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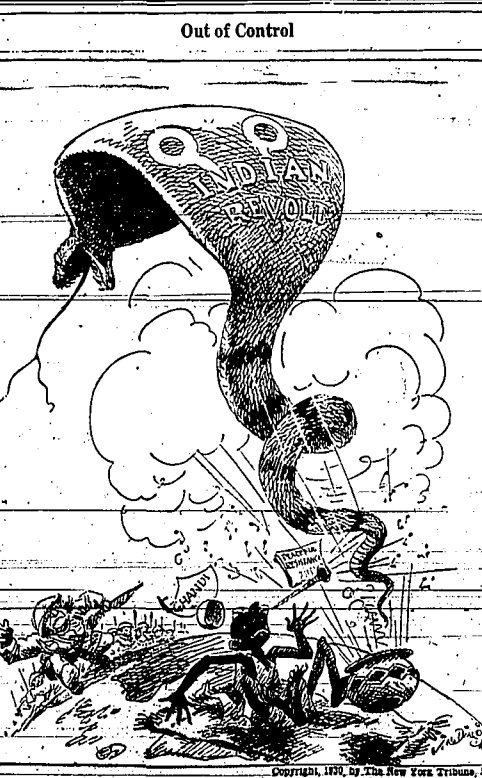

TWIN FALLS BEAN

INDUSTRY PLEASES

H. E. Chatterton, Dealer From Michigan, Expresses Surprise at Great Growth

"The growth of the bean industry in Southern Idaho has given me the surprise of my life," said H. E. Chatterton, Lansing, Michigan, president of the firm of Chatterton and son, dealers in beans, last evening. Mr. Chatterton has been in this section for two days looking over conditions and consulting with Charles W. Barlow, Twin Falls manager and W. B. Lawrence, assistant manager, regarding conditions here. Mr. Chatterton expressed conviction that the bean growing industry would continue to be a success in Southern Idaho.

Mr. Chatterton stated that in his opinion if the pending tariff should pass, which he believed would be the case, the growers of Great Northern beans would get fair prices next year. He said that 300 car loads had been imported during the year and if this importation were cut out it would mean an increase in American beans grown.

On Second Visit Referring to his present visit here Mr. Chatterton said: "This is the second time that I have paid a visit to this section. I came here from Denver in 1918 to look the country over. The bean growing industry was in its infancy at that time in the Twin Falls section. It was suggested that we enter the field and put up warehouses for handling an increasing crop, but I decided not to do so, and I believe that I made a regretful mistake when I did not. We did some business in San Francisco in 1920 and 1921."

"This is our second year in the Twin Falls section and we are very much pleased. We entered the western field regularly three years ago, at the time that we began packing beans in pound cartons, and at the same time began shipping out. We put up 15 varieties of beans in cartons.

"Our shipments of all kinds from the Western states increased from 172 carloads of the 1927 crop to 648 cars of the 1928 crop and 1874 carloads of the 1929 crop up to the present time. This is exclusive of our business in Michigan and New York and other eastern states."

After Stefansson told us of the mild climate in the Arctic area, we clung to the unwavering chill of the Antarctic as a last hope. 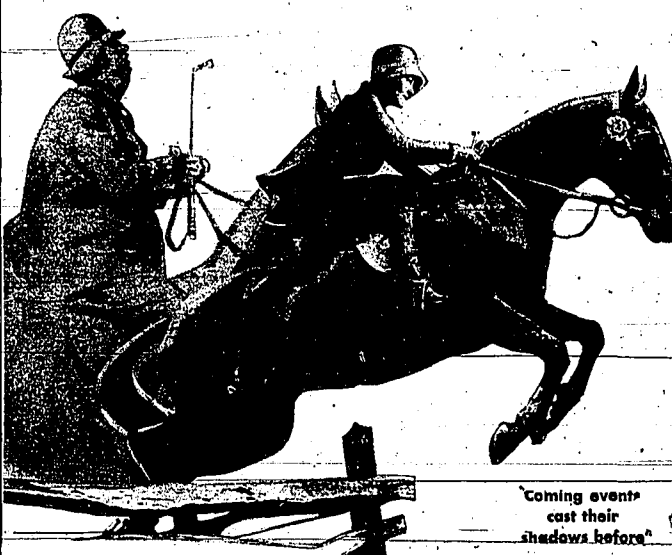

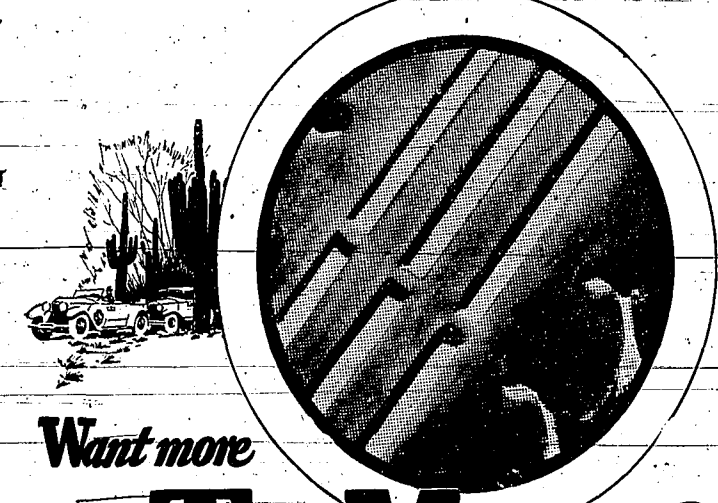

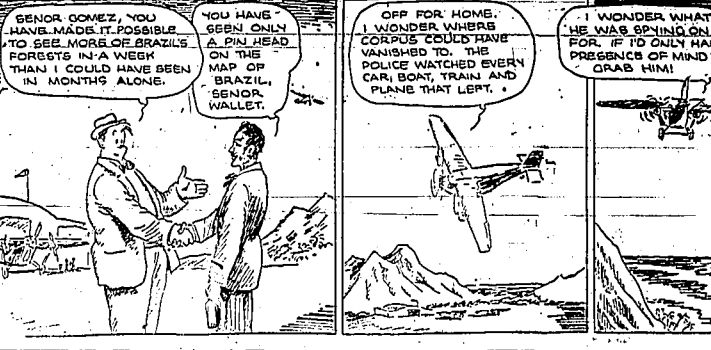
