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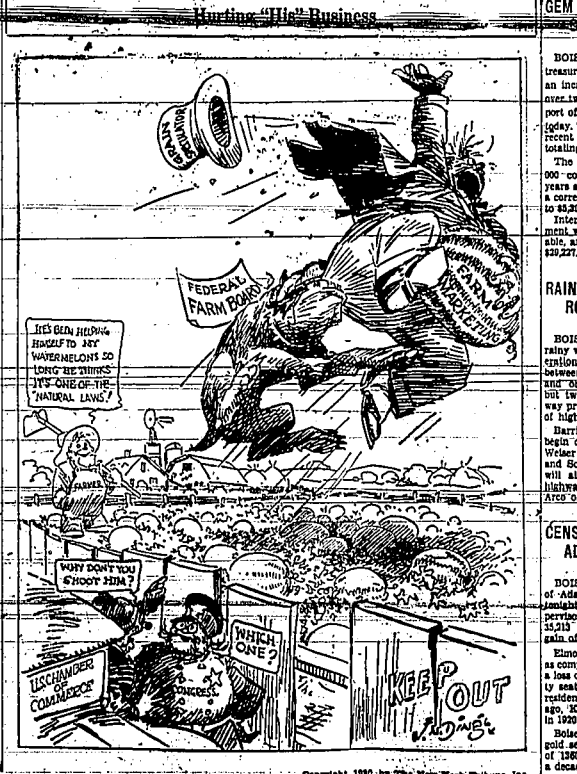

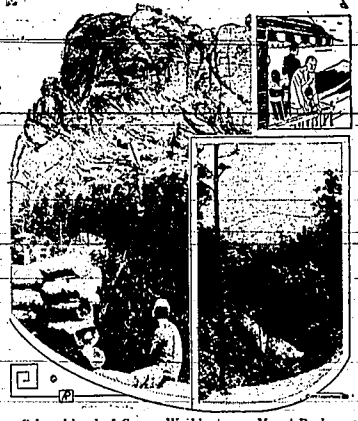

Nation's Caravan of Auto Vacationers Promises to Set New Record of Travel

Jaded City Dwellers Seek to Escape Bedlam of Noise and Heat in Forests and Rural Population Treks to World of Skyscrapers

WASHINGTON (AP)—America's caravan of motoring vacationers promises to set a new record of travel in 1930. More than 11,250,000 automobiles, as estimated by the American Automobile association, will carry 45,000,000 persons on tours in the United States and Canada.

The annual vacation shuffle will find jaded city dwellers seeking escape from their bedlam of noise and heat in forests and beside cool streams while country people will jaunt to the artificial world of skyscrapers and industrial plants.

New points of interest will be the Great Smoky mountain region of Tennessee and North Carolina, where the government proposes to protect an area nearly as large as Rhode Island as a national park, and Mount Rushmore in the Black Hills of South Dakota, where a 60-foot head of George Washington and two paragraphs of Calvin Coolidge's 50-word history of the United States will be unveiled July 4.

The national parks, which were visited last year by 889,045 automobiles, are expected to maintain annual increases in the number of visitors by being open to nearly 3,000,000 persons.

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Earl Sande, Jockey Of American Falls, Gallops To Fame On Gallant Fox Before 50,000 Fans At Classic Kentucky Derby

Preakness Victor Flashes to Fame On Field of Mud

Multitude—Cheers—Idahoan, As Veteran Rider Takes Command and Overcomes Gallant Knight and Ned O

By ALAN GOULD (Associated Press Sports Editor)
C HURCHILL DOWNS, LOUISVILLE, Ky., May 17.—The mud was so thick and every foot of the way, Earl Sande, American Falls, Idaho, and Gallant Fox proved an unbeatable combination today by galloping through the Kentucky derby in the first race in the running of the classic Kentucky derby. "Come on, Sande!" roared the mud-drenched crowd of 50,000 at the head of the field. At the end of the race on the back stretch and opened a good lead.

...Sande! That he should again, as Sande and Gallant Fox severed into the home stretch, defeating the closest contenders with mud.
And come on he did, with a finish so magnificently convincing as to leave not the slightest doubt that the highly favored combination outdistanced the field of crack three-year-olds.
Gallant Fox successfully fought off the early challenge of the Kentucky prize the crowd milled and back the last surging rushes of Gallant Knight, Crack Brigade and Ned O.

The heavily played favorite, bearing the colors of William Woodlawn, was the state champion of the Audubon farm. C. W. Foreman, O. C. Manning and W. Foreman were the owners. The horse was trained by a half-brother of Earl Sande, who was away fourth, the last going position. Crack Brigade and Ned O.

Dismal disappointment, Tanner, a dismal disappointment, finished eighth and for the first time in years, the highly regarded R. Bradley entries were nowhere.
Sande, if ever, in the history of the Kentucky derby, had a day of it and spontaneous outbursts of popular acclaim greeted a victor as he advanced to the post. He came back, the traditional wreath of red roses was draped around the colt's neck and the ear of the state champion of the American race, stepped out to be the covered gold trophy upon Williams' stand. The horse was the New York Jockey club and the owner.

Each and every racing history was made by this dramatic victory for thoroughbred class and superiority in the Kentucky derby. The third year winner, equaling the all-time record for this ancient classic—Gallant Fox, unbeaten as a three-year-old.
The race was a triumph in the rich classics, duplicating an accomplishment which has never been equaled by any other horse—Sir Barton in 1919. The black son of Sir Gallant III—Marquess—was the only horse to be champion of his class, beyond the slightest shadow of doubt.

Recall 1923 triumph
Sande rode his first race in 1923, and the noted Thoroughbred trainer, and repeated in 1923 with King George, the winner of the colors of Clifford A. Cochran. Several times since then, the great rider has been a champion of his class. He has come close but today made good of the honor and thereby equaled the record of the Murphy, who rode the great winner in 1884, 1890 and 1891. It was a dramatic comeback for the little horseman who since his last defeat by Gallant Knight, which furnished a surprise of the race by galloping through the field in the lead and 48.74 to show. The price on Ned O. to show was \$104.

...more than 4000 miles to see his first American champion of the Kentucky race named after him in common with 50,000 others, his Kentucky was shown in some time. 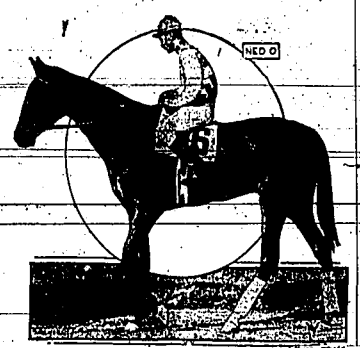

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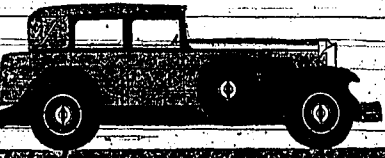

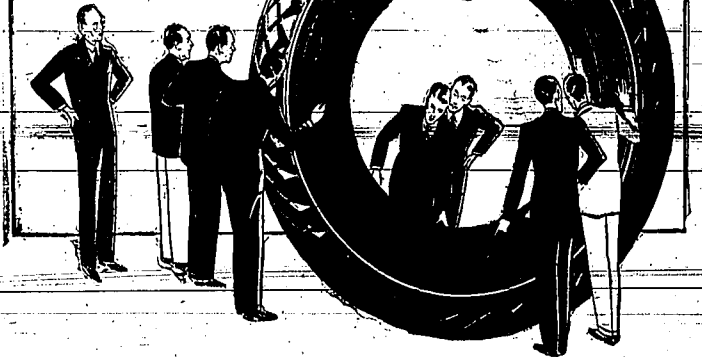

CHINESE STATUTES ENDANGER FOREIGN DOCTORS' PRACTICE

Proposed Abolishment of Consular Court Privilege Makes Physicians Liable In Case of Failure of Cure

By MORRIS J. HARRIS (Associated Press Correspondent) SHANGHAI, May 17 (AP)—Foreign doctors practicing in China may find themselves held accountable for failures of their patients if, as proposed, consular court privileges now enjoyed by foreigners are abolished.

Under old Chinese law, a doctor who fails to effect a cure is liable to punishment and the proposed changes in the extraterritorial system would place foreign physicians in peril of this provision.

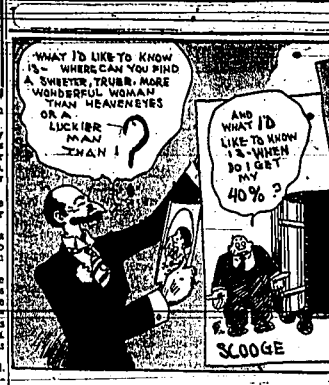

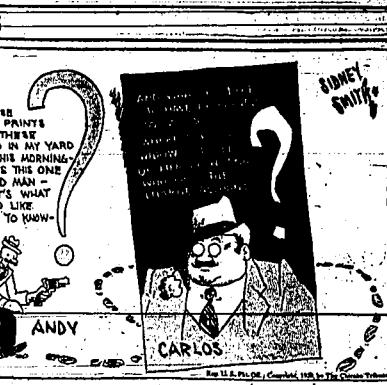
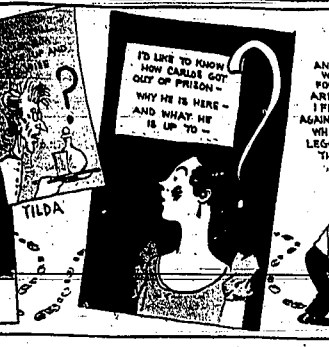

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CANAL BOARD ACTS TO CURTAIL WINTER WATER ON SECTION

Orders Cutting Off Run to 50,000 Acres For Period Of Four Months on Suggestion of Committee

Twin Falls Canal company directors voted yesterday to curtail delivery during the winter season of 1935-1936 to approximately 50,000 acres out of the total area under Twin Falls canal system.

The commission recommended this action on the basis of findings that "seepage conditions on the Twin Falls tract will approximate 50,000 acre feet of water in that portion of the system."

The seepage allowed extends from the Perrine canal on the east to Cedar Draw on the west, and from the Low line canal on the south to Snake river on the north.

In the city of Twin Falls, the water is not available in the evening, the city is not available in the order, since it receives its water direct from the Low line canal through a pipe line.

The commission's investigation indicated that of farms in this area 78.9 per cent are supplied with wells or cisterns of sufficient capacity; 17.8 per cent are not supplied, and 3 per cent have doubtful supplies.

Urges Continuation
Besides shutting water off of the designated area of Twin Falls, the commission further recommended continuation of canal company investigations to determine whether the winter flow increases the underground reservoir supply sufficiently to raise the water table on the project, and that winter flow over the project generally be reduced to a minimum.

Members of the commission are E. C. Davis, Castleford, chairman; Harry W. Woodhull, Twin Falls; R. E. Tompkins, Bluff; T. Dan Conner, Filer; W. A. Colner, Hamlet; J. Johnson, Burley; and R. E. Dobler, mayor of Twin Falls.

Cites Resolution
The stockholders' resolution declared in favor of shutting off winter water "when the same can be done as a feasible and practicable plan," and urged upon the fact finding commission in forming its conclusions and making its findings so that the running of water in the canals during the winter may be ended at the earliest practicable time, provided it be desired and can be accomplished.

Speaking of the action of the board Judge Bothwell said last evening: "It is the theory of the board that under the articles of incorporation and by laws the board of directors has the right to regulate the water and regulations for the operation of the canal system from year to year, having in mind the greatest good for the greatest number of stockholders through the fact finding committee, through resolution adopted by the stockholders at their annual meeting in January."

RAISING OF RABBITS THRIVING INDUSTRY

A growing business in the Twin Falls country is that of raising rabbits for market.

N. Bonwell, Curry, pioneer in the business, states that beginning three years ago with 400 rabbits, he has up to date over 1,000 worth in addition to building up a heavy increase in his stock.

In discussing the business in a general way recently Mr. Bonwell said, "I suppose the largest rabbit farm in this country is that of Ed Stahl, who has a large stock of rabbits. This man does an annual business amounting to \$300,000.00. Stahl is an one time farmer of a powder mill located near Holmes Park. During a period of dull business he turned to raising rabbits which he raised in a borrowed corn crib. In a very short time he found himself with a surplus and, he began advertising rabbits for sale in a nearby newspaper. Mr. Stahl says that his present investment of \$25,000 for newspaper advertising paid for itself \$80 worth of rabbits. Shortly after this experience he gave up his powder mill job and began devoting all his efforts to the raising of rabbits.

Stahl specializes in Ghinchilla rabbits. He imported his first stock from England and is regarded as a foremost authority on this breed in this country.

He also deals extensively in New Zealand rabbits. He sells around 70,000 rabbits a year, a little over 50,000 being for stock purposes, the balance being sold for meat. I have had a good many dealings with Mr. Stahl and have found him willing and anxious to encourage the industry in every way possible.

"I feel that the Twin Falls County Rabbit Breeders' association has accomplished a great deal since its organization and I believe that even greater progress will be made in the future. The rabbit business is a coming industry in and around Twin Falls."
