(By The Associated Press.) BOMBAY, India, May 13—While the government hurriedly assembled in hurried conference, India's resistance to British rule is growing.

INDIANS GATHER IN 'HAYLEY' REGION

Dedication of Bridge Brings Throng to Historic Wood River Valley for Day

HAYLEY, May 13 (Special to The Tribune)—One of the largest throngs that ever assembled in the history of the valley gathered here today for the dedication of the bridge spanning the river between Idaho and Oregon.

Throughout the Indian domain arrests of illegal salaried officers and raiders went on relentlessly. Courts sentenced the offenders to extreme penalties.

The Bombay situation was quieter and less volatile than in the past. It also was officially announced for the first time in the government that the British would not be asked to withdraw from India.

Troops have mopped up the whole Peshawar area. As they swept through town after town airplanes operated simultaneously in attacks upon the hills.

At Allahabad the congress committee of workers engaged in an all-day session. The committee was active for stronger resistance. The passive followers of Mahatma Gandhi were urged to be more active.

Eighty arrests in Calcutta alone were reported in the civil disobedience movement in that district. The trial of Abbas Tyabji continued without serious incident, which in itself was a surprise to the officials.

OFFICER ISSUES NOTICE GHOLAPUR, India, May 13 (The British officer commanding this district has issued a notice to the effect that the administration will take notice of any person who is found in possession of arms or explosives.

NATIONALIST ARMY REGISTERS VICTORY Government Announces Success in "Decisive Initial" Battle for Control

SHANGHAI, May 13 (The Nationalist government announced tonight that the forces had driven the Communists out of the area along the northern border of Anhui and Honan provinces in a battle which cost the Nationalist army 10,000 men.

The battle for supremacy in China has lasted five days. The Nationalists said if they won it, the position of the Nationalist government would be strengthened.

Feng Yu-hsiang, would collapse speedily. President Chang Kai-shek personally directed the attack.

The Nationalists asserted they repulsed Communist attacks in the Shantung province, but fighting continued. Government bombing planes were reported to have done heavy damage to Northern troops concentrated along the railroad west of Kailang.

BORAH QUESTIONS NAVAL DELEGATES ON PACT'S TERMS

Secretary Stimson Insists Arms Treaty Brings Parity Between America's and Great Britain's Fleets

(By The Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, May 13—Secretary Stimson insisted today under sharp examination by the Senate foreign relations committee, to say that the London naval treaty brought parity between the American and British fleets in all categories of ships.

Set upon by the committee members of his second day's appearance, the secretary got quick aid from Senator Robinson, Democrat, Arkansas, one of the American delegation to London, who came into the discussion with a firm defense of the basis for parity adopted by the committee.

Senator Robinson, Republican, Indiana, provoked the Arkansas senator with inquiries as to the reason for America abandoning five of the 15 heavy cruisers authorized by the treaty last year.

Secretary Stimson told the committee that the "substantial compliance" of the treaty was the basis for determining parity.

Senator Robinson, Arkansas, added that the treaty was "a bad deal" and sound because it was not practical to give substantially different meanings to the term.

The secretary concluded his extemporaneous statement to the committee with a recouping of the savings and reductions accomplished under the treaty. He was asked to return tomorrow to subject himself to the questioning by committee members which he has welcomed.

He said the treaty comprises a reduction in the total fleet of this country of 175,000 tons, the fleet of America, Great Britain and Japan of 430,000 tons.

He said the treaty "caps the present building days of Washington conference by Mr. Hughes and goes him 13,000-ton better."

Replying to Chairman Borah of the committee, Mr. Stimson explained the "escalator clause" as termed it, or the "escape clause," which Senator Borah described it. This is the clause permitting the signatory nations to go beyond the treaty limits under certain conditions.

Senator Borah brought out that if England decided to build more ships, this country would be limited to the construction in the same category. However, the secretary added that this country would have the right to build in other categories if well equipped by France or Italy.

Princess Japanese Mr. Stimson spoke most of Japan and praised the attitude of her delegation and of that government permitting the United States to build ships in order to ask Japan, at the same time, to stand still.

Senator Swanson, Democrat, Virginia, asked if the treaty would be extended to include the construction of submarines.

STATE AND CANAL BOARD AGREE ON DAMAGE TO ROAD

Representatives of Directors and Idaho Department of Public Works Settle \$10,400 Claim for \$2300

Compromise was effected for the amount of \$2300 of a claim of the state of Idaho made against the Twin Falls Canal company in 1919 sum of \$10,400 yesterday afternoon when the Twin Falls Canal company and directors voted acceptance and instructed W. R. Hatfield, board treasurer, to sign a check for \$2300, which will be paid to the state department of public works next week.

It was claimed by the state that early last fall the Twin Falls Canal over the road, breaking the paving along the edge of the canal. The canal company refused to admit responsibility for the damage to the road, but in order to avoid a lawsuit entered into negotiations for settlement. The state department asserted that the damage might be more than \$10,400 should the broken places corrode.

In order to secure estimated the canal board secured the services of Warren O. Swenson, Boise, prominent engineer and former commissioner of reclamation for Idaho, who made estimates of damage, and method and cost of repair. About 10 days following a conference in Boise between the engineers of the department of public works, and Mr. Swenson, regarding engineering problems and cost of repair, and between Judge J. H. Bolger, Twin Falls, attorney for the Twin Falls Canal company, and the office of W. D. Ollis, attorney general, a compromise was arrived at which was approved by the Twin Falls Canal board to the payment of \$2300 in full settlement.

Appears Before Board Charles A. Kyle, Boise, bridge engineer of the highway bureau of department of public works, appeared before the board to discuss a proposed bridge near Castletown which the state estimated to cost \$100,000. Kyle will pier in the middle of the canal. This proposal was objected to by the board and the highway engineer would collect debris in the summer and ice in the winter and prevent free flow of water. It is stated that use of iron or steel, at considerable increase in cost. Mr. Kyle after discussing the matter with the board, stated that he would present the views of the board to the state department. He left the board on the occasion of the opening of the bridge across Wood river today.

ATTORNEYS' TILTS MAKE LIVELY TRIAL
