OPPOSITION-BLOCKS REPUBLICAN PARTY EFFORT IN SENATE

Leaders Place Squeeze On Foes of Tariff Measures Burden of Carrying On Debate on Controversy

WASHINGTON, June 3 (AP)—Blocked in an effort to obtain an agreement to vote on the second tariff bill conference report tomorrow, Senate Republican leaders today put squarely up to the opposition the burden of carrying on the debate.

Only one speaker was prepared to proceed and the senate was forced to shut after four hours of speech-making and wrangling over when the showdown should come.

Senator Harrison, Democrat, Mississippi, had denounced the work of the conference in compromising with the tariff reformers.

Senator Dill, Democrat, Washington, again joined in the demand for a speedy action, saying every hour he was going to vote, but Senator Simpson, Democrat, North Carolina, objected to the vote agreement.

METHODIST-BISHOP REFUSES TO DETAIL PART IN CAMPAIGN

James Cannon, Junior, Refuses to Tell Committee of Work Against Smith and Charges "Persecution"

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, June 3.—James Cannon, junior, declining his questioning of "persecution" and challenging the right to examine him before James Cannon, Jr. refused today to tell the senate committee about his Southern Anti-Slavery Campaign in 1925.

He promptly was warned that he must take the consequences, but it was not apparent tonight what those consequences would be. Cannon will be given another opportunity to answer from the stand tomorrow.

He refused to testify before the senate committee that Harry P. Sinclair went to jail, but no senator has indicated a desire to get strictly with Bishop Cannon.

Today's committee session reached its climax in a moment as Cannon, who has since the days of the oil inquiry left.

Both applause throughout the crowded committee room greeted the declaration of the little Southern Methodist leader that he had no more to say.

Considerable interest was shown by Cannon, Jr. Dr. E. L. Crawford, secretary of the board of temperance and social service of the Methodist-Episcopal church.

Used to Pay Bills Cannon said the money was used to pay bills for sending out circular letters to persons he thought would be interested in an Anti-Smith conference in Asheville, North Carolina.

CHURCH APPROVES HIGH COMMISSION

Presbyterians at Cincinnati Endorse Overture Establishing Supreme Court

CINCINNATI, June 3 (AP).—The hundred forty-second Presbyterian general assembly today approved an overture establishing a permanent judicial commission as the supreme court of the church, but modified to retain the concurrence of the assembly in the final action on all judicial cases.

The plan as submitted would have given the permanent judicial commission the power of taking final action on questions of doctrine and on cases involving ministers and presbyteries but this was found objectionable according to the constitution of the church.

The modification was that voting ministers and elders shall retain their privilege of determining matters of doctrine and deciding judicial cases against church members.

The general assembly also modified the plan so as to retain its present power of appointing the members of the judicial commission.

In Face of Vigorous Opposition From "Wet" Bloc, House Approves Bills

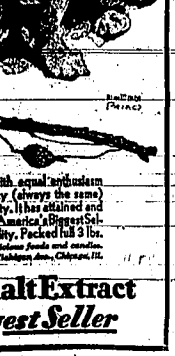
WASHINGTON, June 3 (AP).—In face of vigorous opposition from the "wet" bloc, the house today approved three of four Hoover law enforcement commission proposals to re-voke federal courts of contempt from prohibition cases.

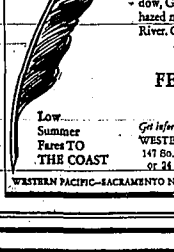

Mini-Cassia Honey Producers Join at Monthly Gathering at Home of Roy Gathen

BURLEY, June 3 (Special to The News)—Mr. and Mrs. Roy Gathen were hosts to the Mini-Cassia Beekeepers' association Sunday at their home near Burley. These gatherings are held once a month, except during the winter, the various members exchanging information and offering the hospitality of their homes.

Arrangements were begun for the annual ordering of honey cans, about 1000 containers of 50 pound capacity being spoken for. Final arrangements will be made at a special meeting called for June 15. It is estimated that 180 tons of honey will be shipped from this district during the season. Honey producers say that shipments will start 10 days earlier than usual, and that prospects are better for this year than last.

The cause of death of these insects was attributed to some such poisonous plants as wild camels, larkspur or sego lily by some of the speakers. Others laid the blame to contraband mash used in the manufacture of bottled whiskey and carelessly dumped out into the public domain.

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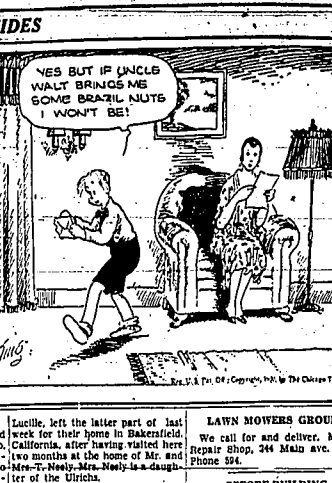
