(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, April 30 - Assurance of a "friendly attitude" to the London treaty and of speedy consideration of it was given Secretary Stamson today by Chairman Borah of the senate foreign relations committee, at a conference at the capitol.

Mr. Stamson, who was the head of the American delegation to the London treaty called on Senator Borah shortly after he had formally turned over the treaty to President Hoover. 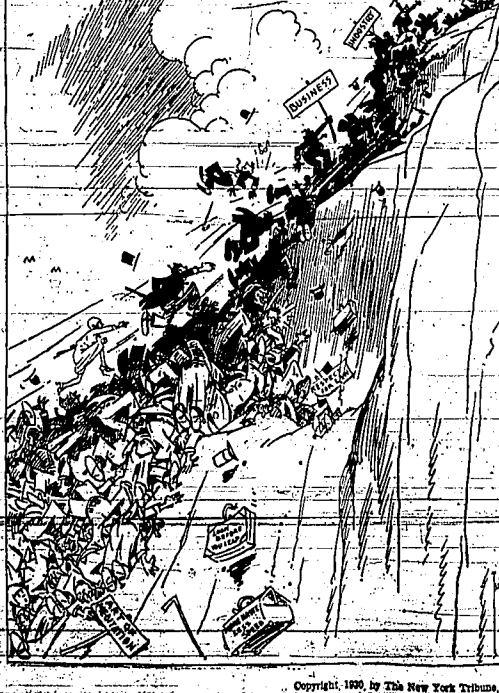

Day Of Debate On Parker's Nomination Brings Vote Nearer

TWO BOURBOIS JOIN IN OPPOSING CHOICE OF CHIEF EXECUTIVE

From Republican Side Once More Comes Charge of Assault on Independence of Land's Highest Court

(By The Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, April 30.—Another day of debate brought a 50-50 tie in the senate today on confirmation of Judge John J. Parker, North Carolina, to the supreme court, but leaders of both sides still were doubtful of tonight's final result. A vote tomorrow is in prospect.

Two Democrats joined the opposition in the day's round of oratory. Senator Wagner, New York, and McKellar, Tennessee, assailing Parker's qualifications. Two Republicans—Senator Hastings, Delaware, and Rhoads, Rhode Island—carried on the fight for the nominee.

As in from the Republican side came the charge that the campaign against Parker was being conducted by the "Socialists" and Liberals against the independence of the supreme court.

The Democratic foe answered with denunciations of Parker's record, particularly his decision upholding the injunction restraining the United Mine Workers from soliciting membership among miners who had signed contracts not to join the union.

Senator McKellar countered the charge of politics with the reading of a letter written by Joseph M. Dixon, assistant secretary of the Interior, to Walter Newton, executive secretary to President Hoover, urging the nomination of Parker as a "major political stroke."

This letter, dated last March 13, was, reported last night in the Carolina, went, repeated in the last presidential election and said if the extension of the situation posed a "major political stroke" to be a major political stroke.

Jack Barstow, 24, San Diego, Remains Aloft in Craft 15 Hours and 13 Minutes

Barstow took off at 12:45 P. M. yesterday in a new Bonavia sail plane of 60-foot spread. He landed at 8:15 A. M. today, "telling his powerful craft down within 500 feet of the point of takeoff. JUNIORS ARRANGE FOR CLASS ENTERTAINMENT

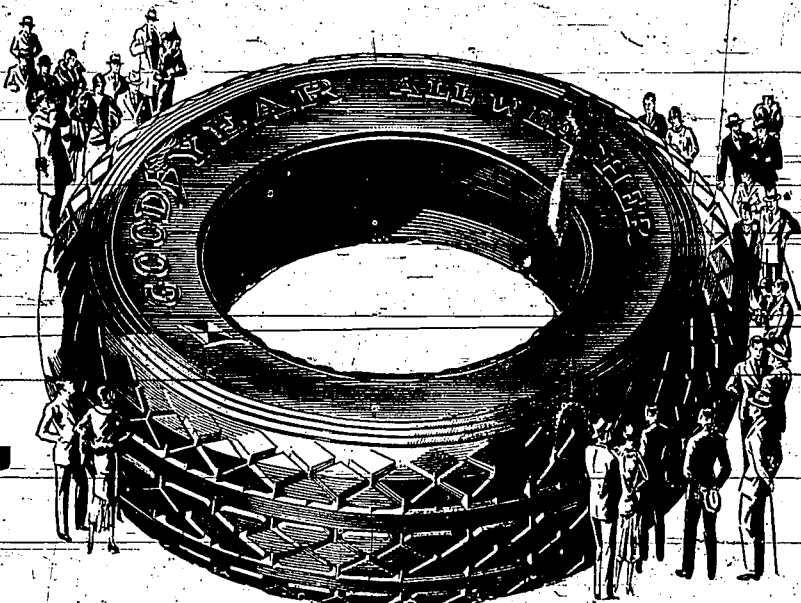

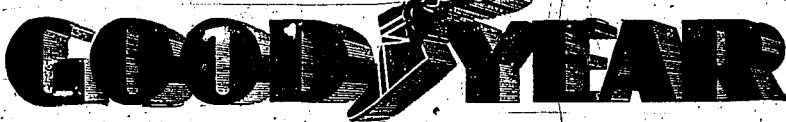

PIONEER RETIRES FROM REALTY FIRM

G. F. Sprague Transfers Interest in Land Concern to T. M. Robertson

Arrangements were recently completed whereby a change in ownership is brought about in the oldest established real estate firm operating under one management in Twin Falls.

George F. Sprague retired from active connection with the Irrigated Lands company, established by him in 1906 and Thomas M. Robertson, who has been associated with the business since January, 1909, continues the management.

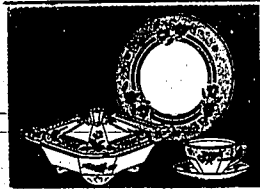

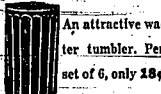

Corn Belt Folks Appear To Know More About West as Dependable Pork Mart Than Do Gem State and Neighbors

(From The Idaho Farmer) — Little more than half the number of hogs and nearly double the population, Mr. Gontl declares.

"It has been carefully estimated that the yearly consumption of pork and pork products in the United States is over 90 pounds per person. There is no reason to believe that the average of California consumes less than this general average, therefore in order to care for our requirements, local sources would be required to supply us with 2,000,000 hogs instead of our present 600,000 head.

BORN IN PARTLY CURSED MEAT

There is a very large volume of meat in the United States which is shipped in from all over the United States to be smoked prior to distribution. The tonnage of this product will easily represent 50 percent of the total live hog tonnage. The figures apply to our local Los Angeles receipts of live and dressed pork and do not take into account the quantities of the same or other portions of the state.

"This internal view of the California situation shows Idaho farmers a sure of their opportunities. In spite of all of California's good intentions to stop pork money from going out of the state, it is believed this exodus of dollars will continue and probably increase. California agriculture has specialized in other fields. Since 1912 the tree production has increased 40 per cent and grape acreage has doubled. Cotton production is high in California. Some large scale pork plants have been developed and in some sections orchard-swine combinations have been tried. The results, however, have not justified a production that extending eastward would occur.

Four Idaho Reasons

J. A. McLaughlin, Vice president and general manager of the Los Angeles and Union stockyards, was asked for his views on the opportunities for Idaho farmers to get a bigger share of the California pork business. Mr. McLaughlin says for getting more pork nearer home for California trade, his letter says: "We have always felt that Idaho would be one of our leading sources of pork for several reasons: (1) Your freight is considerably less than that of the Middle Western points for hog shipment; (2) it seems that a marked profit could be made by marketing your grain crop through the medium of hogs; (3) the grain-fed hog, such as you produce, should have the preference over the corn-fed hog; and (4) California does not produce all of the pork consumed and annually exports many millions of dollars for pork and pork products.

Some States Seize Opportunity

Not all western states are remaining indifferent to pork opportunities. The December, 1919 pig survey showed an increase of 43 per cent in the fall crop for the 11 Western States. Decreases were shown in most states, but increases in Montana, Wyoming, Colorado and Oregon more than offset them. Bows (arrived in the fall of 1919 compared with the previous fall showed 135 per cent for Wyoming, 116 per cent for Montana, and 106 per cent for Colorado.

Colorado, Utah and Wyoming appear to be making a strong bid for California ports. Colorado shipped 37,198 porkers to Los Angeles last year, and Utah marketed 35,225 at the same point. Colorado's hog population was 493,000 in 1920, and 500,000 last year. Utah's total increased from 64,000 in 1919 to 88,000 in 1920. For 1920 the Salt Lake yards receipts showed 121,241 Nebraska porkers and the Ogden yards 184,486. The year previous Salt Lake received 189,533 and Ogden 148,424 hogs from Nebraska. In both cases less than a third were for local packers, the bulk going to the coast. The South San Francisco stockyards received 79,772 Nebraska porkers in 1920 and the Los Angeles yards 80,548. The Salt Lake yards received 311,112 hogs last year and the Oregon yards 216,104. In both cases more than half of the total were from Nebraska. It is estimated that Nebraska pork goes to market on the Pacific coast.

George A. Scott, Western regional livestock statistician for the department of agriculture, says that California has been supplying each year only about 35 to 40 per cent of its total pork requirements. In 1919, of a total estimated slaughter of 1,640,000 head, California furnished about 640,000 head. Of the total estimated slaughter of 1,640,000 head for 1920, California farmers supplied about 800,000 head. Mr. Scott feels that California spent about \$1,000,000 for live hogs outside the state during 1920. This estimate does not, however, take into consideration the millions spent for pork products.

Grain-Fed Hog Popular

As far as California is concerned it makes little difference whether the pork comes from Idaho or Nebraska, although coast pork buyers say the Idaho grain-fed hog is very popular. Undoubtedly California livestock would prefer to keep the money nearer home as an aid in building the home market.

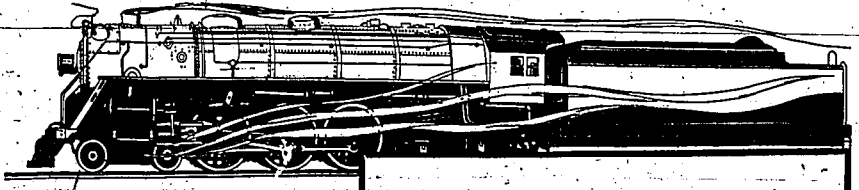

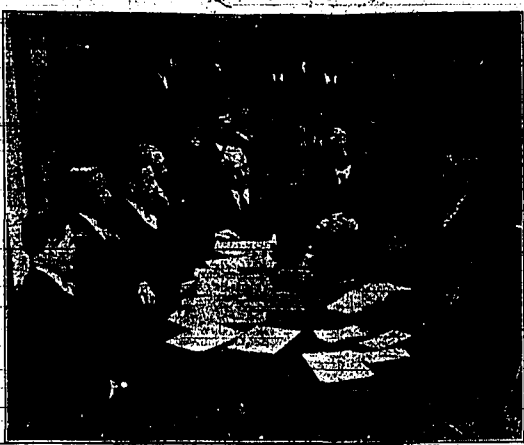

GIRL TOURIST TELLS OF TRIP IN EUROPE
