### ARCTIC EXPEDITION PICKS SUBMARINE FOR DARING TRIP

Sir Hubert Wilkins Party Selects Old and Battered Submersible O-12 for Use on Perilous Voyage

(By The Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, May 12 (AP)—Sir Hubert Wilkins expedition, which will sail beneath the ice across the north of the world from Spitzbergen, via the North Pole to the Bering sea—has chosen the old and battered United States submarine O-12 for its craft, and today made written requests to the navy department.

The plans disclosed that the submarine, if made available, would be virtually completely equipped for boring through ice 50 feet thick, equipped with balloon for observations, and radio. ### WAGNER LABOR MEASURE WINS SENATE APPROVAL

WASHINGTON, May 12 (AP)—By a vote of 84 to 74, the senate today passed the Wagner labor bill.

The bill, which now goes to the house, would broaden the scope of activities of the United States labor department to create a national system of employment offices and to assist the states in setting up similar bureaus.

The latter purpose, the bill authorizes annually \$4,000,000 for the next four years, 75 per cent of which would be apportioned to the states which match the federal funds for the work. The balance of the money would be expended for administrative purposes.

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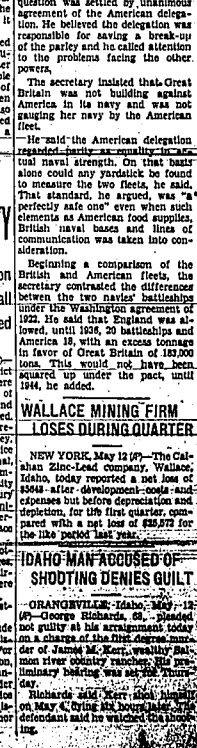
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### COUNCIL BUDGETS

#### \$271,925 EXPENSE OF CITY FOR YEAR

Waterworks improvement increases tentative appropriations \$15,000. No increase in tax levy.

Without elevating the tax levy, which was retained at 30 mills, Twin Falls city council in session last evening adopted a tentative budget providing for \$271,925 municipal expenditures during the coming fiscal year, as compared with \$272,720 appropriations last year, an increase of \$14,990.

### The Weather

#### FORECAST FOR TODAY AND TOMORROW—Generally fair.

Minimum temperature in the vicinity of Twin Falls was 34 degrees above zero during the 24-hour period ending at 6 p. m. yesterday, according to the report of the government weather observer here.

Minimum temperature Sunday was 34 degrees and maximum 57 degrees, with a precipitation of .61 of an inch.

### POTATOES SELL ON MINIDOKA PROJECT

Lincoln Wilder, Burley Produce Dealer, Reports But 10 Carloads Remaining

BURLEY, May 12 (Special to The News)—Potatoes on the Minidoka project are practically all sold, according to Lincoln Wilder, local produce dealer. There are hardly 10 carloads left.

Only some 1000 carloads were shipped to market from Idaho after this date. Now, Wilder says, there are but 300 cars remaining to be marketed. Seed potatoes, also, are not particularly plentiful, and although there may be a slight increase of the tubers on the project the scarcity of seed is likely to prevent a much greater planting than last season.

The limited amount of potatoes already planted here, for early harvesting, seems to be in some danger of turning out a disappointment. The unusually long spell of wet weather, coupled with cold temperatures, prevented these sets from sprouting, and there is a prospect of their rotting in the ground or becoming infested with grubs. The soil will be in good condition, however, for the main planting of potatoes, under ordinary conditions.

### WILDER BELIEVES THAT OUTLOOK FOR BEGINNING OF THE IDAHO POTATO MARKETING SEASON IS FAVORABLE

Wilder believes that the outlook for the beginning of the Idaho potato marketing season is very favorable. Due to poor soil conditions, and adverse weather, prospects for the new crop of seed potatoes indicate a light yield. Advice, he says, is that growing conditions here had in all early stages. He therefore looks for satisfactory prices for Idaho growers up to at least the middle of October.

Although the soil is likely to be in good condition for potato production here, the yield may be offset to a certain extent through the use of poorer seed than usual.

According to Wilder, growers here have been steadily improving the quality of their seed. During times of high prices, however, some growers sell much of their best product and depend on a rather inferior grade of seed selected from their culls. The result is a decrease in the quality of production to the acre. A scarcity of select seed, coupled with high prices, is apt to result this season in a lower yield per acre than when good seed is plentiful and potato prices low.

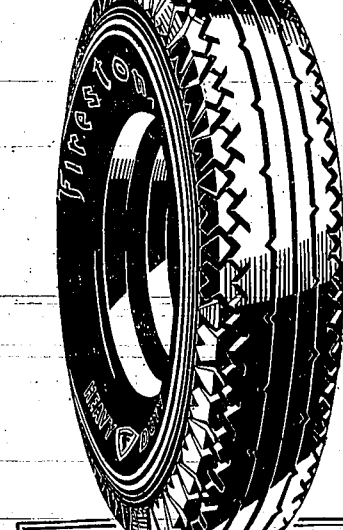
### SOIL TECHNOLOGIST EXPERIMENTS HERE

G. H. McDole, Moscow, soil technologist of the University of Idaho experiment station, and Harry B. Hale, county agricultural agent, last evening completed examination of a large number of orchards and farms in this county where experiments are being made this year with phosphates and ammonia sulphates are being tried out as soil builders. Mr. McDole said that since these experiments started only this spring it is too early to pass definitely on their effect this early in the season. ### Mr. McDole, who has been experimenting on this matter for some years, stated that in his opinion, substituting and proper irrigation, accompanied by the growing of cover crops like alfalfa and clover would slowly eradicate this trouble. 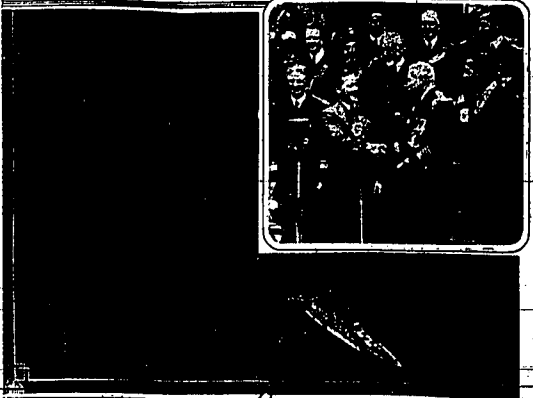

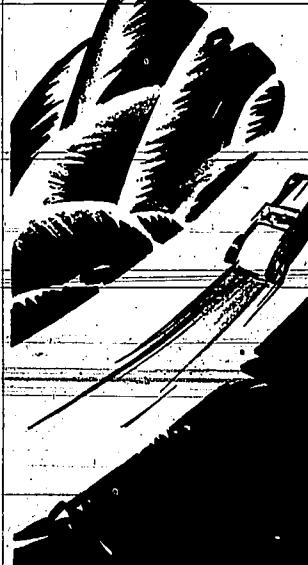

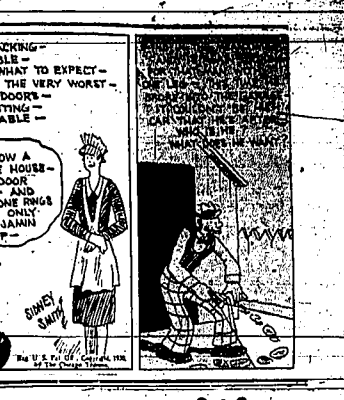

### LIBRARY SHOWS BIG INCREASE FOR YEAR

Circulation Gains Almost 8000 and Number of Volumes 200 Since May 1929

Number of volumes in the Twin Falls public library increased from 50,000 on May 1, 1929, to 51,070 on May 1, according to the annual report of Miss Jessie Fraser, librarian of Twin Falls public library. Circulation for the year which has just closed was 89,279 against 81,723 for the year ending April 30, 1929, an increase of 7556 volumes.

Adult circulation for the year was 61,238 volumes; juvenile circulation 35,027 volumes. Adults read 54,172 volumes of fiction and juveniles read 24,633 of fiction. Non-fiction circulation among adults was 8238 volumes against juvenile non-fiction circulation of 10,247 volumes.

The report in speaking of conditions and of work during the year says: "The magazine readers have made use of the new technical and scientific magazines added during the year."

Classes in the use of library have been conducted at the library by Miss Edith Dyer. All of the English A classes have been brought to the library in class groups, and have been given instruction in the use of the
