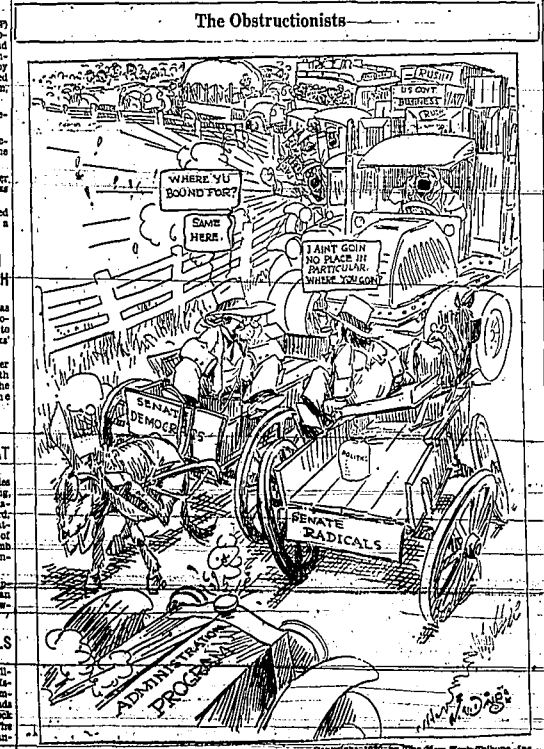

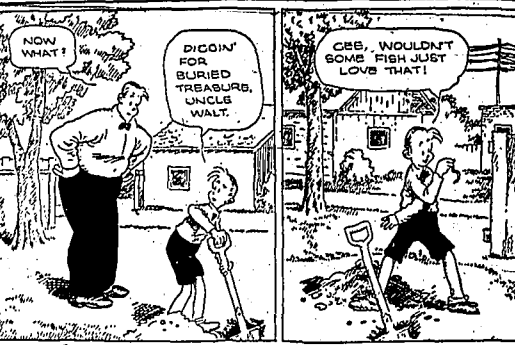

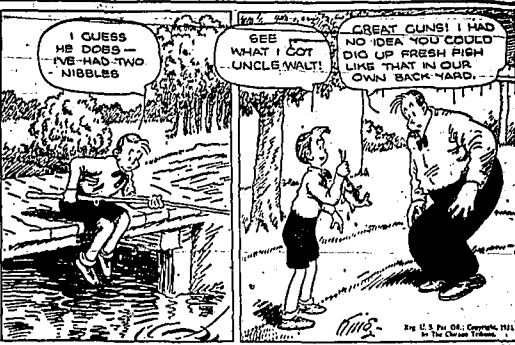

Soldier Unable to Get Into Civil War Battles Commands Veterans

COUSHATT, La., June 27 (AP)—A regiment, unable to discover that the Northern forces had come down the river and their threat of a counter-attack was a bluff, was ordered to retreat.

General L. W. Stephens of Couchatt, La., is in command of the Louisiana National Guard. He is a former member of the United Confederate Veterans.

Stephens, now 67, was named to the office by his comrades at the first reunion at Couchatt, Mississippi, because they felt that although he was an ex-Confederate, he was a hero of Reconstruction days.

In that service, his comrades said, he was an inspiration to his valley brothers and their work has been rewarded in later years as they see their own army. Stephens is a more prosperous. The same spirit still lingers back in the overflows of spring rains in the Red river, from which the plantations now are recovering.

"It was not in a single battle," the blind general said, "that the Confederates said to disclaiming honor as a soldier. Gunboats had come down the river and separated the army. Stephens had fallen. There was disaster on all sides. We just hoped for the best and did what we could, which wasn't much."

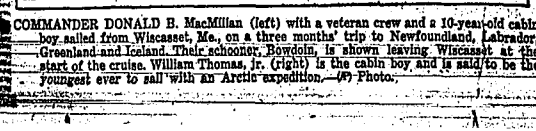
