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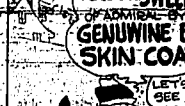

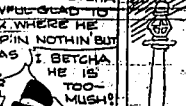

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# Tom Greene Wins in Race of Veteran Packets on Ohio River

## Old Side-Wheeler Churns Past Still Older Betsy Ann

### Race Recalls Days of Robert E. Lee and Natchez; Top Hats and Hoop Skirts Aboard Passengers

(By The Associated Press) CINCINNATI, O., June 25.—The Tom Green, sturdy side wheeler, triumphed over pluck and tradition on the lumpy Ohio river today to win her second consecutive championship of the stream over the historic Betsy Ann.

The trim, white Tom Green, but seven years old, left her oily river behind in a 22-mile race from Kentucky dam to Conty Island. It was the greatest margin of victory in the history of packet racing here.

The race, the third for the modern championship of the river, recalled the days of the Natchez and the Natchez; top hats and hoop skirts as passengers called to each other from opposite decks while the packets snorted and churned their way. The prize itself was a plaque hung from timber at the Robert E. Lee, depicting her struggle with the Natchez on the Mississippi in 1870.

The Tom Green, known to West Virginians and some beholders as the "Hopping Tom" because of her rapid acceleration, pulled several feet ahead of the Betsy Ann, which managed to keep matters pretty much on even terms, however, until they reached the curve of Playtime in front of Cincinnati. Then the Tom Green, with her stern sheers reaching and some beholders credited to the lead by several lengths by the time they reached the city.

In 1925 Barnard gave the Indianapolis club of the American association \$40,000, Riggs Stephenson, former Yonker and Joe Kuganman of Hodapp, that year refused to play for several weeks because he failed to get part of the purchase price.

In 1926 he broke his right ankle and was out for most of the season. The next year he batted .304, but his fielding at third base was indifferent. Then in 1928 he was incapacitated for six weeks with a bad eye.

In 1929 he switched to first base but the injury again overtook him again, and he was out for several weeks with a knee dislocated in spring practice.

When Earl Lind at second slumped this year, Manager Roger Peckinpaugh sent Hodapp to second. Urban floundered briefly and came to his last.

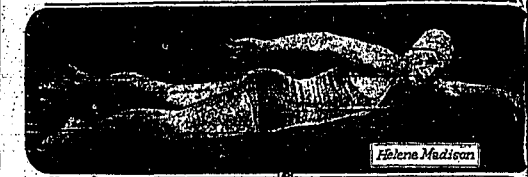

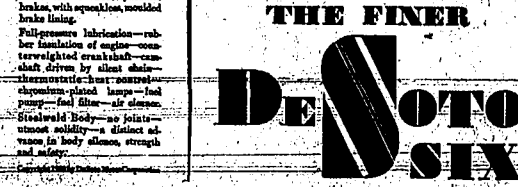

## Mohammedans' Sacrificial Forebodings Of Bad Luck Sadden Morocco's Natives

### Arm of Young Sultan Cuts Sheep's Throat So Deeply That Animal Dies on Being Rushed to Palace

By T. T. TOPPING (Associated Press Staff Writer) RABAT, Morocco, June 28 (AP)—The annual death of a sacrificial sheep to depict the bad omens before the sultan's coronation was supposed to be rushed to the palace, has caused forebodings to many Mohammedans.

A deep-rooted belief that harm will befall the young ruler during the coming year will not dampen the festivity. It was the national holiday of Mohammed—his feast—the slaying of the sheep.

Some 1000 sheep's throats were cut throughout Morocco between midnight and 10 p. m. Many Mohammedans passed out from the effects of overeating in the burning sun of the afternoon. June 28 was recorded but the number is said to be large.

Sheep Price Rises

For 18 days before the day of slaughter, natives at all parts of Morocco, driving before them the traditional sheep, could be seen everywhere. The sheep were sold at all his best, ducks and cows at this season in order to buy a sheep, which was used for the sacrificial feast. In some places, the sheep were sold at as high as \$100.

At 9 o'clock the sultan's head was shaved by the mohammedans.

Since 9 o'clock, delegations from all the friendly tribes—21 were present this year—had been massed in a large field outside the Sultan's Palace, in the center of the city. Clamor of Ceremony

Suddenly in the distance arose a clamor, and presently, protected from the sun by a huge white parasol, held firmly by two Negro giants, with two lads on each side of him, came the sultan. He was dressed in a blue robe, and a white turban. He was followed by a large retinue of officials. He reached the place of sacrifice.

He then stepped in prayer. Then two sheep are brought before the sultan who brandishes a long pointed sword. Two other sheep and both sheep fall.

Three Arabs mounted on mules, carrying the severed sheep, rush toward the Sultan's palace, 500 yards away. Three others carry the severed sheep to the house of the chief justice.

Omens

If the sheep are still breathing upon reaching their destination, the omen of prosperity is assured for the whole Mohammed world. But this year the first sheep expired before reaching the palace. The other animal lived until it had passed the portals of the chief justice.

Thousands crowding to the palace gates to hear the omen were met by the sad message and their laments were strident and long.

"It never occurred in the reign of his father," one woman wailed.

Medial Yusuf, the young Sultan's father, stood five feet five and weighed nearly 200 pounds. Walking 100 yards was violent exercise for him, and lifting his arm above his head a tremendous effort.

## ITALIANS TURN TO BEER AND SURPLUS OF WINES GROWS

### Nation Faces Crisis—Many Vineyard Workers and Hundreds of Others Engaged in Industry Lose Jobs

By ANDRUE BEADING (Associated Press Staff Writer) ROME, June 28.—The wine flowing because Italians are not drinking wine as they used to do.

The country is facing one of the most acute wine crises in her history. Thousands of vineyard workers and wine makers are out of work. And the hundreds of by-product people, such as distillers, who depend on the wine industry are suffering also.

The answer to the puzzle is "beer," the booming beverage having made tremendous strides in Italian favor since the war.

Mesh, Wine Lost

Italian wine has a tendency to turn to vinegar if kept too long. Hence most of the wine that can be sold at once is lost. The value of the wine which goes to vinegar is expressed in millions of dollars.

A congress of wine industries was held here under the auspices of the National Fascist Federation of Wine Industries. Members of all branches of the industry, vineyard owners, distillers and producers, wine merchants, and owners of by-product industries, were in attendance.

Professor Francesco Carpenzetti, director of the federation and who presided at the congress, said in an interview:

"The wine crisis, although connected with the general economic crisis which has struck all countries of the world, has particularly in Italy characteristics of its own."

Former Crisis

A wine crisis is not a new thing. In the last thirty years there have been a half-dozen, one of which lasted three years, from 1908 through 1910.

"Today conditions are worse because the consumption of wine is considerably reduced. Production on the other hand is excessive."

Professor Carpenzetti's remedy was contained in the word "discipline."

"A severe discipline is as necessary in the productive field as in the commercial and industrial field," he said, "a discipline which regulates production quantitatively as well as qualitatively, and which assures the consumer as to the origin and quality of the wine."

Professor Carpenzetti was careful not to mention beer. Yet if its sale could be prohibited he and his wine men would not need to worry.

## British Road Constructs World's First Railplane Passenger Line

A torpedo-shaped coach driven by two airplane propellers, operating fore and aft, and drawing electrical power from the overhead rail to which it is suspended, will flash over an experimental stretch of track built above the main right of way of the London and North-Eastern railway.

It will carry 25 passengers and be capable of developing a speed of 100 miles an hour on a long stretch of track, according to its designer, George Branne, a Scottish engineer.

The railplane is designed to answer to the demand of the airplane age for speedier transportation. The new system will be inspected by delegates to the Transport Congress, which will meet in Glasgow in July. If it wins their approval, plans for a railplane system between Blackpool and Southampton, a distance of 25 miles, will be carried out.

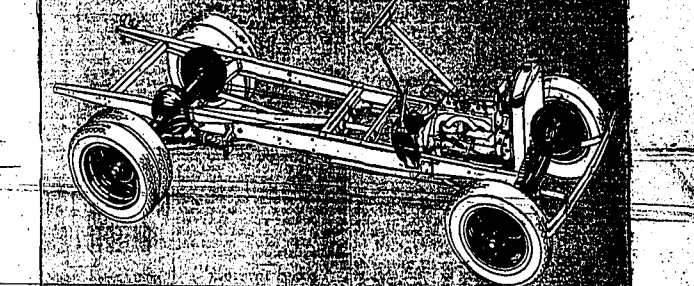

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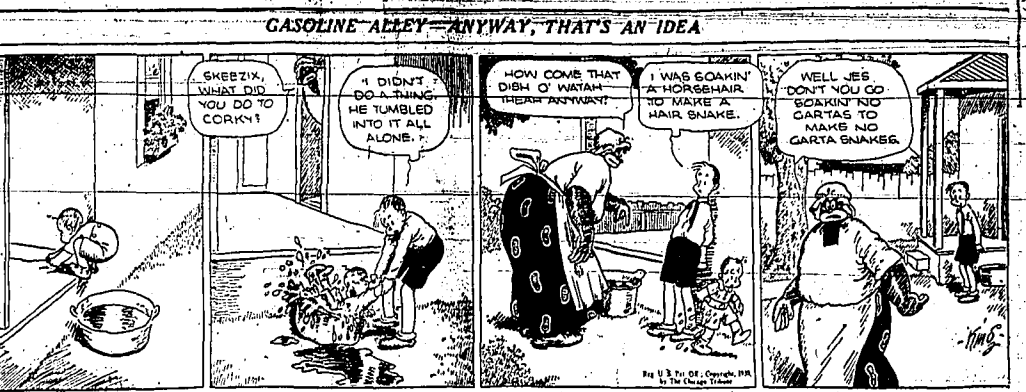

**Reducing Fuel Costs**  
The practicability of reclaiming the heat of water used in washing, without using the water a second time in the laundry, was discussed by T. J. Kouders, Chicago. Under the reclaiming process, the cold, clean water on its way to the boiler passes through the tank in copper pipes and its temperature is thus raised from an average of 40 degrees to an average of 80 degrees. This process greatly reduces fuel cost.
