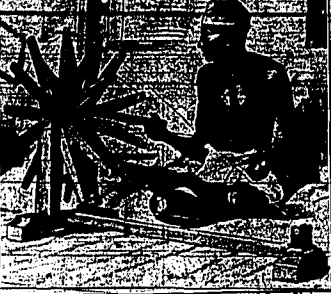

## German Pugilist Plays 18 Rounds Golf in New York

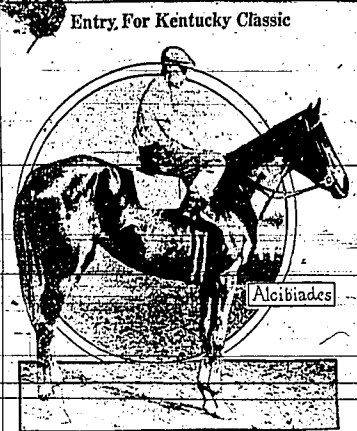
Teuton Wastes no Time in Becoming Strictly American in so Far as Exercise For Coming Battle

(By The Associated Press) NEW YORK, May 5.—Max Schmeling wasted no time today in going strictly American so far as his exercise was concerned. The German heavyweight, who arrived from the fatherland only yesterday, took advantage of the sunny day to get in 18 holes of golf.

Schmeling will appear before the New York state athletic commission tomorrow to apply for reinstatement so that he may fight Jack Sharkey in the Yankee stadium June 12 for the heavy weight championship. The Teuton scrapper was accepted by the commission a year ago for failure to go through with a match with Phil Scott, the British champion, who was later eliminated by Sharkey at Miami, Florida. The reinstatement is a formality inasmuch as the title bout already has been officially approved by the state athletic commission.

The German will sign articles at the commission offices for the match as soon as he is reinstated. He is to receive 25 per cent of the receipts. Sharkey will share similarly in the proceeds.

After a five-hour session Schmeling will leave for his training camp at Hartford, New York, and will not return until the day of the bout, but he is said to be spending his spare time gathered to be sent to tomorrow.

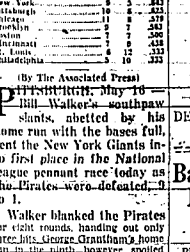

## Moscow Horticulture Department Gives Pointers on Care of Lawns

**MOSCOW, May 3 (Special to The News)**—One of the important problems encountered by yard and garden lovers is fertilization. A good treatment for lawns which are not supplied with a perpetual source of natural fertilization is an application of sulphate of ammonia, a fertilizer adaptable to the soils of many regions of the state. Sulphate of ammonia is recommended by the department of horticulture of the University of Idaho college of agriculture. It should be broadcast at the rate of about four pounds to every 1000 square feet of lawn. It is essential that the lawn receive a very heavy application immediately after the fertilizer has been applied on the grass will "burn." Sulphate of ammonia replaces nitrogen in the soil through its dissolution around the roots of the grass, and upon recommendation of garden experts, it should be applied wherever the lawn is not green or is a pale color. In supplying the lawn with water, it has been found that a thorough soaking is to be preferred to a more frequent lighter sprinkling. Water should penetrate the soil to sufficient depth to feed the grass roots. Mowing lawns and regular irrigation are important in the care of a lawn. Removing the clippings of a lawn rake the accumulation of grass debris also is desirable.

**Weed Elimination**  
Another phase of lawn care that has often been neglected is the elimination of weeds. The dandelion, perhaps, is the worst enemy to grass and is most plentiful in the state. Arsenate of lead has been used to good advantage in combatting the weed.

Often, too, it is necessary for the individual to insure protection of the lawn against trespassers and undesirable animals. A useful method to resort to is the planting of shrubbery as a barrier.

Landscaping and the lawn and home grounds deserve the attention and advice of experts. The shrubbery and both ornamental and lawn trees require a certain amount of water, fertilization and cultivation as well as protection against insects and diseases.

To thrive, ornamental and shade trees must have a source of nourishment as the trees secure their mineral food from the soil and each year the trees send out more roots to obtain this food. "Tree foods in powder form may be secured from local dealers and have been used with great results in this state in supplying the necessary elements to the soil for good tree growth.

**Moisture Supply**  
The size of trees, species, and nature of soil, top, determine the amount of water required for a tree. Some trees are moisture-loving as the willows and poplar, while others like the best soil in summer, soil as the black locust and maple. Soil should not dry out and trees need frequent watering. Continual cultivation and application of a good dust mulch around the base of the tree will aid in its growth.

Caution should be exercised at this time of the year against the pruning of shrubbery and trees. The shrubs that blossom in the spring such as the golden bell or spring ought to be pruned in the spring after the blossoms come out, while shrubs that bloom in summer or mid-fall such as the hydrangea or rose of Sharon ought to be pruned in winter or early spring before the buds protrude forth. Advice pertaining to pruning or surgical treatment of trees and shrubbery may be secured from the University of Idaho college of agriculture.

Fortunately there are few insects and diseases which attack shrubbery and the perennial flowering plants in this state. Gardeners should follow the practice of eliminating these enemies as soon as they are evidenced.

## BUHL BUSINESS WOMEN BERGER RESIDENTS HEAR ATTEND MAY BREAKFAST FILER METHODIST CHURCH

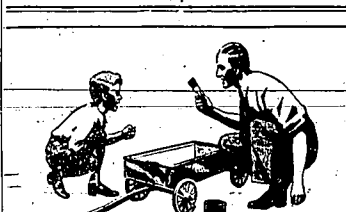
