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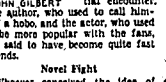

Officials Confer on Another Sharkey-Schmeling Encounter

New York Bristles With Agitation for Championship Tilt

Garden's Officials Promise Important Announcement Soon in Regard to Teuton's Return Battle

By EDWARD J. NEIL (Associated Press Sports Writer)

NEW YORK, June 21—All conferences bloomed in New York today. Lawyers worked overtime, and Madison Square Garden promised something important in the way of announcements concerning Max Schmeling's return bout with Jack Sharkey by Monday afternoon.

The final conference between Garden officials and Arthur Budew, defeated manager of the German, who won the heavyweight championship from a foul from Sharkey June 12, is scheduled for Monday. After that is over the Garden hopes to be able to announce that the last bar to a return match late in September has been removed.

Schmeling is ready to fight if he can get a fight from Budew's manager, contract which does not expire until October 12. Otherwise he insists that he will remain until the entangling alliance with Budew is wiped out by time. Sharkey is so anxious to remove the stain of his defeat on a foul that he is already on record at the New York State Athletic commission as ready to accept a 20 per cent share in Schmeling's wages.

Budew "takes purchase" on apparently the unfortunate sailor from Boston bought something when he made that offer. Frank Bruce, general manager of the Garden, is for Boston tonight to talk with Sharkey and his manager, Johnny Hickey, as to the terms of the purchase. Sharkey's answer probably will be enclosed in Monday's proclamation, but it is expected to be a return match.

There are other minor differences to be adjusted before the match can be made. Joe Jacobs, Schmeling's manager of choice, insists that he be reinstated by the New York State Athletic commission as a manager so that he may officially stake his claim on the million.

Budew's contract is dead.

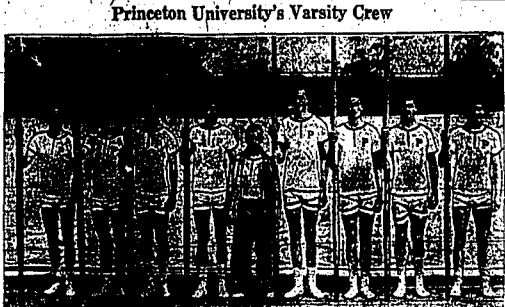

VANCOUVER, B. C., June 21 (AP)—Eddie Hogan, 19-year-old Portland boy, won the Pacific Northwest amateur golf championship today by defeating Johnny Robbins, 10 and 8, in the 36-hole final.

Hogan had Robbins down to 10 and 8 for the ninth and tenth to finish before halting his opponent for good.

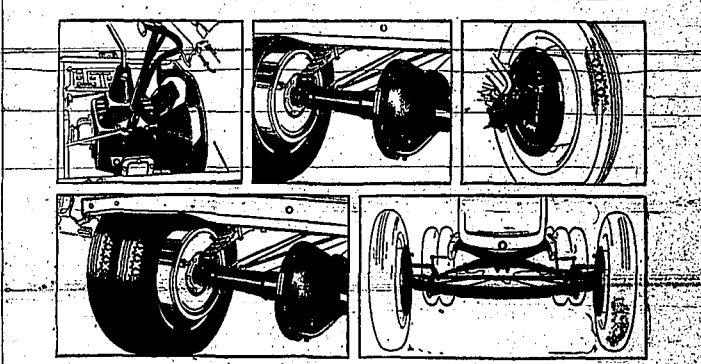

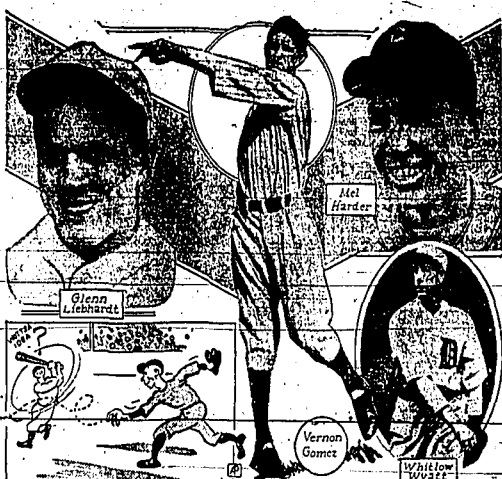

Youthful Material Invades Major Leagues For 1930 Season

Four Hurlers Get Posts While Yet Under Voting Age

Statistics Reveal Youths Seeping Into American And National Leagues at History's Most Rapid Pace

NEW YORK, June 21.—It is an often-repeated cry that the present "machine age" belongs to young men. That old men can't stand up to the pace of swinging wheels. There are no doubtless are many players in the major leagues on whose arms tiny blue veins are beginning to appear, who wonder why this tendency should manifest itself in baseball.
But statistics show that youth is seeping in faster and faster. There are four pitchers in the American League not yet eligible to cast a vote.
Nor are they obscure "bull pen" workers, held on the hope that some day they might develop something.
The first cries of Malvin Leroy Harder were not made until October 15, 1909. They sounded in Des Moines, Nebraska, and Harder, in 1908, won six straight games for the Cleveland Indians.
Justified Praise
He placed the Indians in the pennant race, and justified the club in taking his youthful scrawl on a contract in 1928. That year he spent doing relief hitting, but the next season with the New Orleans Pelicans came on option he won seven games and had two, allowing only 63 hits in 72 innings.
Then there are Vernon Gomez of the New York Yankees and Glenn Liebhardt, Jr., of the Philadelphia Athletics, neither of whom was born until 1910.
Gomez, picked up at his home in Reddo, California, was signed by the San Francisco Seals when only 17 years old. He made his debut in the last play of the Pacific Coast league, with Salt Lake City in 1929, he struck out 172 batters in 203 innings, with the Seals the next year he won 38 games while losing 11.

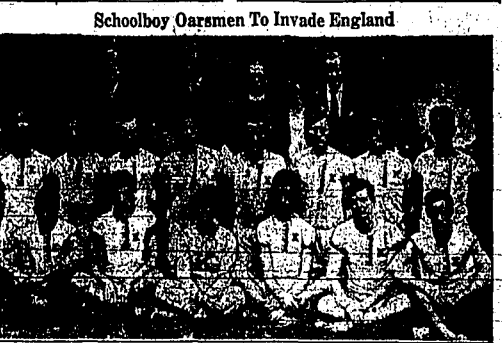
