter more business-like; to enter contests for scholarships offered by the Union Pacific High School; to enter contests to make high grades in school.

BURLEY POPULATION GAINS IN 10 YEARS Inclusion of Precincts Counted in City in 1920 Will Show Increase in Decade

Burley population will show 265 gain instead of 1715 loss if three precincts with estimated 1873 population are included in Burley territory as they were 10 years ago, Judge O. P. Duval, district supervisor of census, said last evening.

Three precincts, Starb's Ferry, Pelia and Unley, were erroneously included in Burley territory, giving Burley 5408 population in 1920, Judge Duval said. Actual increase can only be known when official enumeration of these precincts is received, he stated.

Inclusion of these precincts this year the preliminary count of census returns from Burley's four precincts showed 3703 inhabitants.
