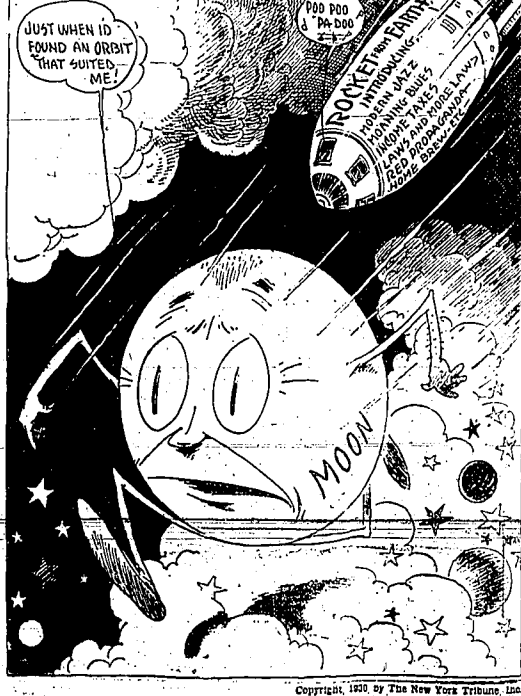

## Warne Furnishes Climax at Relay Carnival in Ohio

Hearts of 15,000 Spectators Skip Beat as Athlete of Middle West Clears Bar And Then Spoils Efforts

DUNKLEY (Associated Press Sports Writer) COLUMBIA, Mo., April 26 (AP)—Climaxing an afternoon of glittering performances, in which seven meet records fell by the wayside, black-haired Tommy Warne, N. O. A. star, vaulted victoriously, provided the thrill in the finals of the Drake relay carnival today when he missed by a hair's breadth establishing a new world record for the pole vault.

Warne hurried his body over the bar with inches to spare, but he knocked the cross bar from its moorings with one arm in two cents and the spectators, waiting breathlessly to cheer, gave way to a man as the cross bar came tumbling to the ground, falling 10 centimeters short of breaking it.

## Stagg Scores in Plea for Youths

Veteran-University of Chicago Athletic Director, Fights for Tournaments

CHICAGO, April 26 (AP)—Amos Alonzo Stagg, veteran University of Chicago athletic director, won at least a partial victory today in his determined fight to continue his traditional high school basketball and track tournaments in defiance of the North Central association's decision to abolish the National Federation of High School Athletic associations.

Stagg, 65, in a speech before the board of physical culture and athletics heard Stagg's long plea for continuance and decided to make an exhaustive investigation before deciding for or against the two "prep" athletic carnivals, which annually attract high school stars from all sections of the United States.

A sub-committee was appointed by Frederic Woodward, vice president of the university, to make the investigation and although its membership was not revealed, it was understood Director Stagg was named as one of the investigators.

The North Central association and the National Federation of High School Athletic associations, led by C. W. Whitten, Chicago, seek to abolish the Stagg carnivals along with all other interstate "prep" carnivals, charging they exploit high school boys and are the main prop of collegiate athletic recruiting campaigns.

Stagg defended his two meet for more than an hour at today's meeting, which was expected to result in an immediate order to abolish the carnivals.

The sub-committee report is expected to be made in June.

## Stanford Defeats Washington Team in Dual Contest

Point-Gathering Orgy Ends With Cardinals in Lead With Score of 96 to 35 In Annual Palo Alto-Fray

By RUSSELL J. NEWLAND (Associated Press Sports Writer) PALO ALTO, Cal., April 26 (AP)—In a point-gathering orgy that saw clean sweeps chalked up in five events, Stanford's powerful track and field squad overwhelmed Washington's Huskies, 96 to 35, here today in their annual dual meet.

Starting with the opening event, the mile run, Coach Stagg's athletes drew away from their old time rivals in decisive fashion. Stanford men showed the way in all places, in the hundred yard dash, the pole vault, javelin throw, 200 and 400 yard and low hurdles.

Washington had its timing, however, with a "white wash" in the half-mile run.

Double winners included "Doc" Dyer, Stanford sprint ace, and a budding hurdler team mate, Roger Smith, and Rufus Kiser, Washington distance star. Dyer, picked off top place in the 100 in 9 9/10 and in the 200-yard dash with a 21 7/10 seconds. Smith raced over the high hurdles in 25 2/10 seconds and anchored the 200-yard low barrier event in 25 1/10 seconds. Kiser ran to an easy victory in the mile and then returned half an hour later to romp some ahead of the field in the half mile.

As expected the Huskies ran off with the mile with no trouble. Kiser raced in first, closely followed by his team mate, Rudy. The time was 17:10. "Doc" Dyer, the "increased" on the coast this season, J. E. Dyer, Stanford's long-jumper, opened up a gap of three yards between him and his teammate, G. H. G. in the hundred. J. Dyer finished third to make it a cardinal clean up. The time was 14:0.

# George Simpson, Ohio State Flash, Runs Century In 9 3-5

## 30,000 Fans See Greyhound Equal World's Record

### World's Record Middle Western Athlete Furnishes Smashing Climax For Pennsylvania University's Relay Carnival

PHILADELPHIA, April 26—For the second straight year, Ohio State's greyhound of the cinder paths, George Simpson, today brought the Pennsylvania relay carnival to a smashing climax with a world's record performance in the 100-yard dash.

Last spring the famous Buckeye bullet shot from his new and much disputed starting blocks to race the century in 9 3-5 seconds, equalling the listed world's record with the late Walter Lewis, who never witnessed an historic performance like this.

Today, with a crowd of 30,000 cheering him on, Simpson disdained the blocks, went 100 yards in 9 3-5 seconds, and repeated this time of 9 3-5 seconds, thereby satisfying any and all desires.

## TWO CALIFORNIA NS BID FOR PLACES ON AMERICAN POLO TEAM TRAINING FOR INVASION OF ENGLAND

### Precedent Topples When Riders From East and West Defend United States Honors on Foreign Soil

NEW YORK, April 26—It may not be surprising some time afternoon next September if the new polo riders in a great Great Britain, in defense of the classic International Cup with this line-up:

Number 1—Eric Pedley, California, Number 2—Winston Guest, New York, Number 3—Thomas Hitchcock, Jr., New York, Number 4—Elmer Boseske, Jr., California.

If so, all precedent will be completely shattered by the combination of East and West, for not in the half century of Anglo-American polo history has it ever previously been necessary to go beyond the Alleghenies or, for that matter, the Chesapeake, to find the best polo players in the world.

It may be a shock to some of the old-timers of polo, the graybeards who clink glasses in Meadow Brook's mellow atmosphere and talk of the days when Foxhall Keene was a star, when Harry Payne Whitney owned the fleet Big Foot, when the Waterbury brothers and when Devereux Milburn, the Harvard law student, was just a youth on horseback. Nevertheless, evidence of the polo match westward and the national growth of one of the most spectacular of sports, Pedley and Boseske, the Californians, have come on to rank among the best players in the world in the United States. Their games are as familiar to eastern fields as they are to the turf of Midwick and Del



The east evidently will be able to depend on the west for valuable help when America meets England in the September international matches. Boseske and Pedley are California players who recently have clinched places on the Yankee outfit.

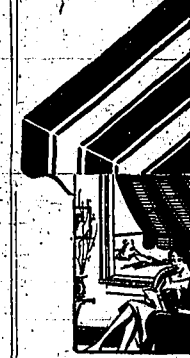

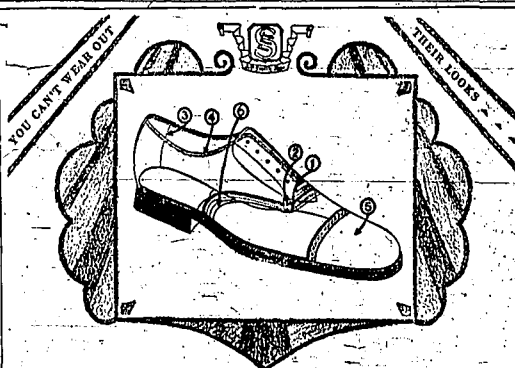

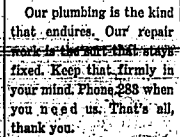

### 80 YEARS' BATTLE ON PLATFORMS OF LAND LEAVE MARK

Picturesque Figure in Life of Yesteryears Rests In Maryland Home

AGED WOMAN PLANS FOR ADDRESS TO RADIO LAND

Leading Cities Arrange For Tribute to Centenary on Date of Birth

SHIVER SPRINGS, Md., April 26.—Compassioned by a peace of serenity denied her in the long years she has been fighting for labor causes, "Mother" Jones will celebrate her one-hundredth birthday on May 1.

Frail, old, one once fierce eyes faded to mild blue, "Mother" Jones' voice is still miraculously strong and vibrant.

As she lies among her pillows at the country home of Mrs. and Mrs. Walter Burgess near Silver Spring, Maryland, that amazing voice leaps out, eloquent and cutting, to teach what she terms the "foes" of labor.

The word "tyranny" still comes with force from almost 80 years of fighting on the platform and in the field.

"Wearing Out"

"Mother" Jones is not sick. She's just "wearing out"—according to medical explanation. She has but one wish now — to live until her one-hundredth birthday.

Celebrations are to be held by the American Federation of Labor in a number of leading cities in honor of it. "Mother" Jones will not be able to attend—any—of them though the Chicago federation has offered to provide a private car for her to come there.

The determined will which has taken her through coal strikes and jails all over the country, fighting for "her boys" may enable her to reach the downsizing sitting room of the Burgess home on the day she passes the century mark.

There she will receive her friends and the strong voice in the feeble body will send a last message via radio to her fellow laborers all over the country.

Noted Men Voted

Bands will play, noted men and women will come to see her. And "Mother" Jones has warned "Mrs. Burgess" that they must be sure and have "her" to eat.

Her continuing laborer receives mail from all over the country. It is her "sugar" upon a stool from where she can see the pine forests and towns circling she has it all read to her and dictate replies.

She keeps track of the labor cause through the daily papers.

She is a close friend of Senator Borah.

# Medals Honor Naval Fliers First To Blaze Atlantic Lane

## SEVEN HEROIC MEN EARN AWARDS FOR HISTORICAL FLIGHT

Six Officers of NC-4, Only Ship of Three Starters to Complete Trip, Receive Honor

## COMMANDER OF PLANES GETS REWARD FOR PART

New Jersey Woman Designs Gold Pieces to be Presented by President Hoover

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, April 26—Naval fliers who blazed the first air trail across the Atlantic in the NC-4 will be honored with special medals.

Designed by Catherine G. Barton, Englewood, New Jersey, the medals will be struck from gold in the United States mint and presented by President Hoover in the name of congress.

Commander John H. Towers, who conceived and commanded the historic voyage in May, 1919, but failed to reach the goal in his flagship, the NC-3, and the six intrepid men who gained Europe successfully, will receive the medals.

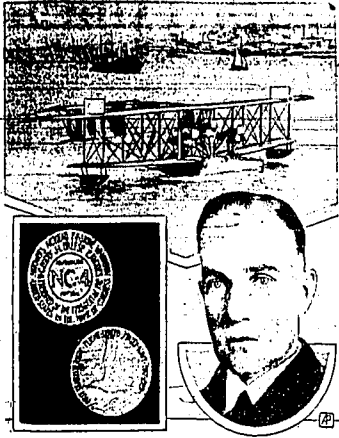
The honored personnel of the NC-4 is made up of Commander Albert O. Read, the seaplane commander; Lieutenant Commander Elmer F. Stone and Lieutenant Walter Hinton, pilots; Lieutenant H. C. Ridd, radio operator; and Lieutenant J. L. Breese and Chief Aviation Pilot Eugene S. Rhoads, engineers.

Three flying boats, the NC-1, NC-3 and NC-4, took off from New Bedford on May 16 for the Azores, following a line of destroyers leading by rough seas. The NC-4 arrived at Horta the next day but its companion ships, landing in the ocean near the islands, were stalked by misfortune.

Two Mihasas The NC-4, found by the alarm ship Ionia and taken in tow, sank in the heavy sea while the NC-1, buffeted by waves for 52 hours, taxied into harbor but was unable to fly.

The NC-4 carried on to Lisbon, Portugal, alone and landed in Plymouth, England, on May 31 with the Atlantic ocean conquered for the first time by aircraft.

Today the hull of the seaplane rests in Smithsonian Institution and its personnel scattered. Towers is assistant chief of the bureau of aeronautics. Read is executive officer of the aircraft car-

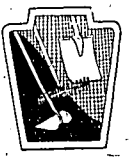

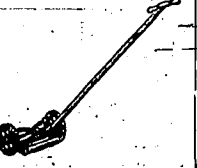

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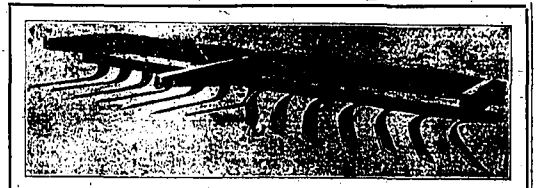
## 4000 MINIDOKA COUNTY EWES AND LAMBS SELL

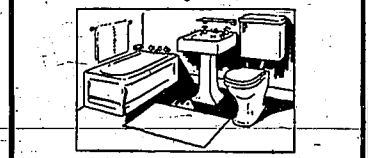

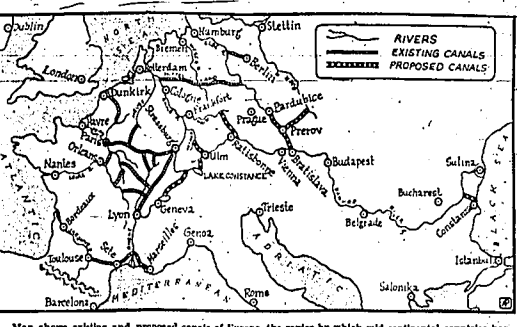

One Time Most Picturesque Structure of Old South Again Reflects Splendor of Residences of Century Ago

CHARLOTTESVILLE, Va. April 26.—"Ashlawn," charming old colonial home of James Monroe, fifth President of the United States, will be dedicated as a national shrine Monday.

That date marks the one hundred twenty-second birthday anniversary of the author of the Monroe doctrine. With its colonial atmosphere and beautiful boxwood gardens, "Ashlawn" is one of the most picturesque of the old Virginia mansions reminiscent of the splendor of a century ago.

J. W. Johns, Pittsburg, has purchased the home and has announced he will restore it, as nearly as possible, to the appearance it had in the days of Monroe. A group of distinguished citizens will attend the formal dedication, while 25 students of James Monroe High School of New York also will be present.

"Ashlawn" thus will take its place as a Monroe shrine along with the little one-story brick building which the President used in Fredericktown when a struggling young lawyer.

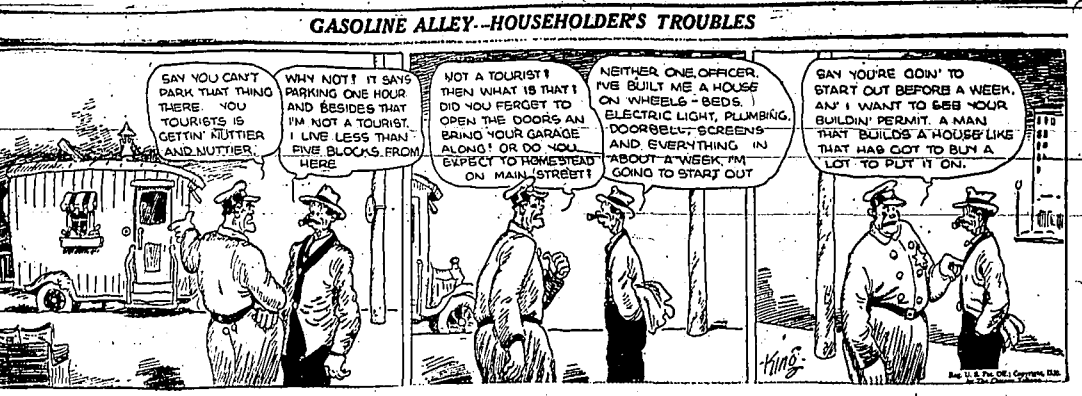

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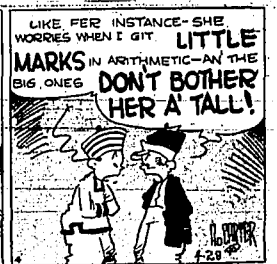

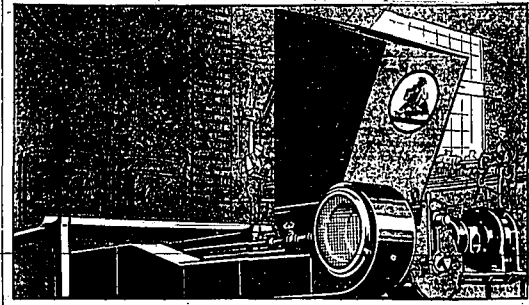
