RAINPROPS MINGLE WITH TEARS FROM EYES OF MOTHERS

Win Breaks Through Lead Sky for Solemn Moment As Gray-Ing Women-Kneel By Sons' Graves in France

(By The Associated Press) ROMANES-SOUS-MONT FAUCON, France, May 21—Spring rains mingled with the tears of American mothers today to freshen the graves of Yankee boys who fell in the Great War.

The mothers, more than 200 in number, reached the goal of their voyage from the United States this morning for the simple, solemn ceremony at the graves of their sons in the six vast military cemeteries wherein their sons lie buried.

With tears and prayers consecrated the resting places of the heroes elected to remain on the battlefields where they gave their lives.

Over nearly all of the cemeteries the sun broke briefly through a gray sky for the simple, solemn moment when the mothers, for the first time, kneel beside their boys.

The mothers were dressed in the best of their own making, and many wore the hats and coats which they had made for their sons in France.

As the mothers gathered at the cemetery entrance the sun came from behind the clouds and warmed them in its warmth.

The raindrops glistened on every grave and cross and the mothers, with their eyes filled with tears, looked on the graves of their sons.

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# Colonel McConnell Recalls Days Of "Second Idaho" On Border

## ADJUTANT GENERAL LAUGHS AT PAROLE DUTY OF REGIMENT

### Official of National Guard Tells About Outfit Taming Scorpions, Tarantulas And Many Rattlesnakes

(By The Associated Press) BOISE, May 21.—It was in 1916 when the "Second Idaho" was on the border doing a bit of parole duty to keep the Mexicans from fighting their battles on American territory.

Colonel McConnel, of the national guard, continues to get a laugh out of the boys in the outfit, named a hill full of rattlesnakes, tarantulas and scorpions to make themselves a safe but not so sane camp.

The regiment moved into camp on a high plain near Nogales, Arizona. It was the most scorpionish camp in the world. The outfit was studded with bulldozers all the way from the size of an egg to hanks of half a ton. The regiment, under the command of Colonel McConnel, was the surprise and chagrin of the officers to find that every rock he touched concealed a scorpion, a rattlesnake, principally the big Mexican diamond rattler. The outfit was unable to rise to the dignity of shading a snake, did they begin to asperg tarantulas and scorpions, and setting low, scattered campfires.

No soldiers blither. But the work progressed. Gradually the rocks began to disappear from the camp site and with them the snakes and smaller parasites. Not a soldier was bitten in the scuffle but the postal authorities and visiting officers and soldiers were driven to distraction.

The Idaho troops, leaving that they seal in removing the rocks and snakes would exterminate the pest, at least from that vicinity, took to capturing them for souvenirs. At no time, said Colonel McConnel, has the American soldier's best toward collecting souvenirs had such full and unreserved approval. Every soldier had a row of bottles along the floor of his tent, each containing a tarantula or scorpion and several containing two or three.

So proud were they of their souvenirs that they shipped them home in pounds and cartons. So great were the arguments that the postofficers began an investigation. When they discovered the nature of the packages being sent home they put a ban on the business. To load some poor small carrier with a cargo of tarantulas, scorpions and occasionally a rattlesnake, all done up in paper in a shoe box, was too much.

But such regulations did not hinder the soldiers. With snakes on their hands which they could not send to admiring folks back home, they took to stashing them out at the corners of their tents.

It was no uncommon sight to see two or three big rattlesnakes tied to the corners of the tent of the soldier. The big gray and black rattlers would be coiled around a tent peg, basking in the sun, tethered to a tent rope by a slender bit of light packing twine or a strand of thread—whatever the soldier had.

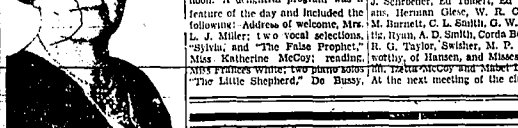

#### Auto Turns Over in Loose Gravel and Eight Students of Class Badly Hurt

Those in the car were Donovan Candauz, driving; Martin Blazer, Ralph Donaldson, John Norby, Jane LaFue, Neta Dalloilo, Florence Whelan and Lela Sims.

All were badly injured except young Blazer, who escaped with bruises and scratches. The party was riding in George P. Blazer's new car.

Ralph Donaldson was hurt the worst having his right leg fractured in two places below the knee; Neta Dalloilo received deep gashes on both knees and "hair" fracture was injured about the head and shoulders. 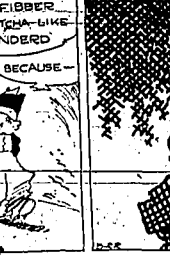

#### Cassia County Groups View Large Select Showing of All Dairy Breeds at Show

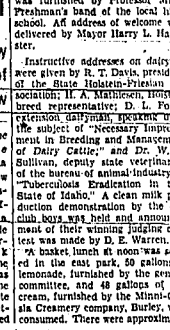
