JURY HOLDS BUYER LIABLE UPON BOND
 W. C. Pond Wins Suit For Payment for Potatoes By C. L. DeLong Surety

Produce dealers licensed under Idaho law are liable on their bonds for payment of cash on delivery of products if they contract to do so, according to verdict returned by a jury in district court here last evening awarding \$180.70 to W. C. Pond, bulk produce dealer, from Carl L. DeLong, former Twin Falls produce dealer, and the United States Fidelity and Guaranty company, his surety for potatoes delivered by Pond to DeLong last December.

Creditor took share of DeLong's estate early this year. Frank L. DeLong, former Twin Falls attorney, appearing as counsel for DeLong's surety argued the produce dealer's license law was not intended to operate as between dealers, but for protection of growers. His motion for judgment on the grounds was overruled.

The jury arrived at its verdict after examination of records of business transactions between Pond and DeLong, introduced in evidence during two days trial, and a disallowed \$55 from Pond's original claim. The produce dealer's license law has not featured in litigation in courts of this district heretofore. In another suit in which evidence was received Monday evening, Frank Rack, bulk grower, claims \$1187 from W. C. Pond, Twin Falls, for alleged failure to pay cash for potatoes delivered January 1929. In that action, Frank T. Wyman, Boise, attorney for Pond's surety, has attacked validity of the dealer's license law on grounds that it invades constitutional right to contract. Pond is represented in both cases by J. H. Barnes, Twin Falls, attorney.
