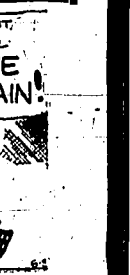

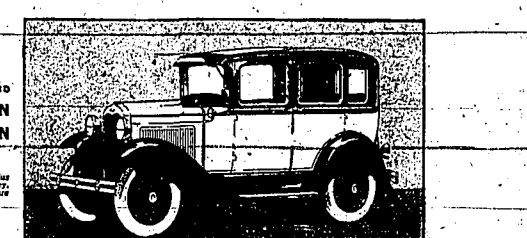

Babson Cites Reasons for Rapid Expansion and Development of Natural Gas Industry of Nation

New Engineering Feats, Confidence of Bankers, Merger Movement and Increased Cooperation Cause Progress, Avers Expert

By ROGER W. BABSON
BABSON PARK, Mass., June 7.—Out of the fastest growing industries in the country today is the natural gas industry. Ten years ago very little was heard of this business, and only within the last two years has public attention been directed to it. Still natural gas is nothing new. A hundred years ago it was first used in a small town in New York for a source of light and heat. Since then towns and cities immediately adjacent to natural gas fields have for a long time used it. For a number of years oil companies have been using it to make kerosene and gasoline. Within the last year or two they are turning out per cent more than they did 10 years ago. Last year natural gas showed the greatest percentage gain in sales of any fuel, increasing 46 per cent in one year. \$150,000,000 was spent in 1929 for the laying of pipe lines and extension of natural gas service. Obviously some new developments have recently occurred which have advanced this sleeping industry to a realization of its great destiny.

Factors Causing Expansion

There are at least five reasons for the strong upward rush of the natural gas business.

First, engineering developments have explored the old theory that natural gas could not be piped consistently for any considerable distance. By the use of new high pressure steel pipe it is now possible to carry natural gas in six states, in thousands of miles. Already a pipe line under way to bring natural gas from Texas to Chicago. Pipe lines have been completed from southwestern gas fields as far east as Atlanta, Georgia. In the Appalachian gas area are pipe lines extending from West Virginia, Pennsylvania, and Southern New York to the territory surrounding Philadelphia and New York City are now in operation. Today natural gas is the only fuel which can be piped in operation, therefore, has been the prime cause for the exceptional progress this industry is making.

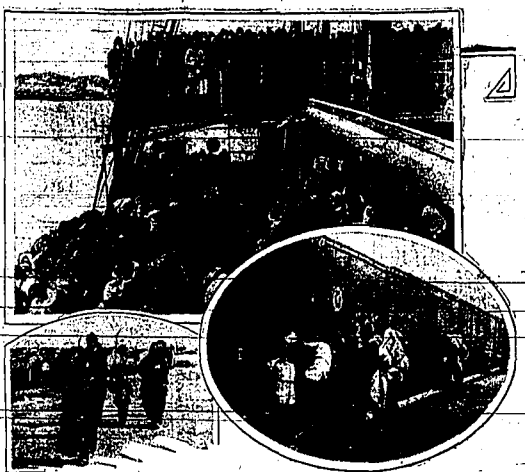
