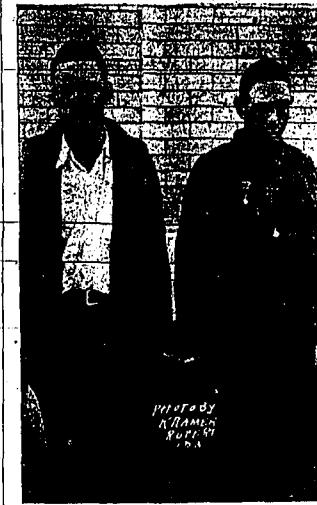
NORTH IDAHO GROUP MAKES NO REPLY TO LIQUOR ACCUSATION

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# INTERACTIONS WIN CONSIDERATION OF SCIENTIFIC WORLD

### Effect of Person's Contact With Fellow Results Differently at Each Personal Meeting

ing about "reaction's" science forces an approaching new reaction in the world "interaction."

It is keener than Newton. It defines that part of reaction which is the result of a person's contact with his fellow. For example, John and Bill mixing it up are quite likely to produce a different interaction than John and Henry.

Lowell Julliard Carr, assistant professor of sociology of the University of Michigan, says that American sociologists have begun to study interactions as a key to conduct.

"Interaction has been so far from the center of attention," he says, "that tradition has never verbalized more than a small fraction of the interactive phenomena that occur. There are innumerable ways of expressing, voice inflections, pauses, silences, approaches, withdrawals for which we have no verbal symbols whatever."

"Try to describe what really happens between yourself and the next friend whom you chance to meet casually upon the street. Of course you will see only part of the interaction, for you will be unable to see your own behavior as your friend sees it."

"But even with the field of observation thus cut in half for you it is almost certain that you will be able to restrict your own behavior to that of your friend's total overt behavior."

"Practically you handle the situation by interpreting your friend's behavior, that is, not by nothing separately the abrupt, the lifted eyebrows, the hesitation, the smile, but by some such synthetic as 'offended,' 'reptical,' 'doubtful,' 'understanding.'"

"You seldom see what happens; you tend to see what you think it means."

## LOBBY PROBE BOWS TO BISHOP CANNON

### Committee Reports Testimony and Caraway Adds One Bristling Paragraph

WASHINGTON, June 19 (AP)—The senate wrote this today to the controversy between the lobby committee and Bishop Cannon after a bristling last paragraph had been added by Senator Caraway of Arkansas.

Going into the source of the money, Caraway said he did not believe it belonged to Cannon.

Chairman Caraway presented a report from the committee, a transcript of thousands of words of testimony given by Cannon during his appearance before the group. He informed his colleagues the committee had agreed it had no right to ask the questions the bishop declined to answer.

Takes Last Straw  
Action by the vice president was the final straw to which opponents of the bishop clung in their hope that the committee would be done about his defiance of the lobby investigation.

## COURT CONSIDERS FIGHT ON TAX LAW

### Idaho Tribunal to Hear Four Attacks Upon Levy On Investment Companies

BOISE, June 19 (AP)—The Idaho supreme court tomorrow will consider four appeals involving the constitutionality of the state law for the taxation of investment companies.

The law in question provides for a tax on the total capital of any investment company doing business in Idaho. The appeals to be heard tomorrow, in each of which the state is the appellant, are the Chicago Livestock Loan company against Ada county, the Utah Mercantile and Loan company against W. D. O'Neil, attorney general, the Union Central Life Insurance company against O'Neil and the Spokane and Eastern Trust company against O'Neil.

The attack on the law is based on the contention that since the stock of these companies, representing the invested capital, are personal property mostly held outside the state, and since personal property can be taxed only where it is found, as located on the books representing this stock is illegal and unconstitutional.

## SCIENTISTS EXPLAIN DREAMS OF FALLING

### Department of Psychology Uses Hypnotism to Discover Causes of Sensation

AUSTIN, Texas, June 19 (AP)—Why everyone occasionally dreams of falling has been discovered at the University of Texas.

A sudden downward shift in some portion of the sleeper's body starts this dream.

These discoveries were made in the psychology department by using hypnotism to push aside the uncertainty which usually veils dreams and their causes.

David Ballin Klein, associate professor of psychology, defined the hypnotic dreams as true counterparts of real sleep.

He says the falling motion which sets like a trigger to set off this familiar dream probably comes from shifting position.

In the hypnotic dreams it was produced by slightly pressing down some portion of the mattress.

Search for the cause of the embarrassing dream-of-appearing-partly clothed in public failed to produce even a clue.

### BANKERS HEAR DEFENSE OF CHAIN INSTITUTIONS

DENVER, June 19 (AP)—Two developments of modern business—chain banking and chain stores, were described yesterday at the convention of the American Institute of Banking as sound economic enterprises, "here to stay" and not passing fads.

E. W. Krick, vice president of the American Trust company, San Francisco, an institution with resources of \$20 millions of dollars, said that 800 bank failures in the last 10 years have demonstrated that the chain-banking system is not enterprises, but the fullest possible service to the public.

Clark O. Mitchell, vice president of the Denver National bank, told the delegates that "the chain store is here to stay and its competition will be hard."

Answering a criticism which he said was generally directed against the chain store to the effect that money left the community, deliberately taken from local business, Mr. Mitchell said:

"Sixty-five per cent of the chain store dollar goes to the manufacturer, 15 per cent to payroll, 10 per cent to rent and the balance up to nine per cent of net profit to incidental expenses such as advertising, repairs, and is spent in the community or in nearby cities."

Mr. Mitchell said the great disadvantage of the small unit bank is that it is not in a position to pay high salaries and buy the best banking brains.

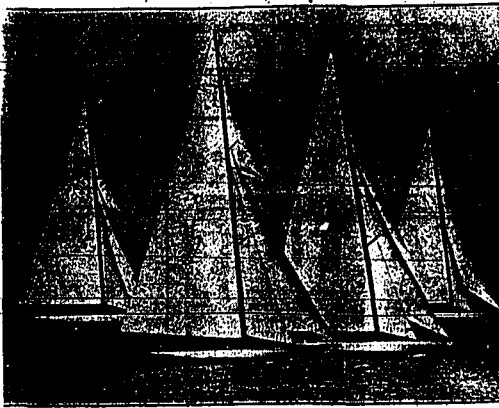

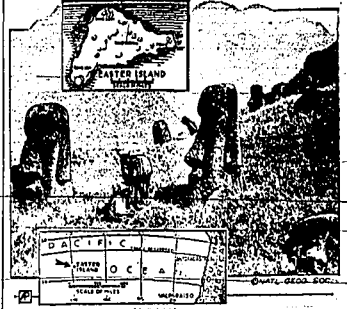

# MOST PROFITABLE FARMING METHODS SUBJECT OF STUDY

### Group of Specialists To Spend Summer Here Gathering Data For Consideration at Farm Conference

How to make the most profit out of farming in the Twin Falls country is a question for which a group of agricultural economists will seek the answers in a study of the Twin Falls and Jerome counties this summer, H. S. Hale, Twin Falls county agent, announced yesterday.

The group will include Dr. Paul A. Eke, Moscow, Idaho experiment station economist; Dr. Edin C. Crane and Harold Brown, representing the Idaho experiment station, and Byron Hunter of the federal bureau of agricultural economics who some years ago made an exhaustive study of costs of farm crop production in the Twin Falls district.

Members of this group during the summer will be observing the farmers and sometimes during the coming winter they will by their conclusions be held here. The conference will be asked to study these conclusions in the light of individual experience and to formulate recommendations.

Similar conferences heretofore have been held with satisfactory results in Jefferson and Franklin counties, although the same organizations there were not as detailed as they will be in Twin Falls county.

### Many Factors Here

In the Palouse, Washington, district, there are here last reported, investigations similar to those to be carried on here have been completed, showing probable expense and income of several different systems of farm operation.

The problem in the Palouse country, Dr. Eke said, is similar in comparison with the wide range of investigation and study in this district. Here, he said, there are many combinations of crop and livestock production, and it is the purpose of the investigators, with the cooperation of the farmers, to study all combinations with view to arriving at the most satisfactory one.

"It is our purpose to make available to the farmer the best information we can get relative to production of farms of the Twin Falls country on a profitable basis," Dr. Eke said in summarizing the purposes of his work here.

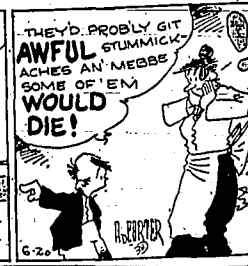
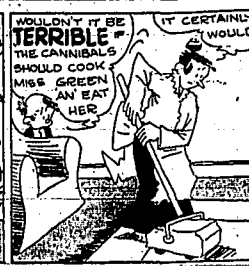
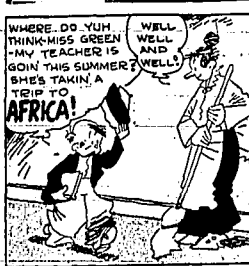
### MISSISSIPPI FARMERS GET CREDIT FOR WOOD

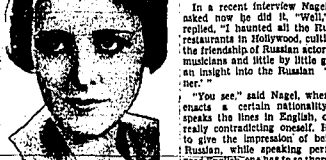

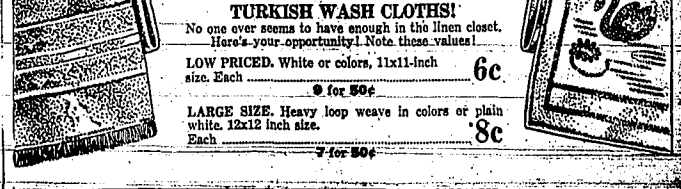

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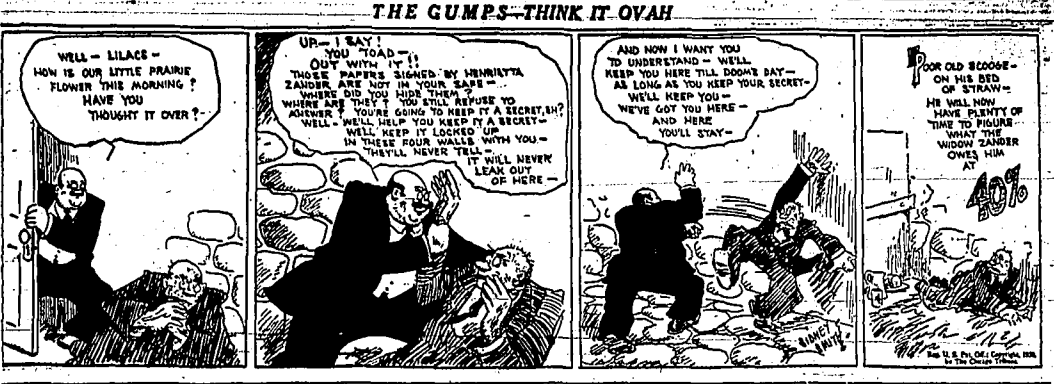
