FRIENDS AND FOES OF LONDON TREATY CIRCULATE PETITION

Republican "Young Guards" Answer Opponents of Immediate Consideration With Counter Movement

(By The Associated Press) — WASHINGTON, June 9 (AP)—Members of the senate were besieged with round robin petitions today for and against prompt consideration of the London naval treaty today as the foreign relations committee got into a snarl at its first meeting to consider the pact.

The Republican "young guard" answered the petition for delay by circulating a counter petition and tonight this group was confident of enough signatures to stay in session this summer until the pact is voted upon.

Sponsors of both petitions are working actively and no one would state precisely how many signatures there are estimated to be, however, that more than 40 members were on the petition asking postponement of debate until fall.

The "young guard" claims a membership of 20 senators and it was believed that most of these, except Senator Robinson, Indiana, were enlisted on the petition pleading to stay in session until the treaty is disposed of. The group also believed it would get support from the Western Independents of the Republican fold and from some of the old guard.

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There was considerable talk tonight of a resolution being introduced to express the attitude of the senate toward the president's blunt refusal of the committee's request. However, Senator Johnson said he had no resolution to propose.

It seemed likely as a result of Johnson's statement before the committee that some definite step would be proposed tomorrow. Committee members indicated they would be asking the president at least to send up those papers "compatible with public interest."

Calling another meeting of the committee for tomorrow, Chairman Borah expressed the opinion that final action would be taken this week on the treaty, thus placing it before the senate in time for consideration at the special session.

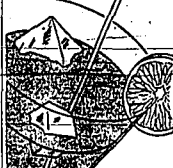
KIMBERLY MAN'S CASE ARRIVES AT CONCLUSION

AVIATOR PLANS TO BEAT OWN RECORD

Lieutenant Apollo Soucek, Credited With Reaching 43,166 Altitude, Acts

WASHINGTON, June 9 (AP)—Monarch of the upper air today with a new world airplane altitude record of 43,166 feet, Lieutenant Apollo Soucek made plans to better both that mark and his world seaplane altitude record.

The airplane record, made Wednesday on the anniversary of his record seaplane flight, was recognized by the National Aeronautics association after the official barograph had been calibrated at the bureau of standards.

It exceeded by 1372 feet the existing record of 41,794 feet held by Will Sieber, German aviator, and marks the highest flight of man. The nearest approach was Captain Hawthorne Gray's balloon ascent to 42,470 feet in 1927, but it cost him his life.

Scheduled to leave Saturday for duty on the aircraft carrier Lexington, Lieutenant Soucek said: "I can now go to sea with a clear conscience but shall devote the remainder of the week, if weather is favorable, in attempts to better both records."

"The attempt to raise the airplane record will be made with the same mental propeller set as a sharper angle. On the record flight the propeller seemed to be beating the air without effect and greater pitch may

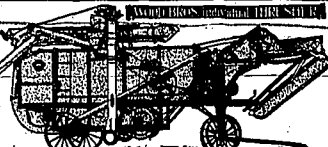

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ACCIDENT BOARD GETS EVIDENCE ON CLAIM

Whether Ben W. Wilburton is suffering from traumatic neuritis caused by accidental injury while in the employ of Twin Falls Canal company in March, 1929, or whether his disability results from functional disability was the question presented at hearing before Judge Lawrence E. Worstell of the state industrial accident board, in the district court room here yesterday.

Wilburton, who claims compensation for total disability, asserts that he was severely injured while working with a silt scraper in the canal company's employment, when the ball of the implement broke off and struck him a heavy blow on the leg.

The liability insurance company denies validity of Wilburton's claim, and offered testimony of Twin Falls physicians tending to show that his disability was "damaged by" disorders other than accidental injury.

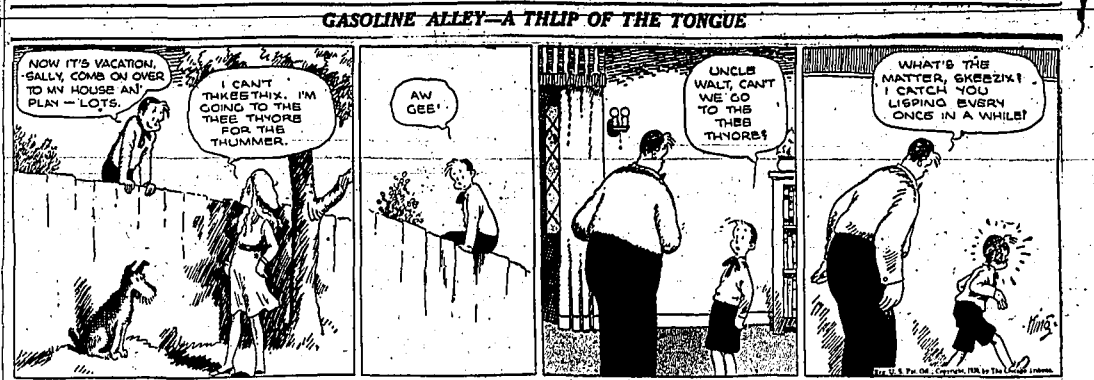
