

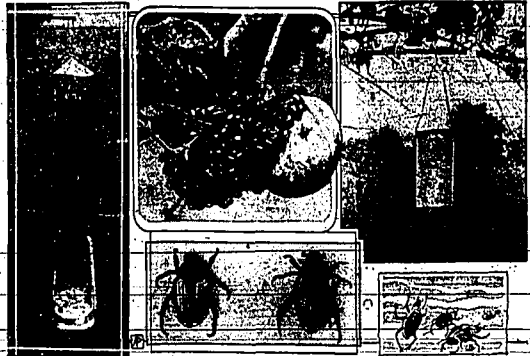
Entomologists Use Gas in Drive Against Japanese Beetle

REPELLENT VAPORS REPLACE TRAPS IN CAMPAIGN ON PEST

Process Consists of Applying Heat to Chemicals to Increase Volatilization

INSECTS DECREASE WITH USE OF LATEST METHOD

(Associated Press Staff Writer) WASHINGTON, May 10.—With infestation spreading, an attempt will be made this year to determine whether crops can be protected by a gas better against the Japanese beetle by driving the insects away from them than by trying to trap the voracious invaders.

Where government entomologists have used traps to effect a marked decrease in infestation, the process consists simply of applying constant heat to chemicals to increase the rapidity of volatilization. The vaporizer which proved most satisfactory under field conditions consists of a 30-inch length of 5/8 inch aluminum fitted over the top of a lantern. The lantern is placed in a can held at the upper end of the sleeve and is protected from rain and wind by a funnel-shaped top attached on one inch above the pipe.

Use in Orchards. When used in orchards the vaporizer is placed in the outer branches of the tree, the top suspended four or five feet from the ground by means of a wire hook. In fields it is suspended from a pole or standard on the windward side of the plants, with the top of the vaporizer slightly below the highest shoots.

The repellent is exactly reverse in practice to the attractant previously used, when it was made to protect crops by trapping the beetles in a can of chemical vapor. In the present case, the year federal grounds in Washington were dotted with such traps.

Use in Fields. Spraying has not been sufficiently satisfactory since it leaves a toxic residue on fruits and corn, and is continually repeated on the flowers of blossoming plants and on leaves and grasses.

Use in Pasture. The Japanese beetle has increased its range to include another county in Massachusetts as well as certain new territory in Connecticut, New York, Pennsylvania, Maryland, Delaware and Virginia.

The insect was discovered in the United States at Riverport, New Jersey, in 1916, where the grub is supposed to have been imported to soil about the roots of Japanese elm prior to 1912.

It is most injurious in its adult stage by reason of its injury to foliage and fruit. As many as five or six hundred beetles have been taken from a single apple tree and it is not uncommon to find as much as from 85 to 100 per cent of the ears of corn injured in an entire field.

Gulf Stream's Shift Brings Vision Of Gotham As Tropical Isle

72-DEGREE WATERS CHANGE DIRECTION TOWARD NEW YORK

Third Report in Less Than Two Years Shows Warm Current Nearer Metropolis

CAPTAIN SIR ARTHUR ROSTRON GIVES DATA

Scientists Declare Proximity Would Not Greatly Alter City's Climate

NEW YORK, May 10.—New York is viewed as a palm-girt, semi-tropical city because of repeated reports that the warm Gulf stream is shifting its course northward.

No Palma for New York

If the stream's 72-degree waters begin piling into New York harbor in the winter, Dr. James Kimball of the weather bureau here says their influence would be less than that of the Gulf of Mexico.

The wanderings are accounted for because the stream ceases to be such after leaving Havana. Thereafter it is a drift, its own velocity not much more than a mile an hour.

The push behind the Gulf stream comes from two warm currents near the equator flowing westward across the Atlantic and uniting in the Caribbean. The direction is believed due to the earth's rotation.

The stream speeds northward past Florida in response to one of nature's greatest powers, the difference in temperature between the equatorial and polar waters.

The undercurrent bank of the stream is believed to be the continental shelf of North America, which holds it well offshore.

LONDON, May 10.—Ishbel MacDonald, who, as prime minister's daughter, an official hostess, can't make any presentations for her father at the royal courts this year despite his high position.

Court etiquette rigidly prescribes that no unmarried woman may introduce anyone to the king and queen. Ramsey MacDonald, an old acquaintance of the man to perform this function for him.

Mrs. Snowden, as wife of the chancellor of the exchequer, is the nearest "patroness" upon whom he can call. She lives next door, at 11 Downing street.

Applications from British and American women anxious to attend the royal courts at Buckingham palace on May 14 and 15, June 27 and 28, this year, have exceeded all previous years.

Thousands of Applications
The lord chamberlain has, since January 1, been sent out thousands of applications from women who wish to be commanded to attend court in one of the king's daughters or friend to their majesties. Not half can possibly be granted although between 500 and 8000 persons will appear at the four courts.

Those who get commands (invitations) will be more fortunate than last year. This year the king, fully recovered from his dangerous illness which has kept him appearing last year, will once more take full part in the pageantry.

Economic law of supply and demand continues to be the most important factor in marketing of potatoes, W. H. West, Kimberly, and 24 other potato growers and shippers of this district who have brought the action to test the validity of the law. Mr. Hicks insisted, however, grades and inspection to help obtain better prices for Idaho potatoes.

Mr. Hicks was the last of four witnesses called yesterday by Leon Frank, attorney general, to testify in support of the state's contention. Other witnesses who yesterday testified in compliance with state regulations before Idaho's potato industry were L. C. On conclusion of Mr. Hicks' testimony, Mr. Hodgins called two witnesses, J. P. Dennis, Twin Falls, and J. H. Kimball, Kimberly, growers and shippers, for rebuttal testimony.

United States Merchant Marine Bids For Maritime Glory

SHIPPERS HOPE TO RAISE AMERICA TO HIGH TRADE LEVEL

Industry Foresees New Era Of Construction, Surpassed Only In Wartime

MAIL CONTRACT AGREEMENTS TEND TO AID MOVEMENT

Building Of Largest Ship Ever Made In Nation Marks Beginning of Drive

(By The Associated Press) NEW YORK, May 10.—The American shipping industry will resume with the greatest pentecost activity in its history, if the expectations of prominent shipping men are realized.

An extensive program of construction surpassed only by the war-time activity will give the United States the speed supremacy of the seas and raise the merchant marine to an unprecedented position in world commerce in the dream of maritime interdependence.

Not since the days of the famous clipper ships with their great sails has the United States been able to boast of its speed on the seas, and vessels flying foreign flags carry the largest portion of the trans-Pacific passenger business of the country.

Outlook Good
The outlook for shipping in this country is bright, said Captain Charles A. McCallister, president of the American Bureau of Shipping.

A requisitioned interest in shipbuilding is noticeable and is due, in a large measure, to the attending of mail contracts and extension of loans to finance new ships being made by the government under the Jones-Whitely merchant marine act.

Captain McCallister said that the United States now ranks second among the ship-building nations of the world, whereas in 1914 it ranked only 14th.

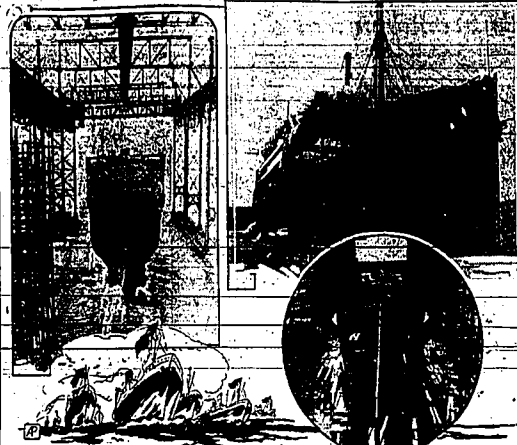

Change In Russian Town's Name Signifies Communist Campaign Against Religion

Historic City, "Sergiyev," Becomes "Zagorsk," in Memory of Bolshevik of Fame During Revolution

By JAMES A. MILLS (Associated Press Correspondent) SERGIYEV, Russia, May 10—After being known for 800 years as "Sergiyev," the name of this historic town, founded by St. Sergius 50 years after Columbus discovered America, has been changed by the Communist regime in St. Sergius in memory of Michael Zagorsk, a communist who was killed in Moscow in 1919 by a bomb thrown by Soviet revolutionaries.

Famous Monastery Next to the famous Pechorsky Monastery—The Pechorsky Monastery, founded by St. Sergius six centuries ago by the son of an impoverished boyar of Moscow, is the richest and historically the most important monastery in all Russia.

Today many of these riches have disappeared and the Soviet authorities have covered the crumbling remains of the once-proud and powerful monastery with a massive, modern building. Today, only about 500,000 pilgrims, the place today is a far sadder sight than that visited in "Golden Days" and "Desert and Village."

This is the site for the visitor to this once holy spot, now peopled only by a few families and a number of children at play, to realize that the monastery was once so vast that it had 10,000 cells and could accommodate 20,000 soldiers. But its nine massive towers and its craggy walls, which in places are four feet thick, suggest how the monastery was able at various times in Russia's stormy history, to withstand long military sieges.

Behind the church altar behind which the young Czar Ivan and Peter the Great were crowned, stands the famous Strelitz Regiment, founded in 1683.

At the side of a church, as understood as the grave of a peasant, is the tomb of Czar Boris Godunov, his wife and two of his children. On the top of the tomb of his Czar, who established serfdom in Russia, children of Communist workers proudly and proudly, wholly unconscious of the presence beneath their feet of the dust of a man who usurped the throne of Russia four centuries ago.

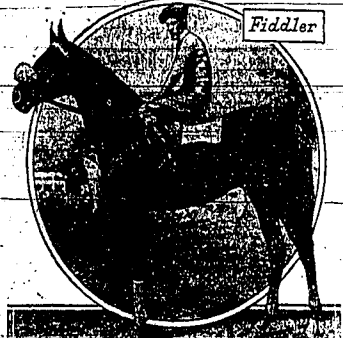

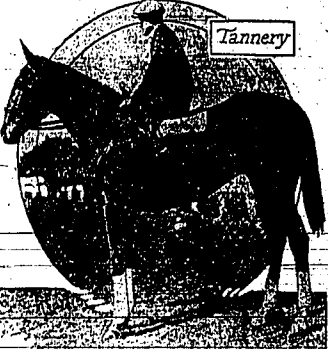

Man's Golf Score Nearly Equals Age

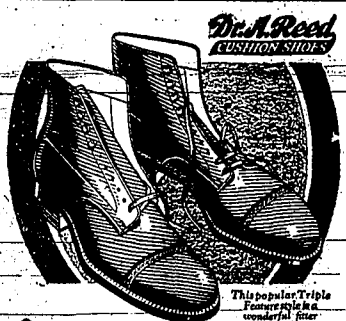

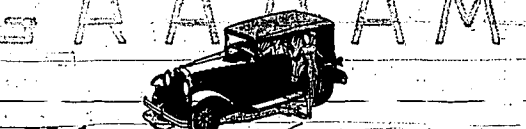

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IDAHO EDUCATORS PLAN CURRICULUM FOR HIGH SCHOOLS

State Board Maps Out Undertaking Toward Creating Entirely Modern System of Instruction

(By The Associated Press) BOISE, May 10.—The massive undertaking of creating an entire new junior-senior high school curriculum has been mapped out by the state board of education with the endorsement of the state education association.

The plan calls for an expenditure of \$20,000 or more which will be deducted from the various high schools and each in turn will be expected to contribute more to the study of the system with a view to having the new curriculum on a more modern basis of students' needs. The new curriculum is based on a survey of conditions made by educators in 1925 while the new one is based on a study made more than two decades later.

Those taking major parts in the program will make a special study of curriculum building at the University of Idaho during the coming summer. The actual work will consume several years.

All present line committees of the production committees are completed—libraries are being equipped at the headquarters of the various production committees. Books on principles of curriculum construction, actual courses of study and high school texts will be supplied. Money for traveling expenses is also available. The first part of the work will be under way.

The work of production has been divided among the committees as follows: Social sciences natural sciences, including mathematics; language, including foreign languages and English composition; reaction education; fine arts, moral education; physical education; administration, supervision and personnel; and social studies. The work of the committee on the extra-curricular activities.

Complete Organization
The chairman of four of these committees will be superintendents of principals from independent districts and of the others superintendents or principals from smaller districts. Each committee will include besides three a curriculum adviser, a superintendent or principal from a large or small district, classroom teachers in the various subjects considered, and the commissioner of education—an ex-officio member of all production committees.
"In outlining the program," the board declared, "we believe in Idaho that the person who is to do a course of study is the one who should write it. Probably the majority of teachers will have an opportunity to contribute in some manner. An educational campaign of this kind is worth more than the \$20,000 which is estimated as the probable cost of the curriculum resulting from this work will be the product of growth from the bottom rather than pressure by the colleges from the top."
