HOUSE REPUBLICANS ADOPT TAARIFF BILL CONFEREES REPORT

Four Hours Heated Debate Results in Downfall of Democratic Opposition By Vote of 241 to 152

WASHINGTON, May 1 (AP)—Running roughshod over Democratic opposition, house Republicans today adopted the tariff bill conference report today, 241 to 152, and then proceeded to strike from the measure, by a vote of 221 to 177, the Senate provision to permit free entry of cement intended for public works by state and municipal governments.

The report, approved after four hours of heated debate, embraced all the rates and administrative provisions of the conference report, which reached an agreement in conference. The senate has yet to act on this report.

Only five major rates were left unacted in the report. The house dispatched one of these by concurring in the senate's increase of a hundred pounds on cement and receding from its own eight-cent rate.

By a vote of 221 to 177, the report was accepted to accept the amendment of Senator Dill, Democrat, South Carolina, to exempt from duty cement imported by municipal governments, the house forced another vote on this proposition in the senate.

Four Rates to Death The other four important rates still in disagreement are sugar, silver, rummer and shingles. Separate votes will be taken on the sugar row and the house Republican chiefs plan to complete action on the measure by the week-end with ballot on export rebates, most favored flexible tariff, and tariff committee reorganization proposals.

Both Republicans and Democrats joined in a determined drive for passage of the tariff bill. Representative Ramsey, Republican, Iowa, modified the omnibus cement industry as a manager of the tariff interests, competition with which was felt only along narrow seaboard strips, amended to but one and one-half percent on domestic production last year.

Representative LaGuardia, Republican, New York, introduced an exemption amendment. He said a new group affiliated with the Mellon brothers had been organized by Dawson, former president of the Gulf Oil company, was setting up a cement plant on Neville island, near Pittsburgh, with a capacity of 1,200,000 barrels.

FIGHT OVER PARKER NOMINATION DABBS

Borah Answers Critics and Reads Message Deploring Own Attitude in Contest

WASHINGTON, May 1 (AP)—More confident of the outcome, Sen. Borah today defended the nomination of Judge John J. Parker, North Carolina, passed the word tonight they were ready for a vote on confirmation of his appointment to the supreme court.

Parker's friends in the senate likewise professed a more hopeful attitude but leading critics that the final roll call go over until Monday. Unless a vote is reached tomorrow, the contest goes over until next week.

The fourth day of debate found the leaders in the contest again taking part. Sen. Fisher, Republican, Ohio, returned to the floor to oppose the nomination of Parker. He again the supreme court itself expressed condemnation of the organized opposition.

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25,000 NEW YORK COMMUNISTS JOIN FOR CELEBRATION

The main address was made by Hamilton Fish, Jr., a New York representative in congress, who said Communists who did not care to abide by the laws and conditions of this country should return to Russia.

LINDBERGH BRINGS MAIL TO NICARAGUAN AIRPORT

PORTO CAEZAS, Nicaragua, May 1 (AP)—Retiring through alternate clouds and brilliant sunshine, the circled spilling wings of Sunday Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh landed here at 12 noon today, after a flight from Cristobal, with 201 pounds of trans-American mail.

The "Flying Colonel" left Cristobal at 11:38 A. M., negotiating the 206 mile distance in 4 hours 2 minutes. Tomorrow he will fly from Porto Caezas over the 638 miles water top to Havana and thence over 25 miles of land and water to place the mail in Miami.

Tornado Sweeps Through Eight Middle And Northwestern States Exacting 17 Lives And Causing Extensive Damage

Storm Dropping Out From Black Skies, Kills Five Nebraskans at Tekamah And Wipes Town From Map

(By The Associated Press) OMAHA, Mo., May 1 (AP)—Sporadic storms of tornados and straight winds swept through eight middle and northwestern states today, exacting 17 lives and causing extensive damage.

Storms dropping out from black skies, killed five Nebraskans at Tekamah and wiped town from map. Six persons are missing and believed dead. Scores of persons were injured.

INDIAN AUTHORITIES SEE END OF RIOTS

Government Officials Look For Early Conclusion of Disobedience Campaign

BOMBAY, May 1 (AP)—Government officials here today believed the civil disobedience campaign fostered by Mahatma Gandhi was being ended.

An official communique said three Nationalists who had been sentenced to six months rigorous imprisonment at Nagra have expressed regret for their action and asked that they be dealt with under the criminal procedure code.

The communique added that they were released after having posted 2500 rupees as bail. It announced this "would appear to indicate that some, at least, of those practicing passive resistance are beginning to recover their equilibrium."

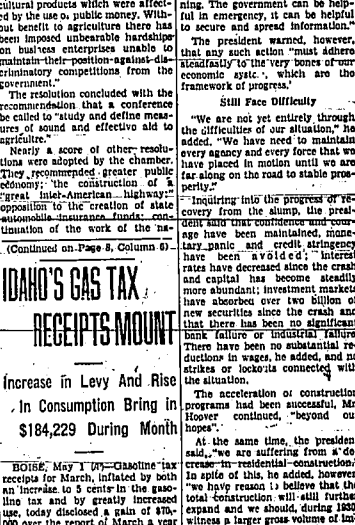

### BOISE PONDERSON LOW CENSUS COUNT

#### Naval Com patriots Desperately Explain Why Shows no Population Gain

BOISE, May 1 (AP)—The principal recreation of cynical Boiesans is listening to their more fervidly loyal patriots desperately explaining why the city has "lost" more than even in the census.

A preliminary report put the present enrollment at about 23,400 persons, while 10 years ago it was 24,000.

and the chances for communi- and other organizations have started drives to get every last mother's son on the roll.

"The loyalists insist that one or two "and possibly more" thousand citizens have removed themselves from the city "between" across the river which takes them beyond the city limits. Along the valley road, it is also claimed, many little communities of commuters have taken refuge from the districts of restricted space and higher rents. Several hundred shepherders also escaped the census enumerators of the city along with lumber workers and the somewhat pathetic crop of prospectors who leave for the hills to early in the spring to be caught by the enumerators.

The fact remains, however, that the city is likely to show a loss of a hundred or two in population within its prescribed limits.

This does not worry the more substantial business men, however. They point to constantly increasing bank clearings, a greatly business turnover in the principal stores, the prospective new hotel, new apartment houses and several new industrial enterprises coming into the city.

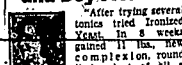
### KENTUCKY CHANGES LAW ON SHOOTING PENALTIES

FRANKFORT, Ky., May 1 (AP)—There is no longer a premium for straight shooting in Kentucky.

Senator James D. Sweeney has introduced a bill which creates an anomaly in the state statutes by fixing a maximum penalty of 10 years in prison for shooting without wounding and a maximum of only five years for wounding.

LOS ANGELES, May 1.—A new leviathan of the highways, will be put in service on the Pacific coast this summer.

Tests of the bus, held to be the largest motor passenger vehicle ever produced, have been conducted successfully, engineers said.

Despite the great bulk of the stage, it has a top speed of 70 miles an hour, developing a six-cylinder, 150-horsepower motor. The motor design permits removal and substitution of the power plant in 20 minutes.

The bus is of duplex construction, carrying passengers in two tiers. The body is built of duralumin with shatter-proof windows throughout. The driver's seat is placed on the rear of the vehicle. A center aisle starting at the front runs back more than half the length of the coach. Single steps lead up and down into four compartments. Seats are adjustable, upholstered and covered with velour. All windows are curtained.

Modern Conveniences  
A large baggage compartment is located at the rear and an emergency door is built at that end of the coach. A lavatory with hot and cold running water is provided.

The motor engine is situated in a compartment accessible by throwing back preceding panels at the front of the bus. Brakes are operated by air pressure.

The stage exceeds the carrying capacity of large buses now in use by 20 passengers.

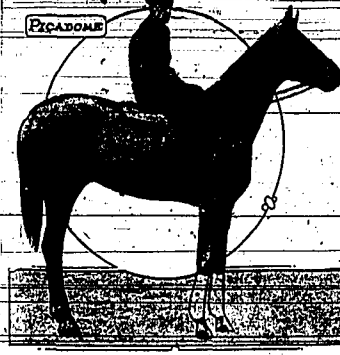

# Larkspur Blossom Furnishes Clue to Mysteries of Heredity

## PLANT CELLS HOLD INVISIBLE BUDDS OF FUTURE STRUCTURE

Carnegie Institution Student Makes Discoveries of Importance to Science

## COLOR CHANGES RESULT FROM CHEMICAL ACTION

Gene Causes Markings on Petals and Different

## Sized Wings on Insects

By HOWARD BLAKESLEE (Associated Press Science Editor)

**C**ONTENDING with the familiar blossom of the larkspur, Dr. M. Demerec of the Carnegie Institution department of genetics here has discovered a new way to get at one of the mysteries of heredity.

This mystery is how such diverse living things as a man, an elephant or the tiniest plant all grow from a small cell originally of the same size and simplicity. In some way the cells contain the instructions of the future structure. That such invisible things actually exist has been established hundreds of times at the Carnegie institution. They are called genes. Although no one ever has seen a gene their presence and effects have been detected.

## Plant Cells

They are situated in or upon chromosomes which are the bodies in a cell, living hereditary characteristics, determining for example whether the living thing shall be a man, an elephant or a larkspur. In the purple spots that often appear on the pink petals of larkspur Dr. Demerec has found a gene, or gene-like, that bears more about certain invisible genes.

These genes are caused by a gene which usually produces the pink color, but occasionally changes its effect to purple. This habit of changing color differs from the action of most genes. Dr. Demerec makes the peculiarity of a gene for watching the gene, or its effects, as they occur in the development of larkspur.

## Produces New Color

He counts the number of cells composing a purple spot. He finds that larkspur so that genes change their rate of producing purple. Genes which once made the purple spot about once in 1,000 chances, can be made to do so only once in 1,000,000. He produces larkspur in blue, rose and lavender, the latter, a new color.

He has also found certain genes in fruit flies which can be studied similarly. They control the shape of wings and body color. He has collected certain facts to have an idea that the instability of these genes may be due to chemical changes. Although he does not disclose what a gene is, it is a step in the desired direction.

Determination of Progress of Industry, Finding of Leading Company and Choice of Securities at Right Time, Factors For Consideration

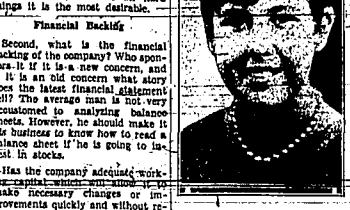

RADSON PARK, MASS., May 1.—I follow frequently one hears the expression, "Yes, the stock market has been advancing, but I always seem to hold the wrong stock." This is the complaint of many who have been disappointed in their investments. It is the rarest thing in the world to buy or to hold the wrong stock, but it is not impossible. Only through intelligent analysis can the investor hope to select securities that will average to show him a profit.

Twenty-five years experience with investments and investors has proven to me that the great majority of people begin at the wrong end when selecting their securities.

**Wrong Procedure**  
The average man looks first at a particular stock, following the quotation from day to day. Perhaps some friend or broker has told him that it is a stock to watch. It may move up a few points. The man takes this as proof that the "tip was right." Perhaps if he is more conservative than the average he will look at the earnings of the company before buying. Hardly ever does he go further than this, but runs in to buy, believing that he has analyzed the stock and confirmed his judgment. This is exactly the wrong way to go about it. He should begin with the general and work down to the specific. That is, he should look first at general business and financial conditions; second at the industry; third at the company; and last at the company's stock. Don't begin your study with the stock; begin with the industry and then study the best companies in the most promising industries.

How to Analyze an Industry  
Since the important thing is the outlook for the industry, how shall the investor analyze the industry? The record of sales and production are valuable, but they are not the principal part of the story. I would suggest putting the industry to be

On the other hand, there is a ton-heavy funded debt. Are investors too large for a business in that particular line of business indicating either slow sales, an undue amount of money tied up in materials which might cause big loss in case of commodity price decline or are the inventories normal in a company of that size in that industry? These are all factors that can be determined from the balance sheet with very little study and they should be determined favorably before a purchase is made.

It is obvious that the best company will show the best earnings. However, it is the trend of earnings which is most important. Many companies who were earning \$10 and \$20 a share during the war have now earned nothing. Others have shown a good earnings. Therefore, while a good earnings record over past years is a helpful indication, if the trend has been gradually declining the investor should find out why. If he cannot find a satisfactory reason why earnings should be more trend upward he ought to avoid the company. In general, it is also true that a new and unseasoned company represents a distinct speculation, but some comparatively new companies have such an excellent outlook that they are better than certain older companies that

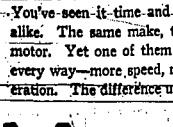
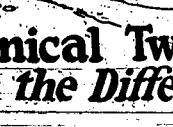
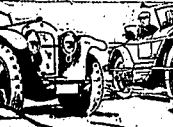

**POTATO GRADE LAW UNDER ATTACK IN COURT PROCEEDING**

H. T. West and 24 Other Growers Put Department of Agriculture on Defensive at Trial Here

Idaho department of agriculture will defend the state's potato grade and marketing law as trial in district court here today in the case of H. T. West and 24 other growers of this district against the department of agriculture and J. B. Welch, state commissioner of agriculture, and W. J. Welch, chief inspector.

It is the first legal test of the new law which was adopted by the 1929 session of the legislature. A number of criminal actions brought under its provisions are still up pending the outcome in this case.
