CHICAGO'S COUNCIL MOVES TO CORRECT CITY'S GOVERNMENT

Committee Hears Reports of Police Commanders of Retiring Force and Judge Orders County Grand Jury

CHICAGO, June 16 (AP)—New brooms began to sweep Chicago today. Mayor William Hale Thompson's two police heads were put on the firing line in the war upon gangs and gunmen, forced out of the high tension of public indignation.

In swift succession, city public and private agencies resolved to purge city hall, police and underworld of the gangster "trash."

The city council committee on police, hearing the reports of the two police commanders and Captain William F. Russell and Captain John Egan, detective chief, determined upon a sweeping reorganization of the police department. Its inquiry will be launched Thursday.

When the gunmen go beyond their guerrilla warfare and attack the ranks of private citizens, said Judge Normale, "it is time to curb them. Gangsters are not only a menace to this community, but a disgrace to the whole United States. The city's reputation has been injured and it is up to us to act for its redemption."

Chief Justice Normale alluded to the daylight assassination a week ago of Alfred J. Lind. Chicago's reputation as a law-abiding city remains unshaken, although the retiring detective chief indicated, as he withdrew his resignation, that he had been a captain at an outgoing station, that the police were more than capable of handling the new post, a captaincy at an outgoing station.

Meanwhile business leaders met secretly at the Association of Commerce to plan to elect the "secret six" committee investigating the reign of crime to 16 men, representatives of various business groups, and to increase the scope of activities and fetter the police.

BLARE OF RADIO AIDS PRISONERS TO ESCAPE FROM JAIL IN FRESNO

FRESNO, Cal., June 16 (AP)—The blare of a radio in the jailer's office early today is believed to have started the sound of breaking locks and falling bars as nine prisoners made a dash for freedom from the felony tank of the Fresno county jail.

As a result, it is believed, by one of their number snatched out of the jail block in a few minutes, the prisoners were able to escape.

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WAGNER PLANS TO HELP UNEMPLOYED WITH LEGISLATION

New York Senator-Serving First Term Introduces Scheme to Stabilize Labor or Conditions of Nation

By HERBERT PLUMMER (Associated Press Staff Writer) WASHINGTON, June 16—A dynamic, foreign-born man, serving his first term in the United States sen-



ROBERT F. WAGNER, senator, has come forward with a plan which he is confident will bring about stabilization of employment in this country.

He is Senator Robert F. Wagner, New York. His three unemployment measures are the result of almost 20 years intensive study and observation of labor conditions.

Advanced at a time when unemployment in this country is at a critical stage and representing his first major effort in the field of national legislation, the Wagner program embraces three features:

Features of Program

The first provides for collection of complete employment statistics by the government.

The second sets up a federal program for emergency construction.

The third creates a federal employment exchange to cooperate with state agencies.

The Wagner plan had its inception as far back as 1911. The famous Triangle factory fire in New York state of that year, which claimed the lives of 143 girls, inspired the 94-year-old Democratic leader of the state senate to introduce a resolution calling for an investigation of all New York protective and welfare laws.

Wagner was made chairman of this commission. For the next four years he directed the work of investigating the whole system of social welfare in New York.

There were 23 corrective laws enacted, and New York as a result, stood from the bottom in the ranks of states which care for their laboring masses to the very front.

During this investigation, Wagner had opportunity to study all problems confronting labor. His attention was directed especially to unemployment.

Wagner's first speech on the floor of the United States senate was on the subject of unemployment in March, 1928. And in a subsequent speech he outlined his remedy.

IDAHO CITY MAN DIES IN AUTOMOBILE WRECK

BOISE, June 16 (AP)—Andrew Phelps, Idaho City, aged about 38, was dead and Mrs. J. C. Smith, 22, was seriously injured and eight others were bruised or slightly injured in Sunday automobile accident in this vicinity.

CAPONE'S BROTHER GETS STIFF TERM

Sentence on Income Tax Frauds Stands Two Gangsters Part For Years

CHICAGO, June 16 (AP)—The two main Capone brothers, "Scarface" Al and Ralph J. who have kept fairly free from jail and prison during their tumultuous careers in Chicago's gangland, will be separated and banished to prison for a long period for income tax frauds imposed today by Federal Judge James H. Wilkinson on Ralph stands.

Ralph Capone, the elder of "Scarface," has never achieved the widespread publicity of Al, but government records show that between 1924 and 1929 he had deposited \$1,700,000 under seven different names in one eleven banks—and had failed to mention it in his income tax returns. Consequently, Ralph was indicted for attempting to defraud the United States and for failure to pay income taxes and concealment of assets.

Capone was convicted on all the charges on April 23.

Judge Wilkinson today denied defense motions for a new trial and arrest of judgment, and to two years in the Cook county jail and two \$10,000 fines. The jail sentence was ordered suspended, however, to be enforced only in the event the other sentence was set aside by a higher court.

Capone had another new experience also today—spending the day locked up in the bull pen in the United States marshal's office. Judge Wilkinson decreed that, pending an appeal, Capone should furnish a bond of \$25,000. Capone, bewildered and stunned by the sentence, was locked up and paid until late today when the additional bond was posted.

This was said to be the first time that Ralph Capone had ever been convicted. His brother, Al, however, spent nearly a year in jail at Philadelphia for carrying concealed weapons, being released last February, and is now in controversy with officials of Miami, Florida, who seek to have him rejailed.

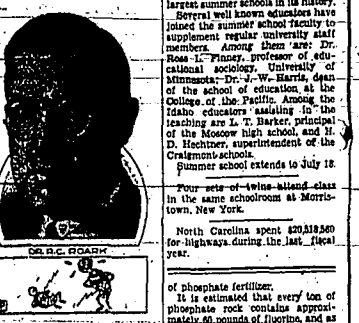

11 States—Representatives Arrange to Analyze Economic Prospects in Conference at Idaho Falls

(By The Associated Press) IDAHO FALLS, June 16.—Western agricultural and business interests will analyze their economic prospects for the next three years at a conference here June 18 and 20, called by the central western advisory board.

The discussions, both in their geographic representation and their subject matter, will represent the usual scope of such a conference. Besides consideration of the transportation needs, commodity prices and prospects, the program will include a new element—organizations under the farm market act as well as a session on plant quarantine regulations and their effect on the farmer.

Features of the conference will continue for an extra day beyond the usual length of the session. A special session will be held on the 18th and 19th. The subjects included in the council—Colorado, Nevada, Idaho, Utah, Wyoming—the deliberations will be joined by representatives of California, Oregon, Washington, Nevada, Arizona and New Mexico.

Grain Export Program
The operation of the farm marketing act will be discussed by James W. Weller, president of the International Grain Traders, Incorporated, who will pay particular attention to the wheat and oat markets. A special location of grain storage facilities close to points of production. The sites of the marketing act operation will be discussed by Frank J. Hagenbarth, president of the National Wool Growers' association.

Organization of the potato industry of the Northwest will be presented by F. J. Higgins, dean of the college of agriculture of the University of Idaho, and the status of the National Potato Institute will be the subject of a report of G. J. 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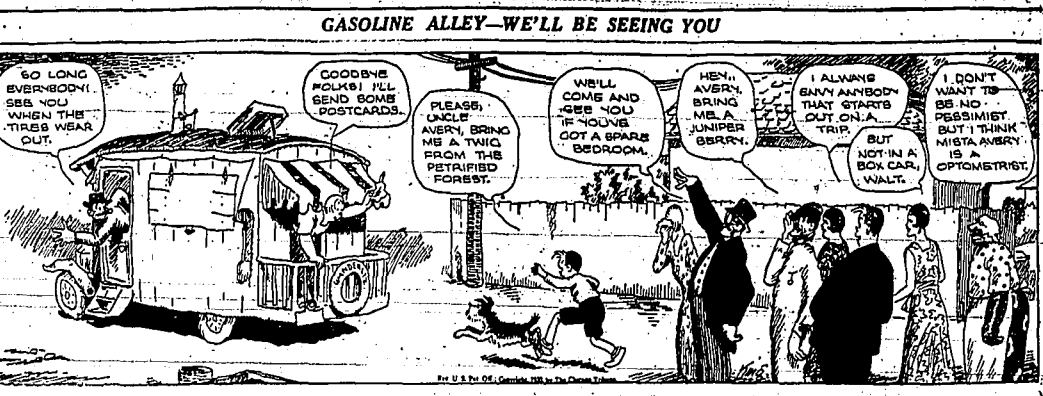

Nation's Highest Highway Nears Completion in Rocky Mountains

Denver, June 14 (AP)—The highest continuous highway in North America, a 2.5 mile stretch extending over Fall River pass on the continental divide in Rocky Mountain National park, is to be completed in the fall of 1930.

A \$10,000,000 government project, the highway will reach into cloud-lands at an altitude of 12,100 feet at one point, and the miles of it will traverse above timberline.

Work on the eastern portion of the road was begun last fall under a contract covering slightly more than 7 miles at a cost of \$600,000. A second section will be started within a short time, to add other miles to be completed. After time has been allowed for earth settlements the surfacing will be started.
