292 WOMEN BEGIN JOURNEY TOWARDS SCENES OF STRIFE

First Contingent of Gold Star Widows and Mothers Starts on 5000-Mile Trek To Graveyards-of-Europe

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, May 3.—Two hundred thirty-two women, many of whose horizons of knowledge are as narrow as a cactus and a sage brush glimpsed from their kitchen windows, are tomorrow starting on a 5000-mile journey by rail and steamer.

They are the first contingent of the Gold Star widows and mothers who will be taken this spring and summer on one of the unique journeys of sentiment ever undertaken by any government. They are to visit the graves of their countrymen in the war-torn France.

The first woman to start on the pilgrimage was Mrs. Helen Blinckin, Bismarck, Iowa. Mrs. Blinckin is the "Salem" she was scheduled to leave her home this morning.

DEATH STREWN AIR TRAIL LURES LONE FLIER DURING 1930

Captain Charles Kingsford-Smith Plans to Finish Globe-Encircling Journey

PILOT'S FIANCEE HOPES FOR SUCCESS OF FLIGHT

Ace Bases Belief in Safety of Venture in Stability of Airplane, Southern Cross

(By The Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, May 3—A lone man-stop attempt to follow the death-strewn air trail westward over the Atlantic remains the 1930 calendar for heavier-than-air craft.

Captain Charles Kingsford-Smith proposes to fly his famous Southern Cross from Ireland in June on a round-the-world air journey that began May 21, 1928, at Oakland, California.

Waiting and hoping for his success will be his fiancée, Miss Mary Powell, attractive daughter of a Melbourne merchant. The wedding is scheduled for September.

Though the westerly non-stop crossing of the north Atlantic remains believed but once in 15, it tempts that cost 10 lives the Australian takes heart for the venture from the past success of his plane.

The tri-motored monoplane carried him and three companions on a trans-Pacific journey from Oakland, California, to Brisbane, Australia, with stops at Honolulu and the Fiji Islands.

NEW YORK, May 3—A new picture of Shakespeare as a maker of world-wide peace was drawn today by John Parilla, national secretary of the English-Speaking Union.

By striking coincidence, Shakespeare's birth and death fell on the same date, April 23, also St. George's day.

"England's greatest gift has been the English language and Shakespeare has been its greatest genius," Parilla declared.

"When he sent forth his wondrous words some three centuries ago the speech in which he thought was confined to England. It was borne across the Atlantic and later took root in the British dominions.

"In the United States it has worked the miracle of compelling in one English-speaking nation a bond of understanding, sympathy, good will and cooperation."

"And thus it is the most comprehensive and powerful influence of all that is preparing the way for the world-wide peace."

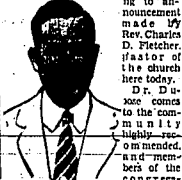
TENNESSEE PASTOR VISITS BURL CHURCH

EXPERT FINDS USE OF LACTOSE ADDS QUALITY TO CANDY

Solentist Creates Formulae to Satisfy Demand for Utilization of Sweet Whey

MILK SUGAR RESULTS IN PLEASING FLAVOR

H. S. Paine, Government Experimenter, Awaits Test of Popular Appeal of Product

By FRANK I. WELSER (Associated Press Staff Editor)

WASHINGTON, May 3.—Good candy has been manufactured experimentally from milk sugar or lactose, honey and cane-syrup.

U. S. Indian government experts on carbohydrates who conducted the work say that if the new flavors find popular appeal and a manufacturing process within the commercial limits of cost can be found the discovery may open new markets for the three agricultural products.

Paine began the present incomplete experiments on boxes of products.

The dairy industry wanted a better utilization of sweet whey, a by-product from which milk sugar or lactose is produced by a number of different formulae. Paine substituted lactose for glucose in making hard candy, or substituted lactose for cane sugar.

Pleasant Flavor

One formula called for 10 per cent lactose and 90 per cent cane sugar. The result was a light brown crystalline candy of a very pleasant flavor.

It still is to be determined whether candy made of various percentages of lactose will absorb less moisture and be more resistant to stickiness than candy made wholly of glucose and cane-sugar.

Lactose is more expensive than either of the other two ingredients under present methods of manufacture.

Five or six kinds of lactoses have been made from cane syrup—now used entirely as a table syrup. Paine says it is probable that the use of cane syrup candy would be limited to those sections of the south where the cane flavor is popular.

Honey in Candy

Honey has presented more serious difficulties. Most candy has to be heated in its manufacture and heating destroys it.

Paine says the alternatives are to find a way to add honey to the preparation without cooking it or to use a certain amount of heat.

While honey has been used to a certain degree in candy making, Paine says there is little hope of expanding unless the problems on which he is working are solved.

Eskimos Profit From Reindeer Despite Scoffs of 40 Years Ago

SEATTLE, May 3 (AP)—Forty years ago a missionary's plan to import reindeer to Alaska caused him to be dubbed "Shell Game" Jackson, so suspicious was the public of his scheme.

Today there are nearly 1,000,000 reindeer in Alaska and 2,000,000 pounds of reindeer meat are shipped annually to the United States. In 10 years the export total is expected to reach 150,000,000 pounds.

Sheldon Jackson, the far-sighted missionary, had to appeal to charity for money to import the first herd of 1200 reindeer from Siberia in 1891.

The government had little faith in "Shell Game," which was designed to give Eskimo new sources of food and clothing. The caribou, seal and walrus were disappearing.

Today the Eskimo has been taught to cast off his nomadic habits of living only for the present and killing for his next meal, and has a profitable occupation. Eskimo boys are taught animal husbandry and the girls learn to make thread from the reindeer's hind-leg sinews.

"The first reindeer were" imported from the west coast of Alaska to the government when the natives' herds had grown. The reindeer animals were "loaned" again, Eskimos were forbidden to sell a reindeer except to another Eskimo or to kill a female until she was old or barren.

Besides giving the Eskimo a new means of livelihood, the reindeer industry has provided a new source of food and clothing for the western world. Marketing of the meat and fur already is a thriving industry.

URBANA, May 3 (AP)—Fresh water shells indicate here the great glacial period built the present lakes of northern North America, says a report to the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

All five of the great lakes of Superior to Ontario appear to have been dug by the glaciers. Before that time, says Frank Collins Baker, curator of the university's museum of natural history, "lakes were probably generally absent, if indeed they existed at all."

This was because during many millions of years the rivers had cut deep courses and drained the lakes.

The mollusk shells support this idea of the ancient geography of the north, for there are of the river type. When the last glacial wiped out the mollusks in this territory, and then left lakes behind it, the shells which proceeded with activity to inhabit lakes.

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Americans' Acquisition of German Oil Lands Causes Furore

YANKEE COMPANIES INTRODUCE NEWER DRILLING METHODS

United States Interests Invade Area Producing For More Than 400 Years

MANY TEUTONS DISPLAY SKEPTICISM OF THEORY

Numerous "Booms" Serve to Checks Speculation of Natives Within Territory

By WADE WERNER (Associated Press Writer)

H MAY 3—"Oil!" Someone whispered the magic syllable and threw northwestern Germany into a fever of discussion about petroleum and the possibility of finding new pools under German soil. Word that an American company had acquired concessions of leases on 160,000 acres in the North German provinces of Brunswick and Schleswig-Holstein was what started the excitement.

"A great many Germans have learned from the first time that Germans have been dipping or pumping oil out of the ground for 400 years. The quantity produced, however, has been negligible compared with the flood poured into the world market by American and Mexican wells. The entire German output has not amounted to only 10,000 tons (about 200,000 barrels) of oil, hard cash about 1 percent of the annual oil production of California and only a few percent of Germany's oil needs.

But now come geologists from America with their new method of deep-drilling methods the German production could be made to rival that of California.

Germany's Reaction "That is strange language, and the reaction in some German quarters has been most laudatory. In others, however, the possibility of tremendous increase in the country's oil output has been met with skepticism. It is recalled that there are plenty of observers who predict that the venturesome Americans will be disappointed in their German predecessors. If they have more money to spend, it will take a little longer to sink. Others object to all this new enthusiasm from abroad.

"Northwestern Germany has had enough sort of oil booms," they say. "Too many people have lost their livelihood in ill-fated oil ventures. Why stir up another period of speculation destined to end in the same old way? If Germans haven't been able to turn the trick, how do these Americans hope to do it?"

The answer of "these Americans" is that Germany's oil industry is in a condition of stagnation because of lack of capital, lack of up-to-date drilling methods and equipment, and a general unwillingness to risk money in search of oil. In other words, oil has been the industrial orphan of Germany for many years. While America it has been alternatively and sometimes simultaneously the favorite son and spoiled child of the world.

Industry Handicapped Even in the face of its handicaps, however, the German industry has made a little progress. Back in the nineteenth century the petroleum "industry" was carried on by villagers who collected the resinous gum of a pond near Wislau, north-

United States Animals Enter in World Fur Exposition in Germany

WASHINGTON, May 3.—Consent has been the necessary appropriation—\$20,000—for American participation in the 12th International fur and hunting exposition to be held in Leipzig, Germany, from May 31 to September 20.

The exposition is the world's first fur fair and is sponsored by the International Fur and Hunting Association, organized under the auspices of the German ministry of commerce. The congressional appropriation, which is tantamount to acceptance of the invitation to the United States to participate, will be used to cover the cost of an official American exhibit under the direction of Frank G. Ashbrook, in charge of fur resources.

Although the United States is the largest fur-producing country in the world, Ashbrook says Americans have very little basic information about the breeding of fur-bearing animals in captivity. The raw-fur harvest is worth about \$85,000,000 a year to trappers, most of whom are farm boys. There are estimates on the contribution of fur farms to the annual harvest, but the industry in the United States and Alaska represents an investment of nearly \$2,000,000.

Fur farmers have had considerable success with foxes, beaver, mink and muskrat. They are just learning the biological requirements of martens and some of the other highly valuable but rapidly disappearing fur animals.

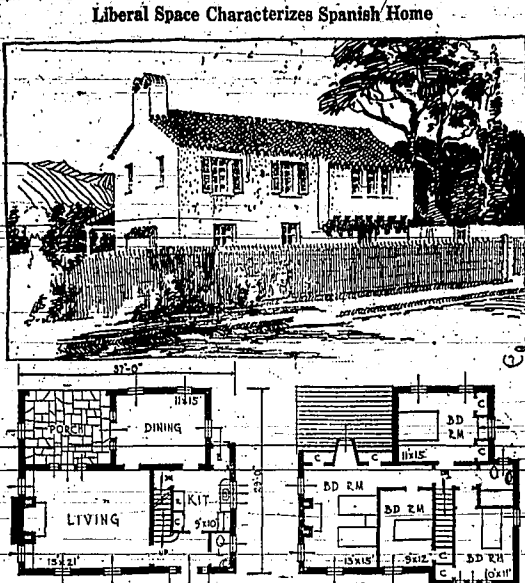

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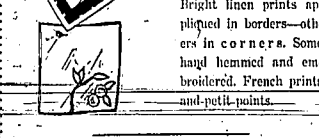

MOSCOW, May 3 (AP)—Fewer students have dropped out of their work at the University of Idaho this year than for any year of the last five, according to enrollment statistics announced by President F. J. Kelly. The figures also show that students have remained more persistently throughout the semester than for any of the last five years.

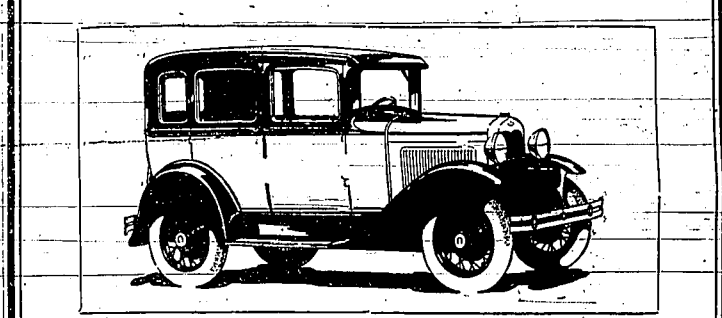

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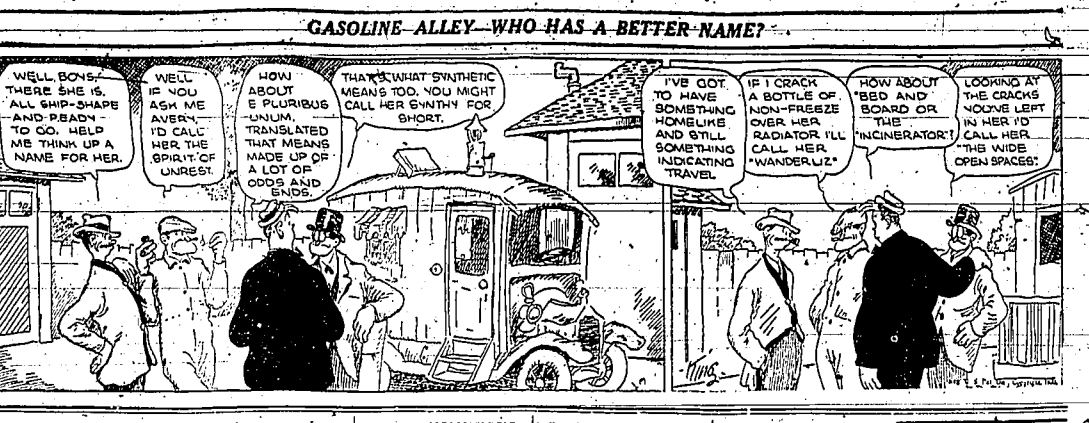

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TRADE REVIVES IN FAR WEST STATES

George B. Nowton, Federal Reserve Official, Tells Of Activities in Month

SAN FRANCISCO, April 29 (AP)—Activity revived in trade and industrial fields of the Pacific coast and neighboring states during March. The seasonal upturn was not as brisk as in the recent boom years, however.

Chief favorable developments were—(1) advances in wholesale price levels toward the end of March and early in April, along with a greater-than-seasonal pickup in lumber and building industries.

Decline was also noted by Nowton in zinc-ferrous metal output, cement, flour and practically all manufactured articles. This resulted in a small net decrease in factory production, and contributed to the maintenance of employment conditions in a rather stable status.

MILAN, May 3 (AP)—A determined drive against "ambulance chasers" is being undertaken here by the institution of the National association for Social Aid.

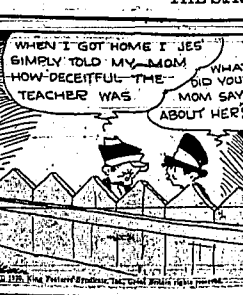
