Foreign Agricultural Export Comes to State to Advise On Fruit Exports

BOISE, June 8 (AP)—Great big Idaho apples are very well liked in England and northern Europe with the exception of the "greening," Frederick A. 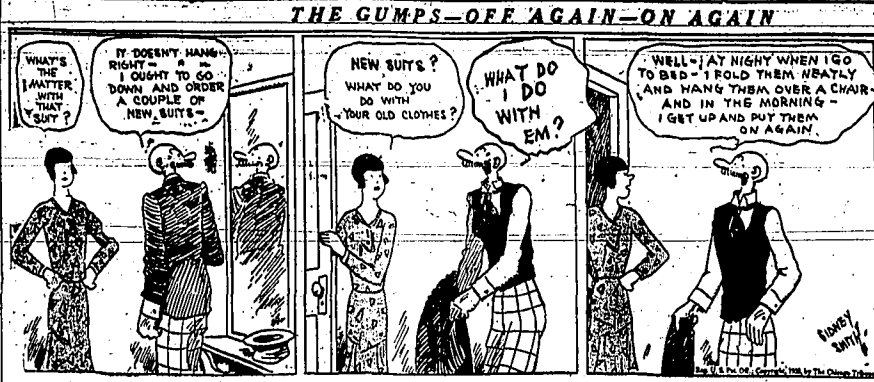

Smith-Hughes Agricultural Department Here Shows Increase in Activities

Under the Future Farmer rating are the following listed: Part taken in Future Farmer fair; part taken in summer demonstration tour; part taken in other and son banquet; part taken in Twin Falls kangaroo court; part taken in summer judging contest; judging teams representing; interest and attendance at Future Farmer meetings.
