SPEAKER CALLS ON PRESBYTERIANS TO UPHOLD "DRY" LAW

Dr. Mark Matthews, Seattle, Declares "Invisible Government" Working Against President Hoover's Policy

(By The Associated Press) CHICAGO, May 20.—An address on behalf of prohibition enforcement by President Hoover is shared by Dr. Mark Matthews, Seattle, before the one hundred and forty-second general assembly of the Presbyterian church in the United States at a rains in Chicago for the support of the amendment and for action on any attempt to modify it.

Dr. Matthews declared that the report of the national loyalty commission, which was unanimously approved today, "concluded upon the statement that the law is in fact being enforced in a constitutional and just manner."

HOOVER PONDERSON TOKYO AMBASSADOR

Name of Henry P. Fletcher Comes For Post in Japan

WASHINGTON, May 20 (AP)—Once again President Hoover is scanning the list of possible candidates for the post of ambassador to Tokyo, as special ambassador during the London naval conference, but is now en route to the United States to receive the appointment.

The name of Henry P. Fletcher, Green Castle, Pennsylvania, former ambassador to Chile, Belgium and Mexico, and one-time under-secretary of state, has again come to the fore as a candidate for the Tokyo post.

Fletcher, because of his intimate knowledge of South American affairs, was chosen by Mr. Hoover when he was president-elect to accompany him on his tour of the Americas and foreign states of residence.

When he resigned as ambassador to Chile, he was appointed to London as special ambassador to the League of Nations.

Among those available in the cabinet service only two are prominent as possible candidates. These are Joseph C. Grew, New Hampshire, now ambassador to Turkey, and Hugh R. Wilson, Illinois, minister to Switzerland.

Penann Aspirations of Nine Suffer Blow When Rejah Fractures Left Ankle in Sliding to Third Base

(By The Associated Press) CHICAGO, May 20.—Penann aspirations of the championship Chicago Cubs, already lowered by the sudden death of Fletcher Hall Carlson and a large sized casualty list, were given another staggering blow today when Rogers Hornsby, one of the greatest national hitters in the game, fractured his left ankle.

The injury, which occurred as the famous "Babe" tried to slide into third base during the morning game of the St. Louis Cardinal-Cub Memorial day double-header, will force Hornsby out of the game at least six weeks. The break may cost the Cubs their second consecutive championship in the National League, hopes for which have rested largely on Hornsby and his big bat and smart field generalship.

BULL, May 30 (Special to the News)—A large number attended the meeting of bean growers, held in the city hall here last night, sponsored by Growers of this county, and addressed by J. W. Jones, Washington, representing the federal farm board. Mr. Jones, who was introduced by P. L. Atkins, Bull, director of the Intermountain Grain association, entered into some detail in explaining the purposes of the federal board, which has several functions. On this subject, he said, in substance and in part: "The farm board has been called by the federal farm bill, probably because it came after years of agitation for farm relief. It is, however, an agricultural marketing act, the stated purpose of which is to regulate the marketing of other industries by assisting and encouraging the development of farmer-owned and controlled marketing agencies, and preventing a controlling surplusage.

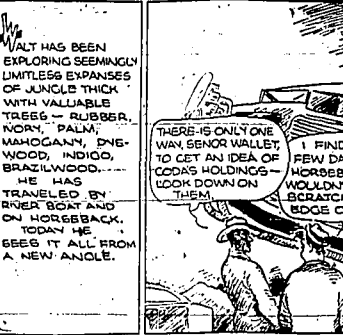

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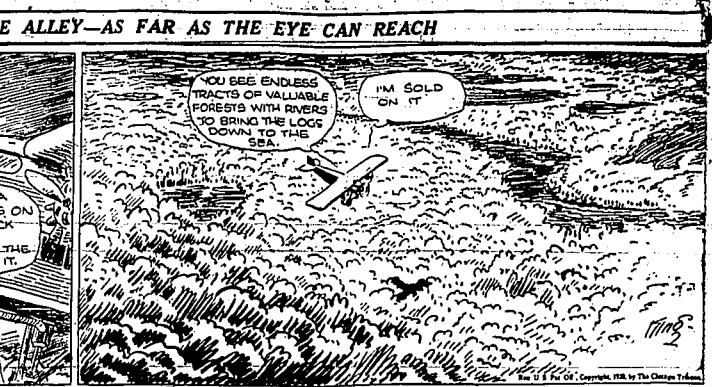
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DIPLOMAT BOASTS GOOD WAR RECORD

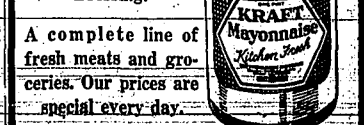

Memorial Day Speaker Summons Nations' Citizens to Resume Responsibility in Government Wartime Idea of Submergence of Individual Persists as Anacronism in Flood of Legislation; E. M. Sweeley, Veteran of Two Wars, Declares in Address

SUBMERGENCE of the individual was one of the effects of the World War from which we are gradually recovering, Captain E. M. Sweeley, Twin Falls city attorney and veteran of the Spanish-American and World wars, asserted in a Memorial Day address delivered before 2000 persons at exercises in Twin Falls cemetery today.

"Under cover of wartime dictatorship, Captain Sweeley declared, every individual who could muster the support of others likewise nursing pets, wrote his theory on the statute books."

"We cannot wage war without a dictatorship," Captain Sweeley asserted, "but the wartime idea of the submergence of the individual was carried over to this time here it is out of place."

"How we have gained a measure of freedom and we are not altogether content to let our responsibilities rest on other shoulders."

"We give an hour on this day, an hour that holds a much greater value than any other day of the year. These glowing clusters of flowers, each a symbol of love of our country and of the appreciation, are more than passing tributes. They are placed by hands that are sensitive to the fact that we know that their full beauty will be for a little while, but we also know that they will wither and decay and again and again with the years, that there will be more lowly flowers to take their place and with this renewal there will come in full force the inspiration that is ours today."
