**MINI-CASSIA DAIRY ASSOCIATION GIVES REPORT FOR YEAR**  
 W. W. Palmer, County Agricultural Agent in Burley, Names Haven Leigh's "Beauty" Outstanding Cow

BURLEY, May 8 (Special to The News)—Outstanding in the second annual report of the Mini-Cassia Dairy Herd Improvement association for 1935 released Wednesday by W. W. Palmer, county agricultural agent, Burley, is the reference to "Beauty," high cow of the association with a record of 302.2 pounds of butterfat for the year. She is a grade Holstein, owned by Haven Leigh, Burley.

For the chairman of Cassia and Mindokota counties 1935 was a very prosperous year, says the report. The average price of butterfat was about 17 cents, there was an exceptional demand for culling stock to be used as breeders and for butterfat production. Beef prices were sufficiently good to justify the culling of unprofitable stock.

Available feed was abundant. All-sterilized hay averaged \$10 per ton throughout the year. Due to low prices for the 1935 potato crop, farmers fed potatoes with good results. Many farmers are becoming more prevalent, the report points out, as dairymen realize the profitable returns per acre in dairy products. Sweet corn is being used mainly, many farmers find that averaging their crop winter wheat for good advantage. Sweet corn molasses proved to be an excellent and cheap feed also, being fed usually about a half bag per cow to three pounds per head daily.

Management improves. Dairy management has improved, according to the report, particularly as to shelter for the herd. Many hand milking barns were built during the year and there is a gradual increase in the use of milking machines. Ready markets are available for butterfat and milk products for both counties, the Mini-Cassia Dairy-Improvement association handles the major portion with freezing stations of the larger companies. There are also cheese factories at Paul, Malin, Oakley and Burley.








Better stock is being bred. There are three Holstein bull associations in operation with 16 outstanding bulls in use and a great many fine ones are being purchased by individuals for the various herds. Approximately \$200,000 was in association.

The average feed cost per cow for the year was \$72.92 and the average value of butterfat per cow \$166.70, with an average profit of \$93.78 per cow above feed cost. The average pounds butterfat produced per cow was 274.6, with an average per cent fat of 2.10. The high cow, Haven Leigh's "Beauty," produced 18,233 pounds of milk in 11 months. Her percentage of butterfat bringing \$43.85, a profit of \$233.24 above feed cost. The lowest cow in the association produced 109.6 pounds of butterfat worth \$23.85, a profit of \$41.83.
