PICKING JUSTICE
Wasn't it Emerson who said once he was going to write the word "whim" over his door, and adopt it as a motto?

The idea might well be recommended to the Senate of the United States in view of some of its recent activities.

In relation to the appointment of Justices of the Supreme Court, for instance, hardly anything else can explain the grotesque performance that some Senators are indulging in.

One Senator tells a story about a jurist nominated by the President for the supreme bench, and challenges friends of the nominee to "disprove this or you can't get many votes for your candidate." There is quite a decided reversal of ordinary judicial processes in this.

More and more the idea is taking hold that a group of Senators among whom Borah is a leader will not be satisfied with any nominee for the bench unless his personal viewpoint as well as his judicial opinions coincide with their own notions.

It is too bad, too, because that rule will forever preclude the possibility of Borah occupying a place on the bench of the nation.

It was Uncle Henry who made the aptest suggestion once that "Borah won't let anyone agree with him."

As soon as the Hindu cause that he has endorsed becomes popular, he changes his view. Certainly among his associates of the bench group he can look for no agreement with all his ideas.

And as a Justice of the Supreme Court, he could write such magnificent dissenting opinions!

PRISON REFORM
A congressman who was chairman of a congressional committee which investigated American prison conditions in nineteen hundred twenty-eight says:

"While we found plenty of overcrowding at Columbus, it was nothing to compare with the overcrowding in federal prisons." And the Columbus prison, now widely praised in every mind because of its traffic fire which cost more than 300 lives, has been represented as the worst institution of its kind!

Fortunately the state of Ohio and various other states are being moved to do something for the proper housing of their prison population. So is the federal government. A bill is expected to pass in Congress which will provide a new, modern federal prison in the northern section, probably in Pennsylvania.

That much the Parent-Teacher associations of Twin Falls have as an advantage in a summer "round-up" of pre-school age children that they are carrying on in cooperation with Twin Falls County Health Unit.

The purpose of the "round-up" is simply to ascertain the physical condition of each boy and girl who will start to school next fall, and to put afflicted youngsters in the way of correction of physical defects that, unless

corrected, would prove a heavy handicap at a crucial stage in their development.

The afflicted child, of course, does not suspect his own handicap, and the pity of it is, so many times, parents do not recognize physical defects in their children.

The "round-up" is to disclose defects where they exist, and to suggest the remedy that will put the child on a normal basis and on a plane of equal advantage to a physical standpoint, with his fellows.

So, many, of these defects, left ready to correction, a simple device or treatment may be depended upon to remove the handicap of defective vision, hearing, teeth or other disability.

It is only necessary in most cases to point out the existence of the trouble. Normal parental affection may be relied upon to apply the corrective measures that are needed.

The work of the Parent-Teacher associations in this undertaking would seem to be mainly one of bringing parents to a realization of the importance of knowing the true physical condition of their children.

It is a work in which the organization can engage most profitably, and it is, perhaps, the most important work the Parent-Teacher associations can do.

MESSY COINAGE
President Hoover has done no harm, and some good, by vetoing a bill for the coinage of a half-dollar in celebration of the Centennial purchase. That is the deal by which the United States in eighteen hundred fifty-three acquired from Mexico for ten million dollars the southern part of Arizona and New Mexico.

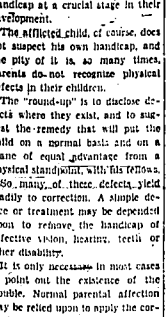
The acquisition is worth celebrating, but the President thinks there may be better ways. He doesn't want to mess up the coinage any more—in the last 10 years there have been 25 such coin laws. That makes confusion and encourages counterfeiting. The national coinage should be kept pure and simple.

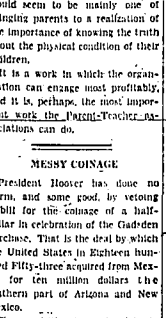

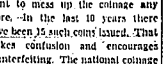

Mr. Olpson says: "Owners of small family orchards, as well as owners of commercial orchards, are reminded of the fact that the late horticultural law makes compulsory the application of at least two sprays of moths, the first to the codling moth worm, the first to be applied when the petals have fallen, the second upon advice of an inspector."
