EARLY HOUR FINDS 600 HOODLUMS IN WINDY CITY JAILS

"Strong-Arm" Police Squads, Armed With Shotguns, Revolvers and Tear Bombs Descend on Under-World

(By The Associated Press) CHICAGO, (Thursday) Morning, June 12.— Nearly 600 reputed hoodlums have been rounded up at an early hour this morning as special "strong-arm" police squads—raided under world-hunts-bent on riding Chicago "for all time" of criminals.

Directed to drastic action by public clamor for solution of the murder of Alford (Jack) Lingle, Tribune reporter, and other gangland slaugher, the squads, armed with shotguns, revolvers and tear-bombs, crashed the door upon the underworld.

The prisoners were so fast that the attaches of the bureau of identification were swamped and extra details were called on to assist in the work of booking.

As soon as word of the raids was circulated, a veritable swarm of reporters, bondsmen and other interested in seeing liberation of the aughts, being refused on headquarters, but their clamor was heeded tonight for the more exact details of the situation tomorrow.

General Exodus Here said there had been a general exodus from the city of gang leaders but added that those who remained constituted a menace so thoroughly that would be "slamped out."

As the raids progressed word was received at headquarters of arrests of Chicago criminals, including other sections of the country, Miss Lingle, Jack Quinn, Capone leader, and Henry Cooper, reputed gang boss, were taken off a train as it neared New York.

Lawmakers two suspects were arrested and a number in Chicago suburbs.

One in the gang was pledged to Cook county law enforcement agencies tonight by Walter S. Maguire, chief of police.

FEDERATION PAYS TRIBUTE TO GOODY

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WITCH-HIKER TELLS STORY IN TRIAL OF MARBLE AT BURLEY

R. J. Sherwood, State's Star Witness, Testifies Regarding Odor of Liquor and Of Riding at High Speed

(Special To The News) BURLEY, June 11.—On direct examination during the second day of the trial in district court of C. D. Marble, Twin Falls, automobile salesman, on a manslaughter charge growing out of the death of L. L. Witham, a fellow townsman, in a highway crash west of here on May 28, R. J. Sherwood, state witness, today told of flagging defendant Marble, obtaining permission to ride with him and of smelling liquor upon entering the machine. Sherwood testified that when he asked at the speedometer one time during the ride the car was traveling 40 miles an hour and that the speed was maintained, he testified that the car was in a crash, shortly before the accident, which was reported to about 60 miles an hour.

SANTO DOMINGO, Dominican Republic, June 11—This little Latin land has set a new style for disposing of defeated presidential candidates.

Federico Velasquez, who lost to General Rafael Leonidas Trujillo in the elections of May 16, was jailed on a charge equivalent to high treason and then offered a job in Trujillo's cabinet.

In the same tower where Christopher Columbus was a prisoner before he was taken back to Spain in chains, Don Federico gazed through the bars and toward the treasury office.

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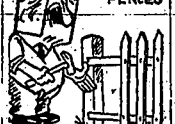

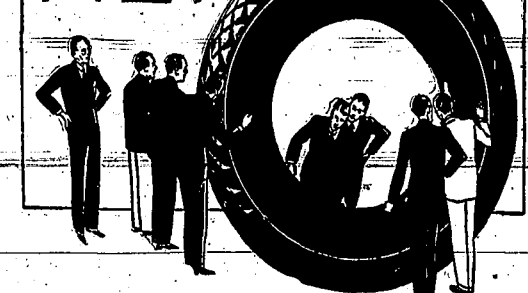

YOUTHS AT BURLEY BUY HEAD OF GOODING HOGS

BURLEY, June 11 (Special to The News)—EIGHT brothers, boys yet in their teens—Ora Smith-Hughes or "Future-Farmer of America," the other a 4-H club member, have bought the show head and breeding herd of Hampshire hogs owned by W. D. Paley, Gooding. Eighteen heads were unloaded in Burley Tuesday afternoon.

These boys are preparing to go on to the circuit this fall with the largest, individually owned show-herd in the Northwest. They will be divided into two groups—48 head of Hampshire and Poland Chinas to take in the principal state fairs and the Portland International and 40 head to follow the circuits of the county fairs in Montana, Oregon, Utah and Idaho. They will start August 17 at Helena and wind up at the Portland show November 10. They will have four practically complete herds on these circuits.

They have offered premiums of \$5, \$20 and \$1, to competitors in the Cassia county fair this fall for first, second and third prize sows of any age, bred by them and owned and exhibited by others.

Mrs. Frances Wann Submits Summary of Activities in Period of Five Months

DURLEY. (Special to The News)—Summarizing her activities as Cassia county nurse over a period of five months from January 7 to June 8, 1929, Mrs. Frances Wann, I. A. report submitted to the county commissioners Tuesday, shows many interesting accomplishments during the time covered, the two largest items being 3231 children vaccinated and 2896 children inspected. She visited 35 communities and 110 schools, traveling a total distance of 268 miles.

There were 1045 children found to be 7 per cent or more underweight; 1263 children referred to dentists; 1510 children referred to dentists; 677 children referred to oculists, and in a subsequent class, children, Mrs. Wann made 22 personal visits to physicians, had 175 conferences with parents, 10 home visits, 100 breast-feeding visits and held nine clinics.

She made 108 talks to trade pupils on crusade-nutrition; two talks to high school groups; 100 talks to teachers; had 23 conferences with individual teachers in schoolrooms; 10 conferences with school trustees; made 15 talks to adult groups; inspected 45 home members and had 60 telephone interviews. Children given immunization against scarlet fever numbered 56.

Mrs. Wann's report was approved by the board, members of which commented upon the splendid work done by her. She will spend the summer touring Europe, returning to her work before the opening of school in the fall.

MINI-CASSIA CREAMERY BUSINESS SHOWS GAINS

For the milk butterfat the association had 42 cents a pound, of a total of \$121,571. The association also purchased 23,811 pounds of cream for which it paid 24 cents a pound or a total of \$1,171,471, making a total of 78,929.55 pounds of butterfat, netting the patrons of 61,117.7.

For May 1929, the association purchased 729,227 pounds of butterfat, showing an increase this year over last year of 58,148 pounds of butterfat. The plant at Rupert is handling approximately 22,500 pounds of milk daily.

During the last week a delivery truck service has been inaugurated from the Rupert casing plant. Virgil Pace is in charge of the truck which delivers butter, cheese, and ice cream to dealers in Rupert, Buhl, Paul and Declo. A fine quality of ice cream is being manufactured—these dealers have shown their willingness to support the home industry.

When this is done a release into the world is rare but when idleness takes the place of the industry of the daily school the former membership are apt to be easily re-established.

Judge Bailey urged his hearers to give attention to the problem presented and to use their best efforts in behalf of the boys and girls after their return from the institution.
