HOUSE JOINS WITH SENATE IN WAR ON NEW DIAL PHONES

Local Officials of Company Responsible for Installation Become Speechless Following New Outbreak

WASHINGTON, May 22 (AP)—Local telephone company officials were especially thoughtful in face of a congressional outbreak against the machine age as typified by dial telephones. A senatorial dike demanding that 460 of the dial telephones be replaced by the old-fashioned kind in the capitol was regarded so favorably by some members of the house that Representative A. B. Clegg, North Carolina, introduced a resolution to instruct the house representative to have the records of all dial telephones removed from house offices, also.

Officials of the Chesapeake and Potomac Telephone company tonight declined to comment. Senator Glass, Virginia, led the revolt in the senate, complaining against being "an employee of the telephone company without compensation."

Directs Removal The senate adopted its resolution directing the sergeant-at-arms to order the telephone company to remove the telephones which are more difficult to operate, and require "special attention" in order to enjoy the benefits of telephone service.

The Pennsylvania assailed the settlement as likely to be construed in Europe as "American endorsement of the Young plan, to which this nation is not a party."

Telephone company officials expressed hope while the revolt was confined to the senate that things would be done in the senate, and when it was recalled that President Hoover had announced that "nothing to be done."

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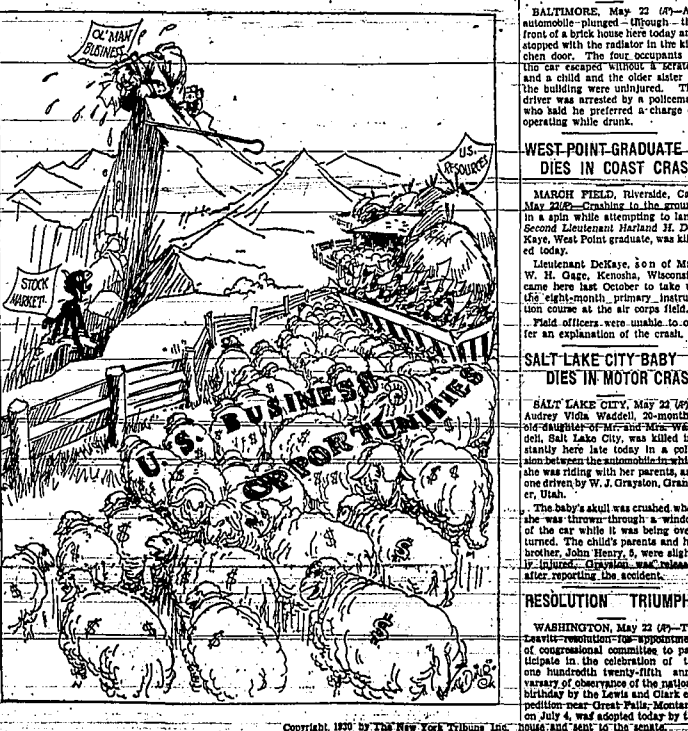
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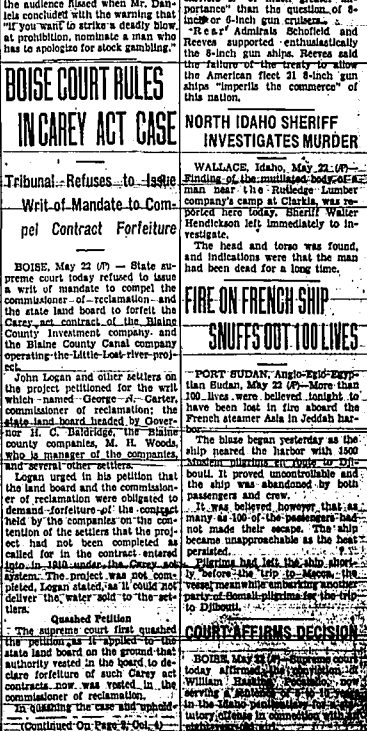

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Television Rises With Adaption To Theatrical Presentation

PIONEER PRODUCTS ULTIMATE USE IN MODERN WARFARE

Dr. E. F. W. Alexanderson, In Address Before Party Of Scientists, Details Possibilities of Future

SCHENECTADY, May 22.—Radio today is only a beginning of the step toward today with its adaptation to theatrical presentation. Tonight, Dr. E. F. W. Alexanderson, pioneer in television—researcher in address before a party of scientists and engineers, respondents, made the expectation of its ultimate development and its practical application to warfare.

Less than six months ago the projection of television images was confined to a screen 14 inches across. Today a screen of 50 inches was used. In addition, the radio movie was operated synchronously with a radio of the same size and in the theatre where the demonstration was held, witnessed the first radio-television and theatrical performance in the world.

The first view was given before a number of the orchestra in the theatre and was repeated at the regular matinee and evening public performances.

Stunts include music "Some of the stunts included music, the orchestra in the theatre led by a conductor standing in front of a television camera, a mile away, who whistled his music for the benefit of his audience, by telephone to their renditions; comedy sketches in which members of the team on the stage and the other in the television laboratory at the General Electric company location and vocal theatrical instrumental selections, with the image of the articles on the screen and the tones being also heard through the medium of a public address system.

The images were produced with wonderful fidelity, with all the shadows and shades of the features of the performers showing on the screen with nearly the same color as in motion picture performance. In fact, the demonstration resembled the reproduction of the images on the screen was limited to the front and rear of the bodies of the performers.

Tonight, in prospecting the ultimate application of radio-television, Dr. Alexanderson said that the engineer or inventor who conceives the future continues himself to the next 5 to 20 years.

"The possibilities for new inventions in this art of television are inspiring," he said, "and when you can put an electric eye wherever you wish and you can see through it, what a new world there opens. An airplane with a new reporter will fly to see whether it is in sight, or whether it will be with him, seeing what he sees and yet the audience will be perfectly safe and comfortable."

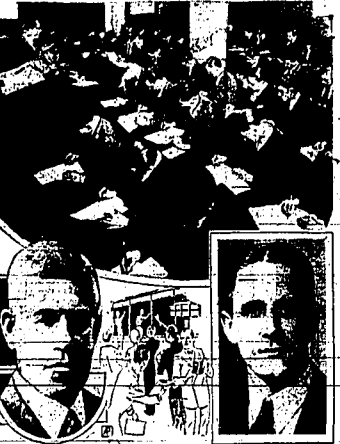
Pages in New York Stock Exchange Study and Gain Riches

SCHOOL AIDS BOYS TO SERVE TRADERS ON STOCK MARKET

100 Members of Wall Street Financial Bureau Attribute Riches to Early Training

2300 Youths Labor on Floor of Gotham Mart

Robert Danks, Furnishes Example of Climb of Messengers to Fame in Finances



(By The Associated Press) NEW YORK, May 22.—It is no mere coincidence that nearly 100 members of the New York stock exchange sprang from the ranks of the blue-uniformed pages who serve the traders on the floor.

Neither is it a case of golden apple falling into their laps, as some boys face the future with poision and wealth assured as partners in Wall Street brokerage houses. Dr. D. E. Schultz will assure you of that.

Probably the formula differed in some respects in each case, but character, personal ambition, training and opportunity played their part, in the opinion of Dr. Schultz, director of the educational institute of the exchange.

When a boy is admitted to the ranks of 2300 employees of the stock exchange he is sent to the institute for training.

His training grounds him in the fundamentals of his job, and there are also voluntary courses in the work of the stock exchange, economic and financial.

An example of a messenger's rise from the ranks is that of Robert Danks, now a member of the exchange and partner in a brokerage house.

Danks is 28. He was forced to leave high school at 16 to support a widowed mother. Just 10 years ago he became a stock messenger, completing his high school education at night and then continuing at city college.

Dr. Schultz said the institute, while conceived as a training school for employees of the exchange, is also directed to the efficiency of the financial district.

Once ambitious boys seeking a start in Wall Street started only as a last resort to the stock exchange. "Now we get the cream," Dr. Schultz said. "We take no one less than a high school education."

Conventions in San Francisco and Berlin Prepare to "Join" by Radio

NEW YORK, May 22 (AP)—Conventions in Berlin and San Francisco will hold a "joint session" by radio June 18.

For half an hour they will be linked across two continents and across seas that even the airplane cannot carry over.

It will be 7:00 P. M. in Berlin and noon in San Francisco when the "World Power conference" in the former city and the "World Electric Light convention" in the latter city will join.

Matthew S. Olson, President of the Light association, will introduce Owen D. Young, speaking in San Francisco. Dr. Oskar von Miller will reply for the World Power conference. Marconi has been invited to talk from the Berlin gathering.

Neither the wireless to both continents will be cut in at Liverpool, Park New Jersey where Thomas A. Edison will speak to both audiences simultaneously.

The power conference meets but once in six years, this being the second gathering. The first was in London, the next will be in the United States. Nearly every civilized nation is expected to be represented at Berlin.

On each delegate's desk will be a microphone in which he may later speak in any one of three languages, switching as he chooses to English, French or German.

The speakers will be translated as delivered.

SAVINGS ACCOUNTS REGAIN POPULARITY SINCE MARCH SLUMP

ELECTRICAL POWER OUTPUT OF NATION DOUBLES IN DECADE

Industry Registers Growth Of 129 Per Cent and Reflects Industrial Activity In Post War Period

(By The Associated Press)

NEW YORK, May 22—A phenomenal increase of 129 per cent in the electrical power production of the nation was written in the decade which closed with the end of 1929.

In the post war period between 1920 and the present the production of electrical power has risen from 43,859,000 kilowatt hours to 97,283,000,000, according to figures of the Federal Power Commission.

Generally regarded as mirroring the industrial activity of the nation, the electrical power rose 47 per cent in 1929 over the previous year. Total production in 1928 was 87,859,000 kilowatt hours.

New York was the greatest producer of electrical power, with 14,450,000 kilowatt hours and California was next with 8,850,000,000.

LINCOLN'S LETTERS BRING HIGH PRICES

Auctions of Presidents' Manuscripts in Chicago Show Great Increase in Value

CHICAGO, May 22 (AP)—The steadily increasing value of Lincoln letters and autographs as well as a sharp general interest in penning of other American presidents was an evidence at Chicago's first auction of books and manuscripts in a quarter of a century.

A one-page letter, written at Springfield June 3, 1849, and signed with the well known "A. Lincoln," was bid up to \$300. Another Lincoln letter brought \$400.

A Coolidge typed and signed letter dated 1923 brought \$21. An autographed copy of a Coolidge book realized the same, while a signed photograph went for \$10.

Two Washington letters, one included at Valley Forge and the other discussing the constitution, went for \$200 each. Incidentally Parson Weems's Life of Washington, containing the original version of the famous "tree story," was disposed of for \$21.

A one-page Harding letter, sent from the White House in 1921, sold for \$30; a Taft signature brought \$15, while Roosevelt autographs ranged from \$12 to \$22.

Here are other presidential letters or autographs, with their sale prices: Wilson, 1912, \$10; Cleveland, 1862, \$21; Fillmore, 1849, \$21; Jackson, 1821, \$27; Van Buren, 1824, \$23; an Jefferson, 1781, \$22.

JAPAN ASSESS BIG INHERITANCE LEVY

Estate of Baron Kichizayemon Sumitomo Pays Tax of \$11,250,000 at High Rate

TOKYO, May 22 (AP)—A record inheritance tax of 25,500,000 yen equivalent to about \$11,250,000 has been assessed against the estate of Baron Kichizayemon Sumitomo, which passed to his son of the same name three years ago. The heir has arranged to pay in five annual installments.

It took the tax officials three days to appraise the widespread financial and industrial holdings of the house of Sumitomo, which ranks third among the great business families of Japan, next to the Mitai and Iwasaki.

The Sumitomo fortune includes a big high trading company, cement mills and coal and copper mines. The value of the entire estate was fixed at \$125,000,000.

The tax rate was 9 per cent at time of death. It has since been raised to 12 per cent.

AIR PASSENGERS GET ACCIDENT INSURANCE

SEATTLE, May 22 (AP)—Airway travelers on the Chicago-San Francisco and Seattle-Los Angeles lines may now get accident insurance as well as the same as travelers on railroad and bus routes.

An insurance company, which specializes in travel, traveler insurance, has agreed to furnish a \$5000 policy, good for 24 hours, for \$2.

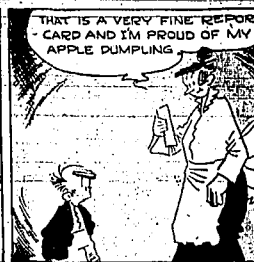
DAHESTAN MEN PLAN TO DISCARD DAGGERS

COLLEGE USES RADIUM FOR NEW PLANT TYPES

AMES, Iowa, May 22 (AP)—Experiments at the Iowa state college genetics department here aim at the creation of new types of plants by the use of radium.

Dr. E. W. Lindstrum, head of the department, has borrowed \$2500 worth of radium to make the tests. The radium is imbedded in small needles.

He hopes, he says, to produce some new permanent types in tomatoes, which are being studied, to discover some of the unknown genetic characters and to establish new linkage groups among the chromosomes in the cells of the tomato and other plants.

BERLIN, May 22—What many a tenant yodel in Berlin thinks is drunken jodeling in the streets is only the nightly yodel-hooping of apartment dwellers locked out after 8 P. M.

Promptly at 8 o'clock every evening and sometimes at 7:59, the porters who watch over the entrances of the city's thousands of apartment houses lock up and go to bed or fare forth in search of relaxation. After that no one can enter without keys.

Big Cluster of Keys
For tenants of regular habits this is simple enough. It means merely carrying a large cluster of keys. The big key, which is only a trifle smaller than the symbolic freedom-of-the-city keys used by civic welcoming committees in the United States, unlocks the big front doors of the building. Two turns in the lower keyhole and one in the upper, in the customary combination. The next key is to the elevator door. After unlocking this and discovering that the lift is out of order one begins climbing the stairs, meanwhile rattling out the third and fourth keys for the apartment door.

Key-number 3 usually unlocks the night-latch with two turns in the lower hole while the fourth, inserted in the upper keyhole, opens the door. Often, however, there is a fifth key for the operation of a brick-alder bar which fits into sockets at the top and bottom of the door.

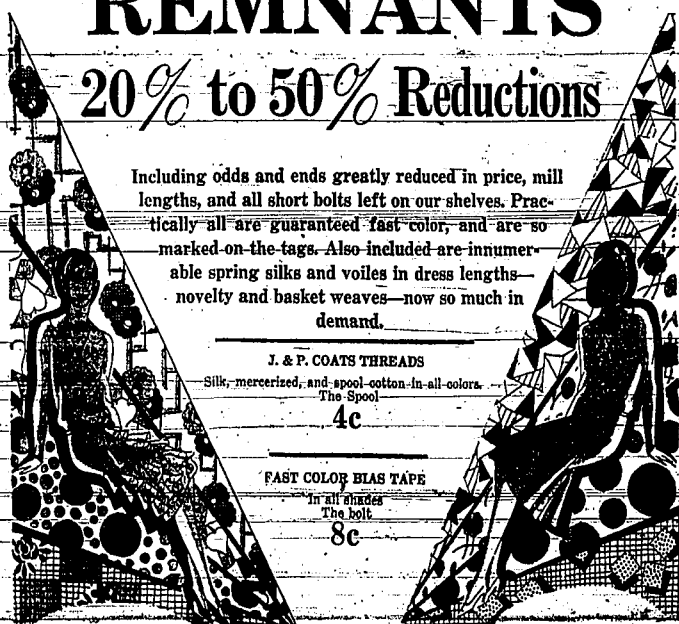

GOVERNMENT PLANS TO EXTEND AIRWAYS

Millions of Dollars To Be Spent in Program of Improvements and Lighting

WASHINGTON, May 22 (AP)—Millions will be spent by the federal government to extend civil airways during the fiscal year beginning July 1.

A program involving expenditure of \$194,000 will include lighting of 300 miles of airways and installation of routes for day flying over nearly 900 miles.

Weather information to pilots in additional airways, radio stations and 33 radio-range stations will be constructed.

Lighting The additional lighting will put into operation 17,000 miles of airways equipped with night lights and complete a southern transcontinental route between New York, Chicago, St. Paul, Denver, San Diego, and Los Angeles.

A lighted airway also will be installed between Memphis, Tenn., and Louisville, Ky. An additional airport to the east will be provided by a St. Louis, Mo., dike, Columbia, Pittsburgh, Harrisburg, Philadelphia, and New York.

A cut-off route between Richmond and Jacksonville will provide a lighted airway from Boston to Florida to connect with South American lines.

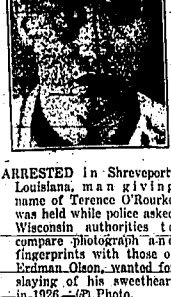

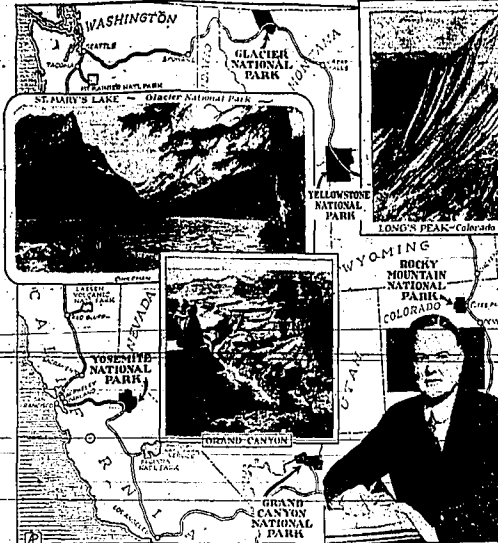

Mulch Paper Stimulates Growth Of Plants and Controls Weeds

By FRANK L. WELLER (Associated Press Farm Editor) WASHINGTON, May 23—A little understood farm practice in this country, the use of paper mulch to stimulate plant growth, has found a definite place in American agriculture after 6 years of experimentation.

Dr. L. H. Flint, physiologist who conducted the work for the department of agriculture, says that the practical test with a view to economical utilization of paper mulch is now well under way, although the knowledge of the methods of obtaining maximum benefit from the different conditions is far from complete.

Paper mulch was used last year on more than 5000 acres. It had been used on but 500 acres in 1928. Dr. Flint estimates the cost of paper at about 65¢ an acre when the usual practice is followed in the production of annual crops.

ITALY BOASTS SAFETY IN PLANE OPERATIONS

ROME, May 23 (AP)—Only one passenger has been lost during the four years of Italian civil aviation operation, says the report of the minister of aviation.

During this period the length of routes in operation has increased three and a half times, the total distance flown five and a half times, and the number of passengers carried five times.

The amount of mail carried has multiplied 40 times, and the weight of baggage and freight 11 times.

There are 18 civil transport lines in operation covering practically the whole of Italy. Passenger rates now compare favorably with railroad and steamship lines.

"No CONTROL"

AMERICA has a sense of humor—and thank heaven for it.

Otherwise radio's newest "gag," the so-called "tone control," might be taken seriously, and somebody might try and start a law against it.

The pitcher may "control" the curves on a baseball. An automobile race may "control" the speed of his car, and a golfer may "control" the length of his drive.

But when it comes to "controlling" the musical notes received by a radio set, as one of the Two Black Crow's very aptly remarked to the other, "you can't do that."

When John McCormack broadcasts a tenor note, no "tone control" will change it to bass. When Joseph Hoffmann plays a treble on the piano, it will stay treble despite all the "tone controls" on earth. If you want to select some other tones, they have to be "selected" from some other station.

There are those, however, who would actually have you believe that merely by manipulating a so-called "tone control," you can bring out bass notes and, meantime, stick the treble notes into a convenient pigeonhole. 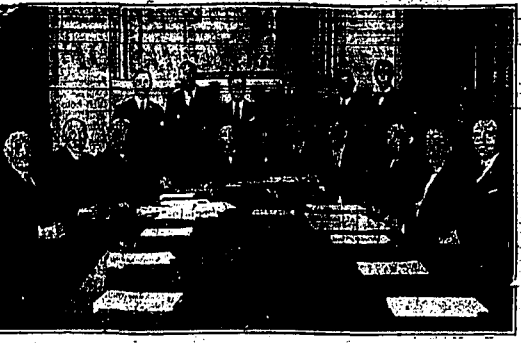

AVIATION LOOKS TO NON-STOP JOURNEY TO ENCIRCLE GLOBE

Arcotic Flyer, at 41 Years of Age, Still Young Enough to Seek New Fields

PROBLEM OF FINANCES VEXES FRIEND OF HERO

Trip of Graf Zeppelin and St. Louis Robin Refueling Tests Point to Undertaking

(By The Associated Press.)

NEW YORK, May 22.—"What will Byrd do next?"

That is a question in the minds of pilots and scientists as the explorer makes his way back toward New York from the Antarctic.

At 41, the rear admiral already has flown across the Atlantic and over both the North and South Poles. He is young enough to look for still more to conquer.

A non-stop refueling flight around the world looms as the next great accomplishment for aviation.

Byrd has taken long flights since Lindbergh came down at Le Bourget in 1927. Kingsford-Smith has flown to Australia, and the "Lone Eagle" has circled South America.

The Graf Zeppelin, has flown around the world in 21 days with four stops.

Byrd will be the first to do it non-stop.

George Palmer Putnam, a close friend of Byrd, declares such a flight is both possible and practical though he is non-committal as to whether Byrd might undertake it.

The chief difficulty in a non-stop round-the-world flight, says Mr. Putnam, would be the coast.

The Graf Zeppelin, during its last summer, Dale Jackson and Forrest O'Brien, piloting the St. Louis Robin, started in the air more than 17 days to set the world's record for refueled endurance flying.

A tri-motored amphibian plane, carrying two pilots, navigator and radio operator, could be the best for the purpose, Mr. Putnam believes. Refueling ships could meet the plane at designated points and load it with additional gasoline without halting the progress of the flight, provided weather at the refueling points was good.

The best route, according to Mr. Putnam, would be by way of Newfoundland, Greece and Iceland to London, across Europe to Constantinople, Persia and India, then up the Chinese coast to Japan and Siberia, across to Alaska, and so back to the United States.

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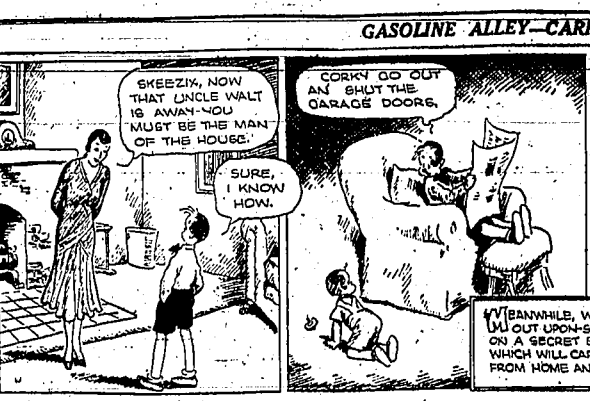

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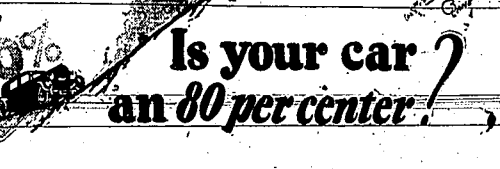
