GERMAN ZEPPELIN PASSENGERS TELL OF STORMY FLIGHT

Great, Gray Ramble of Sky Undergoes Repair at Base in Lakehurst Preparatory to Resumption of Journey

(By The Associated Press) LAKEHURST, May 31 - After riding out the most tempestuous squalls of his career, the German dirigible Graf Zeppelin, that great, gray ramble of the skies, arrived today at this scene of its first triumphal crossing of the Atlantic.

Its shimmering skin blanched by storm surges and washed by sub-equatorial torrents, the ship that has crossed the Pacific and the Atlantic seven times, to say nothing of the world, rose into sight at 6 o'clock this morning as smoothly as the mist from which it came.

Officers and passengers told of storms in the air and as soon as the ship was berthed workers began to break down the mast in order to place the air near engine gondola.

W. P. von Metzner, American representative of the Luftschiffbau, said that the air was broken up by the ship was at its mast at Pernambuco. He said that the damage was found to be unimportant and that the ship was brought on here. The flight, which has already taken 15,000 miles in 204 flying hours, was to take off on May 27 from its home station at Friedrichshafen, with a stop at Seattle, is scheduled for Monday night.

The journey so far has carried the Graf, with its crew of 60 and a shifting list of passengers which when it landed here numbered three women and 16 men, from Friedrichshafen to Seattle, across the tip of Africa and across the Atlantic to Pernambuco, down to Rio Janeiro and back, and then northward 3000 miles to Lakehurst.

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Weather Code By Radio Inspires Ocean Fliers With Hope

SHIPS AT SEA GIVE DATA FOR FORECAST OF STORM HAZARDS

Reports Supplied by International Plan to Reduce Perils of Flying

ATLANTIC WINDS BLOW ALWAYS TOWARD EAST

New Service Gives Promise of Diminishing Danger in Trips From Europe

By HOWARD W. BLAKESLEE (Associated Press Science Editor)

NEW YORK, May 31.—A new radio code is circulating over the North Atlantic, carrying a message of hope for this year's ocean fliers.

The code is the weather reports from ships at sea under a new international agreement whereby the first complete daily forecasts of any ocean are contemplated. These forecasts promise to reduce the weather hazards of the North Atlantic.

If they do, the ocean going planes will have won a long step toward the goal that has cost North Atlantic fliers 21 lives since 1925, brought 13 successful crossings and 19 failures. Now the death toll of all except three of the 21 is charged on the records as "not wanted" and the weather standards foremost among causes suspected.

Winds Trend Eastward
The new service demonstrates how complete the wind and storm trend eastward and never westward over the North Atlantic. It shows that the prevailing west-travel belt is virtually a river of air, flowing either slowly or in gusty surges, and that the planes bound outward from Europe.

There is evidence enough on this one point to account for the fact that but one plane has crossed the Atlantic westbound. The fate of the Vestris illustrates another ever-prevalent menace, no matter what the direction of flight. This pertains to the "low", that is, a storm, which originates off Hatteras, induced, it seems, by general mixing of air of warm Gulf stream air and the cold land breeze.

Storms Sweep Eastward
All these Hatteras storms sweep eastward; they cut the whole North Atlantic; they cut every present proposed airline.

They start any time, but often grow to fill half the ocean. It was one of these, springing from an apparatus, that the 24 hours later developed the power to strike the Vestris her final fatal blow.

Daily forecasting of the entire North Atlantic was authorized last October at a meeting of maritime nations at New York, and adopted to replace the many in use. It is entirely in figures.

A typical ocean weather report, received by Dr. James Kimball, forecaster at New York who makes the new forecasts, reads:

"2911 5912 3200 25413."
Explanation of Reports
The first figure is the time of day. The next, 0, fixes position north of the equator. Thus the entire message translates:

"Monday north of equator latitude 41.43 longitude 59.48 7:00 A. M. eastern standard time wind direction north force 11 knots barometer weather cloudless barometer 30.27 visibility excellent temperature, 43 Fahrenheit."

These messages began late in 1929.

Other Negroes. The situation was quiet tonight. Six members of the Chickasha artillery battery of the Oklahoma national guard suffered minor injuries from missiles thrown by the mob. Several citizens were injured.

Skinner and three other members of the turbulent crowd were arrested but were released later without bond. B. F. 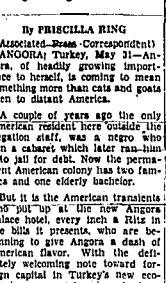
