Throng of On-lookers
Thousands of amiable on-lookers, many of whom arrived five hours before the court began, jostled to get close enough to view the powdered and beflowered debutantes who waited in parked motorcars along the mall for the royal summons.

All of the girls from the United States obediently posed for the cameras, and smiled graciously to acknowledge the acclaim of the spectators.

The regal splendor of the Buckingham palace throne room made an admirable background for the girls in frothy white and pastel hued gowns.

The queen, who smiled encouragingly at each nervous presentee, wore an imposing gown of blue-silver brocade, the famous Kohinoor diamond gleaming from her breast.

King George wore the scarlet full dress uniform of colonel in chief of the Grenadier guards, and presented an impressive picture as he stood by the twin-gold thrones, mounted on a solid and scarlet dais under the golden canopy in the ball room.

The prince of Wales wore the uniform of the Welsh guards, and Princess Mary, a gown of pale blue trimmed in diamonds. A silver tissue train and a diamond sapphire tiara completed the ensemble.

Most of the 800 guests, who were privileged to see the opening court, were residents in their uniforms, but the American and Russian ambassadors were conspicuous for their superb gowns.

On May 7, at San Juan, a patrol in the vicinity of Barral hill encountered about 100 bandits who opened fire from four sides. The bandits used bombs, Thompson and Lewis machine guns and rifles. Four members of the guard were killed and two were wounded. Six bandits died.—The guard lost all of its supplies in the two-hour engagement. The next day a patrol met a small group of bandits of Amucayan near Palencia, but there were no casualties. The guard captured 10 armed horses, dynamite, bombs, saddles and ammunition.

to the purpose of the appropriation and the action of congress.

Olson, who sponsored the re-appointment for the commission, announced that he would introduce a resolution before additional money is appropriated calling for a statement of expenditures already made. He asserted that the commission had been spending its time "counting into thousands the depth of automobiles and such things."

The Virginian said prohibition became effective while he was secretary of the treasury and that he protested against placing enforcement under the internal revenue bureau. He added that other treasury secretaries since had recommended transfer of enforcement.

The original amendment placed in the bill by the senate judiciary committee provides that the legislation shall become effective next July 1.—The house provision providing for joint control by the treasury and justice departments of industrial alcohol permits was retained.

He said he could not agree with the word homage in view of the oath which he had taken and because it was against the tenets of Islam. Moreover, he declared, events in the corporation during the last few days had convinced the Moslems that if the congress really succeeded in capturing the administration of the country, there would be no hope for the Mohammedan minority in India.

The Gandhi movement, he contended, had failed to draw into its fold the most stable elements of the Indian population. It was a move on the part of those who were new down in political life and were trying to retrieve their position, he said.

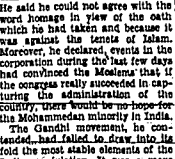

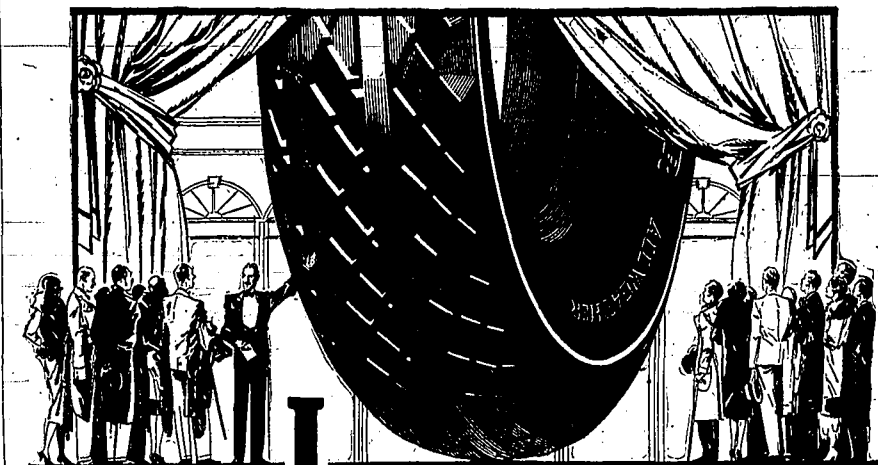

HURRIED LAW MAKING
Congressman Smith and the rest of the Idaho delegation in Washington, as well, perhaps, as a good many other Idaho citizens, have good grounds for complaint against a new registration law requiring every Idaho citizen who expects to appear in person before a grand jury.

Patience or inability to do so, apparently will disintegrate the whole Idaho colony in the District of Columbia, and maybe some others.

It won't do any particular good to find out who is responsible for the law, except perhaps to afford some personal satisfaction to those who seem likely to suffer under it.

Of course, there was no intention to make a law that would work that way. It is just a sample of alpine legislation that must be expected.

As we continue to try to cram into a bare sixty days all the law making for the State that is customary every two years.

The incident might be regarded as evidence of the soundness of suggestion that there should be considerable interval between legislative sessions, with one session to produce the proposed legislation and another to take action on the proposed measures.

IN MIAMI
It may be that Miami, Florida, authorities have hit upon exactly the right method to take care of the case of Chicago gangland's leader, Al Capone, unassisted and unaccompanied in the Southern city.

Miami police are certainly doing their best to discourage Mr. Capone's presence. Every time he shows up on the streets he is placed under arrest and escorted to jail. His attorney gets him out almost immediately.

At the next trial the entire incident is re-analyzed; a most extraordinary state of affairs from the standpoint of any citizen.

Miami may accomplish more than Chicago has. Undoubtedly Chicago would like to rid herself of the tribe of Capone, rook and branch but, notwithstanding her best efforts, Capone is just as much a part of the population as "Big Bill" Thompson. Perhaps it is harder to find Capone in Chicago. There is a course more of it than there is of Miami yet it is the plan works in one place it should in another.

The result of the Miami effort should be watched with interest.

The life in the "Columbian" child, penitentiary, which burned to death three hundred twenty prisoners revealed certain defects of the American penal system. The murder of seven small children by a hapless mother whose husband is imprisoned in that same penitentiary reveals other defects.

The murderer, aged forty-four, the mother of ten children. Since her husband's incarceration she has tried to make a living for her brood by sewing uppers on her own. Her struggle was too great. Finally it seemed best to her to get rid of six or seven very much as one gets rid of superfluous puppies or kittens. She would take care of the older ones or they could take care of themselves.

How about it? We may wait the question of birth control. There is plenty of cause for discussion in the question of provision for the families of men who go to the state, in his wisdom, finds it necessary to place in confinement.

What had that mother done that she should be punished by the daily agony of hoping that her baby brood from starvation? What had the children done, that they should be punished by bitter want and finally by death?

Such things must be managed better by a society that calls itself civilized.

Building, especially home-building, immediately stimulates business in general. No other industry touches productively so many different industries. No other leads to such deep and enduring human satisfactions.

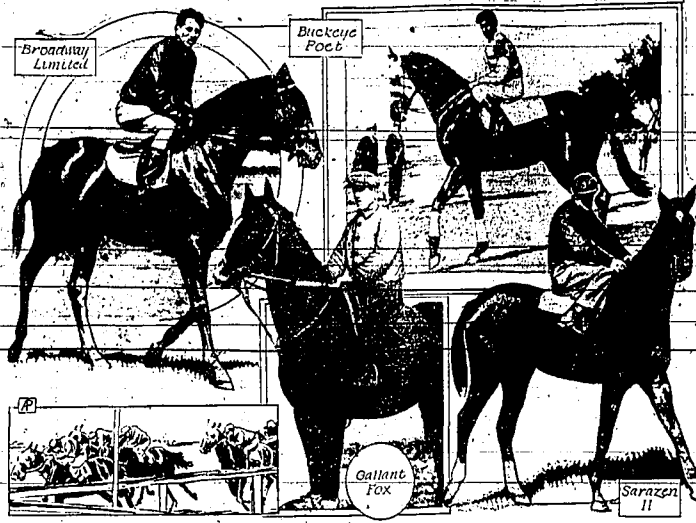

POSSIBILITY OF NO TARIFF BILL GETS SOLONS' ATTENTION

Republican And Democratic Leaders Ponder Over Prospects and Sink Deeper Into Morass of Troubles

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, May 14 — Prospects that after 10 months of work there may be no tariff bill were being seriously discussed today by both Republican and Democratic leaders.

The Republican conference on the measure worked themselves deeper into a morass of difficulties over procedure.

Party-shifflings conceded that whether a bill finally will be sent to the White House hung on the slenderest of a thread. The measure to give the conference a free hand to work out a compromise on the "flexible" provision.

Half a dozen conflicting viewpoints were expressed as to the next move. It was quite generally understood, however, that the senate Republican conference would ask the senate the latter part of the week to let them return the measure to conference with no less binding than the senate's legislative flexible provision.

The house, supported by President Hoover, has turned down the flexible clause withdrawing presidential rate changing power, and its conferees are unwilling to hold further conferences until the senate has authorized a "full and free conference."

Both Democratic and Republican independent groups conferred during the day on strategy plans but no definite course was determined. Further conferences will be held tomorrow.

Coalition Can Kill Bill

Republicans asserted the coalition, which wrote the debenture act legislative flexible provisions into the measure at the height of its power, could kill the bill by denying the conferees a free hand.

Democratic counter-attack with the claim that the Republicans were inclined to let the bill die. Some went so far as to predict that President Hoover would prefer the present law, instead of the pending measure.

Senator Smith, Republican, Utah, who shoulders the burden of the administration's fight, has reacted was plainly worried over the outlook. He said it was up to the senate whether a bill ultimately would emerge from the long tariff labors.

Senator Watson, Indiana, the Republican opinion, that a bill would be passed, but tempered this with a

statement that anything might happen. "If our motion to obtain a further conference without any time is lost, the bill will be dead," he said. Senator Harrison, Mississippi, one of the Democratic conferees, said the most difficult stage of the legislation has been reached and insisted that unless congress was given the legislative flexible provision there was little hope for a bill.

\$500,000 FIRE LEVELS GIANT GRAIN ELEVATOR

CHICAGO, May 14 (AP)—Fire destroyed a grain elevator of the Rosenbaum Grain corporation today, with damage estimated by L. F. Sayre, fire department spokesman, at \$500,000.

The elevator, grain mill recalled, was a relic of the famous battle between Joseph Leiter and Paul D. Armour in 1918, when Leiter cornered the grain market. Armour overtook Leiter with grain scooped at the Northwest gathering nearly 3,000,000 bushels. As this came into Chicago, he had the elevator, with its twin, nearby, built in 60 days—a record time. They were gutted by the Rosenbaum group several years ago when the Armour Grain corporation became involved in litigation.

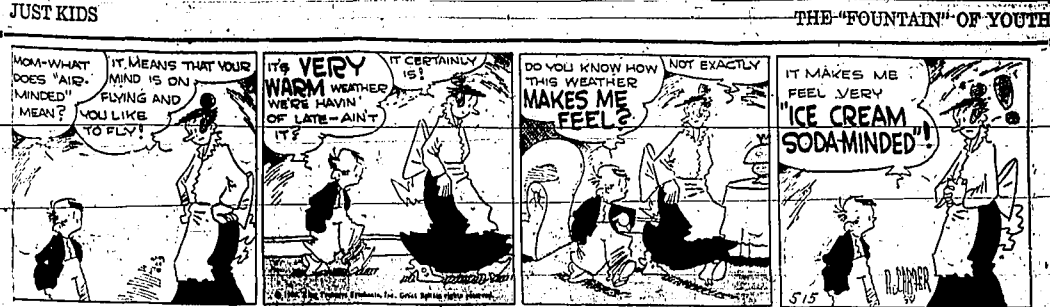

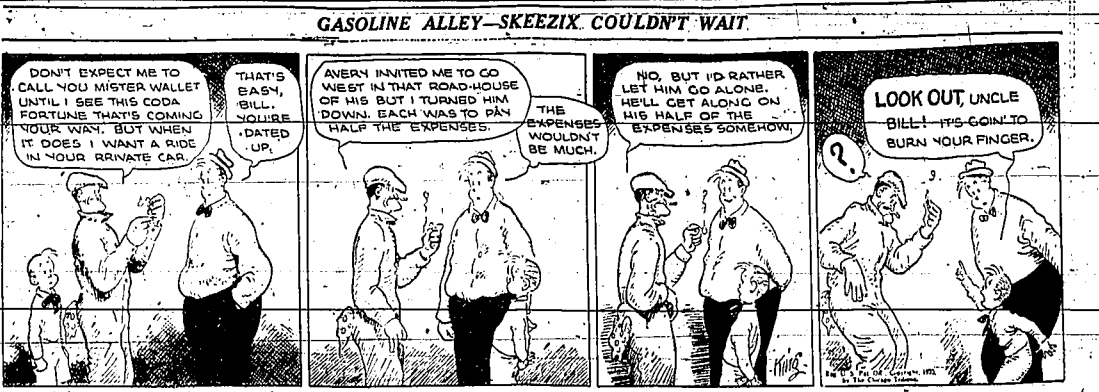
