### Jersey Field Man Sees Improvement in County Herds

J. H. Loughary Praises Dairy Stock Inspected on Annual Tour of Breeders' Association in South Idaho Region

The past three years have witnessed marked improvement in Jersey cattle herds of Twin Falls county, according to J. H. Loughary, Corvallis, Oregon, field man for the American Jersey Cattle Club.

With D. L. Fourt, Idaho extension dairymen, joined an annual Jersey tour to inspect the herds of the county's outstanding Jersey herds.

Nearly 50 Jersey breeders and other persons representing the dairy industry took part in the all-day tour with a stop at noon for luncheon at the Royal Hotel.

While comparing of dairy products is increasing steadily, production during last March declined 3 percent as compared with the corresponding period of the preceding year.

Mr. Fourt stated, pointing out factors that make the dairy industry encouraging one. With cheap feed, good pastures and favorable climatic conditions, he said, the industry in Idaho and the Twin Falls country is ideally situated.

He explained the plan of bull equipping which considerable interest has been expressed among West End dairymen.

As a lastmaster, H. S. Hale, Twin Falls county agent, introduced the other speakers on his own discussion of the extension division in relation to the dairy industry, indicating purpose to increase dairy herd improvement associations, placing more cows on test, and work out a disease control program and pasture improvement project.

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### BOULDER DAM JOB GOES TO IDAHOAN

Graduate of Moscow School Receives Appointment as Engineer on Huge Project

MOSCOW, May 14 (Special to The News)—A graduate of the University of Idaho has been selected to be the engineer in charge of the construction of the Boulder dam on the Colorado river, a project which promises to be one of the largest and most outstanding construction jobs ever undertaken by a government agency.

Selection of Walker R. Young, who received his degree in mining engineering at Idaho in the class of 1917, as the engineer in charge of the largest engineering project on this continent since the Panama canal, recently was announced by the Federal commission of Boulder dam.

Mr. Young, even before the completion of his college course, had had experience in surveying work with railroads. For two years immediately following graduation he pursued the study of a mining engineer.

From 1917 until 1921 Mr. Young was in charge of investigation work in connection with the development of the Colorado river. During this time he investigated dam sites in the vicinity of Boulder canyon, and, in addition, made designs and estimates for dams and structures at seven other locations on the Colorado river.

In 1924 he became engineer in charge of the investigations of proposed barriers at the mouth of the Sacramento and San Joaquin rivers, barriers to prevent incursions of salt water into the rivers.

Mr. Young has been a member of the American Society of Civil Engineers.

# Five Idaho High School Records Fall At Boise State Track And Field Meet

## Rupert Boy Wins Shot Put Honors And Bruins Score

Flier Boys Get 3 Points, Gooding Star Beats Best Time for Mile and Hagerman Athletes Get 5 Counts

(By The Associated Press) BOISE, May 16.—Five state records tumbled by the wayside as the picked battalion of Idaho high school athletes competed here today in the annual track and field tournament.

Although clouds threatened on all sides, public school field was a blaze of sunlight and the 100 athletes swept through the course in the most perfect conditions.

So close was the competition that several prizes had to be duplicated. Wallace and Idaho Falls tied for the high jump. Eugene, Kalbus, Eagle, won all that school's points to take home the prize for the 100 yard dash. He won first place in the 100 yard dash and the 200-yard dash.

For high point honors, however, Eugene shared with Gooding. Wallace, who won first place in the 120-yard high hurdles, led in the 220-yard high hurdles, each garnering 10 points.

The broken records included: The shot put, which Rupert, with a heave of 47 feet 1-1/2 inches against the old record of 46 feet 11-3/4 inches set by Ekholm, Sandpoint, in 1923.

The high jump which Wallace, Aberdeen, won with a leap of 3 feet 10-1/2 inches against the old record of 3 feet 9-1/2 inches set in 1924 by the pole vault, which by Remington, Nampa, with a hoist of 11 feet 11-3/4 inches compared with the old record of 11 feet 8-1/2 inches set in 1929.

The mile run, won by Saffie, Ashland, in 10 minutes 47 seconds against the old record of 10 minutes 47 seconds set by Clever, Caldwell, in 1924. Saffie led the field by more than a hundred yards.

The 100 yard dash was won by Gooding, in 1:22.3 compared with the old record of 1:23 of Conner, Coeur d'Alene, set in 1924. For high points Rupert followed Eagle with 10 points, Wallace and Lewiston with 8 points; Mullan, 7; Ashton, 5; Twin Falls, 4; Nampa, Hagerman, Gooding, Coeur d'Alene and Aberdeen 5 points each; Emmet and Caldwell 4 points each; 3; Fruitland, 2; Malad and Mountain View 1 point each.

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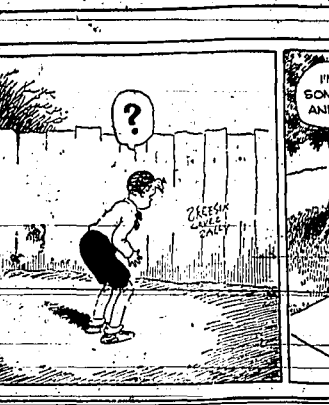

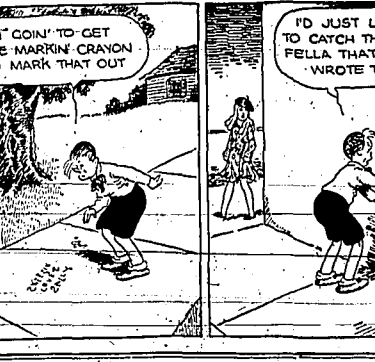

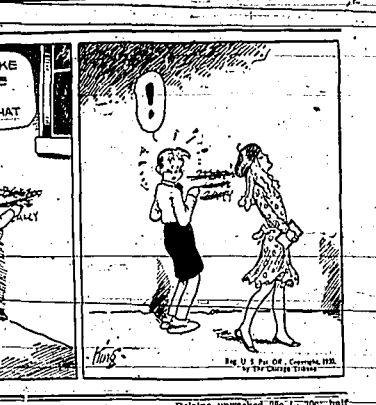
