The dramatic end of the long and special fight through the senate and house against the tariff measure, Arkansas, the Democratic leader, denounce the measure as a "disappointment" even to the supporters.

Senator Borah, Idaho, the Republican independent leader, asserted it failed to meet the party's needs and would be useless to agriculture without the denature and Senator Watson, Indiana, the majority critic, championed it in a vigorous hour and a half speech.

Right after the bill's opposition, the Republican leader waved his arms and pounded desks all around him as he termed the issue an attack the "same old argument" used against every tariff bill.

He assailed Henry Ford and Alfred E. Sloan, president of General Motors, for opposing the measure, asserting the motives of these industrial financiers and industrialists are obvious, and portend only unemployment, or cheapened labor in this country.

Watson conceded business was depressed, but predicted the nation would be on the "upside financially" within 30 days from enactment of the bill.

"We shall regain the peak of prosperity and the position we lost last October," he said.

Senator Robinson said the measure was "a disappointment to the agriculturists and industrialists" regarding the property of agriculture, it perpetuates and intensifies the inequalities and discriminations between agriculture and other industries.

Senator Borah contended whatever benefit the farmer would receive under the bill would be taken by other "rates" in industrial rates.

"How are you going to fulfill the pledge made at Kansas City, that we will give agriculture an equality with industry without the denature?" he asked. "If you raise agricultural rates and correspondingly raise industrial rates you get nowhere."

CHICAGO CLERGYMAN ACCUSES MOVIEDOM OF DISTORTING LIFE

CHICAGO, June 13 (AP)—The moving picture was accused of distorting and misrepresenting American life, creating hostility in foreign nations and affecting international relations by Rev. Frederic Blodgett, S. J., Loyola University, Chicago, speaking today at a meeting on neighborhood and community life in connection with the national conference of social workers.

HYBRID CORN PROVES SUPERIOR FOR YIELD

JAMES, Iowa, June 13 (AP)—Tests on hundreds of Iowa farms have proven hybrid corn superior in yield to open pollinated, or common field varieties.

Joe T. Robinson, president of the Iowa Corn and Small Grain Growers' association, says hybrid corn outyielded open pollinated corn in each of the 12 sections of the state by from 3 to 15 bushels this year. It is the fifth consecutive victory for hybrid corn. The highest hybrid yield was 110 bushels an acre and the highest open pollinated variety, 110 bushels.

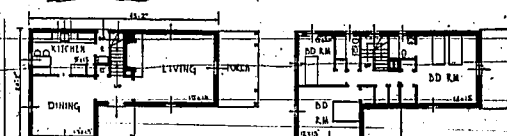

ONE MAN PERISHES

ST. PAUL, Minn., June 13 (AP)—One man is reported to have been killed, several injured and a serious property damage done in a series of tornadoes in southern Minnesota late today.

W. DeWitte, a section foreman for the Chicago Great Western railroad, was reported killed at Randolph, Minnesota, about 35 miles south of here, and numerous buildings there were damaged. Three were reported injured. A call for doctors and nurses was received at Hastings.

Half a dozen homes were destroyed in ST. PAUL park, a suburb, and two persons injured there. "Grandma" Alchewitz was reported killed at a store when her home was demolished. She was seriously burned. Grace Cooley, 14, was injured when she and her father were carried several feet in their home by the water.

A southern Minnesota near Brownsville and Odele, several buildings were reported to have been destroyed.

A roof was torn from a house and several barns, smaller buildings and wind mills were destroyed in the Mendota hill district about 13 miles southeast of Randolph.

A number of orchards in that vicinity were leveled and many of the telephone poles blown down.

No persons were reported injured.

The farm of Ed Edwards, four miles northeast of Brownsville, is said to have been destroyed as well as several others near Odele in southern Minnesota.

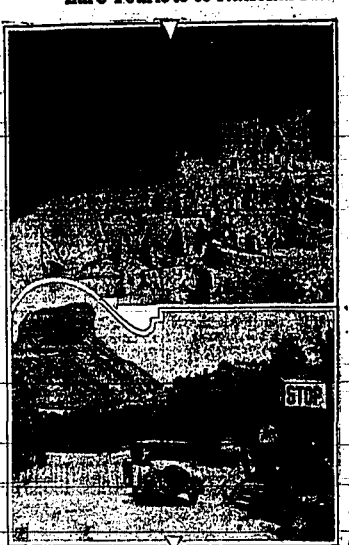

American Cliff Dwellers' Homes Lure Tourists to National Park

DURANGO, Colo., June 13 (AP)—Visiting and surfacing the famous Mesa Verde national park in Southeastern Colorado, where Cliff Dwellers built their homes in the canyon walls long before Columbus discovered America, has opened its 1930 season.

Thousands of persons will view the largest collection of American archeological on the continent between now and November 1.

In the last two years, \$250,000 has been spent toward the 175 year, \$700,000 highway construction program in the park.

The appropriation was made for widening and surfacing the famous Knife Edge road from the northern entrance to the park headquarters from Spruce Tree camp.

Collections of pottery, basket making and other relics are being augmented rapidly.

One 175 year, used in the ceremonial of men and boys, was put together from more than 90 pieces found in the Cliff Dwellers ruin.

Collections of 24 kiva, or ceremonial chambers, is the largest of the ruins.

Thousands of persons will view the largest collection of American archeological on the continent between now and November 1.

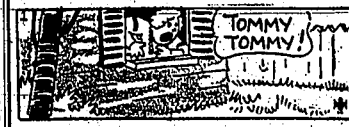
