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FIVE MEN PERISH IN OKLAHOMA CITY AUDITORIUM FIRE

Firemen and 50 Prisoners Recover Bodies of Victims in Blaze Causing \$300,000 Property Loss

(By The Associated Press) OKLAHOMA CITY, May 27.—Trapped by falling walls of the Coliseum, huge auditorium in the stockyards district of Oklahoma City, at least five men perished today in a fire that destroyed the building, with an estimated loss of \$300,000.

Four bodies had been recovered early tonight and firemen and 50 captives were digging the still smoldering debris for bodies of other persons who were reported to have been trapped as they escaped in new automobiles stored in the Coliseum annex.

The dead: A. (DICK) MASON, 29, city fireman; DAVE MEISER, 31, packing plant employee; CLAYTON SMITH, 24, used car salesman; THOMAS SMITH, 29. An unidentified Negro was found.

Tons of debris lodged between workmen and partly erect walls where additional bodies may be found. Of seven men were reported by witnesses to have been trapped in the annex as they were attempting to pass automobiles out when the stage wall fell back into the annex. The Negro was believed to be one of these.

Approximately 150 new automobiles were stored in the annex at the building and volunteer rescue workers rushed to get them out. Some of the cars had no batteries and had to be pushed. It was not believed that the danger had been as great as that at the time was confined to the main auditorium. Several officers stated that the difference between the two groups of men pushing cars was caught when the stage wall fell.

The auditorium, completed late in 1920, had housed most of the great gatherings since that time. The value of the destroyed building was placed at \$300,000 and that of the destroyed cars at \$100,000.

92 PERSONS LOSE LIVES IN BLOODY RIOTING IN INDIA

Riot and Tumult, or Aftermath of Chaos and Uncertainty, Reigns In Four Great Cities of Country

(By The Associated Press) BOMBAY, India, May 27.—Riot and tumult, or their aftermath of chaos and uncertainty, reigned today in four great cities of Britain's Indian possessions.

A rough computation of official figures showed that in Rangoon, Lucknow, Dacca and Bombay, 82 persons had been killed, 883 injured and hundreds arrested.

Over the week-end the riots have broken out of the bounds of the civil disobedience campaign. They over-shadowed the salt raids of Mahatma Gandhi's volunteers and made of "non-violence" a merely academic term.

Rangoon, the Burmese capital, not yet recovered from the earthquake of several weeks ago, tonight was a beleaguered city. Soldiers and police were striving desperately to maintain a hold, already precarious, over fighting crowds and lawless bands.

Forty-four bodies lie in the city mortuary, and many others are believed to have been carried away by friends in funerals. The official death toll stands at 69 and the injured list at 740, but these figures (Continued On Page 2, Col 4)

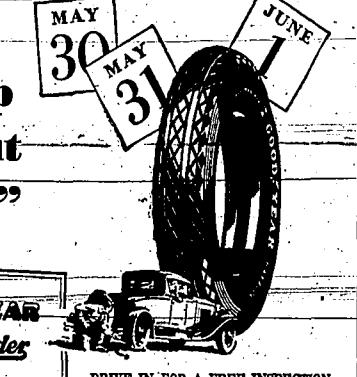

HOPKINS TAKES TIME TO ANSWER

Fugitive for Two Months Returns to Face Prosecution on Felony Charge

John H. Hopkins, 29, sometimes known also as J. L. Griswold, and wanted here since early last March for procuring an automobile with a worthless draft on an Iowa bank, was arraigned in probate court here yesterday on a felony charge of obtaining property under false pretenses.

He reserved his plea until today. He is represented by E. L. Rayborn, attorney.

Officers here have not permitted any extended conversation between Hopkins and his wife, Mrs. Gertrude Hopkins, who was brought here from Spokane to answer to a felony charge in connection with the procurement of the car here. She was released from custody when the charge was dismissed for lack of evidence, but has remained here since.

LIBRARIAN ANNOUNCES READING FOR PUPILS

With a view of inculcating the habit of reading through the furnishing of books to pupils which will be to them a source of pleasure, Miss Edith Dyers, assistant librarian of the Twin Falls public library, explained courses of summer reading, involving reports and credits, in the different rooms in the grade schools during the last week of school. Outlines for these reports are now ready at the desk in the library, it was announced yesterday.

In explanation of the method pursued the following statement was issued yesterday by Miss Jessie Fraser, librarian:

A minimum of six books has been set as the number for which a child may receive credit. To the children finishing the first and the second grades, lists have been distributed. Books read from this list, are to be checked by the librarian, at the desk. The children from the third, fourth, and fifth grades, have made booklets, during the art periods, at school, in which to keep a record of the books read.

"After these six books have been read, the child is asked to report at the library, and he will be given a button, as evidence of the fact that he has read the number suggested. The children who have been in the sixth grades, are to read the books from the Junior high school list. These books for the different grades, are arranged on separate shelves, and labelled, so that they are easily accessible."

He was admitted to \$500 bond to answer to the charges in district court, and in default of bond was remanded by Judge G. A. Bailey to the sheriff's custody.

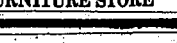
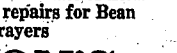
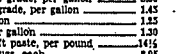
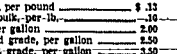
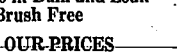
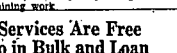
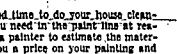
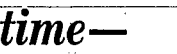
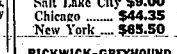
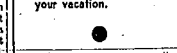
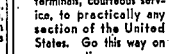
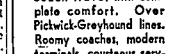
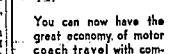
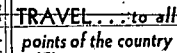
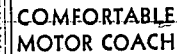
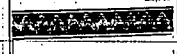

BURLEY MEN BUILD BOAT POWERED BY AEROPLANE MOTOR

BURLEY, May 27 (Special to The News)—A strange craft is being assembled in a local garage here, giving appearance to interested passers-by a sort of cross between a hydro-plane and a broad beam speed boat. A 12 horsepower aeroplane motor has been erected on a steel frame bolted to the deck of a boat hull 24 feet over all and 12 feet wide. The hull was built by Ritter brothers, and the final installation is under direction of H. E. Bloom and Roy Needles. The designers state that the curious craft will be hauled to the Country club docks in about a week, and it will be contended to the boom of Snake river, there to be made use of by boatmen, fishermen and wild-fowl hunters. The propeller is set amidships, 2000; where the mast of a sloop would be stepped. There is just sufficient clearance for the revolving propeller to miss the deck. The pilot's position is just aft the propeller, and he and any passengers that there might be are protected by a sheltered, windshield sloping from the foredeck. The boat will be drawn through the water in a manner similar to an aeroplane through the air, and it is believed by its designers that a tremendous speed can be attained.
