COMMUNAL RIOTING BREAKS OUT AGAIN IN CITIES OF INDIA

City Police Superintendent at Decca Receives Injury During Uprising Resulting in Arrest of Hindus

(By The Associated Press) BOMBAY, May 29—Communal rioting broke out again this morning at Decca, 160 miles from Calcutta, and a village near it.

The situation in the city itself, violently torn for several days by communal rioting between Hindus and Muslims, was reported improved today, but there were indications that trouble had spread to neighboring villages.

Reinforcements under the district magistrate and the superintendent of police got the situation under control.

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# Montanians Commemorate Coming of "Blackrobes" in Montana

## RED MEN OF IDAHO JOIN IN MEMORIAL DAY CELEBRATION

Washington, Oregon and Gem State Tribes Meet at a Scene of First Mission HUNDREDS OF TEEPEES DOT PLAINS IN WHITE

Gathering Commentates Establishment of Christian Faith Within Realm

(By The Associated Press) ST. IGNATIUS, Mont., May 29.—Christianity came to the Indians of Montana territory 75 years ago with the establishment of Jesuit mission in the shadow of the mighty range. Its anniversary is being celebrated this week-end with all the pomp of church ceremonial and pageantry of the red man.

All this week and members of neighboring tribes have been invading the land of the Flathead, not for battle or hunting for days, but to join in commemoration of the coming of the "blackrobes" with their message of peace.

Hundreds of teepees dot with white the green plain behind Montana's oldest active mission—one of the earliest in the Northwest. Into the land of the Flatheads have come their hereditary enemies, the Blackfeet, the Kallian, Upper and Lower Footmen—Pend-Oreille—Kallispellee—Piegan—Kootenai—Shawnee and Chinook, from the reservations of Oregon, Washington and Idaho, possibly 3000 in all.

It was somewhere between 1812 and 1820 that the Iroquois, Ignace LaSalle, came to the Flathead valley, led four of his tribesmen across the Rockies from Canada into the Flathead country.

Settling for "Blackrobes" In 1811, four Flatheads went to St. Ignace, near Chateaux, to see the priest. Their church authorities, who had been told that they were being deceived by a deceiver, had sent them before Father Peter J. DeBmet, resident of St. Ignace, Missouri, in the summer of 1810.

In 1814, with Father Adrian Florez, Father DeBmet and the first St. Ignace mission on the Pen Orelle river, about 60 miles below the present site of the town of Idaho. After 10 years the mission had moved to its present site.

Life on the mission was hard. The present mission presents many differences from the old. A fine brick church, capable of holding thousands of persons, was constructed in 1883 and lavishly decorated. The one-story grade mill has developed into a modern flour mill and a well equipped hospital building utilizes the frame work of the original chapel. Several small log dwellings and the ancient cemetery are the only things left of the original group.

The celebration takes on added significance at this time because it is quite probable that the "blackrobes" will not be repeated. The olden times are rapidly passing. The younger men are more inclined to display their feelings.

CINCINNATI, May 29 (AP)—The Rev. Hugh Thompson Herr, Pittsburgh, an eminent speaker of national reputation, was elected moderator of the annual conference of the Presbyterian church in the United States of America, opening here today.

Marked by a pre-convention campaign which at the last minute witnessed the withdrawal of the only fundamentalist candidate, the balloting of the voting members at the first business session of the one hundred forty-second assembly gave Dr. Herr a two-thirds majority over his only rival. The vote was Dr. Kerr 665, Dr. Master 303.

The fundamentalist candidate was Dr. Samuel G. Craig, Princeton, New Jersey. During the day the field had been narrowed down to these three men and when nominating speeches were called for late in the afternoon, Dr. Craig's opponents did not respond.

## LAW BANS LOW FLYING OVER EXPLOSIVE AREAS

WASHINGTON, May 29 (AP)—Aviators must fly at a minimum of 1000 feet over high explosive areas, under new law amendments to the air commerce regulations.

## BAPTISTS NOMINATE BEAVAN PRESIDENT

Guiding Destiny of New York Divinity School Becomes Executive of Denomination

CLEVELAND, May 29 (AP)—Dr. Albert W. Beavan, president of the Rochester, Colorado, divinity school, Rochester, N. Y., was nominated president of the Northern Baptist convention here tonight.

The election will be Saturday. Nomination has always been considered equivalent to election. The minority report against closer union with the Disciples of Christ was adopted by the convention here today by a vote of approximately four to one.

A realignment of the board of trustees of the University of Chicago, incidental to the plan to double the university's \$100,000,000 in assets, also was adopted by the Baptists.

In the present alignment the board consists of three fifths of Baptists and the remainder of other denominations. Under the new alignment three fifths of the board may be members of any Christian denomination, providing one denomination besides the Baptist is not in majority.

## TWIN FALLS JOINS NATION'S TRIBUTE TO HEROIC DEAD

Graves of 78 Veterans of American Wars to Be Decorated With Flowers in Memorial Observance

An unknown donor of an expensive floral wreath delivered to Twin Falls American Legion post each Memorial day for several years past, has again volunteered for the Memorial Day observance here, sending a floral offering to the World War veterans' organization here last evening.

The wreath bears no mark of identification except that of a Los Angeles florist. It is believed the offering is given by someone with a loved one resting in the cemetery here. It will be placed at the base of the War Mothers' memorial monument at the cemetery during the exercises today.

Seventy-eight veterans of American wars were slept again under the stars and stripes that fluttered over their graves in Twin Falls cemetery last evening.

Devoted women—mothers, wives, sisters and daughters of service men—worked "throughout" the day and until late last evening at a labor of love, assembling and fashioning into garlands a profusion of floral offerings that will be placed today on the veterans' graves.

Early this morning these flowers will be taken out to the cemetery to fulfill their destiny in an expression of love and admiration and respect. Early this morning, too, the flags through which marching units of veterans organizations and patriotic societies will pass in parade on their way to take part in Memorial day exercises at the cemetery.

Order of Exercises P. M. Swezey, Twin Falls city attorney and vice-president of the Memorial address at these exercises. Rev. Glen W. Huston of the Christian church will offer the invocation. E. N. Pettigrove, Hansen, one of Twin Falls county's state representatives and a member of Humboldt American Legion post, will read General Logan's order issued in 1865, summing up the duties of the Civil War veterans of the Republic to observe, as an annual day of memorial of their fallen comrades. Earl Munton, a past commander of Twin Falls American Legion post, will read Lincoln's Gettysburg address. Twin Falls municipal band will play a patriotic air at the beginning of the exercises and again in the afternoon. The Star Spangled Banner immediately before the guardsmen's file veterans in salute and the sounding of taps.

Venerable veterans of the Grand Army of the Republic, of whom there are perhaps not more than five or six in this community, will occupy the place of honor in the parade and at the exercises following it. Their banners, the tattered flag of Dan McCook post, Grand Army of the Republic, will be borne in the vanguard of the march with a color guard bearing muskets that were a part of the property of the elder veterans' organization.

In the march also there are to be displayed the colors of General Lawton—post of the United-Spanish-American veterans—and of Humboldt, Pierce and Twin Falls American Legion posts.

In Line of March Idaho national guard engineers of the Twin Falls unit, Company E, will form an escort for the Civil War veterans, and will precede them in the line of march. Following the men of the Grand Army will come the veterans of the Spanish war, and the veterans of the World war.

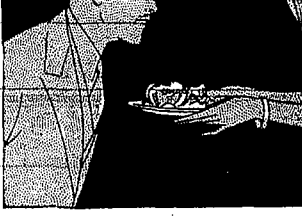

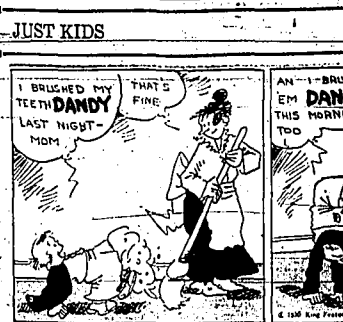

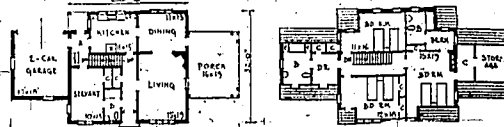

The average citizen looks askance at the vast trend toward gigantic combinations engaged in the production and handling of the necessities of life. He fears monopoly, the spoils of public utility, the power may not be misused to his own disadvantage. Such suspicion is fertile ground for political agitators. Therefore, when putting together an honestly conceived and economically sound merger, the promoters tell the public just what they are doing and why they are doing it. Show what economies are to be made through the principles of mass production, mass distribution, and lower costs.—There is no need for secrecy. Indeed there is great need for the fullest publicity that the vain hope of avoiding necessary restraints to fill the pockets of changing markets. All mergers conceived for these reasons—and there have been many of them—have failed or will fail. Last year during the wild speculative mania it was possible to sell at a profit a stock of a high price. This led to a number of unscrupulous mergers whose main purpose was to profit from the juggling of stocks. These were mergers for speculation rather than for operation, and the investor who was caught in them is likely now to be disgusted with the whole merger idea.

Aiding Weaker Companies Another type, while not necessarily unscrupulous, is unscrupulous in all considered, is a merger to help out some of the weaker companies which cannot stand on their own feet. Frequently the stronger companies drag down the weaker rather than the strong helping out the weak. Often times business men think they are getting a bargain when they buy the assets of an unscrupulous company at prices far below the apparent book value.
