KELLY QUILTS POST AS HEAD OF IDAHO STATE UNIVERSITY

Keen Disappointment Over Inability to Interest Board of Regents in Administrative Policy Causes Action

Boise, May 23 (AP)—The resignation of Kelly as president of the University of Idaho to members of the board of education, it was learned here today. He requested that the resignation take effect not later than September 1.

His resignation, dated May 17, was made public on the eve of a faculty meeting he called at his home in his letter of resignation, he would give the reasons for his resignation.

After prolonged deliberation I can see little prospect of effective service here. I therefore tender my resignation as president of the University of Idaho and of the southern branch of the university, effective as early as possible but no later than September 1, 1930.

Members of the faculty of the university, with few exceptions, are in hearty accord and cooperatively throughout these two years. The student body has responded in a most commendable manner to the administration of the university.

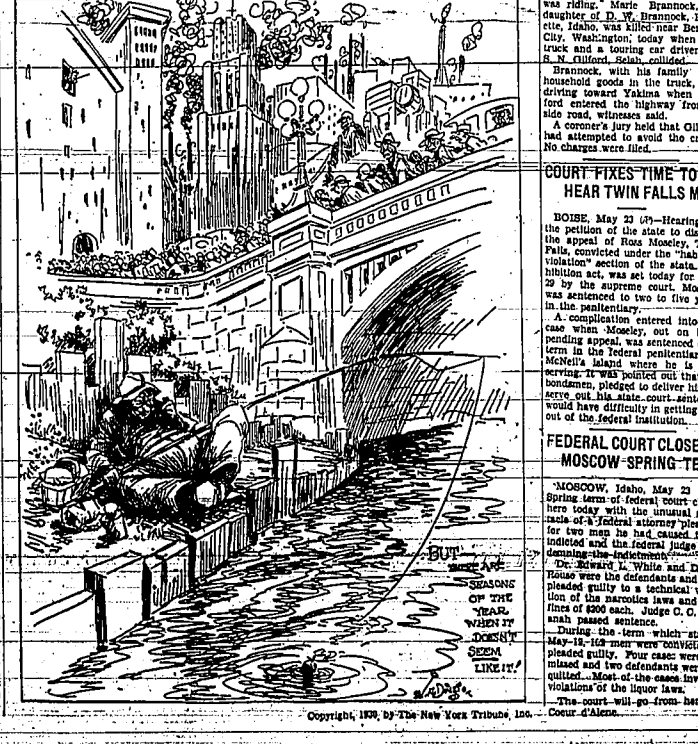

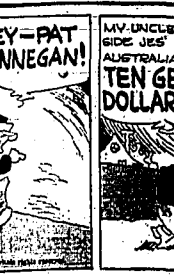

Simpson Serves Notice Of Intention To Set Century Record

Ohio State Star Flashes Through Downpour at 9.7

Great Sprinter Expects to Establish World's Best Time and Make it Stand Without Reservations

CINCINNATI, May 23—Ohio State's great sprint star, Simpson, served warning today that he intends to establish a new world's record for the 100-yard dash tomorrow and make it stand up without reservation.

The Ohio comet, competing in the preliminaries of the Western conference outdoor track and field championship at this season record of the century in 9.7.

Simpson threw his starting blocks which caused the American Amateur Athletic Federation to rule out his performance of 0.4 seconds, as a world's mark. The world's record will not use the blocks in the finals tomorrow when he races Eddie Tolan, University of Michigan Negro sprinter, whose record of 9.5 seconds established in the Big 10 track a year ago, was recognized by the federation as the world's record for the century.

Tolan had no trouble in winning his qualifying heat today in 10.8, but both Tolan and Simpson also won their preliminary heats in the 200-yard dash. Simpson again made the best time, finishing with world record performance when he turned in 21.2 seconds flat for the furlong. Tolan, who came along at the finish, was a second in 21.8 seconds.

American and British were "showered" as favorites to win the best time, finishing with world record performances in the preliminaries.

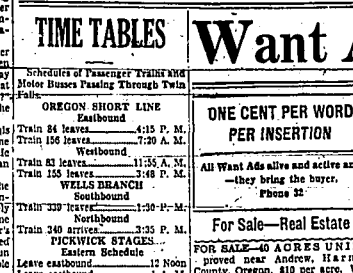

Masterson, Moscow, dean of the college of far, university of Idaho, to the music of the band and the various announcements and talks constituting the program.

High ideals and usefulness alone can bring the two things which every person desires, Dr. Masterson told the class in developing this idea, the speaker painted a word picture of the message that he wished to convey to the class, the flight of the eagle, the note of the song bird, the grass in its humbleness, and the mountain peaks in their stability, as indicating the infinite harmony intended by the Creator.

GIPSON WARNS OWNERS TO SPRAY APPLE TREES

Warning was issued yesterday by Edgar V. Gipson, district horticultural inspector, that codling moths are flying again and that it is time to spray apple and pear trees.

Mrs. Gipson says that rains and cool weather delayed emergence of moths, which are now appearing. He added:

"However, growers are warned that the apple tree is being rapidly and a warm spell would cause a heavy defeat of eggs, as well as the killing of eggs already laid. To guard against this an application of six pounds of lead arsenate and two and a half gallons of oil emulsion to each 2000 gallon tank is recommended, this application to be finished the 25th of May in the warm canyon orchards and June 4 for the project as a whole."

Growers are urged to take plenty of time and use lots of material as the rainy weather at calyx spraying time makes efficient spraying, if possible, many growers not being able to complete that spray, making it doubly necessary for the best crop for this time. All efforts should be made this year, as in the past two years, to eliminate the first brood and this can only be accomplished by efficient spraying at the proper time and with the right materials.
