SMILING SLAYER GOES TO DEATH IN NEVADA GAS CELL

R. H. (Bob) White, Gambler Convicted of Slaying at Elko in 1918, Assists Guards in Preparations

(By The Associated Press) CARSON CITY, June 7.—With a smile on his face, R. H. (Bob) White, convicted of the slaying of Leta Stetter Striker at Elko, Nev., in 1918 did this morning in the new gas chamber at the Nevada state prison.

Death came quickly and apparently without pain, although the 40-year-old gambler but made 40 years, strapped on the straps that bound his hands and legs to the straight-backed chair, after he had taken two deep breaths of the death-inducing hydro-cyanic acid gas. This convulsive movement, which moved his head from side to side with his head was thrown back, was attributed by physicians to a reflex action toward the body appeared to be lifeless.

It was nine and one-half minutes from the time the one-once "egg" of cyanide of potassium in a screen container was dropped into the solution of sulphuric acid and water, until White's heart stopped beating, according to Dr. E. H. Hamer, who presided over the execution. White was a specially built athlete throughout the proceedings and recorded the actions of the first two women witnesses.

Forty-three spectators including two women, Miss Mae E. Kenney, trained nurse of Carson City, and Miss Margaret Hester, a registered nurse of Reno, who were seated here from the state of Virginia, peered through the windows of the execution chamber.

White's gameness was the most talked of feature of the entire affair. As he entered the condemned cell, accompanied by Warden East Penrose, and Captain of the Guard Ward, his step was firm and he was smiling as he looked steadily at the crowd at the two windows. He aided the guards in adjusting the straps which bound his feet, arms to the arms of the chair and gave each guard a hearty handshake when their work was completed and they started to depart.

Warden Penrose was the last to leave the cell. The warden glanced at the execution jar of sulphuric acid and water standing near the wall at the left side of the prisoner who seemed to smile and greeted him by the hand.

"Goodbye Bob," said the warden as he took a broad smile on his face answered "goodbye Matt." He was brought into the cell at 4:38 P. M. It took him 15 minutes to prepare him for the execution and at 4:47, less than 11 minutes from the time he entered the chamber, he was executed.

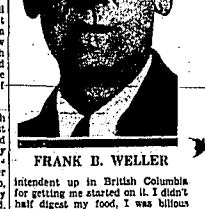

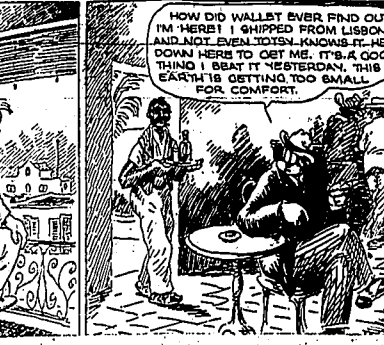
