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SENATORS IGNORE HOOPER'S WISH TO PASS RELIEF BILL

Upper House Votes 66 To 6 For Measure After Rejecting Amendments Designed to Reduce Cost

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, June 23 (AP)—Disregarding again Hoover's wish in the face of an almost certain vote in the senate late today passed by the overwhelming vote of 66 to 6 the modified house bill liberalizing provisions of the World War veterans act of 1924.

The availability of votes for the measure was routed out by the senate in answer to the bill which was introduced by Senator Hooper, but which was not voted on by the senate until after the adjournment of the session.

Senator Hooper, Republican, California, and George Demarest, Democrat, Oregon, introduced the bill on June 17. It was reported by the Finance Committee and as finally passed. Shortridge said he feared the bill would be defeated in the White House as has been the case with similar measures.

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# DR. POWELL URGES AMERICAN IDEALS

## Chauntaqua Speaker Asserts Leaders of Future Must Come From Small-Town

Leaders of America in the future in the past must come from small towns, Dr. E. J. Powell told the crowd which filled the big tent last night, pointing to the fact that the last four men selected for president, Hoover, Coolidge, Harding and Wilson, were from small towns. American ideals must be kept up, he said, by the 4,500,000 girls of America stock becoming mothers instead of allowing the raising of families to be done by foreigners.

Dr. Powell said that there were four easy solutions abroad in this country: the idea that science makes us happier than nature; that money counts more than character; that it is a laughing matter to disobey laws; and that we must care for these evils less in putting teeth in laws than in educating the mind and educating the heart.

Dr. Powell said that the development of regard for the spiritual, respect for the rights of others and the recognition of God, Dr. Powell, who is a cousin of Mrs. H. O. Hayes, was an instructor at the University of the high school of Lincoln, Missouri. Mr. Hayes introduced Dr. Powell.

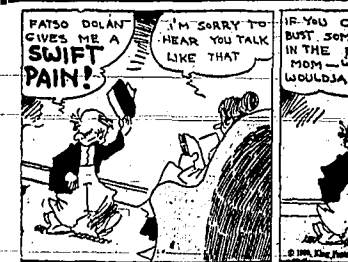

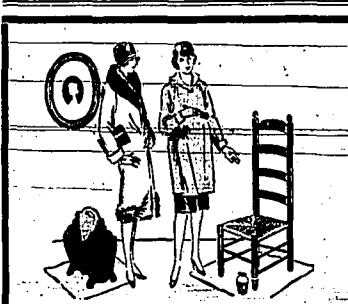

### DEATH RIDES WITH FILER PARTY UPON JOURNEY TO HOMES

#### Auto Accident Closes Life Of Frank J. Fahrénbärker And Brings J. L. Burkett To Verge of Great Beyond

Frank J. Fahrénbärker, 50, filer, blacksmith, is dead; J. L. Burkett, 47, filer, blacksmith, seriously and perhaps fatally injured with fractures and contusions of the chest, and R. H. Wilson, filer, laborer, is suffering from lacerations of the neck as a result of an automobile accident which occurred on the highway near and a half miles south of the scene of the accident yesterday afternoon about 3:30 o'clock Sunday night. Burkett and Wilson were in the Twin Falls county general hospital. The party had been on a trip to the Salmon reservoir, 18 miles south of the scene of the accident.

Within a few minutes after the wreck several cars, driven by Forest Varney, Frank, James and G. P. Noble, Twin Falls, arrived and brought the injured man to Twin Falls. Fahrénbärker was taken to the hospital when picked up, but died on the way to Twin Falls. He is survived by his widow, who was married to the filer; he is married and has three children. Wilson is unmarried.

#### Driver Sees Light

According to the story given by Wilson to Sheriff E. P. Prater, he was driving the car in which Fahrénbärker and Burkett were riding and was on his own side of the road when he saw a car approaching him from the front and on the wrong side of the road. He stated that in an effort to avoid what appeared to be an inevitable collision, he was turned over, Burkett, who was suffering severely when interviewed by Sheriff Prater, said that he saw a light before the accident, but, owing to his condition, was not questioned further by the officer.

The first person to arrive on the scene after the accident was Forest Varney, Twin Falls, who was accompanied by Leonard Leslie and Clifford Urie, constituting a party who had been fishing at the Salmon dam. Varney told Sheriff Prater that he arrived on the scene before the dust caused by the overturning of the wrecked car had settled. He stopped at the wreck. G. C. Nixson, with his son, H. H. Noble, and G. P. Grisell, and Stanley Ludwig who were also returning from the Salmon reservoir, were immediately behind the Varney car, and stated to Sheriff Prater that they saw the wrecked car by the light from the Varney car as it slowed up. The wrecked car was lying on its side with the engine slipping across the highway.

Varney stated that he had not no cars going south after he let the reservoir. This statement, Sheriff Prater said, was corroborated by Mr. Noble who said that they had met no cars going south but stated that he was driving at the rate of 30 miles an hour when the Wilson car passed, traveling, he judged,

# Carnera Wins In Fifth Round When Godfrey Punches Low

### Encounter Proves Nothing of Italian Monster's Ability

### Vast Venetian Lives Up To Finest Traditions of Modern Fighting—by Victory Through Opponent's Foul

By EDWARD J. NEIL (Associated Press Staff Writer)  
**P**HILADELPHIA, June 23.—In keeping with the finest traditions of modern heavyweight battle, Primo Carnera, the mighty muscle merchant of Venice, overcame the Negro Godfrey tonight—on a foul.

Bullyhounded far and wide as the test that is to prove Carnera a genuine, rip-roaring warrior, he was managed to prove exactly nothing. It ended in the fifth round with the man who was belted on the forehead by the Italian, the fatized Shazany-Schelling heavyweight title won up in the Yankee stadium June 12.

It furnished \$100,000 of the ever faithful who paid \$20,000 to see the clash was anything but an extreme agony, this time the highest in point of size that they had ever seen, but it was the head of the Italian, Carnera, linking up most of the floor space, with a left jab and featherweight punch that sent Godfrey tumbling low in his groin.

Godfrey, a huge smelling Negro of the fighting variety, was surrounded in the same perplexed fashion as at the close of so many recent "big battles." Dr. J. Webb Vaughn, physician of the Pennsylvania athletic state commission, examined the vast Venetian in the ring and found that he was fouled, badly hurt and unable to continue.

Referee Tom Riley, who handled the struggle in the rain the night before, was the first to announce the weight title robes from Jack Dempsey here in 1920, said the blow was a deliberate foul.

As for the fight itself, there was much action, but little of a decisive nature. The first round lasted one and a minute, 15 seconds the fifth—after the Associated Press men had Godfrey down in the first round, the first, second and a slight edge in the fourth session with Carnera the better man in the third. There were no knockdowns, although Carnera was staggered in the first round.

The opening round was a thought of take from the minds of the skeptical. Concentrating on the body, Carnera with a left hook, Godfrey with a right, both blocked. Godfrey slammed his man around the ring—over his right arm, and over his right arm to Primo's head at the end of the first.

The fourth round pressed the end. Godfrey obviously was weakened and his punches no longer did much on Carnera's wide open head. The fifth had started before Godfrey, now avoided to a walk, stepped across the ring with a "left hook," which was going to land low. It thudded home on his left arm. Primo caught the blow with a slip, struck Shazany for lighting.
